# Hamilton County farm receives Hoosier Homestead recognition

The Ringer Farm in Hamilton County recently received a Hoosier Homestead Centennial Award for being in operation since 1894, according to State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) and State Sen. Jim Buck (R-Kokomo).

# Noblesville East Middle School moves to virtual learning

In consultation with the Hamilton County Health Department, all Noblesville East Middle School (NEMS) students moved to virtual instruction on Tuesday.

Over 20 percent of the NEMS population is currently absent due to illness, including **50 confirmed positive COVID cases reported last week and 12 more as of Monday**. This 20 percent does not include COVID direct contacts. It does include other illness absences in addition to COVID.

- Team Wake Forest will return to school on Thursday, Aug. 26.
- Team DePauw will return to school on Monday, Aug. 30.
- All other NEMS teams return to school on Tuesday, Aug. 31.
- *If the school nurse has given you a different specific return date due to your personal medical situation, follow that guidance.*

Noblesville Schools officials say they have moved to this short-term, temporary virtual instruction to slow the spread of illness. Officials say they believe students learn best in school and they want

# Westfield City Council approves funding for new public library

*Groundbreaking could take place in spring 2022*

The Westfield City Council has approved a \$16.725 million general obligation bond to fund a new public library. The new 45,000 square-foot library will be built on 3.6 acres at Westfield Boulevard and Park Street in the heart of downtown Westfield.

"This new building will be a centerpiece in the heart of Westfield's expanding downtown," said Library Director Sheryl Sollars. "While the current building has served us well through the years, it doesn't allow

us room to grow and continue to meet the community's burgeoning needs."

The current library on Hoover Street was built in 1983 and expanded in both 1994 and 2014. At 32,230 square feet, it doesn't offer enough room for further expansion.

"The approval on the bond allows us to finalize the purchase of the new property and put the project out for bid," Sollars added. "Our hope is to

break ground on the new library next spring with a grand opening in the fall of 2023."

The newly approved bond will cause a 2-cent tax increase; however, Westfield Washington Schools plans to decrease its tax rate over the next several years, allowing construction on the new library to be net neutral.

KRM Architects will serve as the project architect.

# Three accidental deaths in Hamilton County on Saturday

There were three unexpected deaths in Hamilton County on Saturday, Aug. 21. Two were drownings and one was the result of a single-vehicle accident.

## Fishers drowning

On Saturday night, Fishers police responded to

a call that a body had been discovered in a local pond near 116th Street and Cumberland Road.

According to Hamilton County Chief Deputy Corner Thurl Cecil, the body has been identified as Jesse Randall, 31, Fishers.

There was no indication of foul play involved

in Randall's death. No toxicology reports have been released at this time and the investigation is still ongoing.

## Atlanta drowning

At approximately 9:30 p.m. on Saturday, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department assisted Jackson

Township Fire with a call to Crooked Creek Avenue northeast of Cicero.

David Allan Murphy, 78, Atlanta, was found at the bottom of a pool by his wife. Murphy had a history of heart conditions. Cecil told The Reporter that Murphy most likely suffered a medical episode before fall-

ing into the pool.

## Noblesville car accident

A single-vehicle accident on Saturday at the dead end of Presley Drive in Noblesville left one man deceased, though his body was not located until Monday.

Noblesville Police responded to the scene where a vehicle had struck the concrete barricades at the end of Presley Drive, near the edge of Noblesville city limits. No one was in the vehicle when police arrived.

the community to know they did not make this move lightly. The spike of illness NEMS is currently experiencing is significant, rapidly spreading, and, according to officials, is like nothing the school has seen before.

(no late start for NEMS). Teachers will provide further instructions.

NEMS athletics and other after school activities are canceled through Tuesday, Aug. 31.

An initial search of the area turned up no evidence of anyone from the vehicle.

Because the search area was widened to include the unincorporated area outside Noblesville, on Monday both the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department and Hamilton County EMA assisted Noblesville PD with a search that led to the discovery of the body of the white male driver, whose name has not been yet been released, approximately 100 feet from the scene of the accident.

Hamilton County Sheriff's Department Public Information Officer Ryan McClain told The Reporter, "It looks like he was, for whatever reason, leaving the scene and made it about 100 feet into a field, which was out of Noblesville jurisdiction. That is where he was found, deceased."

Hamilton County EMA assisted with aerial camera drones to both help find the driver and to map the area between the accident and where the body was located.

McClain said toxicology reports are still pending, but the autopsy showed the injuries were consistent with a vehicle accident and there is no foul play suspected.

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Department was able to contact family members who were able to positively identify both the driver and the vehicle.

# Hamilton County studying water availability

*Environmental consulting firm hired to evaluate supply, promote conservation*

## The REPORTER

Hamilton County is addressing what could soon become a dire problem – a shortage of groundwater supply. It has hired an environmental consulting firm, INTERA Incorporated, to study the county's water availability and to determine best conservation practices.

"Hamilton County has long been one of the fastest growing counties in the nation," said County Surveyor Kenton Ward. "Our

water supplies and distribution systems, like other infrastructure, have had to stretch to keep up. We need to do what we can now to ensure we can deliver safe and reliable water to the community in the future."

The Indiana Development Finance Authority published a Central Indiana Water Availability report last year which indicated an alarming increase in water use in Hamilton County, specifically drinking water and industrial demand.

"Hamilton County is at a crossroads relative to growth, connectivity, and application of digital tools to modern problems," said Jack Wittman, INTERA's

Vice President of Water. "Simply stated, more data is needed to solve the water availability needs in the county. Our plan will provide the county with re-

al-time information that can help inform water supply stewardship."

The three-year study will cost the county \$2,145,000. The project will:

- Monitor aquifer and surface water levels and quality to better define seasonal variations and identify potential conflicts in use.
- Discover ways to improve long-term water availability in the county.
- Improve efficiency and expand aquifer yield for drinking water use.

Consider alternative engineering designs for recharging the aquifers.

"We are the first county in the state to commit to a water study like this one," said Mark Heirbrandt, president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. "This will not only modernize our system but help us strategically plan for the future. We're looking to protect and preserve our water supply while supporting growth and providing regional benefits to all water users."

## Noblesville pastor gives out hundreds of COVID-19 vaccine exemptions

While the Archdiocese of Indianapolis will not assist parishioners in getting a religious exemption from the COVID-19 vaccine, a minister in Noblesville says he has provided hundreds of exemptions.

"Although some Catholics may personally be opposed to getting vaccinated, a religious exemption based on church teaching is not warranted in this particular situation," the archdiocese said in a statement last Thursday.

But a Noblesville pastor is getting a lot of attention on Facebook for saying that he's given out hundreds of religious exemptions for the vaccine.

Micah Beckwith is a pastor at Life Church, a Pentecostal church in Noblesville.

"The Lord tells us that everybody is made and designed to be the temple of the Holy Spirit, so on that basis, people have been

Charles Thomas “Chuck” Combs  
October 2, 1955 – August 18, 2021



Charles Thomas “Chuck” Combs, 65, Carmel, passed from his earthly body into the presence of his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on August 18, 2021. After a short but fierce battle with cancer, it was a beautiful finish to a race well and courageously run.

Chuck was born on October 2, 1955, to Jeff and Sally (Hicks) Combs in Chicago, Ill. He was a graduate of Carmel High School, Purdue University, Northwestern University, and Indiana University. He was a noted physical therapist and athletic trainer who began his career with Indianapolis Physical Therapy and Sports Medicine, serving as a director, and later owned and operated Carmel Rehab, which grew to four clinics.

A former Indiana Pacers ball boy and die-hard Boilermaker who was mentored at Purdue by athletic training legends Pinky Newell and Denny Miller, Chuck dedicated himself to teaching and sharing his love of physical therapy with thousands of students and athletes, including many Indianapolis Colts players. He was a frequent presenter at trade conferences and was a lecturer at both Indiana University and Purdue University.

Chuck was a member of College Park Church, where he served as a small group leader for Student Ministries, and participated in Deeper, a Men’s Bible Study group.

Chuck demonstrated his faith unashamedly to everyone in his life. Being the founder and owner of Carmel Rehab allowed him the opportunity to not only address patients’ physical limitations but to simply say, “There is a spiritual element to physical healing. May I pray for you?”

With God’s guidance, Carmel Rehab became a special place of community where people had the chance to be seen, known, loved and cared for. In today’s climate where so many struggle with isolation and hopelessness, time spent at Carmel Rehab was beautifully healing. Even as patients underwent treatment and exercise, the atmosphere buzzed with pleasant, animated conversation led by Chuck, his student aides and staff.

Chuck’s professional accomplishments were eclipsed only by his deep, constant love for his wife and commitment to his family. They enjoyed prayer and devotional times, movies, special events, bike riding, eating out, and trips together – especially to Kings Island. He counted each of his children and grandchildren a blessing and prayed for them daily.

Chuck loved Jesus with a fervent passion and above all else would want to be remembered for living a life that glorified God. His was a life of love, grace, humility, and service to others. Chuck’s life embodied the gospel: God is holy, I am not, Jesus saves, Christ is my life.

He is survived by his wife of 19 years, Julie Combs; children, Chris (Kristen) Combs, Kara Combs, Brittany (John Paul) Clayton, Dakota Allen, and Brady Combs; grandchildren, Sadie and Jackson Combs; mother, Sally Combs; six siblings; father and mother-in-law; sister-in-law; and several nieces, nephews, and cousins.

He was preceded in death by his father; and brother, Danny Combs.
