Since the opening of Grand Park in Westfield, there was no doubt that traffic in the northwest parts of Hamilton County has increased. The Town of Sheridan is well aware of increased traffic into, out of, and around the town.

The Sheridan Coalition, after hosting an Active Living Workshop in partnership with Purdue University and Health by Design, realized the need for community identity. Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt, as a part of this coalition, along with Town Council President and Coalition member David Kinkead, and the Coalition determined the need for town identity.

After speaking with Kinkead, Heirbrandt said it became obvious there was a need to build an identity for Sheridan. There was no evidence of the thriving town existing if you were just driving along the highway.

To Heirbrandt, the solution was high quality signage at the entries of the town that would be made of concrete and brick.

Commissioner Heirbrandt and Kinkead knew it was going to be an expensive project, so they turned to Gloria Del Greco at

the Sheridan Coalition Group and the Sheridan community for support.

"Heirbrandt initially put

up \$500 dollars for a contest: Community members could

County Health Dept. reopens vaccination clinic at fairgrounds

The Hamilton County Health Department has reopened its mass vaccination clinic at the 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville. Hours will be 1 to 7 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays.

"At this time, we'll only be administering the first and second doses of the Pfizer vaccine, as well as booster shots," said Christian Walker, the health department's emergency preparedness coordinator. "Booster vaccines are currently limited to those who received their second Pfizer shot at least six months ago."

Only those who are 65 years of age or older as well as those who are 18 years and older with underlying medical conditions or who live or work in high-risk settings are eligible for a Pfizer booster.

County hires KPMG to improve efficiencies

County Council looking for ways to improve systems, processes

Hamilton County has hired KPMG to conduct efficiency studies of each Hamilton County governmental office and department. The effort is being led by county councilors Ken Alexander, Amy Massillamany, and Fred Glynn, as well as Mark Heirbrandt, president of the Hamilton County Commissioners.

"We're looking at efficiencies within the county at a department level," Glynn said. "Do we have enough space? How efficient are our operations? How can we better support our departments and be the best stewards of the taxpayers' money?"

The Hamilton County Council, the county's fiscal body, is responsible for adopting the annual budget each year. Alexander says a deeper dive

into the efficiencies of each department will help it better determine funding priorities.

"This process will provide us with data to make better decisions and provide our departments with valuable information to plan for our future," Alexander said. "The final report will provide detailed recommendations and specific action steps to ensure a sustainable future for county government."

The first departments to be reviewed will be the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, Community Corrections, and Probation. Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush has a Masters of Business Administration and volunteered his department to go first.

"Stewarding taxpayer resources by applying strategic planning, including financial planning and continuous quality improvement methods is one

of our primary goals," Quakenbush said. "I'm proud to work with a group of elected officials who support public safety and are unified in trying to provide the best quality service to keep our community safe."

KPMG will look at each department's operations and finances, specifically its organizational chart, staffing assignments, attrition, and overtime as well as technology, dispatch, and fleet maintenance. A financial review will also evaluate the office's budget, expenditures, and revenue streams. A final report is expected in late October.

KPMG has done similar work with other counties throughout Indiana and across the nation. It will employ subject experts in everything from community corrections to public safety to assist in the project.

Ex-Indiana lawmaker seeks 2022 challenge to Rep. Victoria Spartz

A Democratic former Indiana state legislator is looking to challenge Republican U.S. Rep. Victoria Spartz in next year's election.

Former state Rep. Melanie Wright of Yorktown said she believed a moderate message could win in Central Indiana's 5th District.

Spartz won her first term in Congress after a tight and expensive campaign last year against Democrat Christina Hale. But the Republican redrawing of Congressional districts boosted Spartz by shifting the Democratic-leaning north side of Indianapolis out of the 5th District.

Wright, a music teacher at Daleville Elementary School, won election three times to the Indiana House before being defeated in 2020.

Carmel Clay School Board unanimously appoints Jennifer Nelson-Williams

Last Tuesday evening, the Carmel Clay School Board voted unanimously to appoint Jennifer Nelson-Williams to fill the vacant District 2 seat created by the resignation of long-time board member Pam Knowles.

Prior to the announcement, Board President Layla Spanenberg thanked the Carmel community for its engagement and willingness to serve the students, staff and families of Carmel.

"Several individuals submitted applications and we were very impressed with all of the very qualified candidates that applied," Spanenberg said. "I found this process to be extremely difficult. It was easier to pick a superintendent. It is a very difficult position to be in for us to deliberate in public. I thought everyone did a phenomenal job during the board interviews."

The process to fill the vacant seat on the school board took place without an audience due to the board's recent decision to not allow public attendance at board meetings.

The decision to make the meeting a livestream-only event was announced last week after board members said they were not able to get work done because of the disruptive behavior from the community.

Nelson-Williams has

been a Carmel resident for 18 years, owns a funeral home located in Carmel, and has two children who attended Carmel Clay Schools.

"I've spent years working in the classroom, outside the classroom helping my kids," Nelson-Williams said. "In addition to my business successes, I am familiar with budgets, management, and profit and loss. I feel I am uniquely qualified to be part of the board."

Affordable, accessible homes now available in the heart of Fishers

With employment and population in Hamilton County rising drastically over the past several years, there has been a shortage of affordable workforce housing for those who work and play in Fishers. Fishers' schools also have excellent programs for persons with disabilities and often attract families to the city for this reason. However, once these individuals graduate, there is a lack of supportive housing and services to help them live independently.

Kelly Hartman, co-chair of the Fishers Advisory Committee on Disability

and founder of Outside the Box, said, "Fishers has great resources, but we don't have affordable housing for our workforce who support folks with disabilities. And we don't have the opportunity to have folks with disabilities integrated into the community."

RealAmerica stepped in and partnered with four local service providers to provide on-site services at SouthPointe Village for persons with disabilities. Janus Developmental Services, Outside the Box, Insights, and Opportunities for Positive Growth are working together to help residents of SouthPointe with life skills, education, employment training, and independent living. Additionally, Janus has on-site offices on the first floor of SouthPointe to provide easy accessibility for residents and their families.

"We've had strong advocacy for folks with dis-

abilities, and we know that housing is a critical shortage for those individuals," said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. "Integrated into SouthPointe will be units that are tailor-made for individuals with disabilities, and this demonstrates a sensitivity to the community and the context for why we're developing these projects. That in itself is a testament to both RealAmerica's and the community's desire to develop something that is accretive to our community."

At SouthPointe Village, 25 percent of homes were set aside for individuals with disabilities, and the entire building is accessible, including raised and lowered garden beds, sidewalks around each community amenity, elevators, automated doors on both ends of the building, and more.

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Westfield cuts ribbon on East Street extension



On Oct. 1, Westfield Mayor Andy Cook was joined by past and present City Council members and business leaders to officially open the north East Street extension. The new roadway will improve connectivity and accessibility between 196th Street and State Road 38 and help enhance the safety of the State Road 38 corridor. The Indiana Department of Transportation and the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) supported the project.

Monon Depot mural featured at Keever’s Sheridan Hardware

The Sheridan Monon Depot continues to gain new attention in the community.

Local artist Melinda Spear-Huff is currently working on a commissioned mural above the front entry of Keever’s Sheridan Hardware on Main Street that features the old railroad building, built in 1882.

The artist’s design celebrates the influence of the Monon Railroad on the town of Sheridan across time including the current use of the rail bed as Hamilton County’s popular 20-plus mile rails-to-trails paved hiking and biking path. The Sheridan trailhead adjacent to Biddle Memorial Park marks the trail’s northern end point.

The work follows a recent announcement that the



Sheridan Historical Society has formed a committee for relocation of the original depot, now located on a nearby farm, close to the trailhead, linking the past to the future. Members of the historic society value the depot as a “three-dimensional

document of Sheridan’s heritage.” Plans for relocation and repurposing its use are in the early stages.

Carmel installs ‘Walk Your Bike’ signs, graphics to improve safety in Arts & Design District

The City of Carmel has installed new sidewalk markings on Main Street to remind bicyclists that they must dismount and walk their bikes when on the sidewalk in the most congested areas of Main Street in the Arts & Design District. New graphics were painted on the sidewalk in an effort to make them more noticeable to bicyclists.

In July 2020, the Carmel City Council approved Ordinance D-2534-20 establishing a Bicycle Dismount Zone along Main Street sidewalks between 1st Avenue East and 4th Avenue West. This order was done to improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists.

“The redevelopment of the Old Town area of Carmel into a thriving vibrant Arts & Design District is a welcome site for this once quiet area of our community,” Mayor Jim Brainard said. “While we embrace the popularity



of this area, the historically narrow sidewalks make it unsafe to mix bicycle traffic with people walking, pushing strollers or dining al fresco in the busy District.”

Commissioners recommend aid from recovery allocation

Hamilton County Commissioners last Wednesday recommended to the County Council funds from the American Recovery Act account be granted to the County Tourism Bureau, the County Auditor and the new county garage project.

Tourism is to get \$3 million to make up for lost revenue suffered during the COVID pandemic. Also recommended was \$133,000 to reconfigure a section of the auditor's office to provide safer separation of employees and members of the public, and \$100,000 for drainage needs at the high rise garage

now under construction and 8th and Clinton streets in Noblesville. The requests will go before the county council at its November meeting for approval and required appropriation. The funds would come from the county's \$65 million recovery act grant. Commissioners will consid-

er additional disbursements at their Oct. 27 meeting. The federal money may go to county agencies which suffered financial losses in the pandemic, infrastructure projects, small businesses which suffered potential revenue losses, and county non-profit charitable organizations which also suffered losses.

Plaque build-up inside your coronary arteries can lead to a heart attack if the flow of oxygen-rich blood to your heart is reduced or blocked. A referral from a Riverview Health family physician is required to qualify for a CT heart scan gift certificate through this program.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his wife of 38 years, Helen Palmeter, in 2001; son, David Palmeter; four brothers; and one sister.

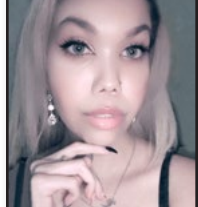

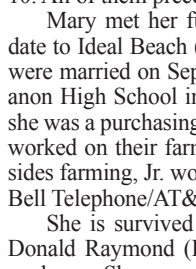

Lessons from the food pantries

Pantry lesson: We usually don’t know the full story. One question we often get is, “Doesn’t it upset you when someone who doesn’t need it takes from one of the pantries?”

Nope, not really. If a neighbor’s family is hungry, the pantries are a safe, confidential place to get food. But think deeper and you realize that we never know the full story. Today’s example of a neighbor in need was relayed from a volunteer. It requires that we examine how we view neighbors in need.

Mrs. Smith goes to pick up food every week for herself and her three children. She arrives at the same time to the same location driving the same late-model



Mercedes Benz. On the surface the Smith family appears to be doing well, yet something seems off. Why are they getting free food from the pantry? Are these folks just gaming the system?

Over time, the rest of the family’s story came into focus. You see, Mr. Smith tragically passed away while deployed on active duty. His dream car (yes, the Mercedes) was purchased shortly before he left on deployment. Mrs. Smith, now a single mother of three, could not bear to part with her deceased husband’s dream car. It was completely paid for. Now she provides for her family in part from the pantries. Our neighbors’ stories can be convicting.

While loading pantries, we occasionally see neighbors shopping for groceries. As a practice we don’t engage, but if a neighbor needs someone to listen, we are happy to. On the road, we see neighbors walk up, drive up in tricked-out jeeps, late-model cars and in motorized wheelchairs. Their story is none of our business. We will never know it unless they choose to engage.

With over 27,000 food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County, so many families are one blown engine, one layoff or one unexpected medical bill away from food insecurity.

In future columns, we will share more stories from neighbors about how your generosity served them in times of need. Be assured that the face of hunger in Hamilton County is not

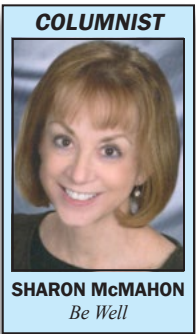
Never gonna get old: Staying active will keep you feeling young

Of course, I spent a lot of time outside playing, riding my bike, etc., but there were no organized options. I enjoyed several years of

baton twirling lessons and competitions but gave that activity up in my later teen years. A few years ago, I uncovered that baton and now twirl for fun whenever I get the chance – outside in the good weather and inside in the room with the highest ceiling! Although my coordination and response time is not quite as good, at least I can manage without hitting myself in the head!

Two of the most important wellness issues for us of a certain age are balance and coordination. There are many activities to increase both of those and include walking, cycling, dancing, golf, bowling, and of course – twirling!

Consider some activities that you enjoyed as a younger person. Maybe due to some health restrictions you cannot participate fully as you once did – BUT YOU CAN DO SOMETHING! Make sure that you have a recent wellness visit with your physician, that you select an activity which you know will not interfere with any medications or restrictions you may have – and enjoy! In addition

to dancing and twirling, I teach three exercise classes each week and feel the benefit not only physically but mentally as well due to the endorphins released by those activities.

enter their designs and ideas for what they wanted the sign to look like,” Kinkead said. “After receiving dozens of entries, the committee, made up of community members, led by Linda Williams, came to a decision on the final design.”

“We had nearly 30 participants, and the winner, Parvin Gillum, actually decided to donate the money back towards the cost of the installation of the signs,”

Heirbrandt said.

It was truly a community effort. Del Greco and the Sheridan Coalition Group worked with the Town of Sheridan to decide on the locations of the two signs, ultimately being on the town limits. The proposed property for the east sign was owned by the Town of Sheridan and the west entrance sign property was donated by Craig Wallace from Wallace Farms.

The Sheridan Coalition Group sold bricks that would be engraved and included in the sign structures. The concrete was donated by Beaver Materials and the foundations poured by Baker Construction. RQAW donated its time to engineer the signs to ensure they would last for decades. Dan Haines Masonry and Caulking offered discounted rates to install the signs.

“This gave us an iden-

tity in Hamilton County, and really included our entire community throughout the process,” Kinkead said. “We are proud of this meaningful and professional welcome sign that truly represents our town.”

“This is truly a collaborative effort by many in the community to make this happen,” Del Greco said. “We are proud to be a part of making this happen for the Sheridan community.”

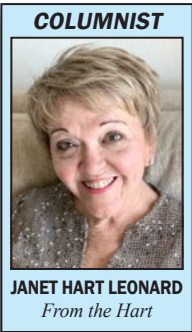
Trusting God at 4:00 a.m.

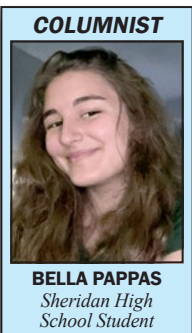

Boone County’s proposed solar farms

Editor’s Note: The Sheridan Student Column is brought to readers by Sheridan High School’s 10th grade English class, taught by Abby Williams.

In Boone County, specifically near U.S. 421, 1,660 acres of farmland could be turned into solar energy farms. According to the Indianapolis Business Journal, NextEra Energy, a company based in Florida, plans on rezoning the land to accommodate their project, which will cost \$210 million in the end.

To many, this may sound like a wonderful idea. The proposed solar farms may

generate enough energy to add to the electric grid, which would reduce the amount of fossil fuels burned. According to The Current, the construction of these solar farms could also

introduce jobs for approximately 200 people in the county during construction. It is estimated that around \$50 million in tax revenue could be generated if the project is successful.

On the other hand, many are unsatisfied with the idea of solar farms. Many residents of the Boone County area will have their houses and properties almost com-

pletely surrounded by solar panels. It is possible that this could alter the property values in this area, not to mention the fact that solar panels are not very attractive to the human eye. Solar panels can also potentially cause pollution in runoff water, especially if they become cracked, which is possible.

Before commencing the construction of these solar farms, there are a few points that should be taken into consideration.

Firstly, where will the \$210 million in funding for this project come from? Will this money be funded publicly, or will it be funded privately through investments?

Secondly, are these solar panels even going to work? According to powerelec-

tronics.com, a website about the true cost of solar energy, the energy efficiency rate of solar panels today can fall anywhere between 15 and 22 percent. This number depends on the number of solar days in a year for the area of the solar farms.

Currentresults.com, a website on weather and science facts, states that in Indianapolis, the average number of sunny days – whether that be full sun or part sun – is 187. Yearly, the percent of sunshine in Indianapolis is only 55 percent.

With only about half of the year actually being sunny at all, will these solar farms actually be efficient enough to generate enough energy to add to the electric grid, or will the project just be a fail?

Hamilton County Council conducts public hearing on 2022 budget

Employee recruitment, succession planning top list of concerns

The Hamilton County Council last Wednesday evening conducted a public hearing on the 2022 budget.

The council held a two-day work session in early August to determine county needs – many of which centered on employee recruitment and succession planning.

“Department heads and elected officials are having a tough time recruiting quality candidates,” said County Council President Amy Massillamany. “Not only has the market become more competitive, but we have an aging staff, many of whom are planning to retire soon. In some cases, we may have

to increase the starting salary of these positions just to be able to compete for the best talent.”

The proposed budget also includes three new full-time positions for the Hamilton County Parks & Recreation Department, one new full-time position in the Auditor’s Office, one new full-time position for the Surveyor’s Office, and two full-time and one part-time employee in the Coroner’s Office. The Sheriff’s Office has also requested funding for body cameras.

This, all while the council weighs the potential for a \$4.6 million income tax

revenue shortfall.

“The State of Indiana distributes our LIT funding annually,” added Massillamany. “While we’re receiving less than we anticipated, our strong financial position will allow us to pull off next year’s budget without increasing taxes or dipping into our Rainy Day Fund.”

The council was also set to approve \$2 million in local not-for-profit funding that focuses on human services and quality of life in association with aiding vulnerable populations. Those agencies include Family Promise, Good Samaritan,

Hope Family Care, Indiana Prevention of Youth Abuse & Suicide, Meals on Wheels, the O’Connor House, Prevail, PrimeLife Enrichment, Heart and Soul Free Clinic, Trinity Free Clinic, the Hamilton County and Economic Development Corporation, Humane Society for Hamilton County, Aspire, Janus, the Senior Citizens Organization, Cherish, and the Shepherd Center.

The proposed budget totals just under \$100 million. Adoption of the budget is scheduled to take place at 8:30 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 18. Once approved, the budget will be sent to the State of Indiana for approval before going into effect Jan. 1, 2022.

ORDINANCE NO. 67-09-21
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF THE NOBLESVILLE AMENDING CHAPTERS 70, 72, AND 132

WHEREAS, pursuant to Indiana Code § 9-21-4-3(b) the City of Noblesville (“City”) is responsible for maintaining traffic control devices upon highways within its jurisdictional boundaries;

WHEREAS, Indiana Code § 36-9-6-2 authorizes the Board of Public Works & Safety to supervise the streets, alleys, sewers, public grounds, and other property of the City;

WHEREAS, Indiana Code §36-9-6-3 authorizes the Board of Public Works & Safety to have custody of and maintain all real and personal property of the City;

WHEREAS, the legislative body of the City (“Council”) is responsible for determining ordinance violations and penalties for violations including, without limitation, violations of the traffic code and traffic signals; and

WHEREAS, the Council now desires to adopt this ordinance amending certain provisions of Title VII Traffic Code as follows: Chapters, 70 (General Provisions), 72 (Stopping, Standing and Parking), and 78 (Traffic Schedule).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana meeting in regular session as follows:

Section 1. Chapters 70, 72 and 78 are amended to read as follows:

CHAPTER 70 GENERAL PROVISIONS
PROCEDURE ON VIOLATION
§ 70.50 NOTICE OF VIOLATION.
(A) A person cited for a violation of Chapters 70 through 78 shall be the driver of the vehicle, if the driver can be identified by law enforcement at the time of the violation. If the driver of the vehicle cannot be identified at the time of the violation, the registered owner(s) of the vehicle shall be liable for any violation.
(B) Whenever a person is charged with a violation of Chapters 70 through 78, they shall be given notice of such charge by an appropriate notice served personally or placed in or upon a vehicle stopped or parked in violation of any provision hereof.
§ 70.51 DISPOSITION OF TRAFFIC FINES AND FORFEITURES.
All traffic fines and forfeitures collected by the City of Noblesville or designee shall be deposited in the General Fund or in accordance with applicable state or local law.
§70.99 PENALTY.
(A) Each violator of the restrictions and provisions of this code on stopping, standing, parking, and pedestrian offenses (except violations of Chapter 72) shall pay a fine and penalty to the City Court Clerk in the sum of \$20 if paid within seven days of the date of the time of issuance, unless provided otherwise under Indiana law. Additional fees shall be assessed based upon the following fine schedule:
(1) (a) All violations (except parking violations):
1. Unpaid between eight 8 and fourteen 14 days of the date of issuance: \$30;
2. Unpaid between 15 and 21 days of the date of issuance: \$50;
3. Unpaid between 22 and 28 days of the date of issuance: \$70;
4. Unpaid between 29 and 35 days of the date of issuance: \$90; and
5. Unpaid after 36 days of the date of issuance: \$ 110.
(B) Violators who wish to appeal the issuance of the notice of violation (other than violations of Chapter 72) must file an appeal with the Noblesville City Court Clerk within 15 days of the date of the issuance. An appeal shall preserve the status quo amount of any fine (e.g., if a violator files an appeal on the sixth day from the date the notice of violation was issued, then the fine, after an unsuccessful appeal, shall be \$20, in addition to imposed court costs). The appeal shall be docketed in the Noblesville City Court and the City Court will promptly set a hearing on the appeal.
(2) Violators of Chapter 72 shall pay a fine in the amounts set forth in § 132.02. A violator may deny the citation in accordance with §132.01.

CHAPTER 72 STOPPING, STANDING OR PARKING
ANGLE/DIAGONAL PARKING
§ 72.01 SIGNS OR MARKINGS INDICATING ANGLE/DIAGONAL PARKING.
The Board of Public Works & Safety shall determine upon what streets angle/diagonal parking shall be permitted and shall mark or sign such streets, but such angle/diagonal parking shall not be indicated upon any state highway within this city unless the Indiana Department of Transportation (IDOT) has determined that angle/diagonal parking shall be permitted. Angle/diagonal parking shall be specified in Chapter 78, Schedule XI as from time to time amended by resolution of the Board of Public Works & Safety.
§ 72.02 ANGLE/DIAGONAL PARKING HEAD IN REQUIRED.
Any and all motor vehicles utilizing an angle/diagonal parking space shall utilize such space by “head-in” parking. For purposes of this section, the term “HEAD-IN” is defined to mean that the front of the motor vehicle shall be nearest the curb.
STOPPING, STANDING, OR PARKING PROHIBITED IN SPECIFIED PLACES
§ 72.10 PARKING NOT TO OBSTRUCT TRAFFIC.
No person shall park any vehicle upon a street, other than an alley, in such a manner or under such conditions as to leave available less than 18 feet of the width of the roadway for free movement of vehicular traffic.
§72.11 PARKING IN ALLEYS.
No person shall park a vehicle within an alley in such a manner or under such conditions as to leave available less than 12 feet of the width of the roadway for the free movement of vehicular traffic, and no person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle within an alley in such position as to block the driveway entrance to any abutting property.
§ 72.12 STOPPING, STANDING, OR PARKING PROHIBITED.
No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or traffic-control device in any of the following places:
(A) On a sidewalk;
(B) In front of or between sidewalk and curb or immediately opposite a public or private driveway;
(C) Within an intersection;
(D) Within 15 feet of a fire hydrant;
(E) On a crosswalk;
(F) Within 20 feet of a crosswalk;
(G) Within 30 feet upon the approach to any flashing beacon, stop sign, or traffic-control signal located at the side of a roadway;
(H) Within 20 feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station and, on the side of a street opposite the entrance to any fire station, within 75 feet of the entrance (when fire station is properly signed);
(I) On the roadway side of any vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of a street;
(J) Within 30 feet of any railway crossing; and
(K) At any place where official signs or markings so designate.
§ 72.13 PARKING ADJACENT TO SCHOOLS.
REPEALED
§ 72.14 NO STOPPING, STANDING, OR PARKING NEAR HAZARDOUS OR CONGESTED PLACES.
(A) The Board of Public Works & Safety is hereby authorized to determine and designate by proper signs places in which the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles would create an especially hazardous condition or would cause unusual delay to traffic as shown in Chapter 78, Schedules VI and VII as from time to time amended by resolution duly adopted by the Board of Public Works & Safety.
(B) When official signs are erected at hazardous or congested places as authorized herein, no person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle in any such designated place. Notwithstanding the foregoing limitation for parking setback, at the intersection of 9th Street and Hannibal Street, parking is prohibited within 40 feet of the intersection on all corners. The City Street Commissioner is hereby authorized to place signs and paint curbs in an appropriate manner to identify to the public the prohibition against parking as stated herein.
§ 72.15 TEMPORARY PARKING PROHIBITION.
Parking may be temporarily limited or prohibited from time to time for special occasions and to meet emergencies upon authority of the Police Chief or his/ her designee who is hereby given authority for such limitation and prohibition of parking, and all vehicles shall observe such prohibition and limitations when proper signs have been erected or placed indicating such prohibition. Violation of temporary parking prohibitions shall be subject to the penalties heretofore or hereafter provided.
§ 72.16 MOTOR VEHICLES TO PARK BETWEEN LINES.
Any and all motor vehicles parked at a location upon a public thoroughfare that is marked a parking space within the corporate limits of the city shall be parked in a manner which will cause them to be located within the lines of a defined parking space.
§ 72.17 PARKING IN CITY PARKING LOTS AND GARAGES.
Any and all motor vehicles utilizing a parking space in a city parking lot or parking garage shall utilize such space by “head-in” parking only, which is where the vehicle is parked with the front of the motor vehicle closest to any parking wheel stop, if any, and facing away from the parking lot traffic lane. Parking by backing into parking spaces or any other form of parking other than “head-in” is prohibited.
STOPPING FOR LOADING OR UNLOADING ONLY
§ 72.25 DESIGNATION OF LOADING ZONES.
The Board of Public Works & Safety is hereby authorized by resolution duly adopted to determine the location of loading zones and shall have placed and maintained appropriate signs indicating the same and stating the hours during which the provisions of this section are applicable.
§ 72.26 PARKING IN LOADING ZONE.
(A) No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle for any purpose or length of time other than for the expeditious unloading and delivery or pick-up and loading of property in any place described in Chapter 78, Schedule X as from time to time amended by resolution duly adopted by the Board of Public Works & Safety and marked as a loading zone during hours when the provisions applicable to such zones are in effect. In no case shall the stop for loading and unloading of materials exceed 30 minutes.
(B) The driver of a vehicle may stop temporarily at a loading zone for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading passengers when such stopping does not interfere with any vehicle which is waiting to enter or about to enter such zone to load or unload property.
§ 72.27 DESIGNATION OF PUBLIC CARRIER STOPS AND STANDS.
The Board of Public Works & Safety is hereby authorized by resolution duly adopted and required to establish bus stops, bus stands, taxicab stands, and stands for other passenger common carrier motor vehicles on such public streets in such places and in such number as it shall determine to be of the greatest benefit and convenience to the public. Every such bus stop, bus stand, taxicab stand, or other stand shall be designated by appropriate signs as designated in Chapter 78, Schedule X, as from time to time amended by resolution duly adopted by the Board of Public Works & Safety.
§ 72.28 RESTRICTED USE OF BUS AND TAXICAB STANDS.
No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle other than a bus in a bus stop or other than a taxicab in a taxicab stand when such stop or stand has been officially designated and appropriately signed, except that the driver of a passenger vehicle may temporarily stop therein for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading passengers when such stopping does not interfere with any bus or taxicab waiting to enter or about to enter such zone.
§ 72.29 PARKING FOR PEOPLE WITH PHYSICAL DISABILITIES.
(A) The Board of Public Works & Safety is hereby authorized to establish parking spaces for people with physical disabilities within the public rights-of-way, parking lots, and parking garages owned, operated, or controlled by the City, now or hereafter, as required by law. Designation of a parking space for people with physical disabilities shall conform to any applicable state or federal standard governing such a space and shall be made with appropriate paintings and/or signs which shall conform to the Uniform Traffic Code relating to such signage.
(B) No person shall cause to be parked within a designated parking place for a person with physical disabilities in any public or private right of way, parking lot, parking garage, or parking facility a vehicle which is not occupied or driven by a person who is disabled as that term is defined by the state and who has an appropriate license, permit, or other device issued by the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles confirming such designation.
A person parked in a designated parking place for a disabled person shall display the following:
(1) A parking placard for a person with a physical disability issued under IC 9-14-5 (before its repeal) or IC 9-18-5-8.
(2) A disabled veteran’s registration plate issued under IC 9-18-18 (before its

expiration) or IC 9-18-5-5 or a modified Purple Heart license plate under IC 9-18-19-1(b) (before its expiration) or IC 9-18-5-6-1(b).
(3) A registration plate or decal for a person with a physical disability issued under IC 9-18-22 (before its expiration) or IC 9-18-5-8.
(C) A motor vehicle displaying an unexpired parking permit for a person with a physical disability, an unexpired disabled veteran’s registration plate, or an unexpired registration plate or decal for a person with a physical disability issued under the laws of another state may only stand or park in a space reserved for a person with a physical disability when the vehicle is being used to transport a person with a physical disability.
(D) Notwithstanding the provisions of division (B), any disabled person shall be entitled to use a parking space for people with physical disabilities as it has been so designated by the Board of Public Works and Safety. Should such an individual receive a ticket for improper parking as hereinafter provided, proof of their physical disability shall be deemed an absolute defense upon presentation of a letter or other document from a physician attesting to their disabled condition.
STOPPING, STANDING OR PARKING RESTRICTED OR PROHIBITED ON CERTAIN STREETS
§ 72.40 APPLICATION OF SUBCHAPTER.
The provisions of this subchapter prohibiting the standing or parking of a vehicle shall apply at all times or at those times herein specified or as indicated on official signs except when it is necessary to stop a vehicle to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a police officer or official traffic-control device.
§ 72.41 PARKING PROHIBITED AT ALL TIMES ON CERTAIN STREETS.
When signs are erected giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle at any time upon any of the streets described in Chapter 78, Schedule V as from time to time amended by resolution of the Board of Public Works & Safety, attached to and made part of this traffic code.
§ 72.42 PARKING PROHIBITED DURING CERTAIN HOURS ON CERTAIN STREETS.
When signs are erected giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle at the locations and times specified in Chapter 78, Schedule VI as from time to time amended by resolution duly adopted by the Board of Public Works & Safety and made a part of this traffic code.
§ 72.43 PARKING TIME LIMITED ON CERTAIN STREETS.
(a) Parking spaces in the Downtown Square Parking as defined in Chapter 78, Schedule VII shall be free for motor vehicles for up to two consecutive hours each calendar day during the hours of 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and city holidays). The two consecutive hour period for each calendar day (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and city holidays) shall begin at 9:00 a.m. or immediately upon parking, whichever is later, and end two hours later until 5 p.m. Furthermore, the two consecutive hour period shall be limited where signage indicates that special parking duration limitations apply.
(b) When signs are erected giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle for longer than the time specified in Chapter 78, Schedule VII as from time to time amended by resolution duly adopted by the Board of Public Works & Safety and made a part of this traffic code.
§72.44 SIGNAGE REQUIRED.
Except for those prohibitions in §72.12, no prohibition, regulation, or limitation relating to stopping, standing, or parking imposed under this or any other ordinance of this city shall be effective unless signs are erected and in place at the time of any alleged offense. It shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works & Safety to see that such signs are erected and maintained.
§ 72.45 ACTS TO EVADE THE PARKING TIME LIMITATION ON CERTAIN STREETS PROHIBITED.
(A) No person shall move a vehicle from one parking place on a street listed in Chapter 78, Schedule VII directly to another parking place on a street listed in Chapter 78, Schedule VII as from time to time amended by resolution of the Board of Public Works & Safety.
(B) Any person who violates the terms and conditions of this section shall be issued a citation and pay a fine, court costs, and/or penalty pursuant to the terms and procedures set out in § 70.99 of the Code of Ordinances of the City.
§ 72.46 STORAGE AND PARKING IN RIGHT-OF-WAY OR TEMPORARY CUL-DE-SAC.
The storage of construction materials or equipment on or within a city right-of-way, easement, street, or temporary cul-de-sac shall be prohibited unless specifically authorized by the Board of Public Works & Safety or by an encroachment permit, improvement location permit, or building permit issued by the city directly and specifically related to the permitted construction activity. Temporary cul-de-sacs shall be for use by emergency vehicles and shall remain free from the storage of equipment and materials.
§72.47 PARKING ON PUBLIC STREET
No person shall park a motor vehicle on a public street for more than 72 consecutive hours. No person shall stop, stand, or park an unattached trailer of any kind on any public street, alley, or roadway except for vehicles used in conjunction with public utility repairs or maintenance of their utilities. Exceptions may be granted on a temporary basis for street booths and concessions when in conjunction with an approved activity also exempted.
METERED AND PAID PARKING
§ 72.50 DEFINITIONS
For purposes of this Section, the following definition(s) shall apply:
(A) Paid parking technology means any meter, kiosk, or application that requires a parking user to pay a fee to park a vehicle in any spot marked for payment.
§ 72.51 AUTHORITY AND POWERS OF BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS & SAFETY.
The Board of Public Works & Safety is hereby authorized and empowered:
(A) To enter into any contract for administration of parking or for the rental, purchase, installation, regulation, use, operation, maintenance, repair, servicing, and supplying of paid parking technology; to provide payment therefor exclusively to the Parking Meter Fund; and to do any and all things or acts necessary and appropriate to carry out and place in effect the purposes and intent of this division, including the determination and establishment of the specifications to be required in the administration, purchase, lease, or other acquisition of parking meters or other paid parking technology.
(B) To locate, determine, and establish paid parking zones and paid parking spaces within such zones upon the advice of the City Engineer.
(C) Such paid parking spaces shall be designated and marked out or caused to be marked out by lines or marks painted or durably marked on the curbing or surface of the street about or alongside of each parking space.
(D) To determine and establish the size and measurement of paid parking spaces.
(E) To install and place paid parking technology upon the curb, sidewalk, or space adjacent to the paid parking spaces and such parking technology showing the time period of lawful parking upon the deposit of the appropriate amount of money therein as established in Chapter 78, Schedule XIV as from time to time amended by resolution of the Board of Public Works & Safety.
(F) To employ or contract with individual persons to carry out the enforcement of the parking limitations in the paid parking zones, to perform the duty of collecting the money deposited in the paid parking technology, and to deliver such to the City Controller who shall count and deposit the same in the Noblesville Parking Meter Fund.
(2) The Board of Public Works & Safety shall appoint such individual person as special police, whereupon such individual person shall have the power and authority to prepare, sign, and deliver or post notices of violation of any parking limitations in any paid parking zone or paid parking space in accordance with the provisions of this chapter.
(3) Every such person shall furnish a bond in the penal sum of \$5,000 conditioned upon his faithful performance of his duties hereunder, which bond shall run in favor of the city.
§ 72.52 DUTY OF DRIVER TO PAY FOR PARKING.
(A) When any vehicle shall be parked in any space with paid parking, the driver of such vehicle shall immediately deposit or cause to be deposited in the nearby paid parking meter technology or via the approved online parking application such amount as is required for such parking space and time period as designated by direction thereon.
(B) Upon the deposit of such money, such paid parking space may be lawfully occupied by such vehicle during the period of time prescribed therefor.
§ 72.53 POLICE DEPARTMENT AND PARKING CONTROL OFFICERS TO ENFORCE PROVISIONS.
It shall be the duty of the officers of the Noblesville Police Department and parking control officers, as appointed by the Board of Public Safety, to enforce the provisions of this subchapter.
§72.54 PARKING METER FUND
(A) Pursuant to I.C. 36-9-12-7, the Noblesville Parking Meter Fund is hereby created. All fees collected from paid parking technology shall be deposited with the municipal fiscal officer. The fees shall be deposited to the credit of the municipality in a special fund called the “Noblesville Parking Meter Fund.” Disbursements from the Noblesville Parking Meter Fund may be made only on orders of the Board of Public Works & Safety for the purposes listed in (B).
(B) Disbursements from the Noblesville Parking Meter Fund may be made only to pay:
(1) the purchase price, rental fees, and cost of installation of paid parking technology for paid parking spaces;
(2) the cost of maintenance, operation, and repair of paid parking technology;
(3) incidental costs and expenses in the operation of paid parking technology, including the cost of clerks and bookkeeping;
(4) the cost of traffic signal devices used in the municipality;
(5) the cost of repairing and maintaining any of the public ways, curbs, and sidewalks where paid parking technology is in use, and all public ways connected with it in the municipality;
(6) the cost of acquiring, by lease or purchase, suitable land for off-street parking facilities to be operated or leased by the municipality;
(7) the principal and interest on bonds issued to acquire parking facilities and devices;
(8) the cost of improving and maintaining land for parking purposes and purchasing, installing, and maintaining paid parking technology on that land;
(9) the cost of providing approved school crossing protective facilities, including the costs of purchase, maintenance, operation, repair, and all other incidental costs; and
(10) the cost of maintenance and operation of a municipally-owned park where paid parking technology is located.
(C) Money deposited in the Noblesville Parking Meter Fund may be expended only upon a specific appropriation by the Common Council in the same manner that it appropriates other public money. The Board of Public Works & Safety shall prepare an itemized estimate of the money necessary for the operation of paid parking meter technology for the ensuing year at the same time of making and filing budget estimates for other departments of the municipality.
§ 72.55 PARKING IN CITY PARKING LOTS AND PARKING GARAGES.
When signs are erected giving notice thereof, a person shall park a vehicle at the locations in accordance with the times and costs as specified in Chapter 78, Schedule XIV as from time to time amended by resolution duly adopted by the Board of Public Works & Safety and made a part of this traffic code. Failure to pay the costs shall constitute a violation of this Section.
COMMERCIAL VEHICLES
§ 72.56 TRUCK PARKING RESTRICTIONS.
Commercial vehicles of 2-ton capacity or more or more than 20 feet in length shall not park within the residential or business districts on public right-of-way except for the purpose of loading or unloading.
RESIDENTIAL ON-STREET PARKING PERMITS
§72.65 ELIGIBILITY.
(A) Occupants of any residential dwelling unit in an area of the city zoned for residential purposes and subject to restricted parking who own an automobile and who do not have an off-street parking space available for their unit may apply to the Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety for a permit for one parking space upon the city street adjacent to such dwelling unit. At the time of application, a valid driver’s license shall be shown. A copy of such license shall be kept with the permit application.
(B) As used in this subchapter, the following definitions shall apply:
(1) “ADJACENT.” Directly across the street and within the same block as the residence.

(2) “HOUSEHOLD.” A single individual living upon the premises as a single housekeeping unit or collective body of persons living upon the premises as a single housekeeping unit.
(3) “RESTRICTED PARKING.” Any street or thoroughfare of the city for which an ordinance has been adopted limiting the hours of parking as from time to time amended. Such streets or thoroughfares shall be posted for restricted and limited parking pursuant to said ordinance.
§ 72.66 INFORMATION REQUIRED IN APPLICATION.
The application form shall contain the name, address, telephone number, and email address of the applicant and the year, make, model, color, and license plate number of the automobile owned by the applicant which is authorized to use the private parking space.
§ 72.67 INFORMATION CONTAINED ON PERMIT.
REPEALED.
§72.68 HANGTAG REQUIRED
REPEALED
§ 72.69 EXPIRATION OF PERMITS.
All permits expire on December 31 of the year of issuance. Permits previously issued must be renewed for the coming year on or before December 31 or the application and permit shall expire as of midnight on December 31 of the year of issuance.
§72.70 FEES.
Fees include an additional annual permit fee of \$30, which shall be paid upon issuance and shall be paid thereafter and will be pro-rated throughout the year as necessary.
§ 72.71 ISSUANCE AND REVOCATION OF PERMITS.
(A) The application for a permit under the provisions of this subchapter shall be submitted to the Noblesville Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety. Unapproved applications may be appealed to the Board of Public Works & Safety, whose decision shall be final.
(B) The Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety shall have the authority to revoke any permit upon finding violation of regulations in this subchapter and to order the forfeiture of all fees paid.
§ 72.72 REGULATIONS FOR RESIDENTIAL PERMIT HOLDERS.
The following regulations shall be in effect.
(A) A permit shall be issued only when there is a lack of adequate off-street parking at applicant’s place of residence. “ADEQUATE OFF-STREET PARKING” shall be defined as space for the automobile, including adequate access to that space.
(B) Permits shall be restricted to one per residence.
(C) Permits shall be valid only for the calendar year in which they are issued.
(D) Permitted parking spaces shall be used for passenger vehicles only.
(E) Permitted parking spaces shall not be subleased or rented, for consideration or gratuitously, to individuals outside the applicant’s household.
(F) The permit holder will purchase and maintain a standard sign as designated by the City from the Street Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works and Safety. The cost for the sign shall be \$75.
§ 72.73 DISPOSITION OF REVENUE.
All funds derived from the granting of permits under the provisions of this subchapter shall be placed in the City Parking Fund.
§ 72.74 VIOLATION AND PENALTY.
Parking in a residential permitted parking space without a proper permit shall constitute a violation of this subchapter. Any violations of this subchapter are subject to the fines listed in §132.02 as well as forced removal of the vehicle.
NON-RESIDENTIAL PARKING PERMITS
§72.85 ELIGIBILITY.
Business owners, employees, or residents of any commercially-zoned buildings of the downtown Noblesville business district (defined as Wayne Street to Hannibal Street and S. 6th Street to N. 12th Street) may apply to the Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety for a parking permit in a designated City parking lot or garage. At the time of application, a valid driver’s license shall be shown. A copy of such license shall be kept with the permit application.
§ 72.86 INFORMATION REQUIRED IN APPLICATION.
The application form shall contain the name, address, telephone number, and email address of the applicant along with the year, make, model, color, and license plate number of the automobile(s) owned by the applicant. Downtown employees or business owners shall also include the name, address, telephone number, and work email address of their workplace. Applicants shall show a picture I.D. in which a copy will remain with the permit. Only the person who is issued the parking permit shall be able to renew the permit, and again, a photo I.D.valid driver’s license will be required at the time of renewal.
§ 72.87 INFORMATION CONTAINED ON PERMIT.
The permit provided for this section shall contain the following information: number of the permit; name and address of the person to whom the permit is issued; year, make and license number of issuance and date of expiration. A copy of a photo I.D. and signed contract will be kept with the permit.
§ 72.88 HANGTAG REQUIRED.
REPEALED
§ 72.89 EXPIRATION OF PERMITS.
All permits will expire on December 31 of the year of issuance. If the permit-holder fails to renew the parking permit by the expiration date, they must comply with posted parking requirements or risk receiving a parking violation, and their permit will be issued to the next person on the waiting list, if applicable. Individuals wishing to relinquish a permit must notify the Noblesville Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety. A refund claim will be submitted for any time remaining on the permit.
§ 72.90 PARKING RATES AND FEES.
Fees for annual parking permits and paid parking spaces shall be as set forth in Chapter 78, Schedule XIV, as from time to time amended by resolution of the Board of Public Works & Safety.
§ 72.91 ISSUANCE AND REVOCATION OF PERMITS.
(A) The application for a permit under the provisions of this section shall be submitted to the Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety. Unapproved applications may be appealed to the Board of Public Works & Safety, whose decision shall be final.
(B) The Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety shall have the authority to revoke any permit upon finding violation of the regulations in this section and to order the forfeiture of all fees paid.
(C) Non-residential permits issued to a business may be transferrable to another employee for a processing fee of \$20 by contacting the Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety. Transfer and issuance of said permits are subject to the review and approval of the Noblesville Police Department or a third party parking enforcement company contracted by the Board of Public Works & Safety.
§ 72.92 REGULATIONS FOR NON-RESIDENTIAL PERMIT HOLDERS.
The following regulations shall be in effect.
(A) Parking permits are only valid for the city lot or garage indicated at the time of purchase. On occasion, the permit holder may not be able to park in their designated lot or garage due to maintenance or special city functions. If the city closes the lot/garage or the lot/garage is full, the permit holder may park on the street nearest their assigned lot/garage. However, at no time is the permit holder to park on the downtown square for more than two hours per day.
(B) The license plate must be visible at all times while parking in the designated area. If the individual fails to display their license plate, they will receive a parking violation.
(C) Permits shall be valid only for the calendar year in which they are issued.
(D) Parking permits shall not be subleased or rented, for consideration or gratuitously, to any other individual.
§ 72.93 PARKING LOTS AND GARAGES.
REPEALED.
§72.94 FINE SCHEDULE.
REPEALED AND REPLACED
§ 72.94 VIOLATION AND PENALTY
Parking in a Non-Residential Permitted parking space without a proper permit shall constitute a violation of this subchapter. Any violations of this subchapter are subject to the fines listed in §132.02 as well as forced removal of the vehicle.
ENFORCEMENT
§72.97 TOWING VEHICLES.
(A) Whenever, in the opinion of the Police Chief or his officers or designee, a stopped, standing, or parked vehicle in violation of the provisions of this traffic code constitutes an immediate hazard to the safety of the citizens, the City, or flow of traffic, the Police Chief or his officers or designee may have said vehicle towed from such position of danger to a containment area. The expense of such towing and storage shall be borne by the owner of said vehicle.
(B) The Police Chief and his officers or designee are hereby authorized to move or cause to be moved and properly stored, at the owner’s expense, any vehicle improperly parked, parked overtime, or abandoned if the owner or operator of such vehicle cannot be found after reasonable effort or refuses or fails to move such vehicle upon proper notification.
(C) Any vehicle having at least 3 parking violations, each of which have not been appealed and remain unpaid 40 or more days after the date of issuance, may be towed to a secure facility and will be released only after payment of all outstanding fines, fees, and any costs incurred for the towing and storage of the vehicle.
§72.98 BOOTING/VEHICLE RESTRAINTS
(a) For any vehicle having at least three parking violations issued under this section, each of which have not been appealed and remain unpaid 40 or more days after the date of issuance, the City or its designee will issue a notice to the vehicle’s owner that the vehicle is eligible for a wheel boot or vehicle restraint until the outstanding parking violation amounts are paid. The notice will also provide the registered owner with 10 days to pay outstanding amounts due. If the vehicle is found parked in a public place after expiration of the 10-day warning period, the vehicle is subject to being booted or restrained by the Noblesville Police Department or a third party enforcement company until such time as all outstanding fines and fees are paid in full. In addition, there will be a \$25 fee for the removal of the boot or vehicle restraint. It is the discretion of the Chief of Police to have motorcycles and/or any other vehicles towed to safe storage in lieu of using restraints. The vehicle will be released only after payment of all outstanding fines, fees, and any costs incurred for the towing and storage of the vehicle.
(b) Violators or registered owners who wish to appeal the imposition of fines and fees paid under this provision may, after paying all outstanding fines and fees (including the restraint removal fee, towing fee, and storage fees, if any), file an appeal with the Noblesville City Court seeking to challenge the fees related to towing, storage, or the installation of the boot or restraint only. Violators or registered owners are unable to appeal the fines for the underlying parking violations under this provision. Appeals must be filed with the City Court Clerk within 15 days of submitting payment to the City for fines and fees imposed under this provision. The appeal shall be docketed in the Noblesville City Court, and the City Court will promptly set a hearing on the appeal.
§ 72.99 ENFORCEMENT
The penalties for the violation of the special restrictions on stopping, standing, and parking as provided in Chapter 72 shall be in accord with the penalties and procedures set out in §§ 132.01 and 132.02.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING CHAPTER 132, NOBLESVILLE ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS BUREAU

Section 1. Chapter 132 is created as follows:
§ 132.01 ESTABLISHMENT OF BUREAU.

(b) The Mayor shall appoint the Ordinance Violations Bureau Clerk.
(c) The Violations Clerk may accept:
a) Written appearances;
b) Waivers of trial;

d) Payment of civil penalties up to \$250.
(d) If a person charged with a violation wants to exercise the right to trial, the person shall appear before the Violations Clerk and deny the violation or enter a written denial with the Violations Clerk.
(e) If a person:
a) Denies an ordinance violation subject to this section; or
b) Fails to satisfy a civil penalty assessed by the Violations Clerk after having entered an admission of the violation; or
c) Fails to deny or admit the violation under this section; the Violations Clerk shall report this fact to the Noblesville City Attorney.
d) The Noblesville City Attorney may initiate formal proceedings against the person for the alleged ordinance violation.

Soccer sectional championships

Millers, Greyounds sweep boys and girls titles, Huskies girls cruise to victory

There was an interesting symmetry to the Class 3A soccer sectional championship games that took place in Hamilton County last Saturday.

At Sectional 8, both the girls and the boys title games saw Noblesville take on Fishers. The girls went first, as the No. 1-ranked Millers beat No. 20 Fishers 3-0 at Hamilton Southeastern to win their third straight championship and fifth in the last six years.

Then in the evening, Noblesville hosted the boys sectional final between the No. 2 Millers and the No. 1 Tigers. In front of a large crowd, Noblesville scored a second-half goal, and that was enough for the Millers to take a 1-0 victory.

SECTIONAL 10 SHOOTOUTS

While all this was going on, the Carmel and Zionsville teams were having their own battles at Sectional 10. Just like at Sectional 8, both the girls and the boys teams played each other for their respective championships.

But it went beyond that. Both games needed penalty kick shootouts to decide the winner, and both times it was the Greyhounds that won the shootouts by 4-1 margins. The No. 10-ranked Carmel boys went first, getting their win over the No. 7 Eagles at Westfield. Later in the evening, the host and No. 4 Greyhounds girls got stellar goalkeeper play from Aubree Empie in the shootout to get past the No. 10 Eagles at Murray Stadium.

The Carmel-Zionsville girls game was scoreless through 80 minutes of regulation and 14 minutes of overtime, so both teams had to get ready for the seemingly inevitable penalty kicks.

"On the sideline, my goalkeeper coach told me I was going to do PKs," said Empie. "I've done them before in practice and I just had confidence in myself and I just told myself to calm down, I told myself I've got this."

The Greyhounds went first, and made their first penalty kick. Empie then stopped the Eagles' first attempt. The same thing happened in Round 2: Carmel made its second kick, and Empie stopped Zionsville's second kick.

After the 'Hounds put in their third PK, they were firmly in control. The Eagles did extend the shootout by making their lone kick, but Carmel put away the fourth to clinch the game and their 17th sectional title.

DIFFERENT SEASON

The Greyhounds had to go through a brutal draw to win the sectional, beating No. 12 Guerin Catholic and No. 6 North Central before their battle with Zionsville.

"I told the girls, the whole tournament is different than the regular year," said Carmel coach Frank Dixon. "So, if you beat somebody in the regular year, that's not going to be the same team you see a month or two later when you play in the sectionals. One, they know, just like you do, if you lose, you're done. You go home. Turn your uniforms in, the season's over. So they're going to play as hard as they can, and so you have to be prepared for that."

“And then the other thing that happens in sectionals is the scoring tightens up. You could see it at the end of that game. They wanted to get to PKs, so they kept five kids back just to make sure, because they felt that was their best chance to win the game. And we kept pushing forward because we weren’t sure what we were going to do in PKs. In practice, we’ve been okay, but not great. Our goalkeepers have been great. They carried us through.”

The Greyhounds are 15-2-2 and will play their regional semi-final at Brownsburg on Wednesday.

The Eagles got their goal in the first half, but the Greyhounds tied things up in the second half; AJ Caito scored off an assist by Josh Martinez. “What an exciting sectional championship game today,” said Carmel coach Shane Schmidt. “I am so proud of the effort the guys gave today.”

The Greyhounds boys team is 13-3-2 and play a regional semi-final Thursday at Avon.

CROWDED HOUSE
Back at Sectional 8, Hallmark Orthodontics Soccer Complex at Noblesville was filled with excitement and electricity for the Millers-Fishers boys game, as the top two teams in the state did battle. A crowd of around 1,000 people attended the game, and it made for an atmosphere that the players reveled in.

“It’s a little unfortunate to have the No. 1 versus the No. 2 so early in the tournament,” said Millers senior Palmer Ault. “We’d hoped to see each other later on down the road. There’s no atmosphere like this you can get in soccer, and I think it’s what makes high school soccer so spe-

cial.”
Ault and his teammate Spencer Holland got Noblesville its goal, which came in the game’s 64th minute. Ault made a pass to Holland right in front of the net, and Holland headed it in.

“Basically that game, whoever first scores will win the game,” said Holland. “We got it, and we knew immediately we had to keep our heads in the game, just play defense, just do what we can to run down the clock.”

The Tigers continued to fight to the end, but the Millers’ defense held them off. That included a diving save from goalkeeper Gabe Ingle with 7:45 left in the game. Noblesville coach Ken Dollaske was quick to credit his defense, which included Ingle, centerbacks Andrew Cochran and Brady Horn, and outside backs Andy Stansfield and Cole Bramblett.

“I know that for us to win against the state’s best competition, we’re going to have to have them play the best game, and they did,” said Dollaske.

The Millers are 16-1-1 and play a regional semi-final game at Columbia City on Thursday.

THREE IN A ROW
Earlier in the day, the Millers’ girls team continued their sectional streak with their third consecutive title. It’s Noblesville’s 12th title in program history and the Millers’ longest win streak since they won six sectional titles in a row between 1996 and 2001.

“I think we just have a culture where the players come in and they know the bar is high, and they want to try to achieve it,” said Noblesville coach Mike Brady. “It’s just a privilege for me and I told them that this morning in a pre-game talk. It’s just an honor to be their coach and to be able to spend time with them.”

Fishers gave the Millers

a strong battle, and it took Noblesville until the 30th minute to break through. Ava Bramblett got the Millers on the board, and they would lead 1-0 at halftime.

Makenna Maloy added Noblesville’s second goal in the 61st minute when Makenna Maloy scored on a free kick. The Millers completed their scoring with 3:02 left in the game when freshman Meredith Tippner found the back of the net. Meskerem James assisted on that goal.

“It’s amazing,” said James. “It’s been one of our desires to keep going. Fishers is a really good team, so we played as a team and we accomplished that. It feels amazing.”

“Fishers has always been a struggle for us,” said Maloy. “My freshman year we lost to them in PKs in the sectional final, so obviously that was in my head. I knew we weren’t going to go to overtime or PKs. I knew we had to get it done in regular time and we did and it was really exciting.”

Noblesville is 16-0-1 and plays a regional semi-final game Wednesday at No. 2-ranked Homestead in what will be a battle of unbeaten teams. The Spartans are 18-0.

HUSKIES DOMINATE
Up in the northern part of the county, the Hamilton Heights girls team cruised to victory in the Sectional 24 championship game, which the Huskies hosted last Saturday night. Heights beat Jay County 9-0, winning the school’s 11th girls soccer sectional title.

Jayla Logan scored three goals for the Huskies, with Kyn-dall Ferguson and Emma Hall both scoring two goals. Ella Hickok and Cassidy Felger each had one goal, with Felger also making an assist. Mady Hutchinson, Emma Linville and Kate Hayes all handed out one assist as well.
