Hall began his sports reporting career in Boone County, working for the Zionsville and Lebanon newspapers. From 2007 until 2013, he worked at *The Noblesville Daily Times* as a sports reporter and assistant sports editor. In 2013, Hall joined the Reporter and daily covers nine high schools county-wide.

“Richie has a tireless work ethic and daily produces unprecedented amount of local high school sports coverage,” said Reporter Publisher Jeff Jellison. “In addition, Richie is excellent at balancing equal coverage for

“We are humbled to receive this honor on behalf of our dedicated community members, our conservation counterpart Pollinator Partnership and, most importantly, the monarch butterflies and rusty patched bumblebees of the Midwest,” said Lana Ramer, CCPR’s Volunteer Coordinator. “Bringing passionate people together allows us to create a greater impact on the world around us.”

Project Wingspan initiative due to the park system’s robust native habitat. Pollinator Partnership’s mission is to promote the health of pollinators through conservation, education, and research, which aligns with CCPR’s core values of making an impact and planning for the future.

CCPR used this project as an opportunity to

make nature education more accessible and highlight the importance of pollinators in everyday life. CCPR engaged the community by partnering with local organizations to host seed collection and sorting events. CCPR partnered with internal programs, Citizen Science

Westfield Lions Poker pulls players from across continent

The Westfield Lions Club’s first Poker for Sight Tournament in two years was a “roaring” success – Lion-pun intended.

Over 350 players from all over North America came together at the Hamilton County Fairgrounds on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 19 and 20 to participate in what is believed to be the largest charity poker competition in the Midwest.

The last Poker for Sight tournament was in November 2019, as the pandemic forced the Lions to temporarily shutter all Poker for Sight events.

“It certainly has been a challenge,” said Lion Mike Birk, Poker for Sight chairman. “Because of the very nature of poker, players need to be close to one another, nine to a table. We have done everything possible to make it safe for everyone. The Lions want to thank all our competitors. This was a great tournament.”

The Poker for Sight series constitutes the largest fundraising efforts of the year for the Westfield Lions.

Mr. Brainard goes to Washington Mayor invited to attend signing of bipartisan infrastructure deal

Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard accepted an invitation from the White House to attend the recent signing into law of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Deal, a ceremony that took place on the lawn at the White House.

Mayor Brainard was among those invited after he was one of only two Republican Indiana mayors to sign a letter to Congress in July urging Representatives to come together and pass a bill that will benefit cities like Carmel, all across the nation.

The letter was sent by the U.S. Conference of Mayors, where Brainard holds a leadership position as a Trustee. Brainard has long been an advocate for compromise and bipartisanship at the local and national level, especially when

it comes to issues that can directly benefit residents of Carmel, who he has served since 1996.

"When it comes to investing public money into infrastructure, we only have one opportunity to build our city the right way and we don't want to strive for mediocre or just good; not the easiest nor cheapest," Brainard said. "We must strive for the best when we have the opportunity to do so. That is what great cities do.

We want to create the best and highest quality of life through building the most ambitious and glorious city we can build. Having the highest quality roads, city services, trails, bridges, parks and other amenities in place, will ensure quality long-term growth. Everything we do is focused on that."

President Biden signed the bill at a ceremony at the White House lawn surrounded by members of Congress, governors and mayors from both parties, business leaders and labor leaders.

Questions about Noblesville’s ‘betting-on-the-come’

The City of Noblesville in recent days has announced plans to build three speculative business buildings for yet to be found corporations wanting to locate in the city. The facilities are to be built in the far-southeastern part of the city at a cost of \$50 million, although the *Indianapolis Business Journal* said the cost will be more like \$70 million.

In the meantime, hopefully the city will remain focused on current needs such as completion of the State Road 37 upgrade, a bypass, downtown parking, riverfront development and an adequate new police headquarters.

Of spice & men

“Pumpkin pie, if rightly made, is a thing of beauty and a joy – while it lasts . . .” – Joseph Wood Krutch, naturalist

Do you want to make a pumpkin pie, she asks. She steals my heart in the simplest of ways. Yes. Yes, of course, I say. We shall get culinary together, she and I. Or so I think. She hands me her trusty recipe book (Horn of the Moon Cookbook: Recipes from Vermont’s Renowned Vegetarian Restaurant by Ginny Callan) and points me to her kitchen. She remains seated.

This is no “we” moment, I quickly learn. It’s a “me” moment, a test perhaps to demonstrate my worth. It’s just me and an empty nine-inch pie pan, my fear reflecting off its glass bottom. A weighty responsibility has been bestowed upon me, the making of, at moment’s notice, a pumpkin pie. I’m confident in the kitchen, but I don’t bake desserts.

I glance back to see if she’s joking, but she’s already lost to the laptop, as if Pie Making Man is as kitchen common as a whistling tea kettle. I’ve helped make pumpkin pies before, though she did the heavy lifting, dealing with the most difficult of the recipe steps, each involving eggs: separating, beating and folding.

During those times, I admired her grace when cracking an egg so that the pointed end opens like a hatch to catch the unbroken yolk that drops from the remaining rounded end, the yolk miraculously staying intact and captured while the whites ooze into the awaiting bowl. I, however, am brutish around eggs, a shell-cracking oaf. I am to eggs what Of Mice and Men’s Lennie Small is to small, furry animals, the crack of my eggshell as haphazard as the crack of a puppy’s neck. So, while she addressed the eggs, I did simpler things, like measure spices: 1 t. cinnamon; ½ t. ground ginger; 1/8 t. ground cloves (add to this ¼ t. salt).

But that was then. Now, it’s all my responsibility. While her fingers crack at the laptop keys, I consider her nonchalance to be a display of faith. I don’t want to let her down. I want her to know I’ve listened to her and learned from her. I also do not want to let the pumpkin pie down; one of the greatest letdowns in life is a bad pumpkin pie.

I hold off on the eggs. I need momentum. I pour the spices in a mixing bowl, along with a 15-ounce can

of pumpkin, ½ cup of half-and-half, and ½ cup of light sour cream. I add ¾ cup of honey, which catapults this pumpkin pie above all others, a hint of honey in each bite – hallelujah. The only thing missing before I do the mixing are the two dreaded yolks. Surprisingly, I go two for three, wasting only one egg, though neither separation occurs as prettily as when done by her gentle hands. I desperately use a forefinger to keep the yolk from plopping out like some detached, sunny eyeball into the puddle of leaked albumen.

I pour the yolks into the pumpkin mixture, stirring it all together until smooth. Then, based on her past directions, I use the electric hand mixer to turn the egg whites into a dreamy, creamy state. It amazes me how such a noisy, violent kitchen appliance creates such beauty in the end.

Gently, I pour the airy egg mixture atop the heavy pumpkin mixture, and with a rubber spatula, patiently, gently apply a down-across-up-and-over motion over and over until all evidence of white vanishes.

As the oven preheats to 425, I unroll a pie crust and form it into the glass pan, cut off the excess edges and then do what her mother once taught her: press my forefinger and middle finger onto the crust’s edge, keeping the fingers slightly apart; then I use my left hand’s forefinger to pull up the edge between the fingers’ gap, repeating this throughout the pie’s circumference, the dimples and raised edges providing an aesthetic appeal.

I pour the pie mixture into the shell and slide the pan into the oven. Fifteen minutes later, I reduce the heat to 350 degrees and bake 45 more minutes – a bit longer actually – until the pie browns, loses its jiggle and fills her house with pumpkin pie scent.

I have done it. I have made a pumpkin pie. Nothing has filled me with a greater sense of inner warmth than thoughts of pumpkin pie during the holiday season, nothing that is, until making this particular pumpkin pie that she has taught me to make, for us, for her, but without her for the first time.

It will taste best after overnight refrigeration, along with, as she recommends, “tons of whipped cream,” stealing my heart again in the simplest of ways, all for which I am most thankful.

pioneer farm settlement. It was founded in 1835 by free Blacks of mixed racial heritage who migrated mostly from North Carolina and Virginia to escape deteriorating racial conditions in the South. The majority of pioneers had the Roberts surname, but other families such as the Waldens, Winburns, Rices and Gilliams also made this migration over a period of 20 to 30 years in the mid-1800s. Their goals were the pursuit of economic, educational

and religious aspirations with greater freedom and fewer racial barriers. These goals were achieved through considerable hard work and the assistance of friendly and racially tolerant white neighbors of the Quaker and Wesleyan faiths living in the surrounding area. Today, set on a gently rolling landscape with many woods and small streams, such as Little Cicero Creek, are a chapel and cemetery. Learn more at roberts-settlement.org.

volunteers, schools, retirement homes, and organizations that serve individuals with disabilities. With the help of 38 volunteers, CCPR collected and sorted 1.5 pounds of uncleaned seed in 2019 and 2020 through 14 collection events. The sorted seeds were then redistributed by

Pollinator Partnership to areas in the Midwest needing habitat restoration. “This was a special project for CCPR,” Ramer said. “It not only benefits our parks, but it also affects many areas around the Midwest, making it a regional effort. This is only the beginning.”

Class 6A football state championship

Shamrocks fall just short to Trojans

INDIANAPOLIS - Westfield football coach Jake Gilbert didn't sugarcoat it after his team narrowly lost the Class 6A state championship game last Saturday night at Lucas Oil Stadium.

The Shamrocks went at defending state champion Center Grove and stayed with the Trojans for the entire game. Center Grove ultimately won 27-21, beating Westfield in the 6A final game for the second year in a row.

"This is a devastating loss," said Gilbert. "I know the average person's like, 'Oh, wow, you played Center Grove really well!' We came here to win. So we are devastated, but super proud of our kids."

In last year's 6A title game, the Trojans dominated, leading the 'Rocks 38-7 at halftime, and eventually winning 38-14. This year was different. Westfield not only showed it could compete with Center Grove, but came close to dethroning the Trojans, who completed a second straight 14-0 season with the victory.

In fact, the Shamrocks led at the end of the first quarter. Center Grove scored the first touchdown of the game, grinding its way down the field. Westfield pushed the Trojans to fourth down twice during the drive, but Tayven Jackson eventually punched it in from the one. Mario Chalmers blocked CG's extra-point try.

The Trojans held the 'Rocks to a three and out on their next drive, but Center Grove fumbled the next play. Chalmers recovered, and Westfield began a touchdown drive. The Shamrocks worked their way down to the CG 36, then Maximus Webster threw a 21-yard pass to Nic Depasquale. That put Westfield at the 15, and that was all Micah Hauser needed, as he rushed into the end zone from there. Caleb King made the extra-point kick. That would make the first-quarter score 7-6.

Center Grove answered with a long drive of its own,

absorbing a sack from Charles Dager to move the ball to the Shamrocks' two. Caden Curry ran the ball in for the touchdown, with Nolan Foley's extra-point kick good. Center Grove was back up 13-7.

Westfield struggled in its next drive, but recovered quickly and made its way to the end zone. The drive contained three big plays, starting with a 35-yard pass from Webster to Ian Bruch to get the ball into Trojans' territory. Webster then found an opening to make a 10-yard rush to the Center Grove 25, and Hauser took care of business from there with another run to the end zone. King again kicked the extra point, and the 'Rocks were back on top 14-13.

The Trojans answered with another drive, this one culminating with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Jackson to Harrison Stomps. Westfield made one last push, which included a 36-yard throw from Webster to Jackson Wasserstrom, but a field goal was no good, and the Trojans led 20-14 at halftime.

Center Grove got the ball to start the second half, and scored on its opening drive. Micah Coyle finished it with a five-yard run into the end zone, and another Foley kick put the Trojans up 27-14.

Westfield got the ball down to Center Grove's 40 before punting, but the Trojans fumbled the punt return and the 'Rocks recovered. Three plays later, Hauser punched it in from the one-yard line. King made his third kick of the game, and Westfield was within 27-21.

But that would be the last score of the championship. Center Grove tried to start a drive, but it ground to a halt after a Popeye Williams sack on third-and-11, which forced the Trojans to punt. Both teams then exchanged punts, which gave the Shamrocks the ball with 6:30 left.

Starting at its own 23, Westfield worked its way down the

Millers fall to LN, but give Wildcats a battle

NOBLESVILLE - The 2021-22 edition of the Noblesville boys basketball team proved something right away last Wednesday night: The Millers can play with anyone.

Noblesville didn't get an easy assignment for its opener, as it hosted Lawrence North, last season's Class 4A state runner-up. Despite getting down in the second period, the Millers came back and took the lead in the second half before the Wildcats made a late run and beat Noblesville 56-50.

Lawrence North was missing one of its star players, Indiana University commit CJ Gunn, but the Wildcats still had a formidable amount of talent, including some on the young side as well. Lawrence North jumped out to a 6-0 lead, with a freshman, Azavier Robinson scoring four of those points.

Millers junior Preston Roberts got his team on the board with a layin, and after that, Noblesville worked its way back to within 15-12 by the end of the first quarter. Senior E.J. Smith and junior Cooper Bean both scored five points, with Bean hit-

ting a 3-pointer and Smith making good on a traditional three-point play. Smith then opened the second quarter with a triple to tie the game at 15-15.

But the Wildcats dominated the remainder of the period, going on a 14-3 run to lead 29-18. Smith was the only Noblesville player to interrupt the run with another 3, and he did finish the half with a third 3-pointer, which kept the Millers within 29-21 at the break.

Scott McClelland, who made his debut as the Noblesville varsity head coach with this game, made the observation that the Millers were "consistently inconsistent."

"The good thing is, it's November," said McClelland. "But we got to start chipping that away and getting that cleaned up so we're not constantly doing the dips and the roller coaster. You saw that there were some good things."

The Millers did quite a few good things in the third quarter. Smith opened the second half with his fourth 3 of the game, then drained a pair of free throws. It was a personal 8-0 run, and it got

Noblesville within 29-26.

The Wildcats pushed their lead back up to 33-26 with back-to-back rebound baskets, but Noblesville answered with an 8-0 run. Bean made a layin, then scored off a Smith steal while being fouled, making the subsequent free throw.

A foul shot by sophomore Aaron Fine brought the Millers within 33-32. Then Smith made a steal that resulted in Fine getting fouled, and he hit both free throws. Noblesville had its first lead of the game at 34-33.

Two 3s from McCoyion Brown put LN up 39-36, but Bean threw in a triple to tie up the game at 39-39; which would be the third-quarter score. Bean put the Millers ahead twice during the early stages of the fourth quarter, with a 3 and a layin, the latter basket putting Noblesville up 44-43.

McClelland said Bean "played really, really well tonight." The coach said Bean "played inspired" and gave

the Millers "a spark off the bench."

"I thought he played his role outstanding," said McClelland. "He accepted his role and played it."

Brown drained his third 3-pointer of the game to push the Wildcats back up 46-44, but Fine tied the game with a putback. That would be all, however. Lawrence North then went on a 6-0 run, and held the lead from there.

McClelland said the Wildcats "out-toughed us," especially on the offensive rebounds late. "They just worked us early, and they really worked us in the fourth quarter on boards," he said.

Nevertheless, McClelland said there were things to be positive about as the Millers begin their season.

"We just got to clean up some stuff," said McClelland. "Right now our rebounding really hurt us, and then we missed some shots around the basket."

Roper's foul shot was the start of an 11-2 run for the Greyhounds. Valiente opened the second period with a 3. Mackenzie Thomas then made back-to-back layins to finish the run and get Carmel within 23-19.

But that would be as close as the 'Hounds would get. Ashlynn Shade scored her first points of the game with a jumper, then quickly threw in another basket while getting fouled, making the free throw for the three-point play. Brooklyn Ely finished the half with another 3, and Noblesville led 31-21 at the break.

"We just hit some big shots," said Millers coach Donna Buckley. "I thought we went through stretches where they cut it down, and then Kaitlyn hit several big shots. Ash came alive and hit some big shots. We just kept answering. And then they forced us to have to answer, because they kept coming at us and Thomas played really well. They had some kids step up. They made us have to really earn that win."

Thomas stepped up again

with back-to-back baskets early in the third quarter, cutting Noblesville's lead to 33-25. Shoemaker threw in her fifth 3 of the game, which Roper answered by making two free throws. Shoemaker responded with 3-pointer No. 6, then Shade scored off a steal. The Millers' lead stayed in double digits from that point forward.

Shade scored 10 points in the third, which ended with Noblesville ahead 49-33. Ava Carter made two 3s for Carmel during the fourth period, and Thomas' three-point play cut the Millers' advantage to 61-49 with 2:42 left.

"She's really put a lot of work into the off-season, a lot of work into her skill set," said 'Hounds coach Erin Trimpe. "She's an outside threat."

Trimpe noted that Thomas was looking to expand her role with the team. "In order to expand it, she worked her butt off to get there," said the coach. "So it's been fun to see."

Ava Shoemaker stepped up for Noblesville during the final minutes of the game, scoring six points and helping to seal

the game for the Millers.

"It's good for us," said Buckley. "We really honestly haven't had too many games where we've been challenged too much yet." Buckley noted that players like Tippner and Ava Shoemaker still have few varsity games under their belts.

"Those are two big pieces of the puzzle, so for them to have to handle some adversity, I think that's really good for our team, especially those young kids to see what does that look like and how do you answer when you're challenged," said Buckley.

Shade finished the game with 20 points, and reached double-double status with 10 rebounds, also getting eight assists and four steals. Kaitlyn Shoemaker's six 3-pointers gave her 18 points. Wilson finished with nine points and eight assists, while Tippner collected five rebounds.

Thomas had 17 points and five rebounds to lead Carmel, while Hannah Lach drained three 3s for nine points. Roper scored nine points, collected seven rebounds and dished out

need to be and just keep getting better. Our schedule's brutal. We're playing the best teams every single night and for us to get down and keep fighting back and have to make some adjustments on their end, I was just really impressed with

But Carmel came back. After taking a timeout with 13 seconds left, Mackenzie Thomas made a layin. The Greyhounds got the ball back, and Laura Valiente tied the game with a floater at the buzzer. On to overtime.

The Royals jumped ahead 64-57 with 2:09 remaining, but Carmel took over after that, finishing the game on an 11-3 run. Thomas played brilliantly during those minutes, scoring eight points, and it was her layin with seven seconds left that got Carmel in front for good. Ava Carter helped out with a 3-pointer right before Thomas' game-winner. Thomas led all scorers with 24 points.
