Westfield Schools may purchase city library building

Westfield Washington Schools (WWS) has expressed an interest in purchasing the Westfield Washington Public Library at 333 W. Hoover St. The library's current building and the 2.63-acre parcel it sits on originally belonged to the school district and was purchased by the library in 1983 to build the current building. The library plans to build a new library in downtown Westfield at Westfield Boulevard and Park Street next year.

"We've been in conversation with the library for months," said Superintendent Paul Kaiser. "This property sits in the middle of our school campus, and with how fast Westfield is growing, it just makes sense to reabsorb it for additional educational opportunities."

The school board unanimously approved a resolution that gives it permission to start discussing a purchase agreement with the library. A recent appraisal estimated the property's value at \$3.85 million. While the resolution does not obligate the school district to buy the property, it does lock in the price and prevents the library board from selling the building to anyone else.

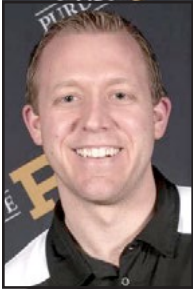
"This resolution really just allows us to continue the conversation," said WWS School Board President Jimmy Cox. "We would need to bring back a more formal purchase agreement to the school board for final approval."

Before it can do that, the library board must finalize the purchase of its new property and put the project out for bid. All told, the process could take another 12 to 18 months.

"We're thrilled to put this building back in the hands of the school district and to continue our longstanding relationship in newer and stronger ways," said Library Director Sheryl Sollars. "It's truly a win-win for the entire community and a project everyone can support."

Sheridan Depot project gets underway

On Aug. 5, representatives of the Sheridan Historical Society and the Town of Sheridan met at the new museum on Main Street and commenced a joint project to move the old Sheridan Monon train depot from its present location on the western outskirts of the community and bring it back into the downtown area.

The depot has been a valued part of the community since it was built in 1882 and served the passenger and freight needs of this thriving community in the northwest part of Hamilton County. By 1974, however, the Monon railroad and its associated depots in Indiana had been largely displaced by truck traffic; the Sheridan depot no longer served a purpose and was in danger of being demolished.

In the mid-1980s it was purchased by local resident Jim Kinkead, disassembled and moved to its present location where it was reconstructed. Mr. Kinkead passed away not too long ago, and his family would like to donate the structure back into the community.

Beck's opens soybean tower at Atlanta facility

Expansion doubles processing capacity from 3M to 6M bushels

Beck's, the largest family-owned retail seed company in the United States, announced last Wednesday the completion of its new east soybean tower. As one of the largest soybean processing towers in the world, it's capable of processing three million bushels of soybeans per year, doubling Beck's processing to six million at the Atlanta location.

"Our family and family of employees are driven to help farmers succeed," Beck's CEO Sonny Beck said. "We couldn't be more excited for the completion of the new east soybean tower, which allows us to more efficiently process and deliver additional units of high-quality soybeans to current and future customers."

The 221-by-300-foot facility features a 10-story, stand-alone processing tower that includes an observation deck with a glass

floor for visitors to see soybeans being processed; video monitoring on all machinery operations; state-of-the-art batch treating to allow more versatility of ingredients; five new warehouses for seed and equipment

storage; and office space.

"I'm honored to be part of today's celebration at Beck's, a strong contributor to

County studying groundwater availability

Hamilton County is addressing what could soon become a dire problem – a shortage of groundwater supply. It has hired an environmental consulting firm, INTERA Incorporated, to study the county’s water availability and to determine best conservation practices. “Hamilton County has long been one of the fastest growing counties in the nation,” said County Surveyor Kenton Ward. “Our water supplies and distribution systems, like other infrastructure, have had to stretch to keep up. We need to do

what we can now to ensure we can deliver safe and reliable water to the community in the future.” The Indiana Development Finance Authority published a Central Indiana Water Availability report last year which indicated an alarming increase in water use in Hamilton County, specifically drinking water and industrial demand. The three-year study will cost the county \$2,145,000. The project will:

- Monitor aquifer and surface water levels and quality to better define seasonal variations and identify

potential conflicts in use.

- Discover ways to improve long-term water availability in the county.
- Improve efficiency and expand aquifer yield for drinking water use.
- Consider alternative engineering designs for recharging the aquifers.

“We are the first county in the state to commit to a water study like this one,” said Mark Heirbrandt, president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. “This will not only modernize our system but help us strategically plan for the future. We’re looking to protect and preserve our water supply while supporting growth and providing regional benefits to all water users.”

Health Dept. offers on-site vaccine clinics to local businesses

The Hamilton County Health Department wants to help Hamilton County get back to work, so it’s offering on-site COVID-19 vaccination clinics to Hamilton County businesses. “Hosting a clinic at your workplace typically leads to more people getting vaccinated, which leads to fewer COVID-19 illnesses,” said Chris Walker,

emergency preparedness coordinator. “Businesses with a high percentage of vaccinated employees usually see improved productivity, improved morale, and a reduction in absence due to illness.” Businesses should consider hosting a workplace



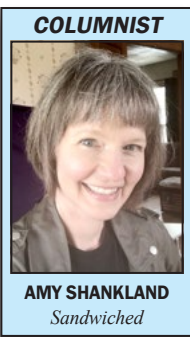

vaccination program only if they have enough space to stand up a clinic while maintaining social distancing through the entire process, from screening to post-vaccination observation. “If hosting a vaccine clinic at your workplace is not possible, try to identify

sionals who work in various divisions in Hamilton County. The classes will be offered weekly on Thursdays from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. at the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office, 18100 Cumberland Road, Noblesville.

This will be an opportunity for the community

to see how the Sheriff’s Office operates and will provide an opportunity for citizens to participate in police style training. The Academy is not designed to give citizens police powers or authority.

The Citizens Academy welcomes all residents of Hamilton County who are

18 years of age or older. Priority will be given to individuals who are in the service jurisdiction of the county sheriff. A criminal background check will be conducted on all individuals who wish to participate. Applicants with a misdemeanor conviction within one year of applying or with a prior felony conviction will be disqualified. Final selection of any applicant will be at the discretion of the Sheriff.

Oh, the sweetness of chapter 5. I wish I could stay here a bit longer and savor the moments.

There is just something about a love story that wraps around our heart, making us want to snuggle up in a blanket with a hot cup of tea or coffee and just keep reading, or in my case ... writing.

Last week, I was there in Chapter 5 as my fingertips quickly scammed over the keyboard of my laptop. I wanted more words and time to tell the story of my parents and their happily ever after.

Born in 1926 in Gap Creek, Kentucky, James Ellis Hart was adopted into the Hart family after his mother died in childbirth. Joe Hart outlived two wives and left another one a young widow with four daughters and Jim.

Circumstances led Jim to only finish the eighth grade. This was common back then as help was needed on the tobacco farm. Jim was the only son, so the choice was made for him.

Meanwhile, across the mountain ...

Audrey Wayne Catron was born the same year but in Sunnybrook, Kentucky. She was the middle child ... in a family of 11. Ten girls, one boy. She, more than likely, was lost in the crowd as child number six. She was needed more at home, so she never made it the two miles down the rocky road, across part of the mountain and over a creek to the school, once she finished eighth grade.

It’s in Chapter 5 where I tell how Jim and his friends would venture over the mountain to meet up with the Catron sisters. I refer to it as “sight-seeing.” Jim

would later say that it was love at first “sight” when he saw Audrey.

Jim would come a courtin’ every Sunday afternoon. He would write Audrey a letter every week between those Sundays. In one of them, which I treasure, he tells her that he would like her to live where he lived, all the time. Talk about a romantic guy.

He finally asked Audrey’s dad, Keen Catron, if he could marry her. After getting the blessing from Keen they headed to the courthouse for a license so they could go see Audrey’s Uncle Joe, a justice of the peace, to get married.

There was a problem at the clerk’s office. Jim was not yet 18 so he needed his dad’s permission to get married. Jim and Audrey knew it would be a long trip back to Gap Creek so they went outside the courthouse and sat for a while. Audrey signed the form and back inside they went, getting the marriage

license.

Sometimes you just have to take matters, and the pen, into your own hands.

Later that day, March 6, 1943, they were married.

They were 16 years old.

So now you have an inkling of what Chapter 5 has to say. It is the sweetest chapter I’ve written. I have many more chapters for you to read someday. I had better get writing.

I’m now on Chapter 11. I don’t like writing it. I don’t like the emotions it has stirred up. I don’t like the setting. It’s lonely here in this chapter. I’ve revisited a few characters and again, shed some – what I thought were forgotten – tears. I want to hurry up and get this one written. It’s a bit bitter to write. I want to pull the blanket over my head and wait for the pain to go away. And yet, I keep writing.

Stay tuned. There’s another sweet chapter being written.

Indiana’s agriculture industry,” Governor Eric Holcomb said. “Life sciences and innovation-based economic development continue driving Indiana’s economy forward, and the growth of Beck’s and the rest of our agriculture industry is proof of that. We’ll continue cultivating an environment where companies like these can thrive for generations to come.”

It will take 60,000 soybean production acres to run at full capacity, equaling 150 incoming semi-trailer loads of soybeans delivered per week. Upon arrival, the soybeans will be stored in the new 125,000-bushel receiving storage facility – 20 bins storing 6,250 bushels.

In addition, the facility contains two receiving

dumps, two scales, and can process two varieties at once. The tower can process 24,000 bags per day through automated package filling for bulk and mini-bulk bags. Once the soybeans have been processed and packaged, 140 semi-trailer loads will go out weekly.

“This project would not be possible without the support of the Indiana Economic Development Corporation and Hamilton County officials,” Beck said. “With their foresight, dedication to Indiana agribusiness, and passion for the growth of the Hoosier economy, we’ve increased capacity, added jobs, and can better serve farmers across our 14-state marketing area.”

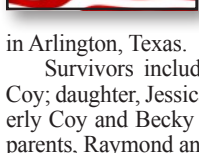

What's the scoop on drug discounts for senior citizens?

If you are approaching Medicare, the biggest shock is the price of medications. People hear good things about Medicare. Medicare runs well. With thousands of clients, we get very, very few complaints a year. But the complaints that do come in almost always center around drug costs.

Enter Good Rx: A free discount card that can potentially save you hundreds of dollars a year.

If you have Medicare Advantage or a standalone Part D drug plan, and your drug co-pay is \$40 or higher, chances are very good that you can save money by not using your insurance card and instead using a discount card.

But not all discount cards are created equal. Look at the bottom of your internet search for a drug using your discount card. Does it say "Estimated price" or "Price may vary"? If so, you will likely be charged an additional fee at the pharmacy. Known as a dispensing fee, the pharmacy may add in a fee from 50 cents up to \$5 per prescription. It's still a savings, but not what you looked up on the handy phone app. Five extra dollars isn't a terrible bait and switch, but there might be more in store for you in a few months.

Here is how that can play out. You see that you can save \$20 per month on drug X. After a few months, you notice you are only saving \$10 per month. Still a savings, but maybe not as big of a savings as another drug discount card offers. The first card did that on purpose to get you to start using them, then raised the price after you started using them.

When you use a discount card one time, the pharmacy stores that information in the patient's profile, so you'll get the discount that card offers in the future. But beware – you might need to keep comparing discount cards and not rely on your initial research.

The majority of people using a drug discount card are using one of these three:

GoodRx, SingleCare or GlicRx. You can find all of these cards online and compare prices against your insurance plan.

Fatality review team working to prevent overdose, suicide deaths

The REPORTER

Nearly 20 percent of the overdoses reported in Hamilton County end in a fatality. So far this year, 54 residents have lost their lives to an accidental overdose, but a team of experts is working to reverse that trend.

Hamilton County has assembled a Suicide and Overdose Fatality Review Team that meets once a month to review the life and death of recent decedents. The multidisciplinary team consists of representatives from public health, public safety, the courts, the Coroner's Office, and local treatment facilities.

"We look at the decedent's life cycle in terms of drug use, major health

events, social-emotional trauma, encounters with law enforcement and the criminal justice system, and treatment history to facilitate a deeper understanding of what happened," said Monica Greer, the executive director of the county's Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs. "Where were the gaps? Where were the missed opportunities for prevention and intervention that could have saved this person?"

Jim Ginder with the Hamilton County Health Department also conducts psychological autopsies on many suicide and overdose decedents; interviewing family and friends in an effort to better understand their his-

tory of substance use disorder, any trauma that may have impacted it, and any barriers to recovery.

"We believe overdose and suicide deaths can be prevented, so we take this very personally," Ginder said. "The more we know about the decedent and their journey, the better we can begin to see patterns of need and opportunity, not only within specific agencies but across systems. This input helps us to develop program and policy recommendations, to improve collaboration between agencies, and

to ultimately prevent future overdose deaths."

experience with this type of work.

The two organizations already have a written statement of understanding between themselves as to how this project will proceed. The Town has indicated they have locations near the Monon Trail where it enters town, and the depot could be placed at either location. The town would be willing to bring any needed utilities to the eventual site chosen, and in the end the Town of Sheridan would retain ownership of the facility. For its part, the Historical Society will provide most of the hands-on work in terms of fundraising, administration, and restoration of the project. Both the Town and the Society will depend heavily on the community for donations and volunteers and to participate in this venture as the real hands-on work takes place.

At present, the Historical Society is entering the planning stages for this project. One of the major issues to be decided is what do we want this building to become once it is relocated? Another issue is where exactly would we locate it? Then we move on to estimating costs and establishing a budget for this project.

Restoration is another issue. How much restoration we must do to the structure depends somewhat on what we want the depot to function as when we are done with the project.

A lot of work needs to take place before we even begin moving the building. Community input is of par-

amount importance at this stage and the Historical Society hopes many community members will come forward to help with this project. The Historical Society currently is in the process of forming a working group of individuals who reflect a variety of talents and can help with all the questions noted above. Honestly, we may spend the first year just getting our ducks all lined up before we begin any actual work, but once plans are all set and fundraising is underway, the actual relocating and restoration may be the easy part of the process.

The next immediate step will be to bring together a smaller group of individuals who will oversee this project. From that group we will add others to subcommittees with more precise assigned tasks such as fundraising, functional design or hands-on manual labor tasks.

If you are interested in being a part of this project – and we hope you will be – please let us know. If you are new to town, this can be a gateway to becoming more involved in your new community. And if you are old to this community, please join us in making Sheridan a better place to live, work and play. You can do that by coming to the museum, located at 315 S. Main St., any Tuesday or Friday afternoon from 1 to 4 p.m. and fill out a volunteer form. Or you can email me, Steve Martin, at shmartin1@comcast.net and ask him to include you in the depot activities.

Millers romp past THS, improve to 2-0

After running to a victory in its first game, Noblesville ran some more in Game No. 2.

The Millers treated their home fans to a nice win last Friday, cruising past Terre Haute South 45-12. The only thing that stopped Noblesville was lightning, which forced a lengthy delay. But the Millers shrugged it off and got a convincing win that ran their record to 2-0 for the first time in six years.

“They had a couple good skill players and I thought we did a great job of containing them,” said Noblesville coach Dave Sharpe. He called the victory a “good team win.”

“We felt like we had a lot of guys play well on both sides of the ball,” said Sharpe. “We played very well on special teams as well.”

Logan Shoffner, who broke the Noblesville single-game rushing record last week, had another outstanding game. He got the Millers on the board 67 seconds into the game by gliding into the end zone for a 17-yard touchdown.

Shoffner scored three more touchdowns during the game. He ran in from 39 yards with 2:22 left in the first quarter, then blasted off on a 71-yard run during the first minute of the second period. Shoffner added a 12-yard run just 38 seconds into the third quarter, giving him eight touchdowns for the season.

Two more Millers players ran for touchdowns as well. Alairic Rogers-Walton took the ball into the end zone from the three-yard line midway through the second period. Jack Skomp scored on a 10-yard jog early in the third.

Noblesville kept its feet on the ground during the game. The Millers did not attempt any passes – all 380 yards of their total offense was by rush. Shoffner totaled 236 yards, while Rogers-Walton added 73 yards.

“The running game was very efficient,” said Sharpe. “Big credit goes to our big

Last-second touchdown sends Carmel past King

CARMEL - It was after 11 p.m. at Carmel Stadium last Friday night and there was still a full crowd.

This was despite the fact that the Greyhounds' game with Detroit King had been halted due to lightning and was slowly crawling through the fourth quarter. But those who stayed to the end were rewarded, especially the Carmel fans, who got to see their team win a game that went from epic to grand opera in the final 90 seconds.

The Greyhounds ultimately beat the Crusaders 42-40 on the last play of the game. Jack Kazmierczak, a kid who was playing junior varsity football one week ago and had stepped in for injured quarterback Zach Osborne for a few plays, flung a last-second pass towards the end zone from the King 35-yard line. It was caught cleanly by Reece Bellin, touching off a late-night celebration at Carmel Stadium.

“I’ve learned not ride the ups and downs,” said Greyhounds coach John Hebert. “It’s too much. It’s taken me 50 years to learn this. You’ve got to deal with whatever happens next. But that play right there was one of the most amazing things I’ve ever seen.”

The Kazmierczak-Bellin connection was actually the fourth big play of the game’s final minute and a half. King had just made a goal-line stand to prevent Carmel from scoring at the one-yard line and took over on downs with just over a minute to play. But on the drive’s first play, the Crusaders fumbled, and the Greyhounds’ Will Webster recovered and took it seven yards to score.

Ben Sponsler made the extra-point kick, his fourth of the game, and Carmel led 36-33 with 1:07 left. King started bulldozing its way down the field, led by its five-star quarterback Dante Moore. The Crusaders got the Greyhounds’ 10-yard line, then Moore sent a pass to Joseph Williams for a touchdown. The extra-point kick put King back on top 40-36.

That was the score with 8.8 seconds left to go. Carmel received the kickoff and got it down to the 35, which set up Kazmierczak’s big throw. Kazmierczak had to step up after Osborne’s injury forced him from the game, and he did just that. Hebert called him “a really steady guy.”

“He’s a very calm and steady kid,” said Hebert. “In fact, I’ve never seen him really show emotions either way, in high or low. Very focused on what we’re trying to do. It’s hard to prepare as a backup. And there have been times where he was No. 3 or even No. 4. He just now earned the second spot.”

While the final 90 seconds of the game were incredible, the other 46 minutes and 30 seconds were also pretty good. There were eight lead changes in the final three quarters and both teams combined for over 1,000 yards of total offense. Moore totaled 435 yards passing for King.

“We knew we had our hands full with their offense,” said Hebert. “It was like almost grasping at straws, really. We settled on a couple of things that worked for us and then they figured out some ways to exploit it, and then we had to change it again. And that’s why you schedule a team like this because they force you to do that.”

Carmel got the game’s first score midway through the opening quarter when Osborne ran in from nine yards. The Crusaders got on the board with a 38-yard pass play, but the ‘Hounds blocked the kick, keeping them ahead 7-6.

Nick Beidl punched the ball in from the one-yard line to get Carmel ahead 14-6. King would find the end zone twice in a row, both from long passes by Moore. The first was a 54-yard pass to Williams that brought the Crusaders within 14-12; they would take the lead on a 24-yard connection from Moore to Lamont Parks.

Osborne powered the ball in from the two-yard line with 1:03 left in the first half to get Carmel ahead 21-19, but Terre Haute Brown took the kickoff 81 yards a few seconds later, and the Crusaders held the lead at halftime 26-21.

Both teams scored again in the third quarter. Osborne ran in to the end zone from 11 yards, then sent a two-point conversion pass to Beidl. Brown answered for King with 1:22 left on an eight-yard run. That gave the Kings a 33-29 lead, which they would hold until the frantic final minute and a half.

Sheridan pulls away from Clinton Central
