Fishers' own Kelsey Murphy wins 2021 MasterChef Legends

Fishers physical therapist and mother of three Kelsey Murphy faced a host of chefs, including the notorious Gordon Ramsay, to win the grand prize on the 11th season of MasterChef on FOX. The Reporter spoke to Murphy about her experience putting the Hoosier state firmly on the culinary map and about what is next for this local champion chef.

In June, when the Master-Chef season began, Murphy told The Reporter the total filming time in Los Angeles, Calif., had been six weeks, but because of the pandemic, there was a seven-month break in the middle. That means she has been keeping her victory a secret for a long last Wednesday.

While at the Knightstown Home his mentors discovered Rick had musical talent. They arranged and provided transportation for him to take vocal lessons at the Jordan School of Music in Indianapolis. This was made possible through a sponsoring American Legion Chapter. Rick graduated from Morton Memorial High School then attended Ball State University where he received his BS and MA degrees. He was a member of the BSU Concert Choir and Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity.

Rick began his teaching career as the band and choral director at Middletown High School. After serving in the U.S. Army, he returned to teach at Scecina High School. Rick started as Choral Director of Anderson High School the next school year. While at Anderson High School he founded the show choir which through the years won many awards and accolades. He loved competing with the show choir and presenting musicals with the entire choral department. Rick was a staunch Anderson Indians supporter, truly loved teaching, and his students. After leaving the high school, he taught elementary for several years combining for 50 years of total teaching before finally retiring.

Additionally, Rick was the choral director for several churches throughout his career. These included First Baptist Church and First Presbyterian Church in Anderson as well as the First Christian Church in Noblesville. I am five days out from the sting. I can finally use my right hand. My finger still has battle scars from that wicked wasp. I might smell a little like vinegar.


I may be a bit more skittish of the sight and sound of anything buzzing.

As hopefully you have seen, the Irsay Family and the Indianapolis Colts have championed a new initiative called "Kicking the Stigma."

This comprehensive initiative was created to shed light and raise awareness on mental illness. During Mental Health Awareness Month in May 2021, the Indianapolis Colts and Irsay Family raised \$4.5 million for the effort.

Kicking the Stigma Indiana State Senator Week was centered around influential Colts players and ma associated with mental



and addictive disorders. Colts have partnered with four non-profit ganizations that have a local footprint, including Mental Health America of Indi-

health conditions

ana, NAMI Indianapolis, Project Healthy Minds, and Bring Change to Mind. Mental Health stigma reduction is critical, but is only a first step on the path of mental health systems change in Indiana.

Mental health advocates and policy makers made great strides during the 2021 Indiana legislative session. An increase in funding for the Indiana behavioral health field is expected to be one of the biggest victories this year for those working at the Indiana State House.

In the last legislative session, the Indiana General Assembly fully funded the work of the Drug Czar at \$10 million for the coming biennium, appropriated \$100 million in federal rescue funds to FSSA for mental health, and another \$50 million to the Department of Health for health grants. They also created a fund for the Opioid Settlement for the prevention, education, and treatment of Opioid Use Disorder and co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders. In addition, Indiana was one of only four states that passed legislation in response to federal law creating the 9-8-8 crisis helpline.

Mental health is health. We have a mental health bubble ready to burst in our state. It is all hands on deck to prevent an incredible agony that is descending on Hoosiers. Each of us has the power to create a society where seeking mental health care is as common as going to the dentist.

I thought to myself "How could that possibly be true?" and after hours of searching, I found an article about how a student had taken ground-penetrating radar and discovered 215 unmarked graves at a residential school. By now that number has climbed to about 5,000.

> The MMIW still happens today. I was alerted to this by one main indigenous content creator, Quiriror, a two-spirit, Dine creator on the platform Tik-Tok. They spoke of the residential schools to start and then line 3. They linked petitions, sources, and many other resources. After more searching by myself to gain other perspectives, I realized that they were correct. The pipeline, the oppression, the genocide, and the ugly parts of history have been covered up for years.

To conclude, this pipeline not only promotes systemic racism brought against the indigenous peoples but is detrimental to all parts of their lives. Enbridge is responsible for the largest inland oil spill, the mistreatment of the Anishinaabe, and for funding police officers to fight water

If we allow this to continue, what will happen next? The genocide of indigenous peoples will continue until something is done. The country founded on freedom is turning into an oppressive and corrupt place unless we the people do something about it.

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
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Eagles stun Millers with big plays



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
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
