Carmel calls off demolition of amphitheater

> Carmel will not proceed with plans to demolish an outdoor amphitheater after an outcry from members of the Carmel Rotary Club which paid for the facility about 10 years ago. Leaders of the Farmers Market, which use the space for part of their Saturday sales location, also protested plans to eliminate the amphitheater in favor of a temporary winter pavilion.

> Mayor Jim Brainard last week said he took responsibility for poor communications with the Rotary and Farmers Market. Opponents said they were caught by surprise with the city's plans. Demolition work has since stopped.

> The Rotary Club had paid \$100,000 to build the facility and donated it to the community in 2011. Former Rotary president Judy Hagan said it would be a "waste" to have it removed. She was part of a protest last Tuesday that faced a construction crew ready to begin demolition work.

Presumably, the hillside semi-circular stone seats facing a sunken stage area will remain intact, and the pavilion plan will either be dropped or moved elsewhere.

Mayor Jensen unveils 2022 Noblesville city budget proposal

Mayor Chris Jensen presented the City of Noblesville's 2022 Civil City budget plan at last Thursday's Finance Committee meeting. The proposed budget continues to focus on all four of his Policy Pillars and maintains continued focus on government modernization, cost containment, and proactive preservation of taxpayer-owned assets.

"Our city is growing and with that growth comes a city budget strategically shaped to meet the needs of our increased capacity," said Jensen. "We are now the 10th largest city in the state and it is our responsibility to plan a smart budget to meet that growth. We are fortunate to have healthy cash reserves, accumulated through many years of growth in assessed valuation and prudent management of public funds for us to be able to invest back into our community."

Hamilton County's American Rescue Plan Act grant portal to close by end of month

The Hamilton County American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Committee held its second meeting on Sept. 3 to discuss and adapt the Relief Grant process and review several applications.

"We are continually hearing from county residents, both in person and through the community engagement portal," said County Commissioner Steve Dillinger. "As a committee we discuss these comments and where appropriate make changes to our existing process."

One recent process change, based on community input, was removing the need to show a revenue reduction from 2019.

"A number of organizations have been very productive in their efforts to obtain both

show a reduction in revenue in 2020 compared to 2019," Dillinger said. "This doesn't mean they weren't negatively affected by COVID-19, and this was a change we felt made the process more equitable."

Thursday, Sept. 30. Interested entities must have a complete application submitted by 4:30 p.m.

"It's important that all applicants understand the committee reviews and weighs submissions on the information that is required and provided," said County Councilman Brad Beaver. "For example, one of those requirements is providing all other funding sources and each of those amounts.'



Noblesville High School given \$50,000 Metro Plastics robot

The REPORTER

Noblesville Schools announced last Tuesday that Metro Plastics Technologies has given Noblesville High School (NHS) a robot valued at \$50,000.

The robot will be used as part of the engineering curriculum at NHS, providing students with the opportunity to implement computer manufacturing programming in real-life applications.

"This partnership with Metro Plastics is a game-changer for our students, not only in taking their robotics programming skills to the next level, but in having the opportunity for mentorship from Metro employees," said Andrew Wilkins, NHS engineering teacher and Project Lead the Way (PLTW) coordinator.

Metro Plastics has already partnered with NHS for several years by hosting class tours and student interns from the school's workforce development program, believed to be the largest high school internship program in the state.

'Our goal is to always provide opportunities for students to develop the skills they need to be strong contributors in the real world," added Wilkins. "We're so thankful that Metro shares this vision and has supported us in making it a reality."

"Without a market for used robots with artificial intelligence, we decided to look for alternative uses for our old robot once we received our new one," said Ken Hahn, president of Metro Plastics Technologies. "Our interaction with the Noblesville High School STEM program, along with the quality interns we have encountered, prompted us to look into how NHS could utilize the technology. The NHS staff quickly replied with a detailed description of the learning possibilities it presented within the community, and the robot's fate was sealed."







Kirschner credited his team with overcoming any mistakes it may have made during the game, leading to the convincing win.

"We all make mistakes, we got to be able to rise from those mistakes," said Kirschner. "And in a lot of facets in the game tonight, when it mattered the most, we were able to overcome those mistakes, whether it be defense, getting a big turnover."

Heights trailed 7-0 after the first quarter, but didn't allow the Tigers to score again. Meanwhile, the Huskies poured in 21 points in the second period. Chance Yeager started things off with a five-yard touchdown run, then Gavin Bramel caught a pair of touchdown throws from Guy Griffey. All that led to a 21-7 halftime lead for Heights.

Yeager struck again in the third quarter, punching the ball in from the two-yard line. In the fourth quarter, Bramel and Griffey connected for another touchdown pass play, then Owen VanHaaren streaked 52 yards to complete the Huskies' scoring. Jonathan Glenn made all six extra-point kicks.

"Kudos to Northwestern," said Kirschner. "He's got his kids playing hard. They're well-coached. They're going to be good down the road. At the end of the day with us, we've got to improve on silly mistakes. But again, I'm not going to take anything away from a 42-7 victory on Homecoming. It's conference victory No. 1."

Griffey had an outstanding game, going 15-of-21 for 236 yards and the three touchdowns. Bramel totaled seven catches for 121 yards. Trey Ehman led the rushing with 73 yards, while VanHaaren totaled 59 yards.

Heights goes back on the road this week to continue division action, playing at Western on Friday.
