Carmel Rotary protests at site of pavilion construction

A displeased group of 25 to 30 Carmel Rotary Club members showed up Tuesday morning at the site of the planned Carmel winter pavilion to protest demolition of an amphitheater on the site. Rotarians had paid \$100,000 in 2011 toward construction of the amphitheater on what is known as Rotary Plaza along the Monon Trail.

But, in the past year Carmel officials decided the site would be better suited for the pavilion, which will serve as an added attraction to the Christkindlmarkt which is staged each year during the Christmas holidays. The Rotary club was to be notified of the new plans for the site, but a member of the club said yesterday the membership was not told until Aug. 31.

Construction crews showed up Tuesday morning to fence the area prior to demolition. Electrical service was disconnected in advance of actual demolition. The protesting Rotarians talked to reporters, but did not attempt to interfere with the work. The fenced area will apparently reduce the size of the farmers market that operates in the area on Saturdays.

A contract for the construction of the pavilion started out in a package of Clay Township projects, but at some point in recent days was handed off to Carmel city officials to oversee and presumably to pay. The cost has not been announced.

Rotarians may or may not get their \$100,000 back under terms of an agreement made about 2011 with the city, which indicated such a reimbursement would be due if the city did not follow through with maintaining the facility.

Rotary members assembled at the site suggested a Plan B be adopted that might alter current plans, which they say will result only in a concrete pad most of the year since the pavilion is to be in place only for the winter.

Former Rotary president Judy Hagan wrote recently that it was "with dismay and disbelief as well as anger" that she learned of the loss of the facility. "What a waste," she said. The Rotary motto includes the words "is it fair to all concerned?" she concluded.

Demolition plans will continue this week followed by construction of the foundation of the planned pavilion.

Westfield legal battles continue

Clerk-Treasurer Gossard's IT investigators finally named

The ongoing legal battles between Westfield Mayor Andy Cook and Clerk-Treasurer Cindy Gossard entered another chapter Tuesday as yet another lawsuit was filed. This one, filed by the clerk-treasurer, names the mayor as the defendant.

This story, which dates back to February, involves one suit filed against Gossard in her capacity as clerk-treasurer, one naming her as a private citizen, and now one filed against the mayor.

There have been allegations interfering with a city-wide audit, allegations of spyware installed on clerk's office computers, and allegations of a late-night "raid" of an office which led to search warrants being served as part of a Sheriff's Dept. investigation.

One point of contention since the discovery of the alleged spyware on clerk's office computers

has been the name of the private company Gossard hired to investigate the nature of the software, who placed it on her office's computers, and what data may have been accessed without her knowledge.

The court documents filed this time finally name the private investigative team hired by Gossard: Veracity IIR.

Veracity IIR is a Carmel-based company which identifies itself as a global intelligence, investigation and research firm specializing in corporate risk management and legal action support.

Veracity was founded by former FBI agents and a former CIA analyst, all with decades of experience in conducting investigations and intelligence collection. Veracity IIR employs highly experienced and accom-

Count 1 for Injunctive Relief:

plished former law enforcement officers, intelligence community professionals, technical experts and analytic personnel.

Count 2 for Declaratory Judgement:

Carmel Utilities to upgrade water meters in city-wide replacement project

The City of Carmel Utilities will begin replacing aging water meters across the community with new, enhanced equipment allowing for more accurate readings and better water efficiency. The project, beginning this month with expected completion in late 2022, will replace approximately 29,000 meters, which have become less effective and accurate due to old age.

"Meter manufacturers site an average meter age of 10 years. Many of Carmel's meters are more than 18 years old and, in some cases, 30 years old," said Utilities Director John Duffy. "By replacing our customers meters with this new advanced water meter technol-

ogy, we'll be able to better serve our water customers with more accurate data on water consumption and detect and stop leaks in a timely manner."

Funded by an \$8 million revenue bond, additional revenue and reduction in expenses due to the new meters will result in the project paying for itself without the need to raise residents' rates. Carmel Utilities has contracted Envocore - RTS Water Solutions to install the new Neptune water meters in a phased approach by neighborhood. Residents are to be informed prior to the installations with two separate postcard mailers, one sent to

the customer's home two weeks before installation, with the other three days before the contractor's arrival. The customer's water will be turned off while the installation process takes place, lasting approximately 20 minutes. A door hanger will then be left at the front door with pertinent information regarding installation.

By replacing entire routes of water meters with the new infrastructure, the project will also eliminate the need to send staff to record meter readings. Eighty-five percent of current meters are direct read, with staff going to each homeown-

er's meter and walking approximately seven to 10 miles per day outside in any type of weather. While a meter reader in the field can read an average of 375 meters a day, the new technology allows meter readings at 350 meters per minute via radio frequency collected on a computer within the Carmel Utilities office.

It's important to note that current meter readers will be reallocated into other positions within Carmel Utilities and will not lose their jobs.

Caucus on Sept. 15 will fill Hampton's seat on Noblesville Common Council

A vacancy on the Noblesville Common Council will be filled on Wednesday, Sept. 15 in a caucus of Republican precinct committeemen, according to county GOP chairwoman Laura Campbell.

The vacancy was created by the recent resignation of councilor Wil Hampton who is moving out of state. Hampton represented Council District 4. Only committeemen in that district will be voting on the replacement.

Hampton's term extends through Dec. 31, 2023. In such a resignation, the party from which the departing member was elected is responsible for filling the vacancy.

The caucus, closed to the general public, will be held at Noblesville City Hall at 6 p.m. on the 15th, but persons interested in being considered for the council seat must apply to Mrs. Campbell at least 72 hours before the caucus.

Hampton was first elected to the nine-member council in 2015 and re-elected in 2019. The council serves as the legislative body for the city.

AG Rokita: I will keep standing up to China

When I ran for Attorney General, I promised Hoosiers I would hold China accountable for their many abuses, including stealing our intellectual property, committing human rights violations, and unleashing a deadly virus on the world, which they unsuccessfully tried to cover up.

I continue keeping my end of the bargain to Hoosiers.

Just weeks ago, the Office of the Indiana Attorney General started an investigation into Valparaiso University's affiliation with the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) through its Confucius Institute. These organizations operate to spread propaganda and circulate the mantra of the CCP at both the university and in several K-12 schools in Indiana. Valparaiso alone has received at least \$1.1 million from the CCP to operate its institute.

Three weeks after I announced the investigation, the university did the right thing by stating it intends to finally end its relationship with its Confucius Institute in six months. After March 1, 2022, there will no longer be any Confucius Institutes in the state of Indiana, but 38 still remain throughout the country. As a result of public scrutiny, Valparaiso has agreed to terminate its relationship with the CCP and has stated that the university will no longer receive CCP or other funding to hire CCP-blessed professors and staff from China through these partnerships.

According to a 2019 Senate Homeland Security Report, the CCP handpicks the directors and teachers for Confucius Institutes and Confucius Classrooms in the United States. The cherry-picked faculty and staff are then required to sign a pledge to protect Chinese national interests while teaching American students on American soil. Meanwhile their contracts can be terminated at any point should they violate "Chinese law" or "engage in activities detrimental to national interests." Not only are teachers bound to protect the CCP's interests, contracts between these American schools and the CCP's Hanban Institute actually require them to obey Chinese law. Chinese law makes criticizing the CCP or the Chinese government illegal, thus making these American schools a CCP tool to suppress free speech.

A subsequent report issued by the congressionally created U.S.-China Economic and Security Review Commission in 2020 stated that these propaganda ef-

orts, which are referred to by the CCP as the "United Front," are nothing more than an attempt to "co-opt and neutralize sources of potential opposition to the policies and authority of its ruling Chinese Communist Party."

In short, these Confucius Institutes are designed to infiltrate and influence the U.S. on issues that are important to how China and the CCP view the world. Any mention of historical events that show the Chinese government in a negative light — such as the 1989 Tiananmen Square massacre, sensitive topics including Falun Gong abuses or its aggression towards Taiwan — are prohibited from being taught. Under the Hanban contracts, it is illegal to mention China's numerous human rights violations, including executing dissidents, forcing Tibetans into labor camps, and enslaving more than 1 million Uyghur Muslims in the Xinjiang region.

In essence, through these CCP-funded organizations, the CCP is using bribery and extortion to operate a massive PR campaign in the U.S. and around the world designed to conceal its history and malign intentions.

China is not our friend. As we speak, China is actively robbing U.S. companies of our intellectual property, stealing our patents, and then attempting to replace U.S. firms in the global marketplace using this stolen technology. Moreover, to this day they remain unwilling to allow any transparent investigation into the origins of the China Virus.

While hundreds of big, woke corporations, such as Facebook and Google, continue to lecture Americans about "Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility" (DEIA), they have remained silent on China's gross abuses of human rights, looking the other way while continuing to do business with them.

Rest assured, in Indiana we'll be taking a different approach as long as I am in office. Our investigation into Valparaiso University's ties to the CCP is ongoing but could be just the start of similar investigations elsewhere in the Hoosier state, regardless of the name given to these United Front CCP-funded organizations.

It is time to demand accountability from China, and my office will continue to make it a top priority.

Tigers win Mudsock battle over HSE

Fishers picked up its first Mudsock point of the year Tuesday night, as the Tigers' boys soccer team beat Class 3A No. 4 Hamilton Southeastern 2-0 at the Royals' field.

Fishers, ranked No. 2 in 3A, scored one goal in each half. Noah Reinhart put in the first goal, with Keiji Nakamae scoring the second goal. The Tigers' defense also played well, with Tyler March making several big saves, including a couple in the final minutes to preserve the shutout.
