

ness, but customers do not always see.

Some of the most important functions that serve all county citizens are done on the county level. From judicial services, county sheriff, to our award-winning parks department, work is done every day to serve our constituents.

In the past year alone, we put a business aid program in place for locally owned small businesses that were forced to close due to the pandemic, started the groundwork to build a shelter for domestic violence victims, received the only AAA bond rating for a county government in Indiana, and will be engaging in performance audits of all departments to ensure that we are spending taxpayer dollars as efficiently as possible. While all this is vital it pales in comparison to the work done by some of our pandemic leaders in Hamilton County government.

When the pandemic started, our Emergency Management Department and Health Department moved quickly and decisively. Numerous volunteers were recruited and trained. Mass vaccination sites were opened at Riverview Hospital and the Hamilton County Fairgrounds. Currently there are more than 50 vaccination sites in our county. When I received the vaccine at Riverview hospital it was a well-organized and flawless process from start to finish.

State Rep. Tony Cook's bill requiring civics education in middle school signed into law

Governor Eric Holcomb recently ceremonially signed into law State Rep. Tony Cook's (R-Cicero) legislation meant to improve civic engagement among Hoosier students.

The law requires middle school students to complete one semester of civics education. According to Cook, Indiana students already take a government class their senior year of high school, but his law ensures students in grades 6, 7 and 8 learn about civic engagement earlier.

"When you turn 18, you're expected to be involved in your community, vote for elected officials and follow the actions taken by our local, state and federal governments," said Cook, a retired school superintendent and government teacher. "However, young adults are not always armed with the tools and knowledge to successfully participate in our democracy. Requiring a civics education course in middle school, along with a government class before graduation, will help prepare young Hoosiers to be engaged citizens throughout their lives."

Attorney General Todd Rokita warns Hoosiers of new 'unsubscribe' scams

Even typically savvy consumers are falling victim to a new scam in which they are emailed that they must unsubscribe from free-trial services in order to avoid charges on credit card accounts, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has warned.

The new scam is distinctive from others because the email instructs recipients to phone a call center for more information rather than providing links in the text of the message itself. (In some variations of this scam, the fraudsters may phone consumers rather than email them and leave callback numbers.)

Operators at the call centers direct callers to a fake company website and lead them through a series of online steps that installs dangerous malware onto the victims' computer sys-

"Scammers are constantly becoming more clever and cunning in their tactics," Rokita said. "Our office is committed to making sure Hoosiers are aware and prepared to avoid these kinds of traps."

Victims are less likely to suspect scams when they are the ones taking the initiative to gather more information, Rokita said, such as having to phone a call center.

Further, email messages that contain malware links are often detected by computer security applications. The attackers in this case avoid such detection by leading victims to those computer has been comlinks over the phone.

During the conversations, the scammers may ask callers to download a spreadsheet and follow other instructions. When callers say they do not recall ever signing up for any

free trial offers, operators ing your device. often explain that it appears someone else signed up for your passwords. the offers using the callers' information.

"The paradox is that ideally at least 12 these scammers pretend to be helping protect their victims," Rokita said. "In reality, they are preying upon them."

At the end of the calls, the operators assure callers that nothing will be charged to their credit card accounts. By that time, the unsuspecting victims already have downloaded malware onto their computers that may enable the scammers to remotely control the victims' computer systems or install ransomware.

Anyone receiving emails such as those described above should refrain from calling the phone numbers provided – and be especially sure not to navigate to any websites provided to you on the phone.

Instead, if you receive such an email, you should call your credit card companies and explain the nature of the email you received. For peace of mind in the off chance the email is legitimate, simply instruct your credit card companies not to accept any such charges.

In addition, if you are concerned about the possibility of unknown charges or debts accrued in your name, you should consider obtaining regular credit reports from Equifax, Experian and/or TransUnion.

Soccer begins on Saturday . . .

Southeastern boys start at home, 'Hounds, Tigers are on the road

The first official day that IHSAA boys soccer games can be played is Saturday, and three Hamilton County teams will be taking to the field that day.

Hamilton Southeastern will host Mount Vernon for its season opener, while two more schools will be going on the road. Carmel plays at Zionsville and Fishers travels to Franklin Central for an early Hoosier Crossroads Conference

The Tigers won a regional championship last year and came very close to advancing to the state finals. Fishers coach Phil Schmidt said his team returns "many key contributors" from that squad.

Juniors Noah Reinhart, a Second Team All-State player and Keiji Nakamae will lead the attack, while two seniors, goalkeeper and captain Tyler March and center back Teghan Brownell, and sophomore Kyle Clayton, are the top defenders.
