"Serving our community at the Statehouse over the last seven years has been a tremendous honor," Cook said. "It's time to turn to the next chapter, which includes pri-

oritizing my family's health as well as my own. I appreciate the trust the residents of House District 32 have placed in me, and I'll make sure there is a seamless transition for the constituents."

Cook said among the reasons for retiring is his need to focus on personal health issues as well as helping care for his elderly father.

As a former school superintendent and teacher, Cook's passion for helping students and educators led him to champion several laws supporting Indiana schools. To help young Hoosiers, Cook worked on bills ensuring student access to mental health services and programs, requiring middle school students take a civics education class, expanding access to

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






Four county council members are elected from elected at-large. The four districts will likely require some changes to the benefit of districts in the southern portion of the county.








# Carmel runs away with fifth set over Millers

Both teams engaged in several runs throughout the match. In the first set, Carmel led 23-20 before the Millers came back by winning six of the next seven points to take the set.
