Westfield city councilor: ‘I can’t help stupid’ at Monon Trail crosswalk

The start of a high-intensity activated crosswalk system at 161st Street and the Monon Trail in Westfield was originally scheduled for Wednesday, but was delayed due to rain.

The delay came as more people learned of controversial remarks from one Westfield City Council member about pedestrians and bike riders who have been hit by vehicles.

Troy Patton, a Westfield city councilor, said during this week’s finance committee meeting, “I like the trails. I think they’re nice,” but added it’s too expensive to build an underground pedestrian and bicyclist tunnel at 161st Street. Patton’s comments were directed towards Westfield’s initial plan to build a tunnel under 161st Street for the Monon Trail.

Signs for motorists at the trail crossing say “cross traffic” on 161st Street does not stop, and Patton said bicyclists ignore the stop sign at the trail. He also called on police to man the trail and to write tickets to walkers, runners and bicyclists who don’t obey the law.

Patton, a Republican, said, “For God’s sakes, get somebody out there and start stopping people and make them stop ... I can’t help stupid. If you’re going to run out in front of a car, natural selection says that maybe you ought to be done.”


Westfield resident Matt Deck told WISH-TV News 8, “Both myself and a majority of our neighbors feel that long-term

the tunnel is the best solution. But if this HAWK system can increase the safety of our residents and visitors to the city in the

meantime, then we’re all for it.”

Deck said about Patton’s remarks, “I just don’t feel these are comments that should be made by a public official in a public setting. I don’t feel that he was serious with that remark. But, I would like him to apologize to the community again for even asserting such a tragic event as he did. I believe that counselor wants the best for the citizens of Westfield.”

County dominates Indiana’s top 10 safest cities list

Safewise.com has released its list of the safest cities in Indiana and four Hamilton County communities earned a top 10 ranking.

Of Hamilton County communities, Westfield ranked as the second-safest city in Indiana. Carmel ranked third, Fishers ranked fourth and Noblesville rounded out the top 10 list with a seventh-place ranking.

According to Safewise, Carmel and Fishers each dropped one spot this year, the only two cities in the state to drop in ranking.

The report indicates the most notable improvement was in Noblesville where property crime rates dropped from 13.2 (2017) to 9.3 incidents per 1,000 people (2019).

Carmel was the only safest city to report murders in the last year.

Sheridan Depot project gets underway

On Aug. 5, representatives of the Sheridan Historical Society and the Town of Sheridan met at the new museum on Main Street and commenced a joint project to move the old Sheridan Monon train depot from its present location on the western outskirts of the community and bring it back into the downtown area.

The depot has been a valued part of the community since it was built in 1882 and served the passenger and freight needs of this thriving community in the northwest part of Hamilton County. By 1974, however, the Monon railroad and its associated depots in Indiana had been largely displaced by truck traffic; the Sheridan depot no longer served a purpose and was in danger of being demolished.

In the mid-1980s it was purchased by local resident Jim Kinkead, disassembled and moved to its present location where it was reconstructed. Mr. Kinkead passed away not too long ago, and his family would like to donate the structure back into

the community.

This is a cooperative project between the Town of Sheridan and the Sheridan Historical Society. Both entities have interest in this project; the Town would like to pre-

serve a piece of its history and the Society has experience with this type of work.

The two organizations already have

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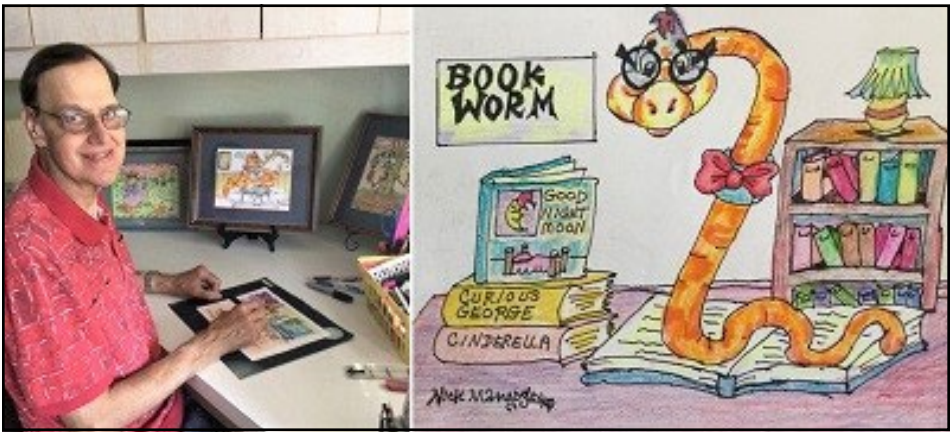

Dead black bear found on Elkhart County roadside last Wednesday

DNR recovered the body of a black bear north of Bristol in Elkhart County on Aug. 18.

The bear was found near a toll road and was in an advanced state of decomposition. DNR staff delivered

the remains to the Indiana Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL) at Purdue for necropsy to determine cause of death. Preliminary results revealed the bear had many fractured bones, injuries that DNR mammalogist Brad Westrich says are consistent with a vehicle collision.

"It is unfortunate that for many in Elkhart County this was their first experience observing a black bear," Westrich said. "It's well documented that wild animals are commonly killed on roadways, and it's a shame that Indiana's fifth black bear in modern history met this fate."

DNR had not received reports of black bears in the area before finding this bear.


Hair and tissue samples will be analyzed to determine where the black bear originated. It was not the same black bear that had previously visited southern

Indiana earlier this summer. Bear reports in that region have stopped coming to Indiana DNR, and Westrich says it has probably moved on to Kentucky, based on confirmed sightings received from Kentucky Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources.


Indiana was once home to black bears. Bear populations in neighboring states are expanding, and Indiana's forests and hills, primarily located in the southern portion of the state, are excellent habitats for black bears.

If you see a bear, report it to the DNR at on.IN.gov/largemammal. Biologists use these reports to monitor bear activity and provide recommendations to local residents.

Millers take care of Avon in four sets

The Noblesville volleyball team did something it hadn't done in a while Thursday night: Beat Avon.

The Millers hosted the Orioles at The Mill, and it was a hard-fought, four-set match. Noblesville prevailed, coming from behind in the fourth set to win 25-16, 25-22, 17-25, 25-22. The match was also the Hoosier Crossroads Conference opener for the Millers.

"Beating Avon is not something that's happened to us in a long time," said Noblesville coach Annie Phillips. "So, we are super happy with that win and we are hungry for more."

After winning the first, the Millers fell behind early in the second set. Noblesville worked its way back to get within one point of the Orioles at 12-11, then took a 13-12 lead after Riley Branch served back-to-back aces.

"We have been working a lot on our serve and serving competitively, driving the ball in," said Phillips. "With that comes more errors, because we're serving more competitively, so we did have quite a few errors. But we've been pretty balanced so far the whole season as far as aces go. A lot of people get a lot of aces, which is nice. We don't necessarily count on one or two servers like we have in the past, either."

Avon used a flurry of kills to get back in front 16-13, and was still ahead 18-15 late in the set. The Millers responded

with four straight points and never trailed again in the set.

The Orioles used a five-point run in the third set to go ahead 10-6, and kept Noblesville at bay from there, scoring the last four points of the set. Avon then led 21-19 in the fourth set before Noblesville took control. Ava Harris hit a kill to tie the game at 21-21, then Riley Resmer made a big block to put the Millers in front. Gabby Weihe hit a kill on match point to clinch the Noblesville win.

Harris led the offense with 10 kills, while Ella Peter hit eight kills. Diana Cox collected 10 digs, and Branch had 34 assists, 11 digs and five aces.

The Millers are 3-2 for the season and play at Fishers next Thursday.

Fishers also picked up a victory in its HCC opener on Thursday, winning at Zionsville 25-17, 25-13, 25-21.

The victory was the fourth in a row for the Tigers, who are now 4-1 for the season. Fishers coach Steven Peek said after the match that everyone seems to think his team is a different team than at the very start of the season.

"You got to come in here and have fun," said Peek. "The girls have their own little things that they're doing to make it an interesting match for themselves between the points and they know what

Girls Soccer Mental Attitude Award named in honor of Theresia Wynns

Having spent her entire career in service to young people, the IHSAA Executive Committee unanimously approved naming the girls soccer mental attitude award in honor of former IH-SAA Assistant Commissioner Theresia Wynns.

During its Tuesday morning meeting, the IHSAA Executive Committee unanimously voted to name the Class 3A, 2A and 1A girls soccer

awards for the woman who spent 15 years on the IHSAA Executive Staff prior to joining the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) in 2012.

A longtime Indiana tradition and one of the most prestigious honors a high school student-athlete can receive, a mental attitude award is annually presented to a senior participant in the state finals in each sport. The Executive Committee selects a student-athlete who was nominated by his or her principal and coach, and who is determined to have best demonstrated excellence in mental attitude,

scholarship, leadership and athletic ability. The presenting sponsor in each sport also awards a \$1,000 scholarship to the general scholarship fund of the student's school.

In her role with the IHSAA (1997-2012), she administered the sports of girls and boys soccer in addition to girls basketball, and girls and boys tennis. She also managed the licensing of over 8,000 IHSAA officials, the IHSAA sportsman-ship program and tournament merchandising.

A native of Easley, S.C., Wynns is a 1966 graduate of Clear View High School

in Easley and a 1970 graduate of South Carolina State University with a B.S. degree in health and physical education. She taught one year at Easley Junior High School before coming to Indianapolis in 1971. Wynns spent the next 26 years as a teacher and administrator in the Indianapolis Public Schools and Warren Township Schools. She officiated the girls basketball state championship games in 1977, 1981 and 1986. Wynns was named Indiana's outstanding girls basketball official in 1983 by the IHSAA and the National Federation of Interscholastic Officials Association.
