Fishers High School Dance Marathon wins national award

The Fishers High School Dance Marathon has won the Children's Miracle Network national award for Best High School Dance Marathon.

The school's annual event has been one of the most successful high school marathons in the state of Indiana, raising \$600,000 since 2008 for Riley Hospital for Children. Even as the COVID-19 pandemic hit, the Fishers Dance Marathon was able to have a six-figure total while having an online marathon.

Fishers Dance Marathon was able to demonstrate remarkable success in online fundraising leading into the marathon. In 2020, Fishers raised \$6,174.57 in the two weeks leading into the marathon. Despite fundraising challenges over the past two years, Fishers was able to top 2020, raising \$21,775.05 in the two weeks leading into the marathon.

Previously, Fishers had a pageant with gentlemen from the school to crown one Mr. DM. To move towards the inclusion of all people at Fishers, this tradition was opened to any student, allowing for a more diverse group of individuals to show off their passion for children's health. The Fishers Dance Marathon leadership worked to make the contest have a wider reach through social media. Each contestant had an Instagram page where they would receive points for followers, engagement on posts, and promoting the marathon. To end the contest, all the contestants participated in a lip-syncing competition at the event. At the end of the night, two individuals were crowned as Fishers Dance Marathon Royalty.

County Health Dept. reopening vaccination clinic at fairgrounds

The Hamilton County Health Department will reopen its mass vaccination clinic today at the 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville. Hours will be 1 to 7 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays.

"At this time, we'll only be administering the first and second doses of the Pfizer vaccine, as well as booster shots,"

said Christian Walker, the health department's emergency preparedness coordinator. "Booster vaccines are currently limited to those who received their second Pfizer shot at least six months ago."

Only those who are 65 years of age or older as well as those who are 18 years and older with underlying

medical conditions or who live or work in high-risk settings are eligible for a Pfizer booster.

High-risk residences include health care settings, schools, correctional facilities, and homeless shelters. High-risk occupations include first responders (healthcare workers, firefighters, police, con-

gregate care staff), education staff (teachers, support staff, daycare workers), food and agriculture workers, manufacturing workers, corrections workers, U.S. Postal Service workers, public transit workers, and grocery store workers. [Click here](#) for a more complete list.

- Adults should always accompany their children and carry a flashlight at night, staying within their own neighborhood and known homes.
- Watch for traffic before crossing any street.
- Avoid costumes that are

long, which could cause tripping, or costumes that have hard plastic or wood props like swords that could be a hazard.

- Face paint is often a safer alternative to masks, which may obstruct vision.

- It is also important to inspect candy before allowing children to have it. Dispose of any candy that is unwrapped.

Works from Calligraphy Guild of Indiana, Margot Bogue on display in The Art Gallery at City Hall in Fishers

The Fishers Arts Council presents a month-long exhibit of paintings by The Calligraphy Guild of Indiana and a three-month long exhibit by Margot Bogue. The Guild paintings are in the main gallery of The Art Gallery at City Hall, Fishers, while Margot's paintings are in The Alcove at The Art Gallery at City Hall.

There will be a free public reception from 6 to 8 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 15 at The Art Gallery at City Hall to meet the artists of the Calligraphy Guild. Adult beverages, along with pre-packaged snacks,

will be available. The Calligraphy Guild of Indiana exhibit will run through Oct. 28, while Margot Bogue's exhibit in The Alcove will run through Dec. 29. A reception will be held for Margot on Dec. 10.

The calligraphy exhibit looks at the art of calligraphy and features work by calligraphers of The Calligraphy Guild of Indiana. Calligraphy is beautiful writing perfected during the medieval years in the illuminated manuscripts of that era. Alphabet styles, ornaments, design, illustration, tools and materials, methods and practices make up the

illustrious history of early books.

Today, calligraphy letters and words are used for design elements as well as traditional certification recognitions, announcements, promotional materials, and the hand-made book.

Activities of the guild include learning programs, demonstrations, and "fair" presentations. Membership is open to anyone interested and includes a subscription to the quarterly publication produced by the members in calligraphy.

Margot Bogue's exhibit is

titled *Ephemeral Indiana*. She focuses on scenes of Indiana that reflect a moment in time, such as Cheeny Creek in winter, a fall day, clouds over the Capitol and reflections of nature.

Margot, most recently won "Best of Show" at the 2nd annual Juried Art Show of Hamilton County Artists sponsored by Jiffy Lube of Indiana. The Alcove exhibit features 26 of her oil paintings.

The Art Gallery at City Hall, 1 Municipal Drive, Fishers, is open weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The gallery is closed on holidays.

Beware of purchasing flooded vehicles

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita is warning Hoosier consumers to watch out for flood-damaged vehicles when shopping for used cars.

Hurricane Ida recently brought widespread and devastating flooding throughout large portions of the southern United States. As affected communities begin to recover from the damage, car buyers around the country, including in Indiana, need to be aware of the likelihood that increased numbers of flood-damaged vehicles will be offered for sale.

“We take action every day against individuals who have victimized Hoosiers by engaging in deceptive and unfair business practices,” Rokita said. “But we also stress education and outreach to help Hoosiers avoid becoming victims in the first place.”

As a result of Hurricane Ida, tens of thousands of vehicles were likely submerged by flooding. Prior to Hurricane Ida, there were already almost a half million flood-damaged vehicles on U.S. roads. That number is now likely to increase significantly.

Flood damage to a vehicle is often catastrophic, and even if the most obvious damage is repaired, the vehicle can suffer long-lasting effects. Besides cosmetic and engine damage, floods can short out a vehicle’s electrical system and compromise safety features such as airbags and anti-lock brakes. Floods also can cause mold

and mildew infestation that can result in health issues for passengers long after a vehicle was submerged.

If a vehicle is flood damaged, its title should be branded as “salvage” or “flood damage,” and such a title brand must be disclosed in writing to a purchasing consumer. However, some flood-damaged vehicles lack such a title brand due to fraudulent activity. Such unbranded vehicles will be moved to states throughout the country, including Indiana, and sold to unsuspecting consumers. With the current shortage of used car inventory, unscrupulous sellers will likely be even more aggressive in pushing flood-damaged vehicles onto the market.

To reduce the risk of unknowingly purchasing a flood-damaged vehicle, consumers should follow these steps prior to making a transaction:

- Ask the dealer to provide a vehicle history report. If the dealer refuses to provide such a report, purchase one yourself. Consumers can obtain a vehicle history report from a variety of sources, such as Carfax, Autocheck, the National Motor Vehicle Title Information System, or the National Insurance Crime Bureau.
- Check the vehicle’s history report to see if there are any reported title brands on the vehicle, such as “salvage,” “rebuilt,” “junk” or “flood damage.” Also note

on the report the state or geographic area where the vehicle was last titled or registered to determine if the vehicle was recently located in an area affected by flooding.

- Ask to see the vehicle’s title, or a copy of the title, and check to see if the title includes any title brands, including “salvage,” “rebuilt,” “junk” or “flood damage.”

• Inspect the vehicle closely for any signs of flood damage by checking to ensure all electronic components, including the heat and air conditioning, are operational. Check for any signs of mud or rust anywhere on or in the vehicle, including the engine compartment. Check for discolored or mildewed carpeting. Note whether the vehicle has any odd smells. Be suspicious of a vehicle that smells like mildew. The aroma of heavy disinfectants and cleaners may also be an indicator that someone has tried to mask a mold or odor problem.

- Take the vehicle for a test drive.

• Have an independent mechanic of your choosing inspect the vehicle prior to purchase. Specifically ask the mechanic to check for any signs of flood damage.

If a consumer suspects a recently purchased vehicle was flood-damaged, and such damage was not disclosed prior to sale, the consumer should file a consumer complaint at [in.gov/attorneygeneral](#).

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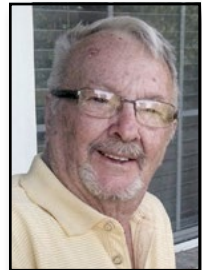

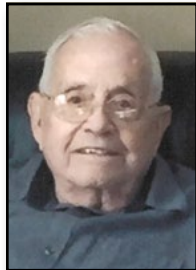

Bramblett's late goal sends Millers past HSE

With time running out and the prospect of overtime looming, Noblesville's Ava Bramblett took matters into her own hands - or feet.

The No. 1-ranked Millers were locked in a battle with No. 4-ranked and Class 3A Sectional 8 host Hamilton Southeastern Tuesday in the first round of the tournament. The score was tied at 1-1 with under two minutes to go until Bramblett kicked a ball into the net. That was enough for Noblesville to win 2-1 and advance to the sectional semi-finals.

"I made that run like 10 times in the game," said Bramblett. "And finally it was just me and the defender and I was like, 'This is the crucial minute, just got to be selfish, take it myself.'"

Noblesville scored its goal in the first half, with Kiana Siefert finding the back of the net during the 25th minute.

"I could hear all my teammates telling me to turn, and I felt the defender on my back, so listening to my team, I just took the touch and found the net," said Siefert.

The 1-0 score would stand at halftime and until the 59th minute. That's when the Royals tied things up, as Tatum Coleman kicked the ball in from about eight yards. Southeastern played aggressive with several shots on goal during the second half, but the Millers were able to hold on.

"I think the whole team, under pressure, we play so well," said Siefert. "Second half, we started getting frantic, but we just pulled it together. Ava's a beast. We all just know what we need to do and we work together really well."

"After they scored, our head didn't drop," said Bramblett. "We knew we had a goal. And nobody wants to go to overtime. You're exhausted. You just got to put one in before."

The well-played sectional game came on the heels of last week's regular-season contest between the two schools, which ended in a 0-0 tie.

"Southeastern's played us as well the last two games as anybody has this year," said Noblesville coach Mike Brady. "They're aggressive, they're well-coached, they come out and play hard. It wasn't a surprise to me that it was a close

Southeastern finished its season with a 12-2-3 record.

"I just want to say what an incredible journey it's been with this team," said Davidson. "I have loved every minute with

this group. They are a special group, special team. And I'm just super proud of the team that they were all year, top to bottom. Every kid."

The Millers are 14-0-1 and will play Pendleton Heights in Thursday's sectional semi-finals.

Westfield won its opener at the Class 3A Sectional 10 at Carmel on Tuesday, beating Arsenal Tech 13-0.

The Shamrocks improved to 8-4-5 with the win and will play No. 10 Zionsville Thursday in the semi-finals.

Sheridan fell to sectional host and 1A No. 7 Tipton 7-0 in a Tuesday first-round game.

The Blue Devils scored three goals in the first 12 minutes, but the Blackhawks battled throughout the game and coach Brian Prange said his team "played very well all night."

"The Lady Blackhawks ended their season, playing with everything they had and playing for each other," said Prange. Sheridan finished its season 7-7.
