# Westfield Washington Schools interested in purchasing public library building

## Resolution locks in \$3.85 million sale price

Westfield Washington Schools (WWS) has expressed an interest in purchasing the Westfield Washington Public Library at 333 W. Hoover St. The library's current building and the 2.63-acre parcel it sits on originally belonged to the school district and was purchased by the library in 1983 to build the current building. The library plans to build a new library in downtown Westfield at Westfield Boulevard and Park Street next year.

"We've been in conversation with the library for months," said Superintendent Paul Kaiser. "This property sits in the middle of our school campus, and with how fast Westfield is growing, it just makes sense to reabsorb it for additional educational opportunities."

The school board unanimously approved a resolution that gives it permission to start discussing a purchase agreement with the library. A recent



appraisal estimated the property's value at \$3.85 million. While the resolution does not obligate the school district to buy the property, it does lock in the price and prevents the library board from selling the building to anyone else.

"This resolution really just allows us to continue the conversation," said WWS School Board President Jimmy Cox. "We would need to bring back a more formal purchase agreement to the school board for final approval."

Before it can do that, the library board must finalize the

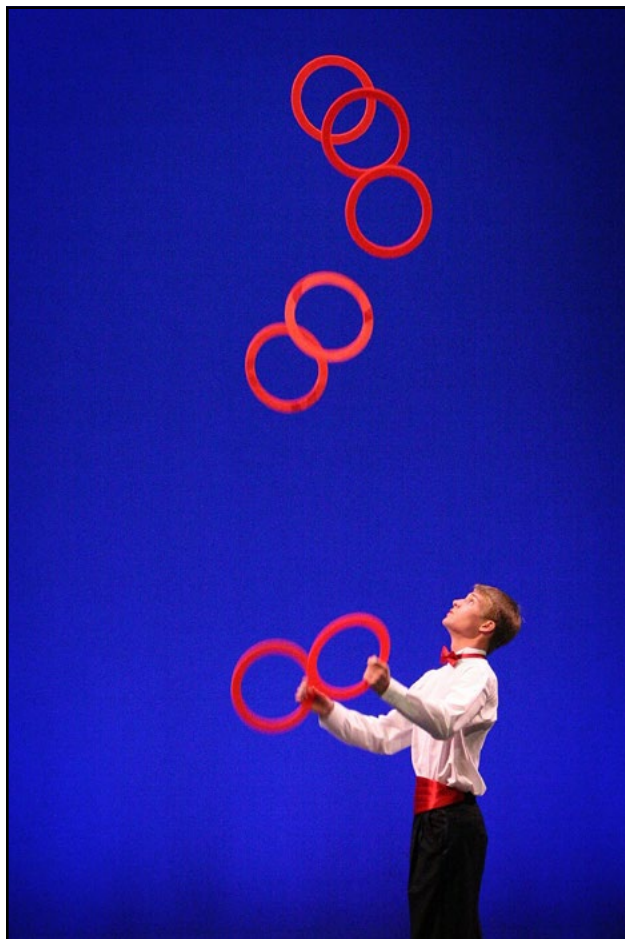

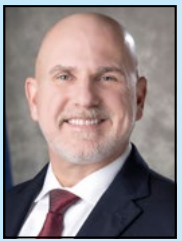
## A heavy heart for Afghanistan and those we left behind

My heart is heavy watching recent events unfold in Afghanistan. The loss of life, including 13 U.S. service members, is unconscionable. Having served as a Marine during Operation Desert Storm and returned to Afghanistan for Operation Enduring Freedom, I'm devastated to see the chaos and horror that's reemerged after decades of progress.

In my years of service, I've witnessed friends – both American and Afghani – fall on Afghanistan soil. We all hoped we'd be a part of building a better future for this country, and certainly never imagined American military involvement ending this way.

To the fallen warriors and their families, I grieve with you. To the American service members and civilians still in harm's way, my

heart and mind are with you. The U.S. government's desertion and abandonment of its citizens and friends will leave a permanent scar on both nations and demonstrates a mode of operation not in keeping with our strong history.

The situation in Afghanistan is complicated. It has been for decades, and there are no easy solutions. But I'm truly heartbroken for the Afghans who I met and worked alongside, including those in the Afghan National Police, the Afghan National Army, the governance, and the locals. They simply desired a better life, and we wanted to help them achieve it.

I fear most for the innocent women and children of Afghanistan who have grown up with a blanket of security jerked

from beneath them suddenly. Those of us who understand the Taliban's interpretation of sharia law know what that means for them. Women and girls will be barred from education and public life. Those who violate Sharia law will be beaten or worse. The progress made in two decades will be erased. These things are happening right now as we rest safely in our homes.

During my service, I spent a great deal of time interacting with young Afghans, both boys and girls. Despite the complex and harsh world around them, their needs were very basic. They were my solace and their innocence kept me sane. Looking at them, it all made sense and I understood our mission.

I've had many restless nights consumed with worry for those we've left behind, the Americans of course, but also the Afghans who relied on us. At

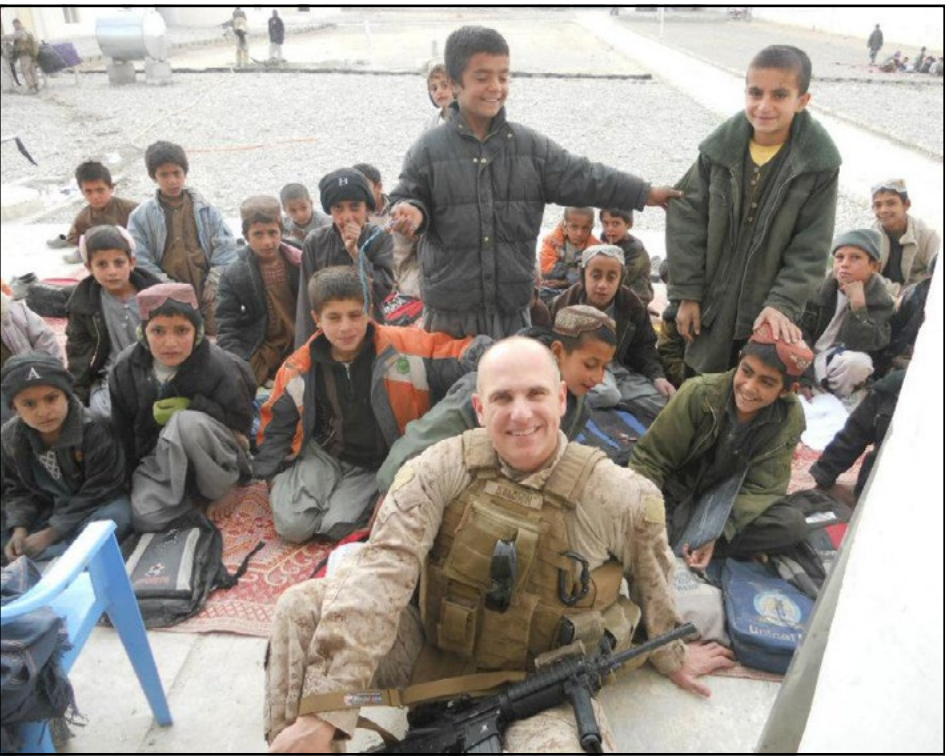

the very least, this administration must get every remaining American home safe, knowing our failures mean it's already too late for some. It goes against every fiber of my being

to know that America is leaving Americans behind. This is unacceptable.

Looking forward, I can only hope that some semblance of the progress made will be preserved;

that, despite this fall, Afghanistan will someday see a future as so many imagined. This Marine believed it then, and I want even more to believe it now.

## Sen. Young makes statement after deadly attacks at Kabul airport

U.S. Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) on Thursday issued the following statement regarding the deadly attacks in Kabul, Afghanistan, that claimed the lives of at least 13 U.S. service members:

"My heart goes out to those Marines and service members who made the ultimate sacrifice today and to their families who joined the ranks of other Gold Star family members. Every American patriot grieves as we witness this tragically avoidable crisis unfolding in real time.

"These brave service members were doing their absolute best to safeguard the evacuation of Americans and innocent Afghan allies. Tragically, their heroic

response was hamstrung by President Joe Biden and his administration, who have failed them at every turn. The American people cannot and should not accept these errors of judgment from their Commander in Chief.

"The Biden administration had months to plan our exit from Afghanistan and to methodically implement an exit strategy. Any plan should have made allowances for worst case scenarios. They should not have been constrained by arbitrary timelines. And under no circumstances should we have rushed to pull troops out before American and

allied civilians were identified and ushered to safety.

"It is time for a deep accounting of what has gone wrong to ensure an operation like this never occurs again. Accountability cannot be deflected. We all deserve answers and we must receive them in short order.

"Tonight, we can take a measure of comfort in the knowledge that our fallen heroes are in God's arms. We pray for the wounded, grieving families, and the safe return of those still in harm's way. And we pray that all of our leaders will be granted wisdom and discernment in coming days."

"We are so excited to open our doors and wel-

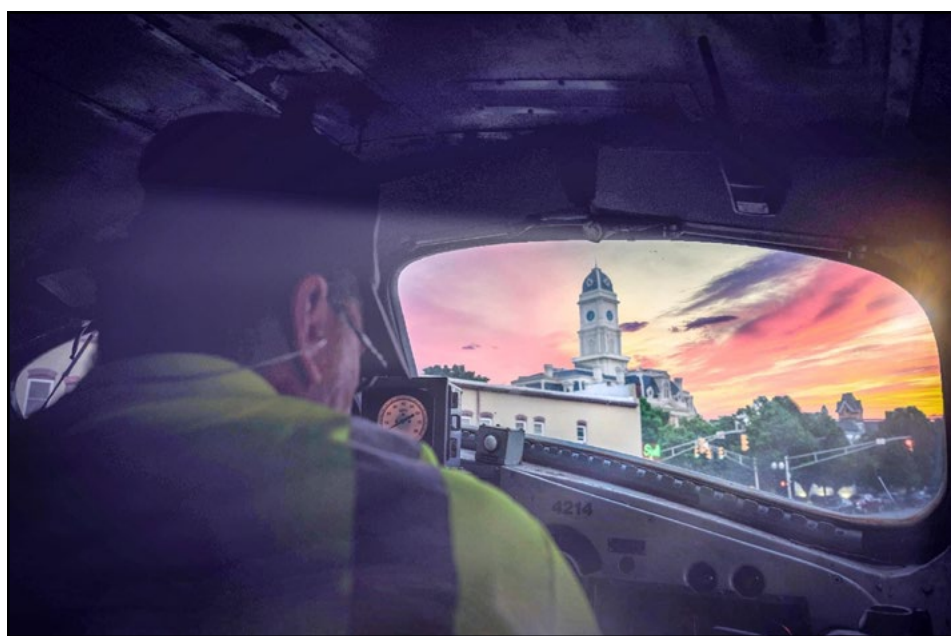

# AG Todd Rokita's team returns \$113K to Hoosiers at the Indiana State Fair

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has announced that he and his staff returned \$133,023 in unclaimed property to Hoosiers at this year's Indiana State Fair. This latest outreach effort brings the total amount of money returned to Hoosiers in 2021 to \$31,264,893.04.

"The Indiana State Fair is a cherished Hoosier tradition, and one that gives the Indiana Attorney General's Office the opportunity to interact face-to-face with constituents we serve across the state," Rokita said. "I'm proud of our team's work to connect fairgoers with direct service from our office and return unclaimed property back to Hoosier families."

During the fair's 24-day run, the Indiana Attorney

General's Office interacted with approximately 5,470 Hoosier fairgoers.

This year, much of the focus of the Attorney General's booth was on helping Hoosiers find **unclaimed property** that might have been available to them. On Friday, Aug. 13, the theme for the entire fair was "Indiana Unclaimed Day."

Staff at the booth also handed out **information** to help consumers protect themselves from the most prevalent types of scams, including fraudsters trying to steal Hoosiers' identities and/or swindle them out of money. Staff members also provided copies of the **Parents Bill of Rights** devel-

oped by Rokita to help families exercise their legal right to have a voice in their children's education.

"After the cancellation of last year's fair, it was clear from my visit and talking to Hoosiers that there was a pent-up demand and an added excitement this year," Rokita said. "It also didn't hurt that there was lots of great food, fun rides, livestock and music for everyone to enjoy."

# Last-second touchdown sends Carmel past King

**CARMEL** - It was after 11 p.m. Friday night at Carmel Stadium and there was still a full crowd.

This was despite the fact that the Class 4A No. 2 Greyhounds' game with Detroit King had been halted due to lightning and was slowly crawling through the fourth quarter. But those who stayed to the end were rewarded, especially the Carmel fans, who got to see their team win a game that went from epic to grand opera in the final 90 seconds.

The Greyhounds ultimately beat the Crusaders 42-40 on the last play of the game. Jack Kazmierczak, a kid who was playing junior varsity football one week ago and had stepped in for injured quarterback Zach Osborne for a few plays, flung a last-second pass towards the end zone from the King 35-yard line. It was caught cleanly by Reece Bellin, touching off a late-night celebration at Carmel Stadium.

"I've learned not ride the ups and downs," said Greyhounds coach John Hebert. "It's too much. It's taken me 50 years to learn this. You've got to deal with whatever happens next. But that play right there was one of the most amazing things I've ever seen."

The Kazmierczak-Bellin connection was actually the fourth big play of the game's final minute and a half. King had just made a goal-line stand to prevent Carmel from scoring at the one-yard line and took over on downs with just over a minute to play. But on the drive's first play, the Crusaders fumbled, and the Greyhounds' Will Webster recovered and took it seven yards to score.

Ben Sponsler made the extra-point kick, his fourth of the game, and Carmel led 36-33 with 1:07 left. King started bulldozing its way down the field, led by its five-star quarterback Dante Moore. The Crusaders got the Greyhounds' 10-yard line, then Moore sent a pass to Joseph Williams for a touchdown. The extra-point kick put King back on top 40-36.

That was the score with 8.8 seconds left to go. Carmel received the kickoff

and got it down to the 35, which set up Kazmierczak's big throw. Kazmierczak had to step up after Osborne's injury forced him from the game, and he did just that. Hebert called him "a really steady guy."

"He's a very calm and steady kid," said Hebert. "In fact, I've never seen him really show emotions either way, in high or low. Very focused on what we're trying to do. It's hard to prepare as a backup. And there have been times where he was No. 3 or even No. 4. He just now earned the second spot."

While the final 90 seconds of the game were incredible, the other 46 minutes and 30 seconds were also pretty good. There

were eight lead changes in the final three quarters and both teams combined for over 1,000 yards of total offense. Moore totaled 435 yards passing for King.

"We knew we had our hands full with their offense," said Hebert. "It was like almost grasping at straws, really. We settled on a couple of things that worked for us and then they figured out some ways to exploit it, and then we had to change it again. And that's why you schedule a team like this because they force you to do that."

Carmel got the game's first score midway through the opening quarter when Osborne ran in from nine yards. The Crusaders got on the board with a 38-yard pass play, but the 'Hounds blocked the kick, keeping them ahead 7-6.

Nick Beidl punched the ball in from the one-yard line to get Carmel ahead 14-6. King would find the end zone twice in a row, both from long passes by Moore. The first was a 54-yard pass to Williams that brought the Crusaders within 14-12; they would take the lead on a 24-yard

connection from Moore to Lamont Parks.

Osborne powered the ball in from the two-yard line with 1:03 left in the first half to get Carmel ahead 21-19, but Terrance Brown took the kickoff 81 yards a few seconds later, and the Crusaders held the lead at halftime 26-21.

Both teams scored again in the third quarter. Osborne ran in to the end zone from 11 yards, then sent a two-point conversion pass to Beidl. Brown answered for King with 1:22 left on an eight-yard run. That gave the Kings a 33-29 lead, which they would hold until the frantic final minute and a half.

Ethan Hall led the Carmel rushing with 104 yards. Osborne had a tremendous game, making 26 of 34 passes for 255 yards. Kazmierczak went 4-for-7, totaling 82 yards. Desmond Duffy had a dominant performance on the receiving end, with 12 catches for 145 yards.

The Greyhounds are 2-0 and will play their first Indiana team next Friday, hosting Center Grove to begin Metropolitan Conference play.

# Millers romp past THS, improve to 2-0

After running to a victory last week, Noblesville ran some more this week in its home opener.

The Millers treated their home fans to a nice win on Friday, cruising past Terre Haute South 45-12. The only thing that stopped Noblesville was lightning, which forced a lengthy delay. But the Millers shrugged it off and got a convincing win that ran their record to 2-0 for the first time in six years.

“They had a couple good skill players and I thought we did a great job of containing them,” said Noblesville coach Dave Sharpe. He called the victory a “good team win.”

“We felt like we had a lot of guys play well on both sides of the ball,” said Sharpe. “We played very well on special teams as well.”

Logan Shoffner, who broke the Noblesville single-game rushing record last week, had another outstanding game. He got the Millers on the board 67 seconds into the game by gliding into the end zone for a 17-yard touchdown.

Shoffner scored three more touchdowns during the game. He ran in from 39 yards with 2:22 left in the first quarter, then blasted off on a 71-yard run during the first minute of the second period. Shoffner added a 12-

yard run just 38 seconds into the third quarter – he has now scored eight touchdowns for the season.

Two more Millers players ran for touchdowns as well. Alairic Rogers-Walton took the ball into the end zone from the three-yard line midway through the second period. Jack Skomp scored on a 10-yard jog early in the third.

Noblesville kept its feet on the ground during the game. The Millers did not attempt any passes – all 380 yards of their total offense was gained by the run. Shoffner totaled 236 yards, while Rogers-Walton added 73 yards.

“The running game was very efficient,” said Sharpe. “Big credit goes to our big offensive line. All of our running backs did a great job of executing and staying on schedule with the chains.”

Seth Stone led the Noblesville defense with 8.5 tackles, six solo and five assists. Mac Lynas made two tackles for a loss.

The Millers host Fishers next Friday to begin Hoosier Crossroads Conference play.

“The HCC schedule is here and we’re going to get some great challenges from great teams,” said Sharpe. “There’s no weeks off in the HCC, everybody knows that.”

In the fourth quarter, Trevon Hatchett scored on a two-yard run, then Micah Hauser added a one-yard rushing touch-

down to complete the scoring. Hauser led the Shamrocks rushing with 114 yards.

Webster went 15-of-19 through the air, totaling 185 yards and three touchdowns. Depasquale had five catches for 49 yards, with Aramboles making four receptions totaling 43 yards and Bruch getting three catches for 76 yards.

Tyler Dikos led the Westfield defense with 13 total tackles, followed by Charlie Dager with 11.

The Shamrocks are 1-1 and open Hoosier Crossroads Conference play next Friday at Zionsville.
