## Sheridan cuts ribbon on \$10M wastewater upgrade

Indiana American Water Company, a subsidiary of American Water Company, last Friday joined local and state officials, community leaders and project partners at a ribbon cutting to mark completion of a nearly \$10 million upgrade of its wastewater treatment facility in Sheridan.

"The investments we have made in the Sheridan wastewater system since acquiring it in 2018 will enable it to come back into compliance with state and federal regulations and give the town the ability to grow again," said Indiana American Water President Matt Prine. "These improvements will provide significant additional treatment capacity so we can treat wastewater that historically has overflowed or been bypassed into the environment."

The Sheridan wastewater system had received numerous

notices of violation of its National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit over the years following many bypass and overflow events related to limited treatment plant capacity for flows coming to the plant during wet weather.

"Much of the existing wastewater infrastructure in Sheridan was put in place decades ago and was nearing the end of its useful life," said Prine. "The sale of the system to Indiana American Water allowed us to bring the expertise, economies of scale and needed capital to provide a solution to issues the town was facing. At the same time, it also gave them the resources to focus on other community needs and priorities."

"We appreciate Indiana American Water following through on their commitment to help our community address our water and wastewater issues," said Sheridan Town Council

President David Kinkead. "This community has a lot of future growth potential, and the investments Indiana American Water is making in our local infrastructure will help to make Sheridan an even better place for our residents and businesses."

The project triples the plant's ability to handle peak daily flows – the largest volume of flow during a continuous 24-hour period – during wet-weather events and includes adding a larger capacity influent pumping and screening facility, an additional larger capacity clarifier, a second aeration treatment basin, and enhancements to the plant's electrical, chemical feed, supervisory control and data acquisition, and disinfection systems.

With the improvements in place, the plant can treat approximately one million gallons of average daily flow – twice as much as before the improve-

ments, and three million gallons of peak daily flow during wet weather conditions, three times as much as before.

The design firm of Wessler Engineering, and the construction firm of Reynolds Construction, designed and constructed the new facility.

Indiana American Water has also made significant investments in the Sheridan water system, which was also part of the acquisition. The company has invested more than \$2 million in the community's water treatment facility to replace the aerator and filter media, improve chemical feed and disinfection equipment, remove lead service lines and replace a pump at one of the wells used to supply groundwater to the system.

Indiana American Water's serves approximately 2,500 water and wastewater customers in Sheridan, or a population of more than 3,000 residents.

## Westfield Schools gives 2 percent pay increase to certain staff

Westfield Washington Schools (WWS) has announced an across-the-board, 2 percent pay increase for all non-certified staff, including instructional assistants, maintenance, groundskeeping, tech staff, front office support staff and bus drivers. Employees in these positions got a raise of at least 2 percent, or if they have already topped out on the pay scale, were given a 2 percent stipend.

Chris Baldwin, human resources director for Westfield Washington Schools, said the school district wanted to send a strong message to staff.

"It's important that our staff know we value them and the hard work that they do for our district, for our students and for our community," Baldwin said. "These people are the backbone of our district, and as the largest employer in the city, they are the backbone of our community."

Westfield Washington Schools' Chief Financial Officer Brian Tomamichel says local legislators had an impact on this move.

"Thanks to our Indiana general assembly for prioritizing funding for public education," Tomamichel said. "With the funds provided, we were able to ensure that our pay remains competitive so we can retain and attract the most qualified and talented people."

Tomamichel, Baldwin and the WWS administration is preparing to enter into negotiations with the Westfield Classroom Teachers Association with the intention of extending these pay raises to teachers as well.

## Carmel PD investigating Noblesville PD shooting

At approximately 5:22 a.m. last Wednesday, Noblesville police officers responded to 698 S. 5th St., Noblesville, on an unknown call for police. Officers arrived a short time later but were unable to make contact with anyone at the residence.

Moments later, officers heard yelling from the west and went to continue to investigate. At the scene, the officers encountered a male and a female subject. During the encounter, the male subject was shot by a Noblesville police officer. Immediately after he was shot, the officers on scene began rendering aid until medics from the Noblesville Fire Department arrived and transported him to an area hospital.

The male subject has been identified as Karmen Parrish, 41, of an unknown

**Statement from Mayor Chris Jensen on officer-involved shooting**

"This morning our officers responded to disturbance calls multiple times at the same residence involving an individual with an active warrant. The final interaction ended in an officer-involved shooting, which is an unfortunate ending to any public safety call for assistance.

"I have been briefed on the status of the matter and continue to receive updates on a regular basis.

"I am grateful for the continued commitment from the Noblesville Police Department to keep our community safe. Our officers train tirelessly for instances they hope to never face, but are prepared for when they do. I am thankful for our partners at the Carmel Police Department who, per protocol, will step in to lead the investigation into this shooting. Our community's safety is my No. 1 priority."

## Fishers Arts Council awarded \$4,290 grant

The Indiana Arts Commission (IAC) announced it has awarded \$4,290 to the Fishers Arts Council (FAC) through the Arts Project Support grant program.

## Former HSE teacher arrested for molesting student on school grounds

Fishers police have arrested a former Hamilton South-eastern (HSE) Schools math teacher for molesting a student on school property during the 2017-2018 school year.

Ian Gray, 38, Carmel, was arrested and charged with two counts of Child Molestation, one a Level 1 felony, and the other a Level 4 felony.

In late May, a mental health professional contacted the Department of Child

Services, and an investigation began with the Fishers Police Department. Officials within the school district were immediately notified and the teacher was removed from the classroom.

## Olympics on the Big Screen in Carmel

City officials noted Monday's Movie at Midtown schedule will change to accommodate the Games. The last showing of the movie will begin at 6 p.m. instead of 7 p.m. so that live prime time Olympic Games coverage on NBC can be broadcasted.

## Short film puts Noblesville farm in Indiana Spotlight

There is more than corn in Indiana.

Genesis McKiernan-Allen and Eli Robb own and operate Full Hand Farm in Hamilton County. This past weekend, a short film about the farm and its value to the community was featured at the Indy Shorts International Film Festival.

The Reporter spoke with Noblesville filmmaker Rocky Walls about Indy Shorts, about the Full Hand Farm short film titled *More Than Corn*, and about how our readers can enjoy the surprisingly rich Indiana documentary industry all year.

"This particular episode that is playing at Indy Shorts is about their farm waking up after the winter," Walls said. "Although they farm year-round, spring

is still a time of awakening in a lot of ways. The snow is melting. Things are warming up. Certain crops can start to go in the ground. While this episode is a stand-alone little story about their farm waking up, it is also the first episode of an ongoing series for Hoodox, Indiana's streaming service."

According to Walls, Hoodox (Hoosier documentaries that inspire) is Indiana's first and only streaming service featuring exclusively nonfiction, Indiana-focused content that's not only entertaining, but also helps you connect to your community and create positive change.

"For years I've wanted to tell the stories of the hard-working, inspiring people essential to our local food economy," Walls told The Reporter. "Eating local has become more important and mainstream

than ever in the last year, but there's still so much more to learn and share. This standalone short film also serves as the introduction and first episode in an ongoing series our team is producing for exclusive distribution on Hoodox."

While *More Than Corn* is the first part of a series, it stands well enough on its own to earn its place in the Indy Shorts festival.

"Our mission with *More Than Corn* is to inspire Hoosiers to abandon the mindset that Indiana is just cornfields," Wall said. "How many of us have heard or said something along those lines when talking about Indiana with out-of-state friends or even amongst ourselves. Sure, we have corn. But we have so much more and I guarantee you'll be a proud Hoosier when you watch Eli and Genesis work on their small, Indiana farm in

this new series."

Walls joked that neither 12 Stars Media nor Hoodox have anything against corn.

"We aren't anti-corn," Walls told The Reporter with a laugh. "The series has nothing against corn by any stretch of the imagination, but there is more than that here too. This little farm is growing produce on just five acres that feeds hundreds if not thousands of people every year through people buying their produce at a farmer's market or restaurants buying their produce and serving it customers. In Indiana, sure we've got corn and we've got soybeans, but we've got a lot more than that, too, and let's celebrate that."

When Hamilton County art dealer was at center of international intrigue

It has been 30 years since an international art scandal found its way to a small Hamilton County art studio. Many county residents have forgotten or were not here to remember the circumstances which led to the event that made the news throughout the U.S. and Europe. It was 1991 when the tale of intrigue reached its climax.

The story began in 1974 when military forces from Turkey invaded and occupied the island nation of Cyprus. Looting followed during which four ancient religious mosaics were stolen from a Greek Orthodox church. Little was known of the whereabouts of the mosaics and other looted items for several years.

They had been smuggled from Cyprus to Amsterdam by a shady Turkish art dealer, and eventually came into the possession of a Swiss dealer who claimed to be an Austrian archduke.

Meanwhile during the 1970s and 80s in Hamilton County, art dealer Peg Goldberg was operating a studio in her home on Shelburne Road a mile north of 116th Street. Peg, a native of Spencer, Ind., was an IU graduate, a social worker and a Hamilton County Commissioner. She was elected in 1986 partially due to her opposition to making 116th Street a four-lane road from U.S. 31 to Michigan Road.

Among Peg's friends and clients was prominent

banker Nick Frenzel, a top executive with Merchants National Bank in Indianapolis and a Carmel resident.

In 1988 while on a buying trip in Europe, Peg heard that four priceless mosaics were available for \$1.2 million. They were reported to be among the five most valuable pieces of Byzantine art in the world.

Peg called Frenzel seeking a loan in the belief that the four art objects could be sold for as much as \$20 million. Frenzel made arrangements to get the money to Peg.

News reports indicate Peg met the alleged archduke at the Vienna airport to make the transaction. She shipped the mosaics home. The archduke was apparently not seen again.

Seeking to sell the items, stored in the Merchants Bank vault, Peg made con-

tact with the J. Paul Getty Museum in California. Getty officials apparently tipped off Cypriot authorities that some of their looted art had been located. The Greek Church Archbishop of Cyprus soon filed suit in federal district court at Indianapolis, demanding return of the property.

In 1991, the court ruled the Greek church would get the mosaics. They were shipped back to Cyprus where they are on display at the national museum.

The bank lost its money and later sued Peg, but she likely could not pay. Peg maintained she did not know the art was considered stolen property. She later married a Richmond, Ind., orchestra conductor and moved to Naples, Fla. where the couple opened an art gallery. Peg died in 2012 at the age of 73.

By the way, it doesn't have to be 50, 60, or 65 - it's perfectly okay to do it for any old birthday. You'll spread love and kindness that just might come back to you tenfold!

## Good fitness plans use activities you already enjoy

"This is the first day of the rest of your life..." - "Hold Us Together" by Maher and Wilson

Even during a pandemic, each day is an opportunity to focus on how to customize a fitness lifestyle that makes sense for you which will address most specifically your needs and your schedule.

As a nutrition and wellness coach and fitness instructor, I know very well how clients can be resistant to a plan which does not truly reflect their goals and real-world opportunities to achieve those goals. My professional management position for many years kept me at my desk and sitting at meetings, so incorporating flexibility and strength training was imperative and in my "retirement" (think REWIRED instead of retired!) years that focus becomes even more important as I age - gracefully, I hope!

It is a well-known fact that moderate exercise can help prevent slowing processes that come with age, as

it enhances blood flow to the brain, which can reduce the risk of stroke. It also improves cognitive processing and slows down the degeneration of the nervous system.

The key to a fitness plan is to not think of it as short-term punishment that you have to "put up with" but to make it part of your daily routine. After a few weeks it will become second nature to you. Additionally, it is important to remember that you only have to lose a small amount to see large health benefits. Losing just 5 to 10 percent of your body weight can lower blood pressure, cut your risk of diabetes and heart disease, and lower your intake of bad cholesterol.

Let's see ... what is an activity in which most of us participate every day? Could it be ... walking?! This simple act will bring significant benefits to your heart and your weight. If you aim for 10,000 steps per day, you will feel the difference. And if you feel like skipping - go for it and increase your calo-

rie burning! The key to a plan or program which will keep you focused on activity is to find what you enjoy, vary your activities by biking, dancing, swimming - or whatever keeps you moving.

Don't forget the resistance training which can raise the metabolic rate by about 30 to 50 calories per day. Over a three-month period, appropriate training will produce about three pounds of muscle which will boost your resting metabolic rate by about 7 percent. Do you have a favorite TV or internet program you watch two to three times each week? Make that your resistance training time as well while you watch or listen to your program!

Many of you who read my column regularly know that I am passionate about the importance of flexibility training for your body. Without it, none of the above suggestions will give you maximum results and can lead to injury. Your joints can tighten and become thicker as you age, but flexibility exercises can help increase mobility. Bending, rotating, and extending your joints prevents injury so choose a good, gen-

tle stretching regimen four or five days a week. The key word is *gentle* with no vigorous forward or side twists.

My most important recommendation - before implementing any of the suggestions mentioned above - is that you have a complete physical to determine any contraindications to any of these activities. In particular, if you are over 50 years of age and have had little or no physical activity for some time, please begin with your physician's examination which can address or uncover issues which may help you to plan your fitness program. The key to your success lies within you: Find activities that help you feel better, look better, and increase your energy and longevity. Remember, "This is the first day of the rest of your life..."



## Olympics swimming

Carmel's Jake Mitchell places 8<sup>th</sup> in 400 free

The first of Carmel's two swimming Olympians took to the water last Saturday, and he made his way into prime time.

Jake Mitchell made a stunning run into the final of the 400-meter freestyle event last Saturday morning at the Tokyo Olympics. Seeded 13th in the semi-finals, Mitchell swam a personal best time of 3:45.38 to place seventh overall, with the top eight advancing to the final and a chance to swim for medals.

Mitchell finished eighth in the final, with a time of 3:45.39, just .01 seconds off his semi-finals time. Mitchell and the other qualifiers swam the finals last Saturday night (last Sunday morning in

Tokyo) and a large crowd of several hundred people gathered in Carmel's Midtown Plaza to watch on the big screen television.

The gold medal in the 400 free went to Tunisia's Ahmed Hafnaoui. The 18-year-old came from behind to finish first and give his country its first-ever gold medal in that event. Hafnaoui's time was 3:43.36. He qualified eighth in the event and swam from Lane 8, making him only the third swimmer in Olympics history to win gold from that lane.

Australian Jack McLoughlin took the silver (3:43.52) and American Kieran Smith took the bronze (3:43.94). Carmel's second

Olympian, Drew Kibler, will begin his Olympic quest on Tuesday. Kibler will be part of the US

men's 4x200 freestyle relay. The American team will swim in the second of two heats at 7:03 a.m.

EDT Tuesday morning.

Each heat contains eight teams for a total of 16 competitors. The

top eight teams advance to Tuesday night's final, which is set for 11:26 p.m. EDT.

## Haylin Harris runs away with Indiana Women's PGA Open

It had been a while since Haylin Harris had won a tournament.

The last victory for the Carmel golfer and incoming Michigan State University senior was a junior tournament. Last Thursday, Harris won her first adult tournament by triumphing at the Indiana PGA Women's Open, which took place at Plum Creek Golf Club in Carmel.

Harris led the tournament wire-to-wire, carding identical rounds of 67 on both days of the event to pick up the win. Her final total of 134 was 10 under par and nine strokes ahead of second place.

"It was actually my lowest tournament total," said Harris. "I've never been in double digits before, under par."

Harris was in control from the beginning, making six birdies during her first round last Wednesday to take an early, four-stroke lead. She followed that up with another six birdies during the second round last Thursday, making four of them in the front nine. That's a total of 12 birdies for the tournament, the most of any player.

"I just felt very comfortable with what I was

doing the last few days," said Harris. "When I knew I had a nice cushion there, I knew I didn't need to do anything crazy. Just maintain what I was doing. I felt very calm coming down the end there."

After receiving the winner's trophy, Harris gave a brief speech, thanking her supporters and complimenting the Plum Creek staff for having the course in great shape after it had been drenched by rain late last week.

"When I was out here, I was like 'Hey, it's going to be hard to get the course ready in a couple days,' but I couldn't believe how well they did," said Harris. "The balls were bouncing way down the fairway today and they had it very firm, so they did a phenomenal job getting it dried out in time."

Harris will soon be headed back to Michigan State for her senior year. The Spartans won the Big Ten tournament last season, qualifying for the regional and eventually the NCAA national tournament, where they finished 16th.

"We have three freshmen coming in and they're all really good, and we've

got a couple of really good returners, so I think we're going to have a really strong team again this year and do some good stuff," said Harris.

Zionsville's Claire Edwards and Fountaintown's Anneliese Fox each carded 143s to tie for the runner-up position; both golfers had two-under par 70s in their second round.

Four other Hamilton County players finished in the top 10. Carmel's Angelica Pfefferkorn, a Guerin Catholic graduate now playing for Oklahoma State University, placed fourth with an even-par 144. Pfefferkorn had seven birdies over the course of the tournament.

Noblesville's Macy Beeson, an incoming Lapel junior, took fifth by scoring 145. Beeson made an eagle during her first round, taking care of the par-4 Hole No. 10 in two strokes. She also made one birdie in the second round.

Two Carmel golfers tied for sixth. Incoming sophomore Michaela Headlee scored a 146, draining seven birdies along the way. Sydney Longstreth, a new Carmel

# Westfield native takes his brother with him in spirit to Tokyo Olympics

Standing at 6-feet-5 and 230 pounds with a recognizable hairstyle, Westfield native Joe Schroeder is a civil engineer who enjoys sailing in his free time, was a college cheerleader, and a rugby standout who earned a roster spot on Team USA. "There is such a deep sense of pride," Joe's mother Susan Schroeder said. "Joe is full of grit and determination, he always chased his dreams, and this is one of his biggest ever. He has been relentless."

The most recent addition to Schroeder's robust resume reads "member of TEAM USA Eagles rugby sevens squad."

Beginning at age 15, he collected a few rings at Cathedral High School.

"And as he moved onto college, he decided to go to Trine (University) for civil engineering, and they did not have a rugby program," Jim Schroeder said. "So, he just decided not to play sports. Sophomore year there was

Joe Schroeder will proudly represent Trine University as their first-ever Olympian; he's also one of two Cathedral grads to compete on the world's biggest stage.


