Danielle Carey Tolan, Westfield Washington Township Trustee, was awarded the prestigious honor of Trustee of the Year by the Indiana Township Association at its annual conference on Sept. 21.

This award is given to a trustee who has proven to be exceptional and goes above and beyond the traditionally required responsibilities.

"I am humbled and honored to receive this distinguished award," Tolan said. "There are so many trustees across the state of Indiana whom have made important contributions to their community and do amazing things to serve their constituents."

"Danielle is one of those people that is always looking for better ways

to do things," said Adams Township Trustee Michelle Junkins. "When she says she can take on a project, there is no doubt in my mind she can."

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Tolan stepped up as a community leader in many ways, including creating a Community Outreach team with Westfield community and nonprofit leaders to ensure that the needs of the community were being met.

She also works tirelessly to oversee a federal grant that provides assistance to renters in the county. As the President of the Hamilton County Trustees Association, she was given the opportunity to manage the \$18 million federal grant for the Hamilton County Emergency Rental Assistance Program

(HC ERAP). This program assists renters who have lost income due to the pandemic. Within a short timeframe, she secured a team to manage the rental assistance program for the entire county. To date, HC ERAP has distributed over \$5 million in rent and utility assistance to more than 1300 households, allowing these residents to remain in their homes.

Tolan is in her second term as Washington Township Trustee and has worked to create efficiencies in local government to not only streamline the township office but to be a better steward of taxpayer money. Her passion to give to the community has shown as she has strengthened partnerships with over 150 Hamilton County and state service providers.

## Names changing for streets in Old Town Carmel

The City of Carmel is in the process of renaming streets in the Old Town section of the city. Letters have gone out to the first 171 residents living on east-west streets advising the names of their streets will be changed effective Feb. 1, 2022, according to Joshua Kirsh of the city engineering office.

He said the changes are being made to attempt to avoid confusion sometimes experienced by the current system of numbered streets and avenues. In the older section of the city, streets run east and west. Avenues run north and south. The configuration is a grid system with its center at Main Street and Range Line Road.

Under this system, an address of 500 Third Ave., N.E. is found five blocks north of Main and three blocks east of Range Line. This grid system was adopted about 80 years ago to replace named streets such as Walnut, Maple, Elm, etc.

Kirsh said eventually all numbered streets and avenues will be replaced by either original names from the early days of the community or names of local historic significance.

For example, 5th Street N.E. and N.W. will be named Small Street in honor of L.J. Small, longtime operator of an early mercantile store, and 4th Avenue north and south will be named Richland Street to honor the first Carmel school established in 1833.

In addition to the 171 residents already advised of the changes, another 403 residents will be advised of changes to the names of their streets in coming months. No changes will be made to the names of Main Street or Range Line Road.

## Higher taxes can come with no rate increase

Many political leaders around Hamilton County are gleefully telling everyone that they will not increase the property tax rate next year. But, they are not saying that most individual homeowners will pay more in 2022. For some it will be a little more and for some it will be a lot more.

The reason, of course, is that there was widespread upward trending in assessments for next year. Property owners were advised by mail of any increase in their assessment, but many paid little attention to the notice.

Countywide, the taxable assessed valuation increased by about \$1.7 billion, a tremendous amount for any county. Most of the increase was found in the growing

# Levinson opens: Noblesville's first downtown apartments in 106 years

Noblesville officials and Rebar Development last Friday officially opened The Levinson, a \$25 million mixed-use project. The Levinson provides the first new apartments in downtown Noblesville since 1915.

"Enhancing and preserving downtown is one my administration's key pillars," said Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen. "There is a demand for living options in and around the Downtown Square and urban density supports our local businesses, restaurants and shops. Since this project started, it has attracted additional downtown development interest and projects to redevelop space in our

growing community."

The Levinson includes 75 market-rate and 10 affordable-rate studio, one- and two-bedroom modern apartments with a rooftop deck and contemporary amenities. Additionally, the 2,000 square-foot lobby along Maple Avenue includes a public exhibit of downtown Noblesville's rich history and 5,100 square feet of commercial space is along Ninth Street.

"The Levinson is attracting millennials, empty-nesters, high-earning and workforce professionals to downtown – serving as an economic driver for Noblesville restaurants and businesses," said Rebar

Development President Shelby Bowen, adding that only four units remain unleashed.

The project also includes a four-level, 299-space parking garage. A minimum of 199 spaces will be available for paid public parking. The Levinson will provide four hours of free parking to guests, and cost \$2 per hour after that time per day.

"Surface parking lots, while functional, are not the best land use strategies to sustain and enhance a vibrant downtown," Community and Economic Development Director Sarah Reed said. "A public parking garage is an essential component to address current, perceived and real parking challenges."

The Levinson is named after one of the pioneer families in Noblesville. The family was known for being charitable, but it was the eldest son of the Levinson family, S.O. Levinson, a Noblesville High School graduate and Nobel Peace Prize nominee, who donated his family's former homestead to the city in 1938. A portion of the land was used as the former City Hall site before becoming a public parking lot.

The Levinson is a public-private project between Rebar Development and the City of Noblesville. Hagerman Inc. and Edwards-Rigdon Construction built the project and garage.

# Frightfully good show in Westfield

## Main Street Productions stages “Dracula” Oct. 7-17

Dracula.  
What images does that name conjure? Bella Lugosi? Bats and wolves and the terrible cost of immortality? Blood, of course, is right there at the top.  
Main Street Productions (MSP) is staging *Dracula* this month and is holding a blood drive to offer the community both some chilling Halloween entertainment and a chance to help alleviate the ongoing blood shortage.

This version of *Dracula*’s story is a play written by Steven Dietz in 1996 which follows the original Stoker novel more closely than most of Hollywood’s versions have. While the book tells the story in the form of letters moving in chronological order, the play tells some of the early parts of the story in flashbacks.  
“There are a lot of moments from the original Bram Stoker’s *Dracula*, but it moves really fast,” MSP Director Brandi Davis told The Reporter. “We jump back and forth. I think there are 43 scene changes across 17 locations, so it moves quick.”  
Davis did note that due to

the nature of the show, it is not appropriate for all ages and parents should use caution when choosing whether or not to bring children.  
“There is a still a lot of blood and a it is very dark, so some kids may be scared,” Davis said. “There is not anything inappropriate necessarily, but vampires can be scary.”  
And since this is *Dracula* staging in the weeks leading up to Halloween, it was a perfect opportunity to hold a blood drive.  
As the pandemic wears

slowly on, blood supplies have been at dangerous and historic lows this summer. MSP is partnering with Versiti Blood Center of Indiana, formerly Indiana Blood Center, for a one-day blood drive in the parking lot of Westfield Playhouse, 220 N. Union St., Westfield.  
“We are doing a blood drive in conjunction with the show on Oct. 13,” Davis told The Reporter. “If you give blood during that blood drive you get one ticket to any show this season.”

# The evolution of the mind

When we were young children, we rarely asked ourselves questions such as, “Why am I not able to understand what others understand quite easily?” When we were so young that reading and talking were difficult, we didn’t realize that we were learning at a tremendous rate, nor looking back can we acknowledge what it was like not to be able to read or speak.  
When you sit down and examine the books which you are currently reading compared to the simplicity of books you may have read in say, elementary school, you may question why you failed to comprehend the simplicity behind those books and might question why you could not then comprehend books at your current level.  
When you think about the conversations you overheard from your parents, you might realize that you cannot recall exactly what they were talking about at the time. How is it that as an adult these concepts seem like basic knowledge but are absolutely incomprehensible to a child?  
When I sit and recall reading as a child, I remember the first book that truly made sense to me. At the age of five, the first ever book I could even read was this book on ABCs and memorizing the alphabet. When I dwell on the difficulty of reading such a simple book at the time, I ask myself, “How could I be so stupid as to not be able to read something so easy?” Yet no matter how much I think about it, the fact still remains that it took me about 15 minutes to figure out that C is for cat. Now I read actual books and can comprehend quite well that Z is indeed for zebra, so why was it that 10 years ago that was something that brought me so much strife?  
Often when I look back to when I was really young, it seems like I go from not being able to understand some simple things at all to them becoming basic knowledge.  
I believe that one of a child’s greatest abilities is the ability to rapidly assimilate knowledge at an extraordinary pace. This ability, which makes us learn so rapidly, is probably why it is so weird to look back to when we were children and notice how things that didn’t really make sense at the time, like counting and reading, seem so easy and are considered basic knowledge to us a short while later in life. We overlook how difficult these concepts are to learn at the time and thus don’t understand how they did not make sense in the first place.  
When I attempt to memorize things now or learn something new that can prove to be difficult (such as another language), I find that it takes a tremendous amount of time and effort and can have diminishing returns if I don’t constantly go over the material that I am trying to learn.  
Yet, when a young child is often in contact with foreign languages, due to factors such as the cultural areas in which they grew up or because of their parents, then they are able to pick up that language, often without trying. Due to this ability, children are able to learn and grow at a rapid pace so that they can be prepared for the future and are able to adapt to their surroundings when they are older.  
So when I truly sit back and ask myself, “How is it that as an adult these concepts seem like basic knowledge but are absolutely incomprehensible to a child?” I find that the answer lies within a lack of understanding of the difficulty of the concepts that the child is still trying to grasp and understand. When you are a child, you learn quickly things that would be difficult for adults to learn and it can undermine the difficulty of the things you are learning and the rate at which you are able to absorb the knowledge.  
The things that we do not know as a child are only unknown to us because we have yet to learn them. Our ability to adapt and understand complex concepts such as reading and writing is due solely to the fact that we were able to learn them so quickly as a child.  
When we look back at our youth, we should not be surprised at what we didn’t know, but amazed at the things we knew at the time.

cities of Carmel, Fishers, Noblesville and Westfield.  
This will mean about a 7 percent county-wide increase in tax revenue, even more in the fastest growing areas, and somewhat less in northern parts of the county.  
So, if you hear officials brag about little or no increase in the rate, don’t be overly impressed. The fact is, growing communities, while having legitimate needs for more money to provide public services, will have more than enough revenue to meet those needs.  
Beyond true needs, city, town and the county council, along with school boards and township boards, should reduce their tax rates at least a little to offset the increases most residents experienced in their assessments. There would still be sufficient new money to meet increasing costs of government.  
Will we get that relief? It might depend on whether any taxpayers demand it. Contrary to popular opinion, officeholders do listen to their voters.

# Atlanta Heavy Trash Pick-up Day set for Oct. 29

Heavy Trash Pick-up Day is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 29 in Atlanta. Please heed these reminders from Republic Services:

- Prohibited items**  
No grass clippings, limbs, leaves, dirt, rocks, bricks, cement, appliances with Freon, tires, televisions, copy machines, telephones, computers, monitors, gaming systems, animal or human remains, large pieces of metal, hazardous chemical medical or infectious waste, oil-based paints, flammable fluids, pesticides, bug spray, or automotive fluids or parts.
- Acceptable items**  
Furniture, washers, dryers, stoves, bag small-bulk items to prevent windblown debris, wrap broken mirrors or glass in cardboard – tape shut and label “GLASS,” mattresses and box springs MUST be contained in a bag or fully wrapped.
- If you are discarding construction equipment . . .**  
Bundle securely, no more than four-foot length and 40 pounds, no nails or screws are to be visible, carpet and padding is to be rolled and tied, no more than four-foot length and 40 pounds, empty latex paint cans with lids removed and an absorbent (kitty litter) added to dry out any remaining paint residue.

Hamilton County Coroner John Chalfin identified the victim as Dominic Strain, 18.

Police reporters indicate Baker was handling a loaded gun while intoxicated and accidentally discharged it, hitting the man while he was sleeping on the couch.

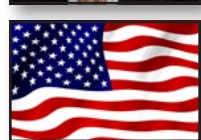
### Glen Harold Harper

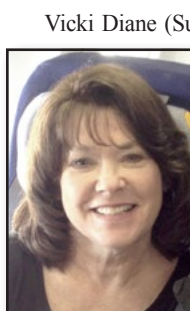

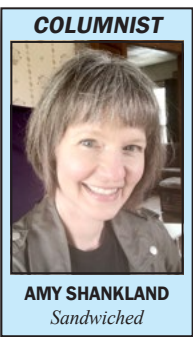

The Medicare mailbox dilemma

If you are 64 or older, starting each October your mailbox will be full of solicitations from dozens of insurance companies. Why the onslaught of not only print, but TV and radio ads? Because 60 million Medicare members can change their drug and Medicare Advantage plan regardless of their health. There are billions of dollars in play and every insurance company in your area will reach out to you.

It's not all bad because you do have a lot of choices. What is bad is how confusing it can be and the time pressure to make a choice before the deadline of Dec. 7.

I've had many instances of clients calling me after Jan. 1 and saying, “Now that all my company has gone home from the holidays, I'm ready to sit down and go over my Medicare options with you now.” Unless there is a special exception, most people are “locked in” to their health plan for a year and can't change. Telling those clients that they missed their annual window to move is never fun.

Something that frustrates insurance agents as well as the general public is that we agents know what the plan changes for 2022 will look like in July. By law, we are not able to share that information until Oct. 1. We sit on the information for three months, and then when

it's time to call all our clients about the changes, we struggle to get ahold of you, or your struggle to reach your very busy insurance agent.

The system is further convoluted because this time period (Oct. 1 to Dec. 7) has no bearing on the millions of Medicare members who own a Medicare Supplement policy – yet they are under the impression that they are impacted as well.

If you have a Medicare Supplement Plan, it's most likely a Plan F or G. The law doesn't “lock you in” to your plan or give you a time period that you can move. With a Medicare Supplement plan, you can change any time of year. The catch is that you must be able to answer the health questions! If you have, for example, COPD, Parkinson's, or use a walker, you are unlikely to ever be able to change to a similar plan.

But you could move to a Medicare Advantage plan without answering any health questions – you guessed it, during the October to December time frame. Hence, all the letters and postcards in your mailbox!

# Greyhounds, Royals win tennis sectional titles

The Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern boys tennis teams successfully defended their sectional championships last Thursday.

Over at the Todd Witsken Tennis Center, the No. 1-ranked and five-time defending state champion Greyhounds beat No. 19 Guerin Catholic to claim its 12th consecutive sectional title. It's also the 35th overall championship in the Carmel program's history.

The Royals got victories at Nos. 2 and 3 singles and swept both doubles matches, thus clinching Southeastern's 12th sectional championship in program history.

"I thought we played well," said HSE coach Kirk Webber. "Noblesville's a good team. As a coach, you're always afraid you're going to have a letdown after a match like yesterday, but our guys did a nice job coming out here."

Webber said a key to the win was good starts in each of the match wins, with all of them quickly taking the first set.

The coach said his team "took care of business, stayed focused and played well." No. 2 Paul Schneider and No. 3 Abhi Chaddha won singles matches, while the doubles teams of No. 1 Aiden De Witt and Andrew Spirrisson and No. 2 Nolan Houseman and Davila Rodrigo also won in straight sets.

The Millers' win came at No. 1 singles, with Noah Bushong winning 6-1, 6-3. The victory qualifies Bushong for the individual tournament for the second consecutive year. Bushong will play the individual sectional at North Central next week.

Southeastern will also head to North Central on Tuesday for the team regional. The Royals will take on the host and No. 5-ranked Panthers in the semi-finals, which begin at 4:30 p.m.

Shamrocks move up to third-place finish

Carmel places fifth, HSE sixth, Noblesville ninth - Six golfers named to All-State Team

**CARMEL** - The Westfield girls golf team has qualified for the state meet in seven of the last eight years, and each time, the Shamrocks have finished in the top six.

That streak continued this weekend at the state meet, which finished up last Saturday at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel. Westfield was back on the podium, as the Shamrocks improved their second-round score by 11 shots over their first-round score, and that moved them up to third place.

Westfield had a two-day total of 637. The Shamrocks' second-day score was 313, an improvement over their first-day score of 324.

"It was good today," said Westfield coach Trevor Neu. "It was nice that we put together a good day to move up the ladder a little bit. Yesterday was pretty disappointing for us as a team. A lot of teams struggled yesterday. We rebounded well. The kids played a lot better golf today, a lot smarter golf, tried to minimize the mistakes today and that definitely paid off for us."

The 'Rocks had a top 10 finisher in Sophie McGinnis. The senior played consistently throughout her two rounds and finished with a two-day score of 151. McGinnis carded a 75 on Saturday, a one-shot improvement over her Friday effort of 76.

"Sophie had a really good two days," said Neu. "She played the course really well, managed everything really well, just handled her emotions. She's a senior, so you'd expect that a little bit. Really proud of her two days, really proud of all the kids in bouncing back."

McGinnis had two birdies during her second round. Samantha Brown, who also totaled a 75 during her second day, collected three birdies on Saturday. Addi Kooi had two and Allie Hildebrand made one. McGinnis and Brown were both named to the All-State team at the conclusion of the meet.

This year's state meet finished after 7 p.m., as it had to absorb a two-hour rain delay during the late morning and early afternoon. But there was nothing that could stop Evansville North. The Huskies defended their state championship with a dominant score of 606, well ahead of runner-up Homestead's 624. Castle took fourth with a 639, giving the Evansville area two podium teams. Lapel's Macy Beeson defended her individual state championship with a two-day score of 144.

Carmel took fifth place with a team total of 652. The Greyhounds were also led by a senior, Ava Hedrick, who scored a 157 over her two days, making two birdies during her second round.

Michaela Headlee was right behind Hedrick with a 158, including two bird-

ies of her own. Headlee was also named to the All-State team. All three of the other Carmel players - Ava Nguyen, Claire Swathwood and Sophie Mock - each made one birdie in the second round.

The 'Hounds had a 323 for their second-day score, improving by six shots over the first round.

"We were able to make up some shots today," said Greyhounds coach Kelly Kluesner. "Still didn't play quite as well as we had hoped for after that rain delay, but a top-five finish after our start yesterday, we'll take it."

Hamilton Southeastern placed sixth at the state meet, its best finish since the Royals took third in 2014. Southeastern got an outstanding effort from Yanah Rolston, who tied for seventh place with a 150.

Rolston had two birdies during her second round, and was named to the All-State team afterward. Marissa Spreitzer also collected one birdie. The Royals scored a 330 for their second round.

"We really were off to a really pretty good start," said Southeastern coach Steve Guenin. "Then we got rained on, and we came out and struggled after the delay. But we did fine. We came out here and we gutted it out and did a nice job hanging in there. Not as well as we'd hoped, but it was good."

Noblesville scored a 684 for its two-day total, placing the Millers in ninth. Noblesville had a second-round score of 345.

Caroline Whallon led the Millers with a 160; she scored 80s in both rounds of the tournament and was named to the All-State team. Sophia Stutz had one birdie in her second round.

"It was a long, tough day," said Noblesville coach Justin Werkley. "I think we did fine. Again, could have played better, could have played worse. I think they all did their best and that's all we ever ask."

Two individuals had high finishes at the state meet. University senior Becky Williams tied for 11th place with a 153; Williams rose up to that position by scoring a 73 during her second round, including four birdies.

Guerin Catholic senior Christina Pfefferkorn scored a 159, tying her for 24th place. Pfefferkorn had two birdies during her second round.

Pfefferkorn was also named to the All-State team. She is not only the first Golden Eagles golfer to make it to state all four years, but she is the only athlete in Guerin Catholic history to reach state all four years in any sport.
