# Looking back 59 years

Time capsule from 1962 found in cornerstone of Noblesville church

On Tuesday afternoon, a time capsule from 1962 was opened in the cornerstone of the First Church of God located off Field Drive across from Noblesville East Middle School. Community members, including members of the 1962 congregation, gathered to open the time capsule and revisit the history of the church and of Noblesville.

The church was disbanded 12 years ago, and the property was purchased five years ago, initially for storage, and the land will now be used to construct the new Noblesville High School tennis facility.

Noblesville Schools Director of Communications Marnie Cooke told The Reporter she had heard rumors of a time cap-

### Local food pantries getting more than 4,700 pounds of meat thanks to 4-H'ers

### The REPORTER

Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank (HCH) has sponsored its sixth year of "Meating" The Need, a partnership between 4-H Beef, Dairy, and Swine projects and the Food Bank. HCH is a non-profit organization that supports local food pantries and meal programs year-round in Hamilton County.

This year HCH purchased nine beef cattle and eight swine at the Hamilton County 4-H Livestock Auction on Tuesday, July 20.



More than 4,700

pounds of meat will supply 20 Hamilton County food pantries with farm fresh beef and pork raised by 4-H members. Meat Distribution Day is Saturday, Aug. 7. This is the fifth year that volunteers from St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, Carmel will help with Meat Distribution Day.

The 16 4-H members, including 10-Year 4-H members Jenna Peterson and Andrew Holloway, designated their animals for sale to the Food Bank will be helping to feed families and children across Hamilton County with the equivalent of 18,800 meals of good, healthy protein.

Protein is an item that is often missing from HCH clients' meals and hard to provide consistently by the pantries because of cost. When beef and pork are available, the families are so appreciative. Donations to this program went towards the appraised market purchase price of the 4-H animals and to the 4-H members as they pursue their 4-H, education, and life goals.

### Shields to be honored as first judge of county's Superior Court 1

A special ceremony honoring the first judge of Hamilton Superior Court No. 1, V. Sue Shields, will be held at 10 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 23, 2021, in the Ceremonial Courtroom of the Hamilton County Historic Courthouse. The event is open to the public and will feature comments from Judge Sue Shields and Commissioner Steve Dillinger.

The Hamilton County Commissioners, who are playing host to the event, will unveil a plaque which shall permanently honor the numerous achievements of Judge Shields. The event was

originally planned to take place during the Centennial Year of the 19th Amendment, but was postponed due to COVID.

Judge Shields was not only the first judge of the Hamilton Superior Court following its creation by the Indiana General Assembly, but she was the first woman judge elected to a court of general jurisdiction in the State of Indiana. That "first" was followed by her appointment as the first woman to serve on the Indiana Court of Appeals by then-Governor Otis Bowen. She capped off her judicial career by being the first woman Magistrate appointed in the Federal Court for the Southern District of Indiana.

Judge Shields and her late husband Bill raised their family in Sheridan where they resided for many years. Bill Shields served as Sheridan Town Attorney for many of those years.

called our council president over lunch because he was able to find out from the state that our revenues will be \$4.6 million less than what his conservative estimate was. So we are looking at things a little bit more closely because we have to account for that much less revenue in 2022. There are things we can do to adjust, but no decisions have been made. We are still in the middle of it."

Alexander told The Reporter part of the shortfall may be a sort of hidden state penalty for receiving COVID-19 relief money in the form of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) disbursements.

"We get our revenue from many different sources," Alexander said. "Revenues outside of local income tax were up. When you look at thing like real estate going up by 6.5 percent in assessed values, we are actually still – I believe trending very positively. This [state tax revenue reduction] has obviously caught us all off guard and I think without understanding exactly how this came to be,

calls and my understanding is that it could be tied to the ARPA money that we got. That distribution may be being used against us. But I am not sure. I want to wait for Mike Reuter to get back with us and say, 'This is how it is going to impact us.' We have already mapped out the strategies that will allow us to not make huge, impactful changes."

Alexander explained that the county's rainy-day fund could easily absorb this, but council members are also working to be fiscally prudent and make changes where needed.

"I think the department heads did a very great job of putting together their plans and trying to stick to what we want to achieve, which is having a fixed tax rate that doesn't go up," Alexander said.

Reuter will present a revision to the fiscal plan at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday morning with adjustments for the income tax revenue shortfall.

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

### **Rep. Spartz co-sponsors** bipartisan, bicameral bill to help provide critical new resources to federal judiciary

Congresswoman Victoria Spartz (R-Ind.-05), member of the House Judiciary Committee, joined representatives Darrell Issa (R-Calif.-50), Juan Vargas (D-Calif.-51), and Scott Peters (D-Calif.-52) in introducing bipartisan and bicameral legislation to provide the federal judiciary critical resources in the form of new judges to relieve overcrowded dockets and streamline vital court proceedings.

A Senate companion bill of this legislation was introduced by Senators Todd Young (R-Ind.) and Chris Coons (D-Del.).

"Our judicial system is overwhelmed with hundreds of thousands of pending cases," said Rep. Spartz. "It has long been said that justice delayed is justice denied. This legislation addresses this issue for the most overworked regions of our country, including political manner."



Sen. Young attacks the bill for "taking a system that is actually working cause it "federalizes states' authority quite well and applies drastic election reforms." Unfortunately, Indiana's voting system is not "actually working quite well." Even in 2020, a year that witnessed high voter turnout, Indiana ranked 43rd out of 50 states and D.C.

The reasons for Indiana's low turnout can be attributed to Indiana's voter registration deadlines, voter ID law, and other voting structures that create unnecessary barriers for Hoosier voters. For example, our Voter ID law is one of the most restrictive in the nation; only six other states employ such an ID law. Voter registration ends 29 days before Election Day, the earliest date allowed under federal law.
