Hamilton County assuming responsibility for fallen tree

Commissioners agree to pay for damages to personal vehicles

Strong winds toppled part of a tree onto four cars parked below it on the evening of Thursday, Oct. 21. The 86-foot-tall tree was located on the north-east corner of the Old Courthouse Square.

"We are so grateful that no one was hurt in this incident," said Hamilton County Commissioner Christine Altman. "The vehicles involved can be replaced or repaired. We're just incredibly lucky this incident didn't result in someone getting hurt."

A certified arborist last conducted a tree hazard assessment on the fallen tree three years ago and deemed it to be healthy at the time.

"We did not have evidence that the tree was diseased, dying or posing any threat," Altman added. "Even though there is a question if the county is responsible under common law for the damage

caused by the fallen tree, we feel strongly that we should assume responsibility for the damage caused to the vehicles. We do not want to place additional burden on the those affected and want to get them

back 'on the road' as quickly as possible."

Damages could total close to \$100,000. Unfortunately, after further examining the damaged tree on Friday, an arborist determined it could not be saved

and needed to be removed. Fortunately, the county began cultivating saplings from the tree's acorns several years ago and plans to plant them on the Courthouse Square to continue the tree's lineage and history.

Westfield Council receives audit report

Investigators say Clerk-Treasurer's Office undertook destroying 200 boxes of records

On Monday, Oct. 25, the Westfield City Council received the findings of a 13-month long assessment of Westfield's financial records and determination of potential fraud, waste or abuse.

Westfield Mayor Andy Cook introduced the presentation and explained a brief history of what lead up to the audit.

"In the summer of 2020, there was council mention of improprieties financially with the city, particularly involving Grand Park. Shortly after, this

administration invoked the state law to order such an investigation into the city," Cook said. "In August and September of 2020, we engaged three firms to conduct this investigation of our city operation and a forensic financial audit. We expected this to take

istration would be involved in the results of the investigation or would have the opportunity to see the results before they were completed.

about six months at that time."

Cook explained a previous concern expressed by the council was that his administration would be involved in the results of the investigation or would have the opportunity to see the results before they were completed.

"I pledged to all of you at that time that we would all be presented with those results at the same time, and that will happen tonight," Cook said. "I have not seen this report. I have not discussed it with the people that will be presenting to you."

At Monday's meeting, Zachary Klutz from Taft Stettinius & Hollister explained the role of each of the three partnering firms conducting the review of the city.

Two Noblesville businesses announce relocation, growth plans

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced on Monday the expansion of two existing Noblesville businesses. The total investment for the projects is \$11 million.

WoodTurningz, Inc. and Texon Towel and Supply Company are splitting the 7.55-acre lot of undeveloped land at 15405 Endeavor Drive. Each business will own 3.77 acres of land and will build separate

52,500 square-foot buildings to occupy. Additional space will be available for lease or future growth.

"We are excited to see two of Noblesville's own expand with this new investment and jobs commitment within our community," Jensen said. "As new investment continues to occur in Noblesville, working

Taft Stettinus & Hollister focused on compliance with the law.

Klutznick introduced Daniel Hedden from Baker Tilly Municipal Advisors, the firm that would focus on an operational review and assessment of the City of Westfield primarily as it relates to financial matters.

Klutznick indicated Bryan Callahan from BKD CPAs & Advisors conducted a forensic audit of the city’s books and accounts designated to detect fraud, waste and abuse.

“We were aware of allegations that we were directed by the mayor or city administration officials to target certain parties or officials as a part of the examination, or that we were otherwise instructed to include or not include certain things in the report. This is patently false and did not occur,” said Klutznick in his opening remarks to the council.

Klutznick said during the investigation timely responses were received from the Westfield City Council and administration to various requests for information and documents.

“Unfortunately, we did not receive access or timely responses for information, records, data and documents directed to the Clerk-Treasurer’s Office,” Klutznick said. “Even when info was provided by the Clerk-Treasurer, it was often incomplete, the wrong information, in the wrong format or simply not responsive to our underlying requests.”

Klutznick also explained the investigation was delayed due to litigations between the mayor and the clerk-treasurer.

“Another significant delay occurred in late February of 2021 when the Clerk-Treasurer’s office undertook to destroy, through Indiana Statutory Document Destruction Process, reportedly over 200 boxes of city records, files and documents maintained by the clerk-treasurer’s office. According to the Clerk-Treasurer’s Office, such document destruction is undertaken once per year for documents over 10 years old.”

Klutznick said because of the large volume of documents to be destroyed, and because of the fact it was occurring during an audit process and while information and document requests were pending, investigators did undertake efforts to review the information the Clerk-Treasurer’s Office sought to destroy.

In addition, investigators learned there had not been any notices filed for record destruction by the Clerk-Treasurer’s Office in the past four years other than the one filed in 2021.

At the conclusion of the presentation, council members were provided with the report that totaled more than 400 pages.

Members of the council and Mayor Cook both agreed to review the report and to discuss its findings at a later date. “We have a lot to digest,” Cook said.

2026 and 18 to 20 employees by 2031. Their project investment is \$6 million.

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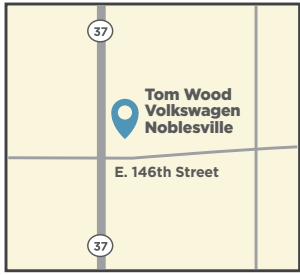

AG Todd Rokita, 17-state coalition win apology from national school board group

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita on Sunday commended a national school board group for backing down from inflammatory language it used to prod the Biden administration into threatening parents' First Amendment rights.

Pledging to continue the fight against the Biden administration's intimidation tactics, Rokita – who organized a 17-state coalition of similarly concerned colleagues – said an apology from the National School Boards Association (NSBA) shows that taking a strong stand for liberty produces real results.

He thanked the 16 other state attorneys general for their involvement in the cause.

“We are shining a light on injustices perpetrated against parents of schoolchildren, and it's making a real difference,” Rokita said. “We will continue to defend the rights of parents to stay closely involved with their children's education and speak their minds to public school officials.”

On Oct. 18, Rokita composed and sent a letter – also signed by the 16 other state attorneys general – to President Joe Biden and U.S. Attorney General

Merrick Garland. The letter demanded that the Biden administration cease making threats against parents such as those contained in an Oct. 4 memo from the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), which called for the FBI and other law enforcement to keep a close eye on parents nationwide to address supposed “threats against school administrators, board members, teachers, and staff.”

The DOJ memo echoed an NSBA letter sent Sept. 29 to the Biden administration lamenting the rise of parents pushing back against divisive ideologies, including critical race theory (CRT). The NSBA letter raised the specter of local protests rising to the level of “domestic terrorism.”

Just four days after Rokita and the other attorneys general issued their demands, NSBA leaders confessed in a memo to its members that there was “no justification” for the organization's incendiary language.

But, Rokita noted, the Biden administration still has not apologized for its own threats against parents.

“Most Hoosier educators are no doubt as appalled as anyone by Joe Biden's anti-parent bias,” Rokita said. “Now is a time for Hoosiers to unite.”

Local community leaders can promote such unity, he added.

“Indiana school boards as well as the Indiana Department of Education should denounce the DOJ memo,” Rokita said. “Sheriffs' departments and other police agencies should consider declining any DOJ meetings aimed at repressing parental participation. And everyone involved should work together to facilitate free speech by protecting all participants at school board meetings.”

Further, both the NSBA and the Biden administration must take steps to correct their mistakes, Rokita said.

“Parents don't just have ‘a’ role in their children's education,” he said. “They have the first and primary role. To properly serve our communities, leaders at all levels of government must recognize this basic truth. My own office will be taking further actions to this end.”

Junior core to lead Noblesville team

The Noblesville girls basketball team was a good, young team last season.

Is it possible for the Millers to get better, and younger, this season? They certainly have done so in the latter category. While Noblesville graduated some standout seniors from last year's team, this season's team has no seniors.
