U.S. Senator Todd Young left little doubt that he will be running for re-election next year as he addressed a Republican Fall Dinner crowd Sunday in Carmel. The first-term senator was introduced to the gathering of 300 party faithful by Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen, who welcomed "native son home" to Hamilton County.

Young grew up in Carmel and graduated from Carmel High School in 1990. His parents still reside locally. The senator, his wife and children now live in Bloomington. He defeated former Senator Evan Bayh in 2016 with substantially less name recognition and little campaign reserves.

At 7:33 a.m. Saturday, the Carmel police and fire departments responded to single-vehicle crash at the intersection of 106th Street and Ditch Road.

It's time to get prepared for safe travel this winter

Across the country, temperatures are dropping and winter weather is on the horizon, and the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) urges Hoosiers to be prepared.

Governor Eric Holcomb proclaimed Nov. 7-13 Winter Weather Preparedness Week in Indiana. Along with the National Weather Service and other agencies, INDOT encourages the public to use this week as a reminder to take steps to come with winter weather.

For safe travel, INDOT offers the following tips:

· Always slow down for conditions, especially on snow covered roads.

• Never tailgate or drive beside a snowplow. Drivers may not be able to see you.

• The safest place on the road during a winter storm is behind a snowplow, but if you must pass, do so carefully and remember to use appropriate speed for

conditions.

• Be prepared in case of a crash and being stranded. monitor forecasts several Always carry an emergency kit in your vehicle with food, water, a phone charger, sand or cat litter, flares or bright LED alternatives, a flashlight, and blankets.

• Keep your vehicle full of gas.

In colder temperatures, salt and brine alone take longer to activate, so environmentally-friendly chemicals are used to boost effectiveness. Snowplow drivers typically work 12-hour shifts during a storm and on average take two-to-three hours to complete a full route.




