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Arcadia getting \$5M in federal, state funding

The Town of Arcadia has been awarded \$2.8 million dollars from the Hamilton County - American Rescue Plan Act fund, along with \$2.2 million dollars in State Water Infrastructure Funding (SWIF) from the Indiana Finance Authority.

Arcadia competed with over 500 applicants throughout the State of Indiana to secure financing for the town's Indiana Department of Environmental Management compliance-driven wastewater improvement project that includes stormwater components.

This project is a partnership with the Arcadia Town Council, Hamilton County Commissioners, Hamilton County Council, and the Hamilton County Surveyor's Office. The town will match these federal grant dollars with wastewater improvement projlocal funding sources.

Feed the Frontlines reinstated in Carmel

Hospitals in Carmel are again working 24/7 to respond to a surge in COVID-19 cases. Independent restaurants still challenged from the initial wave of the pandemic are facing additional setbacks and possible closures. The City of Carmel is gearing back up its Feed the Frontlines initiative to help provide hot meals to frontline workers at IU Health North and Ascension St. Vincent Carmel hospitals.

Meals from locally-owned restaurants will be delivered to healthcare workers on the frontlines. It's a true win-win: Healthcare workers will enjoy nourishing meals, while local restaurants will receive the critical business they need to continue to keep staff employed.

The program will provide hundreds of meals throughout the week, which will be divided between Ascension St. Vincent Carmel and IU Health North hospitals to support healthcare workers dealing directly with COVID-19 patients. The city has partnered with IU Health North and Ascension St. Vincent Carmel hospitals to reinstate the program that was so successful in the spring.

Longtime Sheridan football coach Bud Wright honored with display at museum

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





SCAR replicas. Terry had a good heart and possessed a unique sense of humor, which he







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Hamilton County Council not holding back in tackling several difficult topics

Fall is my favorite time of year. Having spent the majority of my childhood in either Colorado or Virginia, I got the full spectrum of colors, temperatures and weather. Indiana is no different. We get the color changes in the fall foliage and the temperatures are generally

perfect. It is kind of like the calm before the storm.

Hamilton County Council is a bit like that too. Our Council activity is full of meetings, closing out projects, beginning projects, updating next year's budgets with new information, and the inevitable beginning of election campaign season.

In 2022, the County Council district representatives are up for election. In years past, that has usually meant that the Council steers clear of potentially polarizing actions. Not this year. This Council has made it clear that it intends to be willing to tackle the difficult topics and act when others might have delayed. I'm proud to be a member of this body.

If you looked at the Council agenda last week, you would have seen it was packed. Standard things had some extras that might go unnoticed.

One of the more mundane items I mention regularly is the approval of grant appropriations. This month was the first appropriation of grants associated with the ARPA funding provided by the federal government to the county. This comes across as a very simple approval, but the effort to get the information, prioritize the asks, and then move them forward has taken many, many meetings.

Knowing this was going to be a Herculean effort, the Council created an ARPA Committee with the sole purpose of reviewing grant applications, discussing pros and cons, and making rec-

A 'six-sational' achievement

Carmel sets new consecutive state title record, runs unbeaten dual meet streak to 130

CARMEL - If it seemed like the Carmel boys tennis team was celebrating twice as much after it won the state championship last Saturday, there's a good reason.

The Greyhounds made history at their own Todd Witsken Tennis Center by claiming their sixth consecutive state title. Carmel beat Zionsville 5-0 in the championship match, completing another unbeaten season at 24-0. The 'Hounds, in fact, have not lost any dual meets during their sensational (or is that six-sational?) run, having compiled a staggering 130-0 record over the past six years.

Winning a state championship is cause for celebration in itself, of course, and so is setting such a historic record. But there's more to the story: The goal of six in a row entered Carmel's collective mind pretty much the second after the Greyhounds won their fifth in a row last year.

"Before we even had a chance to celebrate, everybody's talking six, so I really don't think we really celebrated last year," said Carmel coach Bryan Hanan. As a result, the team started trying to put itself in a position to win the sixth.

Once all the matches were over, there was a lot of screaming and shouting from the Greyhounds. Call it a release of pressure, and also the pure joy of setting a record for the ages.

Carmel had been tied with North Central, which won in five in a row between 1982 and 1986. Overall, the Greyhounds claimed their 14th state title.

"This one, we're going to enjoy," said Hanan. "We're going to enjoy this one. I don't think we did so much last year. We had a lot of pressure. We talked about this for two years."

The 'Hounds quickly clinched the dual match over the Eagles, who were making their second appearance in a state championship contest. No. 2 singles, senior Eli Mercer and the No. 1 doubles team of junior Jack Jentz and senior Srisanth Malpeddi both won easy matches to give Carmel a quick 2-0 lead.

The decider was No. 2 doubles, where the team of sophomore Braedon McIntyre and senior Adrien Qi won 6-3, 6-3. Freshman Rocky Li followed, winning at No. 3 singles 6-0, 6-4.

for the trophy presentation, as No. 1 singles Broc Fletcher was locked in a tense battle with Zionsville's Cole Chappell, both of them seniors. Chappell won the first set 6-3, and then Fletcher began cramping in the second set. But he toughed out the second set 6-4, and then held on for victory by taking the third set 7-5. Fletcher was in such discomfort that at times he was serving underhanded, but he battled his way to the win.

"The match was clinched," said Hanan. "I went up to him when he went down with a cramp and I said 'Hey, we've clinched this match. If you can't continue...' and he says, 'I'm not going off the court playing my last match at Carmel High School not being able to finish it.' That's the kid he always is. He's been like that for four years."

While the team portion of the state finals is finished, there's still one more thing left to settle: The individual singles and doubles tournament. Jentz and Malpeddi went through the team tournament undefeated, so they will advance to the doubles event, which begins Friday at Carmel's Todd Witsken Tennis Center. Jentz and Malpeddi will be the top seeds. Malped- a 23-4 record.

Everyone would have to wait awhile di won the doubles title last year with the now-graduated Jones McNamar.

In the morning semi-finals, Carmel beat No. 2-ranked Columbus North 5-0. Fletcher again came back from a set down to win in three sets, 3-6, 6-3, 6-2, while the No. 1 doubles: Jack Jentz and Sri-Greyhounds won the other four positions in straight sets.
