Westfield Lions Poker pulls players from across continent





I glance back to see if she's joking, but she's al-Pie Making Man is as kitchen common as a whistling tea kettle.

I've helped make pumpkin pies before, though she did the heavy lifting, dealing with the most difficult of the recipe steps, each involving eggs: separating, beating and folding.

During those times, I admired her grace when cracking an egg so that the pointed end opens like a hatch to catch the unbroken yolk that drops from the remaining rounded end, the yolk miraculously staying intact and captured while the whites ooze into the awaiting bowl. I, however, am brutish around eggs, a shell-cracking oaf. I am to eggs what Of Mice and Men's Lennie Small is to small, furry animals, the crack of my eggshell as haphazard as the crack of a puppy's neck. So, while she addressed the eggs, I did simpler things, like measure spices: 1 t. cinnamon; $\frac{1}{2}$ t. ground ginger; 1/8 t. ground cloves (add to this $\frac{1}{4}$ t. salt).

But that was then. Now, it's all my respon-

sibility.

While her fingers crack at the laptop keys, I consider her nonchalance to be a display of faith. I don't want to know I've listened to her and learned from her. I also do not want to let the pumpkin pie down; one of the bad pumpkin pie.

pumpkin mixture, and with a rubber spatula, patiently, I'm confident in the gently apply a down-acrossup-and-over motion over and over until all evidence of white vanishes.

As the oven preheats to ready lost to the laptop, as if 425, I unroll a pie crust and form it into the glass pan, cut off the excess edges and then do what her mother once taught her: press my forefinger and middle finger onto the crust's edge, keeping the fingers slightly apart; then I use my left hand's forefinger to pull up the edge between the fingers' gap, repeating this throughout the pie's circumference, the dimples and raised edges providing an aesthetic appeal.

> I pour the pie mixture into the shell and slide the pan into the oven. Fifteen minutes later, I reduce the heat to 350 degrees and bake 45 more minutes – a bit longer actually – until the pie browns, loses its jiggle and fills her house with pumpkin pie scent.

I have done it. I have made a pumpkin pie. Nothing has filled me with a greater sense of inner warmth than thoughts of pumpkin pie during the holiday season, nothing that is, until making this particular pumpkin pie that she has taught me to make, for us, for her, but without her for the first time.

It will taste best after overnight refrigeration, along with, as she recommends, "tons of whipped to let her down. I want her cream," stealing my heart again in the simplest of ways, all for which I am most thankful.

Class 6A football state championship Shamrocks fall just short to Trojans

INDIANAPOLIS - Westfield football coach Jake Gilbert didn't sugarcoat it after his team narrowly lost the Class 6A state championship game last Saturday night at Lucas Oil Stadium.

The Shamrocks went at defending state champion Center Grove and stayed with the Trojans for the entire game. Center Grove ultimately won 27-21, beating Westfield in the 6A final game for the second year in a row

"This is a devastating loss," said Gilbert. "I know the average person's like, 'Oh, wow, you played Center Grove really well!' We came here to win. So we are devastated, but super proud of our kids."

In last year's 6A title game, the Trojans dominated, leading the 'Rocks 38-7 at halftime, and eventually winning 38-14. This year was different. Westfield not only showed it could compete with Center Grove, but came close to dethroning the Trojans, who completed a second straight 14-0 season with the victory.

In fact, the Shamrocks led at the end of the first quarter. Center Grove scored the first touchdown of the game, grinding its way down the field. Westfield pushed the Trojans to fourth down twice during the drive, but Tayven Jackson eventually punched it in from the one. Mario Chalmers blocked CG's extra-point try.

The Trojans held the 'Rocks to a three and out on their next drive, but Center Grove fumbled the next play. Chalmers recovered, and Westfield began a touchdown drive. The Shamrocks worked their way down to the CG 36, then Maximus Webster threw a 21-yard pass to Nic Depasquale. That put Westfield at the 15, and that was all Micah Hauser needed, as he rushed into the end zone from there. Caleb King made the extra-point kick. That would make the first-quarter score 7-6.

Center Grove answered with a long drive of its own,

absorbing a sack from Charles Dager to move the ball to the Shamrocks' two. Caden Curry ran the ball in for the touchdown, with Nolan Foley's extra-point kick good. Center Grove was back up 13-7.

Westfield struggled in its next drive, but recovered quickly and made its way to the end zone. The drive contained three big plays, starting with a 35-yard pass from Webster to Ian Bruch to get the ball into Trojans' territory. Webster then found an opening to make a 10-yard rush to the Center Grove 25, and Hauser took care of business from there with another run to the end zone. King again kicked the extra point, and the 'Rocks were back on top 14-13.

The Trojans answered with another drive, this one culminating with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Jackson to Harrison Stomps. Westfield made one last push, which included a 36-yard throw from Webster to Jackson Wasserstrom, but a field goal was no good, and the Trojans led 20-14 at halftime.

Center Grove got the ball to start the second half, and scored on its opening drive. Micah Coyle finished it with a five-yard run into the end zone, and another Foley kick put the Trojans up 27-14.

Westfield got the ball down to Center Grove's 40 before punting, but the Trojans fumbled the punt return and the Rocks recovered. Three plays later, Hauser punched it in from the one-yard line. King made his third kick of the game, and Westfield was within 27-21.

But that would be the last score of the championship. Center Grove tried to start a drive, but it ground to a halt after a Popeye Williams sack on thirdand-11, which forced the Trojans to punt. Both teams then exchanged punts, which gave the Shamrocks the ball with 6:30 left


