# Submission portal now open for American Rescue Plan funding

*Hamilton County businesses, nonprofits encouraged to apply*

**The REPORTER**  
The application portal to request American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding assistance is now open for Hamilton County businesses, nonprofits, and governmental units.  
The funding will support hundreds of organizations that serve Hamilton County residents mitigate the negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. All entities must complete the online process.  
“This is about much more than simply replacing lost revenue,” said Amy Massillamany, Hamilton County Council President. “It’s about helping the people in our communities. Sure, it’s about helping to keep the doors open, but by doing so, we are helping our neighbors receive paychecks and healthcare their families are relying on, now more than ever.”  
The Hamilton County ARPA Committee drafted an investment plan that was ap-

proved by the County Commissioners at their Aug. 9 meeting. The plan includes a variety of programs to help the county recover from the effects of the pandemic, including support for the business community and service organizations.  
The funds will be available to organizations that meet the following criteria. Those who:  
• Are in good standing concerning state and local taxes, any appropriate professional licensing and/or program (state and federal)  
• Are in compliance with any appropriate and applicable local codes and ordinances  
• Are locally owned  
• Are in good standing with the Indiana Secretary of State  
• Endured negative economic impact due to the COVID-19

• Show a decline in overall revenue from 2019  
• Can supply a COVID impact statement that illustrates the connection between the negative economic harm and the COVID-19 public health emergency  
Priority will be given to those businesses that are minority-, woman- or veteran-owned and service organizations focused on providing direct, life-sustaining assistance, with a focus toward recovery and sustainability.  
“I have seen organizations do some amazing things to adapt and survive under unprecedented circumstances, but so many are just getting by as the pandemic drags on,” said County Commissioner Christine Altman. “This grant pro-

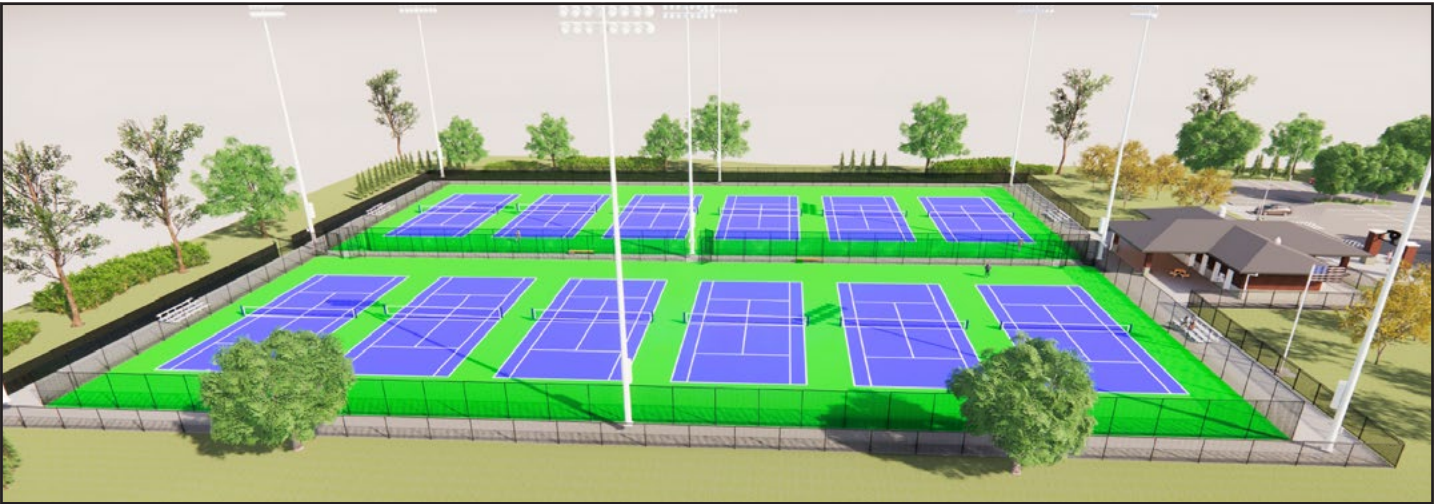
gram provides much needed assistance that will help organizations throughout our community overcome the next phase of the crisis.”  
The size of the relief grant is not to exceed the total revenue lost by the organization between 2019 and 2020. Relief grant funds can be used for a variety of expenses including, but limited to payroll and benefits, rent, mortgage, utilities, insurance, advertising, materials, etc.

# Mosquitos test positive for West Nile virus in Noblesville

The Hamilton County Health Department Vector Control Program has received confirmation notice from the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) that the first mosquito sample of the season has tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV).  
The sample was collected from a trap site located in the near Greenfield Avenue and Summer Road in Noblesville. The detection of WNV activity is evidence that the disease is present in Hamilton County and the public should take proper precautions to stay protected.  
For optimum protection the Health Department recommends individuals:  
1. Wear long sleeves, pants, socks, and shoes when outdoors.  
2. Apply EPA approved insect repellent containing DEET, Picaridin, or Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus to any exposed skin.  
3. Keep mosquitoes outside by keeping doors and windows closed or making sure

# New 12-court tennis facility heads to Noblesville school board for approval

Noblesville High School has announced the proposed construction of a new tennis facility to be located on Field Drive across from Noblesville East Middle School.  
Construction of the 12-court facility was approved last Tues-

day by Noblesville Common Council, and it will now go before the school board on Tuesday, Aug. 17 for approval.  
If approved, construction of the \$4 million facility is scheduled to begin Sept. 1 with expected completion in May 2022. School officials indicat-

ed the project will be financed through a bond with no increase in the tax rate and no use of referendum funds or classroom dollars.  
“The new courts allow us to meet demand and continued growth at NHS for an expanded tennis program,” said Marnie

Cooke, Director of Marketing and Communications for Noblesville Schools. “Our current courts are shared by NHS and Noblesville East Middle School. The current courts will still be maintained and will be used for middle school tennis and public access.”

# County still on ‘do not feed’ list

*DNR says 76 counties can resume feeding birds*

The Indiana DNR announced last Tuesday that Hoosiers in 76 counties across the state can resume feeding birds but asks that residents of Hamilton County keep their feeders down while the investigation into what is killing songbirds continues.  
The DNR recommended a statewide moratorium on bird feeding on June 25 to slow the spread of a still-undetermined illness that is killing birds across the state. Hoosiers answered the call, removing feeders, cleaning birdbaths, and submitting more than 3,400 reports of sick or dead birds. DNR biologists believe there to be more than 500 cases in 72 counties that involve a very

specific set of clinical signs (crusty eyes, eye discharge, and/or neurological issues).  
Based on the data, it appears that the illness is consistently affecting specific areas. There is no imminent threat to people, the population of specific bird species, or to the overall population of birds in Indiana.  
Residents of the following counties should continue to refrain from feeding birds: Allen, Carroll, Clark, Floyd, Hamilton, Hancock, Hendricks, Johnson, Lake, Marion, Monroe, Morgan, Porter, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe, and Whitley.  
Residents of other counties may again put out their feeders. Seed and suet feeders should be cleaned at least once every two weeks

by scrubbing feeders with soap and water, followed by a short soak in a 10 percent bleach solution. Feeders should be thoroughly rinsed and dried before being filled with birdseed. Hummingbird feeders should be cleaned at least one a week with a 10 percent bleach solution and rinsed thoroughly.  
The USGS National Wildlife Health Center’s avian disease experts are working to determine the cause of this outbreak. Indiana will continue to support the effort by providing samples to the laboratory.  
If you see a sick or dead bird with the above symptoms, report it at [on.IN.gov/sickwildlife](https://on.IN.gov/sickwildlife). Reports help DNR staff continue to track this outbreak.

# No surprise, Hamiton County is fastest growing in the state

To no one’s surprise, Hamilton County’s new official census shows explosive growth in the past 10 years, increasing by 26 percent to 347,467. In 2010 the total was 274,569. The 2020 census shows the county as the fourth most populous in Indiana after Marion, Lake and Allen.  
Two of the state’s 10 largest cities are now Carmel, in fifth place at 99,757, followed closely by Fishers at 98,977. Noblesville is at 69,604, and Westfield – which is actually the fastest growing – has a population of 46,410.

Mark Heirbrandt, president of the county Board of Commissioners, said he is not surprised by the figures, and feels the county has done a very good job of keeping up with the dynamic growth. “We are always planning five to 10 years ahead, and a good example is the current study we approved for potential water and sewer service” in the area of 236th Street and U.S. 31.  
With the greatest population increase of any Hoosier county, the growth requires almost constant improving and addition of

roads, schools, health services, criminal justice facilities, planning services, parks and recreation.  
The new census also means more representation for the county in the state legislature, likely one more representative and perhaps one additional senator. This depends, however, on how gerrymandering of the districts is accomplished.  
The 5th Congressional district, of which the county is a part, will also be redrawn and likely make Hamilton County a greater portion of the district than it is currently.

## Duke Energy Foundation awards \$40K total to 3 county school districts

The Duke Energy Foundation has awarded approximately \$280,000 in grants to 11 workforce development and education programs in Indiana to help create a pipeline of workers prepared for employment.

Locally, Hamilton Heights School Corporation received \$20,000 for career technical education programs, Noblesville Schools received \$10,000 for SoftSkills integration within Noblesville Schools' internship program, and the Westfield Education Foundation received \$10,000 to

support certification cost for students and teachers in its trades program.

"I hear consistently from Indiana businesses that well-trained workers are one of their greatest needs," said Duke Energy Indiana President Stan Pinegar. "Many of the jobs don't require a college degree but instead need skilled workers with specialized training. These grants support that demand. Developing a skilled workforce is key to attracting and retaining business in Indiana, and it's a high priority of Duke Energy."

## Actors Theatre of Indiana receives \$24K grant from Indiana Arts Commission

The Indiana Arts Commission announced its award of an Arts Organization Support grant to Actors Theatre of Indiana (ATI) on July 12. This grant of nearly \$24,000 will be paid out annually over the next two years.

Over 590 applications were reviewed by 167 Hoosiers from around the state specializing in arts, community development, and finance.

"The projects and organizations that are receiving the funding have major positive impact on the culture, economic, and educational climate of Indiana," said Indiana Arts Commission Chair Alberta Barker.

The annual distribution

totaling \$11,978 is an AOS Grant – Art Operations and Support.

"This two-year grant will assist ATI to further its mission to enhancing the quality of life in Central Indiana by offering high quality professional theatre performances and programs that engage, inspire, educate, and entertain," explained ATI Executive Director James Reilly.

Funding for the Indiana Arts Commission and its programs is provided by the Indiana General Assembly and the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency.

## Westfield touts 94.3% vaccination rate

Zionsville officials say residents want a return to normalcy, and that's why 95 percent of the population 12 and older is fully vaccinated, according to data from the Indiana State Department of Health.

Mayor Emily Styron said Tuesday, "Vaccines are how we get back to normal. Vaccines are important."

The Democrat says that message helped motivate Zionsville residents to get their shots and now, accord-

ing to health officials, they have become the most vaccinated community in Central Indiana. "They really engaged our community as volunteers, and there's nothing like making the point that we're all in this together than inviting the community to help in the vaccination effort."

Styron also says she's depended on churches and other local organizations to spread the message on getting the

COVID-19 vaccine.

In Hamilton County, Westfield also has a high vaccination rate. The city of 46,145 people is trailing just behind Zionsville; 94.3 percent of Westfield residents 12 and older are fully vaccinated. The Hamilton County Health Department says it's because more than half of their population has a high school or college education.

"That helps as well when

it comes to them going out and finding out that information to help them make that decision on getting vaccinated," said Christian Walker, the Hamilton County Health Department public health preparedness coordinator.

Walker adds that there's also been an increase in available health care in Westfield.

"Part of it is they've got a new hospital system there, with Riverview (Health) expanding the hospital out into Westfield. I think the (U.S.) 31 corridor helps," Walker said.

# Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will conduct sobriety checkpoint on Friday, Aug. 20

A sobriety checkpoint will be conducted on the night of Friday, Aug. 20.

Impaired driving is one of the nation’s most frequently committed violent crimes. Just in Indiana in 2019, alcohol-related traffic crashes

killed 106 people and injured another 1,014 people. Twenty-six percent of all drivers involved in fatal collisions in Indiana were legally impaired.

In Hamilton County in 2020, the State filed 898 cases involving impaired driv-

ing. Of these, 101 drivers had prior convictions for operating while intoxicated within the last five years.

To combat this crime, the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will set up sobriety checkpoints around Hamilton County to aggres-

sively deter, detect and arrest those drivers who make the decision to drive impaired. Sobriety checkpoints have proven successful in both raising awareness of impaired driving and reducing the likelihood of a person driving after they have been drinking.

screens are in good repair.

4. Avoid outdoor activities at dusk and dawn, when the mosquitoes that transmit WNV are most active.

In addition, all Hamilton County residents are asked to do the following in order to eliminate mosquito breeding sites around their home:

1. Remove all unneeded containers that hold water (tires, cans, bottles, buckets, jars, drums, and other trash/rubbish).
2. Dump and invert wheel barrows and kiddie/toddler pools when not in use.
3. Change water in bird-baths and pet bowls weekly.
4. Inspect water in flower pots and plant containers weekly.
5. Clean rain gutters.
6. Drain and fill tire ruts, stagnant pools, and puddles.

7. Place tight covers over cisterns, cesspools, septic tanks, tubs, and rain barrels where water is stored.

8. Keep the margins of ponds clear of vegetation and stock ornamental ponds with top – feeding minnows.

In response to finding WNV, the Hamilton County Health Department will increase surveillance and control activities in the sample positive area. Adult mosquito fogging will be conducted to rapidly decrease the number of adult mosquitoes in the sample positive area.

# Our leaders during COVID pandemic were not politicians

Hamilton County government is an entity that sometimes gets overlooked in our county. I once had a conversation with one of our county mayors who referred to county government as the back-of-the-house restaurant function that is vital to the business, but customers do not always see.

Some of the most important functions that serve all county citizens are done on the county level. From judicial services, county sheriff, to our award-winning parks department, work is done every day to serve our constituents.

In the past year alone, we put a business aid program in place for locally owned small businesses that were forced to close due to the pandemic, started the groundwork to build a shelter for domestic violence victims, received the only AAA bond rating for a county government in Indiana, and will be engaging in performance audits of all departments to ensure that we are spending taxpayer dollars as efficiently as possible. While all this is vital it pales in comparison to the work done by some of our pandemic leaders in Hamilton County government.

When the pandemic started, our Emergency Management Department and Health Department moved quickly and decisively. Numerous volunteers were recruited and trained. Mass vaccination

sites were opened at Riverview Hospital and the Hamilton County Fairgrounds. Currently there are more than 50 vaccination sites in our county. When I received the vaccine at Riverview hospital it was a

well-organized and flawless process from start to finish.

As a result of all this hard work, 198,421 Hamilton County residents have been fully vaccinated as of Thursday, Aug. 5. Westfield has the highest vaccination rate at 93.7 percent while Carmel sits at 80 percent. Overall, 70.7 percent of eligible Hamilton County residents have been fully vaccinated. Because of these high vaccination numbers, counties surrounding Hamilton are seeing much higher infection rates than we are.

With this type of success, some politicians will try and take credit for other people's accomplishments. Personally, I would like to thank our leaders who work behind the scenes – our Hamilton County pandemic leaders from the Hamilton County Health Department, Hamilton County Emergency Management, and every other county government official that put in the work. Hats off to you and God bless.

# Are you owed back child support? Ex-spouse's Social Security can be garnished

Many women are unaware that child support that was never collected can be garnished once the ex-husband starts to collect Social Security. If your spouse is in arrears to more than one ex-spouse, no longer is it on a "first come, first serve basis." There is a limit on how much he can be garnished, depending on if he is also supporting a spouse or child.

And while Social Security Disability payments cannot be garnished for regular debt like credit cards and past due medical bills, disability, too, can be garnished for child support!

Many have long given up on collecting back child support by the time their ex-spouse reaches the earliest age he can choose to draw Social Security retirement benefits (age 62), but back child support orders never expire.

While you can do it without an attorney, it's easier if you hire professional help. You'll need to locate your original child support order and calculate how much you are owed. Basically, you need an order from the court that you can send to Social Security to request a garnishment. Send the judgement for garnishment (if the court

doesn't file it for you) by certified mail to: General Counsel, Social Security Administration Room 611, Altmeyer Building, 6401 Security Blvd., Baltimore, MD 21235.

If you are the person who owes back child support and are afraid you might have nothing left once your ex reads this article, fear not. There is a cap on how much your Social Security can be garnished, so you won't be left with \$0. The maximum that can be garnished is 50 percent of your Social Security if you support another child, 60 percent if you don't support another child, and 65 percent if the support is more than 12 weeks in arrears.

These rules do not apply to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) as it is protected from garnishment even if the creditor is eligible to garnish regular Social Security. SSI is a form of welfare for low-income seniors.

# Smooth budget hearings lead to better outcomes for taxpayers

Thank you to the Hamilton County Reporter again. It is wonderful to participate in local news reporting, and as a reader of this article, I know that you share the same passion for our local community. I'm honored to be provided this opportunity to share my comments with regards to the County Council.

I trust everyone has had a wonderful summer. It is nice to have spent time with family and friends and even better to enjoy it without masks. August is budget season and your County Council deliberated over department budget requests, non-profit funding, and county project planning for two days. The goal of every Councilor is to keep the tax rate low and maintain or improve the quality services that our citizens and businesses demand.

The last 18 months have been hard on everyone, but it has not been without some positives. Difficult times require us to rethink things which can be a catalyst to growth. As I began to look over the notes from the budget hearings and the August Council meeting, I happened upon some information from the Health Department. I am awed by the county's reaction to the coronavirus. The hard work and determination of so many have helped Hamilton County lead the state in our vaccination rate of 76 percent for eligible persons 12 and older. It is this effort that is going to help our businesses cope and stay open should the Delta variant continue to spread. No one wants to relive 2020, so thank you for your efforts to keep our numbers lower than any other county in the Indianapolis metro area.

Budget hearings are two days of meetings that are the culmination of months of work by our county departments. It would be a mistake to not state how thorough and supportive the Auditor, her staff and the rest of the departments have been during our deliberations. The hearings went very smoothly, but I've had several requests to explain the process.

The budget hearings are in effect a work session

with the various departments. It is advertised like any other public meeting but is not the actual public budget hearing, which will happen on Oct. 5 at our regularly scheduled meeting. At that meeting, the public is welcome to participate and provide comments. The adoption of the budget will happen after the public hearing concludes at a special meeting currently scheduled for Oct. 17.

The timing of these various meetings also coincides with revenue information provided by the state and overseen by the Department of Local Government Finance (DLGF). I would recommend that all taxpayers become knowledgeable of the process and understand how your taxes are divided up and spent by your various governmental units.

The overwhelming issue that was raised by the different departments was the need for a qualified workforce and succession planning. Time and again, we reviewed requests for new people but were also told about how hard it was in recruiting people to come work for the county. These are two issues that we are working with various leaders around the county, but it is also the main reason that I championed the need for a Hamilton County career center and sought out a county audit. The career center will not fill every job but with information collected from our economic development experts at Invest Hamilton County, we can focus training in the areas of greatest need.

How will the audit help this? Our audit has a focus on creating efficiencies and possibly better ways to provide services so that the need for more people can be automated or processed differently. We have no doubt that our departments run very lean and efficiently, but we want to give the department leaders the opportunity to challenge their own thoughts and ideas.

Another topic of conversation at budget hearings was about the opportunities provided to the county through grants. As we stretch and maximize every dollar, we also must

continuously look for new revenue to offset the use of county tax dollars. Every department has grant opportunities, but few have the time or resources available to manage either the grant writing process or the paperwork that follows.

One department head stated that 20 to 40 percent of her time weekly was spent doing paperwork for a single grant. Through much debate we empathized with her position but directed her to continue to pursue the grant and we promised to seek support to help her with the paperwork. This is but one department and there are many that could use these services.

We do not want to advocate for a single entity in each department but will turn to the audit to determine how best to support grant writing and administration. We do not want to overwhelm the audit team but it is an opportunity to relieve financial burdens, possibly in a way that is highly efficient or even outsourced.

The budget hearings concluded with some news of an estimated Local Income Tax (LIT) distribution that was far below anticipated levels. In previous articles in The Reporter, this was shared, but I want to alleviate concerns about the impact of this change in our anticipated revenues.

The amount of LIT is distributed by the state and generally follows similar changes of other Marion County doughnut counties. This year was very different, and we will seek to understand why. Our estimates already accounted for revenues based on only 10 months because of the state income tax delays in 2020. Our numbers showed a 3.6 percent drop in LIT from the previous year, while similarly-sized counties like Hancock, Hendricks, Boone, Johnson all experienced modest gains or decreases. Even Marion County had less of a drop than we did, and our county opened back up before all of them. We believe that this might be an error and will seek further information. This change can be absorbed without increasing our tax rate, dipping into our Rainy Day Fund, or changing our operational budgets.

As an analogy, our household can still pay

all our bills, pay the kids for mowing the lawn, do the bathroom renovation we had budgeted for, but we are not going to put as much into savings as we had hoped. It is Hamilton County's fiscal discipline and strong financial position that allows for this to be achieved.

The last item for this article is the only item of major consequence discussed at County Council. I requested several months ago an ordinance that requires that any department notify the Council of any grant that requires financial commitments from the county in the form of a match. As a county, we have been disciplined in managing cash flow, but unforeseen changes can wreck a plan. The goal of the ordinance is not to be the approver of the grants but to have knowledge of the application so that we can refine our financial plan to accommodate the projects in the grant.

Some of these commitments are years away while others can be the very next year. Offsetting budget costs is not a concern and is strongly encouraged for our departments. Unbudgeted projects are an issue when they are very large.

In the 2022 budget, the Sheriff is seeking body cameras for its staff, and we have accounted for that in their budget. He also plans to seek grant dollars that might minimize that expenditure.

After much deliberation, we concluded the introduction of that ordinance and will refine language based on comments shared.

This is a good ordinance that will allow us to continually refine budget plans to reflect current conditions. It is no different than how you manage your household budget and businesses.

My goal with these monthly columns is to inform you of county-level issues, and to invite you into the conversation. It is easy to say we have all the answers, but I see myself as a gatherer of facts elected to promote business principles in government. 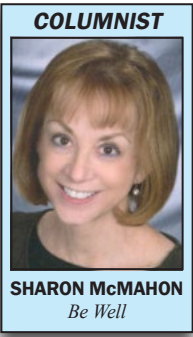
