



Arcadia getting \$5M in federal, state funding

The Town of Arcadia has been awarded \$2.8 million dollars from the Hamilton County – American Rescue Plan Act fund, along with \$2.2 million dollars in State Water Infrastructure Funding (SWIF) from the Indiana Finance Authority.

Arcadia competed with over 500 applicants throughout the State of Indiana to secure financing for the town’s Indiana Department of Environmental Management compliance-driven wastewater improvement project that includes stormwater components.

This project is a partnership with the Arcadia Town Council, Hamilton County Commissioners, Hamilton County Council, and the Hamilton County Surveyor’s Office. The town will match these federal grant dollars with an additional \$923,000 from local funding sources.

“With a tremendous amount of support and teamwork, the residents in Arcadia will reap the many benefits from this

wastewater improvement project,” said County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt. Hundreds of Indiana municipalities applied for the grant, but only a few were awarded. Congrats to all involved.”

The project engineer is Andrew Cochrane with Commonwealth Engineers, and the grant administrator is Tina Mendenhall Henderson with Mendenhall and Associates. This project is funded

through concerted effort from the Town of Arcadia’s board members and utility staff who have been dedicated to improve the quality of life, along with the environment, for their community.

Feed the Frontlines reinstated in Carmel

Hospitals in Carmel are again working 24/7 to respond to a surge in COVID-19 cases. The City of Carmel is gearing back up its Feed the Frontlines initiative to help provide hot meals to frontline workers at IU Health North and Ascension St. Vincent Carmel hospitals.

The program will provide hundreds of meals throughout the week, which will be divided between Ascension St. Vincent Carmel and IU Health North hospitals to support healthcare workers dealing directly with COVID-19 patients. The city has partnered with IU Health North and Ascension St. Vincent Carmel hospitals to reinstate the program that was so successful in the spring.

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Longtime Sheridan football coach Bud Wright honored with display at museum

Football is not the only sport to be honored at the museum. Back in the 1950s, Coach Larry Hobbs had an outstanding series of basketball teams and there is a great display of their triumphs

Noblesville teen’s “Tomorrow” is finally here “Annie” production features cameo from Carmel mayor

Making her CYT debut is the dog, Lilly Mosier, who will portray Sandy, Annie’s faithful canine companion. Lilly is 15 years old, loves meeting people and playing with her favorite red ball. Lilly’s owner, Jaimie Mosier, is also the Musical Director for *Annie*.

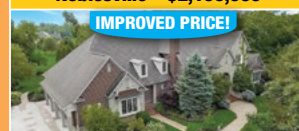

GOP sets Fall Dinner . . .

New district assures county a new state representative

Hamilton County is certain to have a new state representative following next year’s election. District 32 was remapped by the state legislature as part of the decennial redistricting of the state.

The new District 32 results partially because of the county’s tremendous increase in population and partly due to what some call gerrymandering by Republicans. But, in this case Democrats are not complaining too loudly about alleged gerrymandering.

The new District 32 will be very competitive, political experts believe. It stretches across the southern end of the county through portions of southern Clay and Delaware townships. This includes precincts where Democrats

have done well in the past two elections.

There will be no incumbent in the new district, which may add to its competitive nature. Thus far there has been no one expressing interest in running for the seat, at least not publicly. But, it is still early in the game. Filing for office in next year’s election begins in January.

In other political news, county Republicans have set a date of Nov. 7 for their annual Fall Dinner. It will be held at the 502 East Event Center in Carmel. The event draws several hundred GOP officeholders, candidates, contributors and party faithful. This year U.S. Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) will be the featured speaker.

Hamilton County claims Young as a native son since he grew up in the county and graduated from Carmel High School in 1990. Now

County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush, Prosecutor Lee Buckingham, Superior Court Judge Jon Brown, County Commissioner Christine Altman, and State Reps. Jerry Torr and Donna Schaibley were in the crowd of more than 100.

Among first time candidates also seeking support were Trini Beaver for County Recorder, Kevin Poore for Assessor and Paul Hensel, running for Clay Township Trustee.

Hospice has befallen the household.

This, just in time for the fifth anniversary of Mom being told she might have five years to live.

The stage four colon cancer has progressed to nearly every organ, most recently robbing her right eye’s vision while en route to her brain. A walnut-sized, cancerous lump protrudes from her groin.

She’s still alive, after snoozing away most of the summer. Each nap seemed to pull her farther away, as if caught in a cancerous riptide. Lately, the frequency of friends visiting has increased. Despite her deterioration, she still enjoys company and conversation and becomes livelier when the faithful share afternoons with her, her vitality somehow replenished with each door knock.

Her humor remains. She whispers her zingers. “Make sure those floozies who show up with casseroles aren’t allowed in,” she reminds her posse. Mom’s certain Dad (M.J.) is destined to be the greatest catch in town soon. There’s always been a tinge of jealousy there.

The hospice bed is positioned so she can watch her favorite show, “Two and a Half Men.” She loves Charlie Sheen, but Dad doesn’t seem threatened. If it was Martin Sheen, maybe he’d worry.

A funny funeral-related story Mom likes retelling: When she and Dad volunteered to deliver food and booze to a relative’s house for a wake, they carried the fried chicken and cooler into the kitchen. Two strangers inside seemed surprised. My parents had entered the wrong house.

The funeral home director recently visited. Mom dictated arrangements. She selected a navy blue coffin. She will don a white shirt, black and white jacket, black pants and black hat. In lieu of flowers, visitors will be encouraged to make donations to her favorite

charity, Anderson Woods Summer Camp for the disabled. Visitation: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Services will include Elvis singing “Amazing Grace” and Tom T. Hall singing “Me and Jesus,” the latter describing to a T her daily, non-congregational, personal talks with Jesus. “Me and Jesus, got our own thing goin’ / Me and Jesus, got it all worked out / Me and Jesus, got our own thing goin’ / We don’t need anybody to tell us what it’s all about.” She hopes everyone will clap to the lively, gospel beat of “Me and Jesus.”

On Sept. 17, Mom was helicoptered to an urban hospital across the river. This, after Dad found her in their bedroom staring into space, unresponsive. A stroke was suspected, but scans pinpointed seizures caused by swelling brain tumors. “That was very scary,” she recalled in intensive care. “I’d hate to go through that again. I was just staring into the mirror. I saw strange little animals, even a unicorn, in my vision. The doctor called them hallucinations.”

Dad encouraged more radiation to shrink the tumors, but a turning point had already been reached.

“I’ve gone through a lot,” she said from a Louisville hospital bed. “I didn’t give up to chemo or radiation, and I didn’t give up to the surgeries. I’m ready to give up now.”

Her uncharacteristic throwing in the towel was akin to Muhammed Ali retiring from boxing.

Outside, Dad remarked, “After all this time, I can’t believe she’s giving up now.”

“Her body’s giving up, Dad. She’s been not giving up for almost five years. We should respect her wishes.”

“It’s not that I don’t respect her wishes. I just keep thinking there could be a miracle.”

“Dad, she’s been with us for the last five years, isn’t that miracle enough?”

Last week, Mom told my wife Brynne, “I am

ready to let go, though M.J. doesn’t think so.”

“I don’t think he’ll ever be able to bring himself to say ‘it’s OK to let go’ to you. He loves you so much and wants you to be OK.”

“How’s Scott handling this?”

“He’s OK, and when he’s not OK, I’m there, and I hold him.”

“I’m glad.”

“Are you hurting today?”

“I always hurt. I’m just good at powering through. But I’m tired, and I can’t do it much more. The doctor said, ‘You only have a short time.’ How short is short? Is it a month? A week? A day? God has let me be in control and make my decisions around this. I’m just tired. It’s time to let God make this decision for me. I don’t want to do this anymore.”

Another funny funeral story Mom likes retelling: While looking into a coffin to pay her last respects to a friend’s brother, Mom’s sunglasses slipped off her face and somehow landed perfectly onto the face of the deceased. “I had to get them back without the others seeing. I was so embarrassed.”

“This dying thing ain’t like I thought it would be,” she said at home. “I’ve been laughing, planning my funeral. My visitors have been dancing and drinking. We’ve had a good time. They keep my mind going. I think that’s what it’s all about.”

Her headstone sits on a pre-purchased cemetery plot. It advertises her beginning: February 29, 1944. It awaits her ending.

A poem’s passage written by Kimberly Blaeser, “. . . and if the soul leaves our body, then we must rehearse goodbye,” resonated for me today, for through those words I realized how my columns written over the past five years about Mom have represented just that: rehearsals for the letting go.

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Hamilton County Council not holding back in tackling several difficult topics

Fall is my favorite time of year. Having spent the majority of my childhood in either Colorado or Virginia, I got the full spectrum of colors, temperatures and weather. Indiana is no different. We get the color changes in the fall foliage and the temperatures are generally perfect. It is kind of like the calm before the storm.

Hamilton County Council is a bit like that too. Our Council activity is full of meetings, closing out projects, beginning projects, updating next year's budgets with new information, and the inevitable beginning of election campaign season.

In 2022, the County Council district representatives are up for election. In years past, that has usually meant that the Council steers clear of potentially polarizing actions. Not this year. This Council has made it clear that it intends to be willing to tackle the difficult topics and act when others might have delayed. I'm proud to be a member of this body.

If you looked at the Council agenda last week, you would have seen it was packed. Standard things had some extras that might go unnoticed.

One of the more mundane items I mention regularly is the approval of grant appropriations. This month was the first appropriation of grants associated with the ARPA funding provided by the federal government to the county. This comes across as a very simple approval, but the effort to get the information, prioritize the asks, and then move them forward has taken many, many meetings.

Knowing this was going to be a Herculean effort, the Council created an ARPA Committee with the sole purpose of reviewing grant applications, discussing pros and cons, and making recommendations to Council, which is generally followed by a pretty simple vote. The effort that our Auditor's office and other departments have put into this is monu-

mental. That committee includes two standing members (Brad Beaver and Sue Maki) and three rotating members. I am part of the rotating members along with Amy Massillamany and Steve Nation. We will have new ARPA grant appropriations regularly over the next year. This month's appropriations included a White River opportunity, a workforce initiative, and two sewer and water projects.

For many years, our county has been reluctant to use financing on projects. With the parking garage approved earlier this year, we have seen the benefit of using this type of funding tool. Since then, we have refinanced existing bonds that date back decades to benefit the taxpayers.

One item on this month's agenda presented by the Commissioner's attorney, Mike Howard, was the refinancing of the 2014 purchase of hangars and the office complex at the Hamilton County Airport. This refinancing will save taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars. In addition, it was reported that Hamilton County is now the only county in Indiana to have a AAA bond rating. As we look forward to the needs of our residents and businesses, we are also looking into our past to find creative solutions to save our county money.

This month, Purdue Extension presented the 4-H Fairground's master plan. As you may know, this project was initially looked at pre-COVID and we were forced to put the brakes on that effort due to the pandemic. The county has put minimal improvements into the 4-H Fairgrounds over the past 20-plus years. For many communities, the fairgrounds provide ample space for tourism through convention opportunities and events. Our fairgrounds are far be-

hind many other communities as it pertains to technology and many of the buildings have outlived their useful life as supported by the subject matter experts. The Council had already agreed to support some drainage work and technology, but we know that there is a bigger capital ask. The extension stated that they wanted to use this time to reacquaint the Council with the long-range plan and will work to put priorities when they come back in front of Council.

The last item of note was the financial support of the County Efficiency Study. KPMG is widely respected as the leader in governmental efficiency reviews. They have no ties to anyone and can provide a fair and balanced look at our county. I'm thrilled to have the support of the Sheriff's office and the Criminal Justice System as a whole for participating in this effort. I know our teams are doing great work and have wonderful leadership, but our goal is to help them see across departmental boundaries and offer a fresh perspective.

In the end, I expect that Sheriff Quakenbush (who has an MBA) will have glowing reports for their ability to handle the increases in activity, an expanded jail and an added court all while hearing the negativity that permeates from the national news. I'm proud to report that this is not the sentiment in our county and certainly not on this Council.

The KPMG efficiency study passed unanimously and we are getting started with a kick-off meeting in the next week.

Council has been a truly wonderful experience. I've learned a great deal about our county and the people who serve. I've seen other governmental bodies also providing overwhelming service to their communities and want to take this time to recognize one in particular.

For most readers of the Hamilton County Reporter, you will already know that Danielle Carey Tolan was just named Trustee of the

Year. Her efforts to support people through COVID and her leadership to administer the \$18 million federal grant for the Hamilton County Emergency Rental Assistance Program (HC ERAP) was only one of the many accolades that were noted.

I bring up Danielle because throughout 2020, I participated in weekly coordination meetings where she was working throughout the county on making sure food pantries were stocked, people had shelter and were being supported as needed. Her work in supporting the county was an ideal partnership because of her willingness to cross those invisible lines of political boundaries to get the job done.

It is my belief that through coordinated efforts between our governmental bodies, we can deliver the most efficient and best solutions for taxpayers. I'm proud to call her my friend and my Trustee. Thank you, Danielle. Westfield Washington Township and the county as a whole are proud of you.

Thanks again for reading this update. My goal with these monthly columns is to inform you of county-level issues. I've received some wonderful feedback and will continue to write. I have been participating in a number of events these past few weeks and hope that people will let me know so I can plug them when appropriate. Blackhawks hold off Cougars, clinch Hoosier Heartland Conference title

SHERIDAN - As Sheridan's game with Carroll last Friday night at Bud Wright Stadium rolled on, the intensity level on the Blackhawks' side continued to rise.

If Sheridan won the game, it would clinch at least a share of the Hoosier Heartland Conference championship. The Cougars made it tough, and the Blackhawks had to play all the way to the end of the game before they were finally assured of the victory.

Once Sheridan's 28-21 win over Carroll was complete, the Blackhawks players ran out onto the field cheering, screaming, hugging and a couple helmets were thrown in the air. Seconds later, the 'Hawks had their trophy, the first time the team had won a conference title since 2018.

"They got fired up," said Sheridan coach Bud Wright. "I thought early, I didn't know whether we were or not, but after we got going, they got fired up over it. I think they were ready to play."

The Blackhawks were ready from the beginning. Less than two minutes into the game, the Cougars punted the ball. Jalen Herron caught the punt, then ran, found a couple openings, ran some more and didn't stop until 89 yards later, when he was in the end zone for the game's first touchdowns. Freshman Owen Bell made the extra-point kick, and he was just getting started, too.

"I thought it was very

important that we got on the board early there, because they were pretty tough on defense," said Wright.
