### **Senator Todd Young** announces nominees for **U.S. Service Academies**







Within television, books, movies, and even social media, we see mental illness everywhere. While it is good to

have open discussions on how to avoid developing mental illness and the reality of living with a mental illness, the discourse has become almost jovial. When people who are mentally ill talk about their real-life struggles to feel like someone understands, those who don't understand feel left out and sometimes lead to people faking a disorder to feel "special."

Despite what many people think, living with a mental illness quite frankly sucks: It's not special; it's a battle in your mind that does not need to be glamorized.

Hannah's fictional story affected real lives because of how romanticized and glamorized it was. Some teenagers, if they are unstable, are easily influenced by the media around them, as displayed in this instance

details the life of a tremendous and beautiful but what about its effect on mental health? Dear Evan Hansen deals with many dark and sad topics, among those being anxiety and suicide.

In Evan Hansen, social anxiety is used as an excuse to allow Evan Hansen to get away with unacceptable behavior. Not only is it used as an excuse but also a quirk of sorts. Evan Hansen's anxiety is like a microwaved potato, half-baked and used to pretend that something, or someone, is interesting when really, it's just a potato. Having anxiety is a war in your brain that doesn't stop, not a quirk to make you interesting. the above quote is not pretty. I wish it were not so, but think about it there is a reason that sleep deprivation has been used as a torture device for centuries!

Thankfully, I dare say that none of us has been in that predicament, although judging from the number of OTC sleep aids available and advertised, along with prescription medications available to patients, there is a significant problem going on in our society which results in sleep loss for many. An estimated 50 to 70 million Americans suffer from sleep disorders/sleep deprivation. Only one-third of American get the recommended seven to nine hours of sleep. Nearly 9 million U.S. adults take prescription sleep aids. 1 personally believe those numbers have increased significantly



recuperate, neurons become overworked and less capable of optimal performance in many types of thinking. Apart from occasional sleepless nights, over the long-term poor sleep may put someone at a higher risk of cognitive decline and dementia.2 Lack of sleep can affect not only our brains, but all our bodies functioning organs. This is a subject which I recommend each person who struggles with insomnia or other sleep issues to research and discuss with their physician.

Poor sleep can take many forms. It can be caused by short sleep duration and/or fragmented sleep. Both insufficient and interrupted sleep makes it difficult to progress through sleep

as our country has cycles in a normal, healthy way. Sleep deprivation has been

shown to cause greater likelihood of car accidents Drowsy driving accounts for thousands of crashes, injuries and fatalities each year, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Another cause of poor sleep could be a condition called "sleep apnea" which is a potentially serious sleep disorder in which breathing repeatedly stops and starts. This condition must be diagnosed by a physician with resulting treatment prescribed by a physician.

# Shamrocks soar back to state

WESTFIELD - By keeping their feet on the ground, the Shamrocks are soaring back to Lucas Oil Stadium.

The Westfield football team punched its second consecutive ticket to the IHSAA state finals last Friday night, pulling away from Merrillville 48-19 to win the Class 6A north semi-state. The 'Rocks got off to a very quick start, held off the expected run by the Pirates, then used its run game and defense to dominate the second half.

Westfield improved to 12-1 with the win and will take on Center Grove in a repeat of last year's Class 6A state finals. The game is set for 7 p.m. Saturday.

This year's semi-state game was almost a rerun of last year's contest between Westfield and Merrillville, with the only change being the location. The Shamrocks won last season's game at the Pirates' Demaree Stadium. This time, Westfield's Riverview Health Stadium was the site, a welcome relief after the 'Rocks took a road trip to Fort Wayne Carroll last week to play and win the regional.

"You can have all the time in the world," said Micah Hauser, Westfield's do-itall senior star. "So last week was extremely stressful and under really bad conditions. But this week, being at home, being able to relax before the game was extremely nice."

If they were relaxed before the game, the Shamrocks were ready to go at the start. Westfield scored on its first two drives, not wasting any time. Hauser broke loose for a 30-yard touchdown run just 85 seconds into the game, with Caleb King making the extra-point kick. Then after the Shamrocks' defense forced a three-and-out, Maximus Webster powered his way into the end zone on a 20-yard run.

"I don't think we could've gotten off to a better start." said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert. We had a great kickoff return. We scored in a few plays. And then the defense stepped up right away."



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

NOBLESVILLE - The 2021-22 wrestling season began in Hamilton County last Wednesday, as Noblesville hosted Fishers in an all-county and Hoosier Crossroads Conference dual meet at The Mill.

And the Millers were ready. Noblesville started its season with a bang, winning 10 of 14 matches over the Tigers for a 51-17 victory. The Millers have several solid wrestlers in their upperweight divisions, and the middle and light weights are pretty good, too.
