# Submission portal now open for American Rescue Plan funding

Hamilton County businesses, nonprofits encouraged to apply

The application portal to request American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding assistance is now open for Hamilton County businesses, nonprofits, and governmental units.  
The funding will support hundreds of organizations that serve Hamilton County residents mitigate the negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. All entities must complete the online process.  
"This is about much more than simply replacing lost revenue," said Amy Massillamany, Hamilton County Council President. "It's about helping the people in our communities. Sure, it's about helping to keep the doors open, but by doing so, we are helping our neighbors receive paychecks and healthcare their families are relying on, now more than ever."  
The Hamilton County ARPA Committee drafted an investment plan that was ap-

proved by the County Commissioners at their Aug. 9 meeting. The plan includes a variety of programs to help the county recover from the effects of the pandemic, including support for the business community and service organizations.  
The funds will be available to organizations that meet the following criteria. Those who:  
• Are in good standing concerning state and local taxes, any appropriate professional licensing and/or program (state and federal)  
• Are in compliance with any appropriate and applicable local codes and ordinances  
• Are locally owned  
• Are in good standing with the Indiana Secretary of State  
• Endured negative economic impact due to the COVID-19

public health emergency  
• Show a decline in overall revenue from 2019  
• Can supply a COVID impact statement that illustrates the connection between the negative economic harm and the COVID-19 public health emergency  
Priority will be given to those businesses that are minority-, woman- or veteran-owned and service organizations focused on providing direct, life-sustaining assistance, with a focus toward recovery and sustainability.  
"I have seen organizations do some amazing things to adapt and survive under unprecedented circumstances, but so many are just getting by as the pandemic drags on," said County Commissioner Christine Altman. "This grant pro-

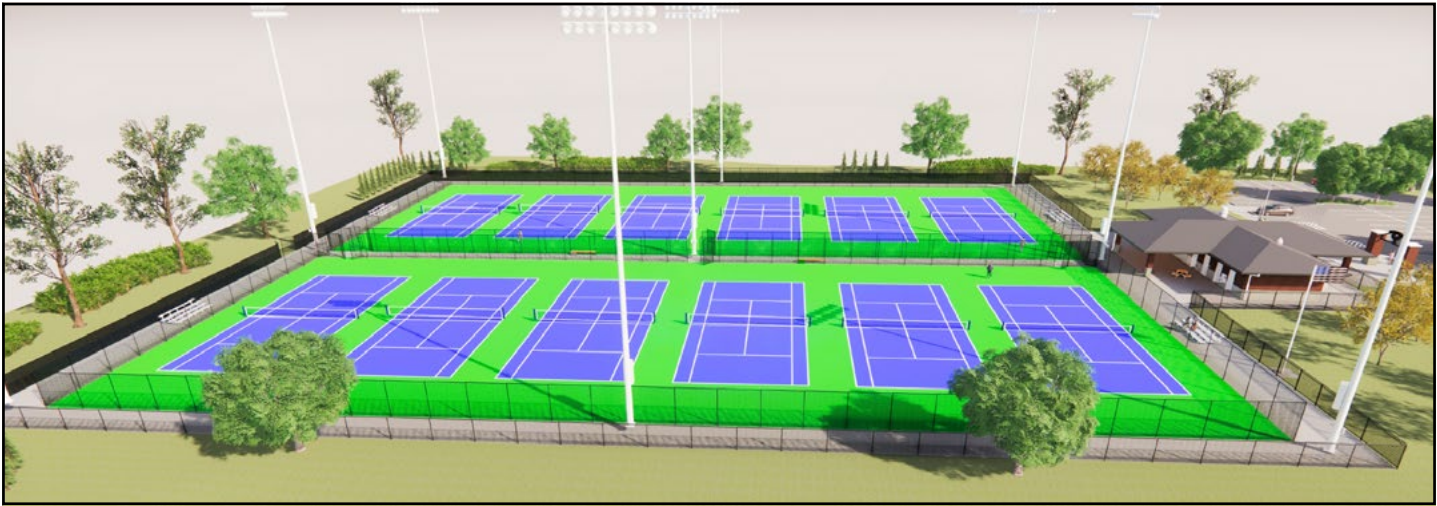
gram provides much needed assistance that will help organizations throughout our community overcome the next phase of the crisis."  
The size of the relief grant is not to exceed the total revenue lost by the organization between 2019 and 2020. Relief grant funds can be used for a variety of expenses including, but limited to payroll and benefits, rent, mortgage, utilities, insurance, advertising, materials, etc.

## New 12-court tennis facility heads to Noblesville school board for approval

Noblesville High School has announced the proposed construction of a new tennis facility to be located on Field Drive across from Noblesville East Middle School.  
Construction of the 12-court facility was approved Tuesday

by Noblesville Common Council, and it will now go before the school board on Tuesday, Aug. 17 for approval.  
If approved, construction of the \$4 million facility is scheduled to begin Sept. 1 with expected completion in May 2022. School officials indicat-

ed the project will be financed through a bond with no increase in the tax rate and no use of referendum funds or classroom dollars.  
"The new courts allow us to meet demand and continued growth at NHS for an expanded tennis program," said Marnie

Cooke, Director of Marketing and Communications for Noblesville Schools. "Our current courts are shared by NHS and Noblesville East Middle School. The current courts will still be maintained and will be used for middle school tennis and public access."

## State Rep. Tony Cook's bill requiring civics education in middle school signed into law

Governor Eric Holcomb recently ceremonially signed into law State Rep. Tony Cook's (R-Cicero) legislation meant to improve civic engagement among Hoosier students.  
The law requires middle school students to complete one semester of civics education. According to Cook, Indiana students already take a government class their senior year of high school, but his law ensures students in grades 6, 7 and 8 learn about civic engagement earlier.  
"When you turn 18, you're expected to be involved in your community, vote for elected officials and follow the actions taken by our local, state and federal governments," said Cook, a retired school superintendent and government teacher. "However, young adults are not always armed with the tools and knowledge to successfully participate in our democracy. Requiring a civics education course in middle school, along with a government class before graduation, will help prepare young Hoosiers to be engaged citizens throughout their lives."  
Cook authored this law based

on the recommendation from the Civics Education Task Force lead by Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch. He was appointed to serve on this task force along with other state lawmakers and elected officials in 2020. According to Cook, this law is modeled after a successful Florida program.

As a result of all this hard work, 198,421 Hamilton County residents have been fully vaccinated as of Thursday, Aug. 5. Westfield has the highest vaccination rate at 93.7 percent while Carmel sits at 80 percent. Overall, 70.7 percent of eligible Hamilton County residents have been fully vaccinated. Because of these high vaccination numbers, counties surrounding Hamilton are seeing much higher infection rates than we are.

With this type of success, some politicians will try and take credit for other people's accomplishments. Personally, I would like to thank our leaders who work behind the scenes – our Hamilton County pandemic leaders from the Hamilton County Health Department, Hamilton County Emergency Management, and every other county government official that put in the work. Rain barrels continue to grow in popularity across the country; beautifully painted rain barrels increase their desirability and encourage water conservation by using recycled rainwater. Rain barrels sit under gutter downspouts to collect and store rainwater from roofs that would otherwise be lost to runoff and diverted to storm drains, streams and rivers. The collected water can then be used to water plants in the landscape instead of using treated water, which saves water and energy. Additionally, Carmel residents who install a rain barrel are eligible to apply for a \$50 rebate per barrel from the city's Storm Water Utility.

# Are you owed back child support? Ex-spouse's Social Security can be garnished

Many women are unaware that child support that was never collected can be garnished once the ex-husband starts to collect Social Security. If your spouse is in arrears to more than one ex-spouse, no longer is it on a "first come, first serve basis." There is a limit on how much he can be garnished, depending on if he is also supporting a spouse or child.

And while Social Security Disability payments cannot be garnished for regular debt like credit cards and past due medical bills, disability, too, can be garnished for child support!

Many have long given up on collecting back child support by the time their ex-spouse reaches the earliest age he can choose to draw Social Security retirement

benefits (age 62), but back child support orders never expire.

While you can do it without an attorney, it's easier if you hire professional help. You'll need to locate your original child support order and calculate how much you are owed. Basically, you need an order from the court that you can send to Social Security to request a garnishment. Send the judgement for garnishment (if the court doesn't file it for you) by certified mail to: General Counsel, Social Security Administration Room 611, Altmeyer Building, 6401 Security Blvd., Baltimore, MD 21235.

If you are the person who owes back child support and are afraid you might have nothing left once your ex reads this arti-

cle, fear not. There is a cap on how much your Social Security can be garnished, so you won't be left with \$0.

The maximum that can be garnished is 50 percent of your Social Security if you support another child, 60 percent if you don't support another child, and 65 percent if the support is more than 12 weeks in arrears.

These rules do not apply to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) as it is protected from garnishment even if the creditor is eligible to garnish regular Social Security. SSI is a form of welfare for low-income seniors.

## Sen. Young to oppose infrastructure bill

*U.S. Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) on Sunday issued the following statement regarding his intent to vote against the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act:*

"For the last several months, I've been working diligently with my colleagues toward a bipartisan infrastructure bill to provide crucial funding for our crumbling roads and bridges and to make targeted investments that yield positive long-term results in areas like broadband, ports, and airports.

"As I've said many times, while I'm eager for a bill that makes these investments, I'm also committed to doing so in a fiscally responsible way. Having reviewed the Congressional Budget Office's (CBO) estimated fiscal impact of this legislation as currently constructed, and frankly

still not being comfortable with a number of the Democratic priorities contained in this version, I will vote 'no.'

"As many of you know, I have concerns with the way CBO scores legislation and, even in this case, I don't agree exactly with their scoring analysis. Nonetheless, I'm not yet comfortable with the current pay-fors in this legislation nor am I comfortable with Speaker Pelosi's continued insistence on tying passage of this bill to the Democrats' \$3.5 trillion reckless tax-and-spend budget proposal. Whether it is infrastructure or the

Democrats' reckless budget, we can't afford to continue to grow the national debt at this pace, particularly as our economy recovers from the pandemic.

"Once this legislation passes the Senate, it will move next to the House of Representatives, where changes are all but certain. I intend to do what Hoosiers expect me to do, which is to continue working with my colleagues to improve this bill in hopes that the final product will be one I can support, because I sincerely believe we must address our nation's infrastructure needs."

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# Noblesville police officer David Barnes promoted to Sergeant

On July 21, Noblesville Police Chief John Mann petitioned the Noblesville Police Merit Commission to consider a merit promotion within the police department.

Chief Mann requested that Patrol Officer David Barnes be promoted to the rank of Sergeant. The Police Merit Commission approved the request and Barnes was officially sworn in at his new rank during an internal ceremony on Monday.

Sgt. Barnes was hired by the NPD on June 20, 2016. Prior to his promotion, Sgt. Barnes served in the Criminal Investigations Division as a detective since October 2019. He began his career assigned to the Patrol Division as a patrol officer prior to his appointment as a detective. In addition to his regular duties, Sgt. Barnes also serves the department as a STOPS (Strategies & Tactics of Patrol Stops), RAD

(Rape Aggression Defense), ALICE instructor as well as a DRE (Drug Recognition Expert). Sgt. Barnes will be reassigned back to the Patrol Division where he will serve as a field supervisor.

Advancement to the rank of sergeant and lieutenant are merit promotions within the Noblesville Police Department. Patrol officers and detectives are eligible to apply for the sergeant promotion process, while officers currently holding the rank of sergeant are eligible to apply for the lieutenant process. Interested candidates for either process must submit to a formal evaluation process. The process is comprised of a number of components to include a written examination, oral interview, assessment exercises, and a review of past work performance. The process is

extremely competitive and is administered every two years in order to establish an eligibility list. If the promotion request is approved by the Police Merit Commission, the officer is required to serve a one-year probationary period.

The Noblesville Police Merit Commission is charged with making final decisions on promotions, hiring, and disciplinary matters relating to members of the police department. The commission meets on the third Wednesday of each month at 5 p.m. at Noblesville City Hall and the public is welcome to attend.

All other advancements in rank within the police department are considered appointments (deputy chief and assistant chief) and are made by the Chief of Police and those appointees serve at his/her discretion.

## Talk to your kids about vaping before they have a chance to start

Dear Editor:

It's the most wonderful time of the year ... back to school! You may have sent your children back to school, but have you really checked everything off that back-to-school checklist?

**Make sure you've checked off talking to your kids about the dangers of vaping.**

Unfortunately, one out of five high school and one in 20 middle school students currently use e-cigarettes. According to the CDC, among the 3.6 million U.S. youths using e-cigarettes in 2020, more than 8 in 10 reported using flavored e-cigarettes. It's important to talk to your child. Vaping is not just flavored water. It contains nicotine, and it's addicting.

Here's some tips to prevent youth from vaping:

- **Start the conversation early** – Share the facts. A wonderful resource is the [CDC Know the Risks Parent Tip Sheet](#).
- **Create a trusting environment** – Make sure when they come to you, they already know you will openly listen to them.
- **Look for opportunities** – If you pass someone vaping, take that opportunity to remind your child why they should not vape.
- **If you vape, quit** – Be a smoke/vape-free role model for them to look up

to. Call the Quitline (1-800-784-8669) for FREE tobacco cessation resources.

Here's some tips on how to talk to youth who are vaping:

- **Stay calm** – Don't get angry. It will only make things worse. Stay relaxed and put away all electronic distractions.
- **Respectfully ask questions** – Ask them why they started vaping. Ask them if they understand the dangers of vaping. Try not to interrupt their responses.
- **Talk to them about advertising** – Youth are shocked Tobacco Companies target them in an attempt to attract new users.
- **Respond with care** – Let them know their health is important and nicotine can even train their brain to be more easily addicted to other drugs.

It's important to give them the tools to be successful.

Make certain they are prepared and they know the harms of vaping. Let them know you support them and you're proud they choose to be smoke and vape-free! 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# Attorney General Todd Rokita warns Hoosiers of new 'unsubscribe' scams

Even typically savvy consumers are falling victim to a new scam in which they are emailed that they must unsubscribe from free-trial services in order to avoid charges on credit card accounts, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has warned.

The new scam is distinctive from others because the email instructs recipients to phone a call center for more information rather than providing links in the text of the message itself. (In some variations of this scam, the fraudsters may phone consumers rather than email them and leave callback numbers.)

Operators at the call centers direct callers to a fake company website and lead them through a series of online steps that installs dangerous malware onto the victims' computer systems.

"Scammers are constantly becoming more clever and cunning in their tactics," Rokita said. "Our office is committed to making sure Hoosiers are aware and prepared to avoid these kinds of traps."

Victims are less likely to suspect scams when they are the ones taking the initiative to gather more information, Rokita said, such as having to phone a call center.

Further, email messages that contain malware links are often detected by computer security applications. The attackers in this case avoid such detection by leading victims to those links over the phone.

During the conversations, the scammers may ask callers to download a spreadsheet and follow other instructions. When callers say they do not recall ever signing up for any

free trial offers, operators often explain that it appears someone else signed up for the offers using the callers' information.

"The paradox is that these scammers pretend to be helping protect their victims," Rokita said. "In reality, they are preying upon them."

At the end of the calls, the operators assure callers that nothing will be charged to their credit card accounts. By that time, the unsuspecting victims already have downloaded malware onto their computers that may enable the scammers to remotely control the victims' computer systems or install ransomware.

Anyone receiving emails such as those described above should refrain from calling the phone numbers provided – and be especially sure not to navigate to any websites provided to you on the phone.

Instead, if you receive such an email, you should call your credit card companies and explain the nature of the email you received. For peace of mind in the off chance the email is legitimate, simply instruct your credit card companies not to accept any such charges.

In addition, if you are concerned about the possibility of unknown charges or debts accrued in your name, you should consider obtaining regular credit reports from Equifax, Experian and/or TransUnion.

If you suspect that your computer has been compromised by a hacker, you should:

1. Quarantine your device by unplugging from the network and disabling Wi-Fi. As long as you're connected to the internet, the hackers may be access-

ing your device.

2. Change your passwords. Make your passwords longer – ideally at least 12 characters.

3. Let your family and friends know that your device or email may have been hacked so that if they notice anything suspicious appearing to come from you, they don't fall prey to a scam themselves.

4. Scan your device for any malware, deleting anything suspicious, and restart your device.

5. To be better prepared for such events, install security software from a company you trust and set it to update automatically. Use a password manager to keep track of your passwords.

Report any scam attempt you encounter to the Consumer Protection Division of the Indiana Attorney General's Office, which works every day to safeguard the rights of Hoosiers. Visit [Indiana-Consumer.com](http://Indiana-Consumer.com) for more information.

# Southeastern boys start at home, 'Hounds, Tigers are on the road

The first official day that IHSAA boys soccer games can be played is Saturday, and three Hamilton County teams will be taking to the field that day.

Hamilton Southeastern will host Mount Vernon for its season opener, while two more schools will be going on the road. Carmel plays at Zionsville and Fishers travels to Franklin Central for an early Hoosier Crossroads Conference game.

The Tigers won a regional championship last year and came very close to advancing to the state finals. Fishers coach Phil Schmidt said his team returns "many key contributors" from that squad.

Juniors Noah Reinhart, a Second Team All-State player and Keiji Nakamae will lead the attack, while two seniors, goalkeeper and captain Tyler March and center back Teghan Brownell, and sophomore Kyle Clayton, are the top defenders.

Four-year letter winner and captain Sam Hevesy and captain Charlie Stump will lead the midfield. In addition, the Tigers will have several first-year varsity players and three freshmen. In all, Schmidt says Fishers has a solid team with quite a bit of potential.
