Nickel Plate Express exceeds goal for rail preservation

The Nickel Plate Express surpassed its \$20,000 fundraising goal for rail preservation at the inaugural Golden Spike Gala on Nov. 4.

The gala, hosted by Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen and sponsored by Gaylor Electric, raised \$25,500 for the preservation of historic rail equipment in Noblesville.

Indianapolis resident and frequent Nickel Plate Express passenger Gail Parka kicked off the evening with a \$10,000 donation to the Nickel Plate Express. Not to be outdone, Parka's seven-year-old grandson, Aiden, sent his grandmother with a piggy bank full of \$67.51 in change for the Nickel Plate Express. Aiden hopes to be a train engineer one day and was excited to support the Nickel Plate Express' continued operation in Hamilton County.

Alerding has consistently volunteered for the Republican Party. She is a precinct committeeman, co-chair of the Noblesville GOP club, treasurer for the Republican Women's Club, and last year won her race for Noblesville School Board.

Alerding has come up with some creative ideas for events, including next Sunday's chili cookoff between the Noblesville and Westfield GOP clubs, raising money for the party including a very successful silent auction, and ways to heighten public awareness of the GOP. She has knocked on hundreds of doors for candidates and made phone calls.

Hamilton County Republican Party Chair Laura Campbell and the entire Hamilton County GOP was honored to present Alerding with the 2021 Susan Armstrong Heart of the GOP Award.

Susan Armstrong was a longtime precinct committeeman and volunteer, who during the course of her later years struggled with heart failure. While awaiting a heart transplant, she continued her work for the party by making phone calls and writing notes to voters. She received a donor heart and was able to continue volunteering in person for the party for several years prior to her passing.

Westfield Lions bring Poker for Sight tournament back to 4-H Fairgrounds

The Westfield Lions Club Poker for Sight tournament is back.

On Nov. 19 and 20 at the Hamilton County Fairgrounds in Noblesville, one of the largest charity Texas Hold'em tournaments in the nation will take place as the club resumes the bi-annual events after the COVID pandemic interruption.

Each Poker for Sight tournament has a guaranteed purse of \$25,000 with \$10,000 going to the winner. More than 300 players from around the nation will vie for the cash.

Qualification rounds begin at 10 a.m. on Friday, Nov. 19, with a second round at 6 p.m. A third round will take place at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 20. The Championship round will kick off at 5:30 p.m. on Saturday. **Only the top 15 percent of the players from each round will qualify for the Championship.** The Lions have a reputation for conducting one of the best-run poker tournaments.

"After taking more than a

year off due to COVID, we are thrilled to be back better than ever," said Lion Mike Birk, tourney director. "We are seeing a huge increase in interest; poker players simply want to

get out and get playing!"

To register for the event, go to lionspoker.org. Preregistered players get a discounted buy-in. At the door the buy-in is \$135, but the event is close to being a

sellout, so players are encouraged to register early to ensure a seat at the table. The top 25 players in the Championship round will receive a cash prize, and member, \$10,000 to the winner.

Electric rail preservation non-profit to hold fundraiser in Westfield Nov. 19

The nonprofit Hoosier Heartland Trolley Co. (HHTC) will host a fall fundraiser, “Hoosier Trolley Electric Brews,” from 6 to 10 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 19 at Grand Junction Brewing Co., 1189 E. 181st St., Westfield.

Each guest will receive one complimentary drink, appetizers and desserts. Proceeds support Indiana’s only nonprofit working to preserve and revive the state’s electric railway heritage for education, tourism and economic development. Tickets are \$40 each and must be purchased in advance at hoosiertrolley.org. All guests must be 21 years of age or older.

“Events such as this allow our organization to further our community-centered, educational mission for generations to come,” said HHTC Vice President Cameron Nichols. “Proceeds will support current projects, including the restoration of an Indiana interurban car, community outreach programs and the development

of our permanent home.”

HHTC has preserved several rare artifacts, including three of Indiana’s last interurban cars, which were the electric train precursor to today’s interstate highways. The organization has also saved the last Indianapolis streetcar, an 1860s mule-drawn Indianapolis streetcar and an 1898-built electric locomotive from Singer’s South Bend sewing machine cabinetry works. These artifacts are the core of a developing electric heritage railroad

project where the community will be able to experience, enjoy and learn from an industry that transformed the state into what it is today.

About the Hoosier Heartland Trolley Company

The Hoosier Heartland Trolley Company is an Indiana nonprofit 501(c)(3) founded in 2018 to save the last remaining railroad cars representing the state’s rich electric railway heritage. The organization exists to spark imagination in people across all walks of

life regarding the art, science, culture, technology and economic empowerment of Indiana’s world-renowned electric railway industry from the 20th century. The company is developing the state’s only electric heritage railway to immerse Hoosiers in authentic transportation experiences as a community asset for education, economic development and tourism. 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Noblesville family checks big item off their bucket list

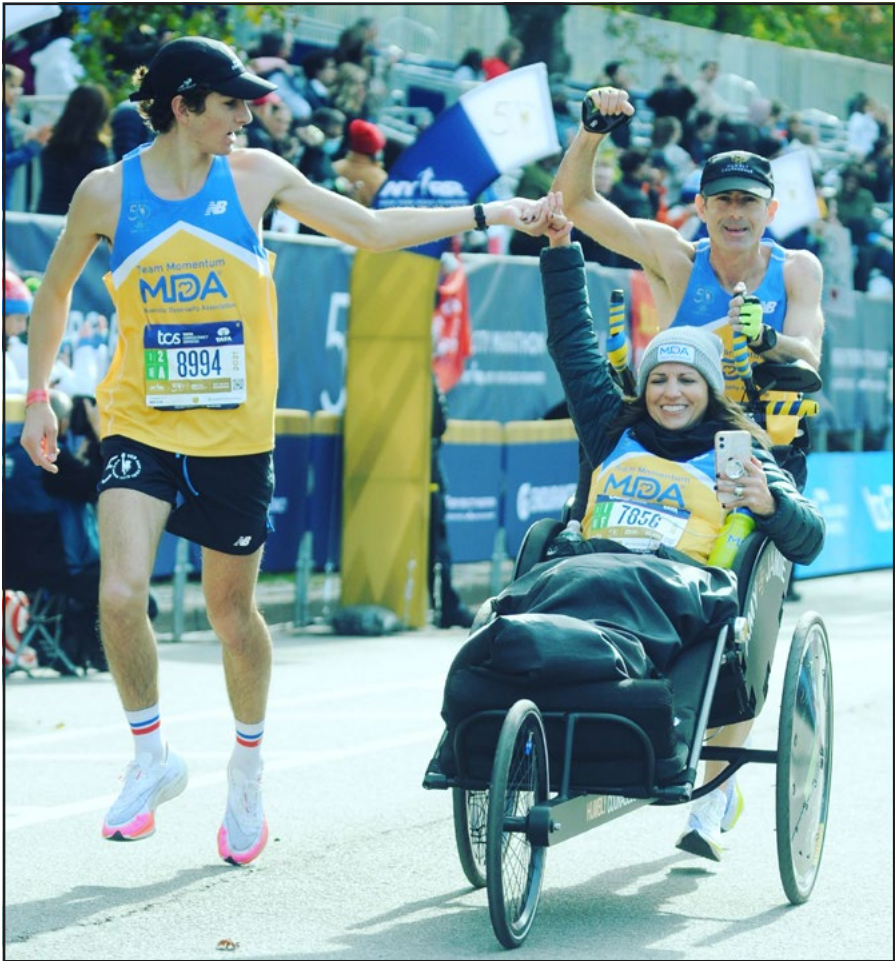

Being in quarantine made me realize how crazy my family is and how lucky I am that I do not have to spend all day every day with them, but it also made me realize how lucky I am that I have the opportunity to spend time with them.

My husband John will tell you that I've said this phrase every year for the past 21 years – in other words, for as long as I've been a parent. This statement refers to each stage of life our boys have been in.

Of course, there were the not-so-fun moments when we were up with them at 2 a.m. Or when we had to change a poop diaper for the eighth time in one day. 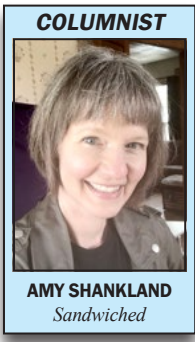

On Nov. 9, Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation (CCPR) closed on a land donation totaling approximately 63 acres from Falcon Nest II, LLC. The property, which is located in northeast Carmel near 146th Street and River Road, was donated in honor of Thomas Marcuccilli, one of the original founders of STAR Financial Bank.

Thomas Marcuccilli was a native Hoosier who contributed

greatly to the state's economy and is remembered for his patience, generosity and positive influence in the state. Nearly 80 years ago, along with his business partner, he established STAR Financial Bank and saw great success. The Indiana community bank has since grown to \$2.7 billion in assets and provides banking, mortgage, investing and wealth management services to Hoosiers across the state.

While the planning and development of the new park will take time and concerted community efforts the name is already decided: Thomas Marcuccilli Nature Park. Its addition fulfills several goals and recommendations outlined in CCPR's 2020-2024 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan, which includes enhancing park and recreation opportunities within the community by expanding trails and

environmental education near the White River.

CCPR's first step in developing any parkland is creating a park master plan. This document outlines all future development of the park and typically takes between nine and 12 months to finalize. During this time, CCPR will host community meetings to identify public needs and discuss park concepts. Additional information about this process will be forthcoming.

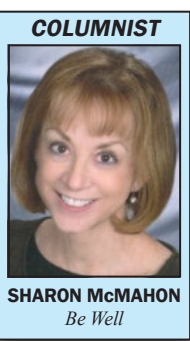


What you can do to improve your sleep quality, part 1

"Be thy sleep silent as night is, and as deep." – Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

I have a hunch that my subject matter this week will resonate with a few of you. Sleep ... the kind that lasts for several hours, renews brain and body functioning, leaving us awake and refreshed ... remember? I am sure there are people reading this and unsure of why I would select this topic, and if you are one of those people – good for you!

For most of my life sleep was never an issue: Wash face, brush teeth, jammies, head on pillow, done. And while I usually have no issues falling asleep, my brain knocks on my skull around 2 a.m. or so, maybe later or a bit earlier. One never knows! How common are sleep problems? Hav-



ing trouble sleeping is commonly reported throughout the world. According to the American Sleep Association (AMA), sleep disorders currently affect as many as 50 to 70 million U.S. adults, and insomnia is the most frequently reported.

It is commonly accepted that since we are all different that our specific sleep needs are different, and of course that would apply to toddlers, adults, teenagers, etc. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, adults need seven or more hours of sleep per night for the best health and wellbeing.¹ Short sleep duration is defined as less than seven hours of sleep per 24-hour period.

It is also commonly accepted that as we age our sleep

habits and patterns change; I personally can attest to my own experiences thus far. So what is going on and how can we make the necessary changes to ensure that we have better sleep – therefore better health, stronger immune systems, increased cognitive abilities, and increased longevity?

Unfortunately, there are no "easy" answers to that question. Many of the random articles you read, and I concur with their suggestions, advise us to turn off electronics of all kinds, make sure your bedroom is comfortably cool, no caffeine in the hours leading up to your bedtime, keep the lighting off or very low, etc. Most of us are aware of these suggestions and follow them, as I do. However, the awakening issue persists. Sigh. While thankfully this does not occur on a regular basis, it occurs frequently enough to further study the subject.

There is so much informa-

tion about sleep issues and disorders that I will make this a three-part series regarding how we can identify whether or not we should seek medical advice and/or make changes in our own habits and lifestyles which can benefit our bodies to get the proper rest it requires.

Noblesville Council approves agreement to build three speculative industrial buildings

On Nov. 9, the Noblesville Common Council approved economic development agreements with Equicor to construct three new speculative industrial buildings: Two at the southwest corner of Olio Road and 146th Street totaling 500,000 square feet, and one in Saxony Corporate Campus totaling 115,000 square feet. This project has a capital investment of \$50 million.

“More and more businesses are looking at Noblesville to start-up, relocate or expand,” Mayor Chris Jensen said. “Having open building space in addition to shovel-ready real estate options make our city even more attractive to businesses who are looking to call our fast-growing community home. I appreciate the Noblesville Common Council’s forward-looking mindset and proactive approach to

attract new businesses.”

Equicor, a nationally-recognized real estate development and investment firm based in Carmel, and city officials will market the buildings to attract prospective tenants in industries consistent with the city’s desire to support certain targeted, high-wage employers, including tenants engaged in advanced/light manufacturing, wholesale trade, life sciences innovation, health technology and professional, technical or financial services. The project includes numerous architectural enhancements given its proximity to major roads and adjacent developments. The project includes three separate buildings totaling 615,000 square feet of flex space. Buildings are antici-

pated to be completed in 2023, 2024 and 2025.

“This is a viable and marketable project that will attract the types of businesses we at the city want to bring to our community,” Noblesville Economic Development Director Andrew Murray said. “Combined with our workforce, quality of life and connectivity, Equicor adds one more piece to our portfolio to attract new employers with high quality space that is in short supply today.”

In consideration for the investment commitment, the Common Council approved real property tax abatements as part of this project. Equicor anticipates the employment of at least 200 new high-paying, high-quality jobs.

“Whether it’s for simple

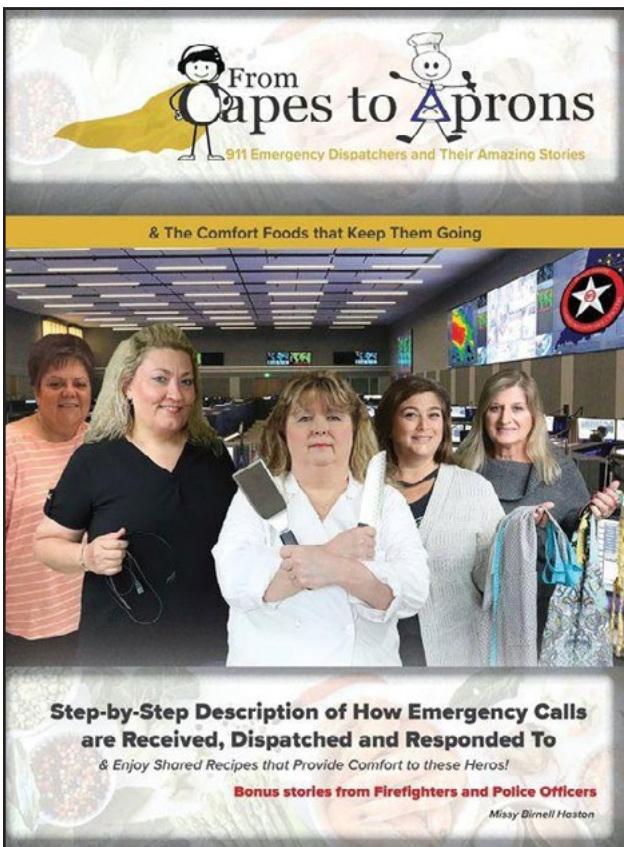

The White River Christian Church Food pantry was started by Jeff and Kim DeMaise. Each week, Jeff and Kim work by engaging the volunteers, doing inventory control, ordering, stocking and assisting the volunteers to be the hands and feet of Jesus and being an outreach to the community. Starting as a small pantry from within a closet, this pantry now includes a building serving approximately 285 or more families a week. This translates to about 1,200 people each week or 4,800 people each month.

Guests are welcome to come from 1 to 6 p.m. every Thursday. The indoor model is in place from 1 to 5:30 p.m. where guests can come

into the pantry and select foods, or guests may come in from 5:30 to 6 p.m. for a premade bag. Premade bags are also provided anytime between 1 and 6 p.m. There is also a gluten-free/allergy selection.

The food pantry is located at 1685 N. 10th St., Noblesville, in the cream-colored building just south of the church.

Masks at Noblesville Schools could become optional for some under certain circumstances

Editor's note: The following statement was released by Noblesville Schools last Wednesday morning regarding updates to the school district's masking policy. It is addressed to district parents and families.

Thank you for your ongoing commitment to our COVID protocols, allowing us to keep schools open and students learning in person. We appreciate your support and patience as we navigate together through these challenges.

Today we're providing an update regarding the use of masks at Noblesville Schools.

Effective immediately, masks are recommended and optional for spectators at public extracurricular activities, such as athletic and performing arts events that do not take place during the school day.

At this time, masks will continue to be required during the school day for students, staff and visitors.

Beginning in January 2022, once the metrics below are both met for two consecutive weeks, qualifying school buildings will be "mask optional."

Masks could again become required should a school go above either one of these thresholds.

1. Positive COVID case rate of 1 percent or less (based on overall building population).
2. Quarantine rate of 3 percent or less (based on overall building population).

We report COVID positive cases and quarantines by building at tinyurl.com/kmupvh3r and will notify parents when these criteria have been met. Please note that this would be Jan. 26, 2022, at the earliest.

The COVID benchmarks and timing are based on the following considerations:

- Honoring significantly increased COVID-related workloads of teachers, nurses, bus drivers and other employees critical to operating our schools
- Overall COVID spread in Hamilton County
- Vaccination rates of school-age children
- The ability for students ages 5-11 to be fully vaccinated.
- Guidance from health professionals
- Compliance with state health orders (Currently, universal masking during the school day allows us to significantly reduce the quarantining of healthy students. The state has indicated they plan to reevaluate their quarantining requirements in January.)
- Federal mandate for masking on buses

• Quarantine rates from activity happening outside of school

We're pleased to report that we have been experiencing fewer "close contact" quarantines as more students become vaccinated and encourage you to speak with your child's medical provider about the COVID vaccine. (Vaccinated students are not required to quarantine for close contact as long as they remain symptom-free.)
