the best for those players and for them to be successful in life.”

Williams says the student has not reached out to him or offered an apology, but he is willing to have a conversation with the player to increase education.

Blackface became widely popular during the Civil War, often used by white performers to demean and dehumanize African Americans.

Angela Umphery says her Black son, a Center Grove student, was behind the player in the photo. She says as a single white mother, she’s been trying to find ways to have conversations with her son about race.

“We need to talk more about this,” Umphery said. “Somebody needs to educate the kids. They need to talk to them because this is serious.”

Umphery says the student seen in blackface should be disciplined but she doesn’t believe he should be kicked off the football team. She says she is mostly disappointed with adults who were there at the time the photo was taken and those who took to social media to express their opinions.

“My heart was really broke to see what people were saying against other families, against kids,” Umphery said. “No adult should ever threaten a child.”

As for Williams, he says he won’t let the situation keep him from moving forward. “To my fellow Black brothers, just keep your head up. Live every day with a passion (and) thrive to be great.”

know that it stands with Popeye Williams, his family, our families of color, and anyone else impacted by the blackface photos.

“It is unfortunate that the recent media coverage has nothing to do with the great football that was played on the field,” said Dr. Paul A. Kaiser, superintendent of Westfield Washington Schools. “Instead, the lasting image is of a player in blackface, mocking a Westfield community member. We’ve been in constant contact with Popeye, his family and other people who may have been impacted to support in any way they need. We want all Westfield families who may have been impacted by that act of racial bias to know that we stand with you and support you as well.”

Alicia Denniston, principal of Westfield High School, also extended her support and commitment to students’ inclusion.

“We stand in support of Popeye and the Williams family as they process and face this act of racial discrimination,” Denniston said. “While we know that people make mistakes, we hope we can all use this opportunity to learn from our actions. WHS remains committed to standing up against racial discrimination, supporting our students of color, and promoting diversity and inclusion efforts in our school and community.”

Everyone plays a part in bringing an end to racism and we can only accomplish that by working together. Westfield Washington Schools remains committed to making sure all of our students and families feel safe, seen and valued. We cannot let actions like this go unnoticed and we are confident that Center Grove High School will take appropriate action with regards to their investigation.

By the time first-year basketball tryouts came around, Roland was ready and easily made the junior varsity team, much to the surprise of all except Roland himself. He made the varsity team thereafter each year and made quite a name for himself. Now here we are in 2021, 69 years later,

and he is getting inducted into the Hamilton County Basketball Hall of Fame. Quite an accomplishment for a Sheridan youngster who would not be deterred by a junior high school coach telling him he was not good enough to make the team.

I have been honored to serve two terms as Noblesville Township Trustee and one term as a township board member. It has been a pleasure to work with my excellent staff and township board members Peggy Pfister, Joe Arrowood, and John Davis.

We have accomplished a lot during my time in office. We have increased the level of financial assistance for Noblesville residents and established new programs for families in need, the homeless, and qualifying inmates being released from the Hamilton County Jail.

Our office is actively involved with the Noblesville Police and Fire Departments in seeking help for the drug-addicted and those who suffer from mental illness. We have provided an opportunity for some of our residents to find a way out of these very serious societal problems.

These efforts have been very beneficial to many who have taken advantage of the help offered and rewarding to all of us who work at the

Trustee Office.

During my time in office, we have consistently lowered your tax rate and have lowered the general property tax levy two times. Our tax levy for 2022 is \$205,000 less than it was in 2021. We were able to do this in part because of federal COVID funding for rent and utilities. The bottom line is that my proposed property tax levy has been kept low while providing more services to residents in need. This has been accomplished with the support of the Noblesville Township Board.

The Hamilton County Health Department held a town hall on Tuesday to help answer many of the common questions parents have about getting their kids vaccinated against COVID-19.

Dr. Christopher Belcher, a pediatric infectious disease specialist at Ascension Medical Group in Carmel, Dr. Evan Kreutzer, a board-certified pediatrician at Ascension Medical Group, and Dr. Shobana Pandian, a pediatrician at Community Health Network in Fishers, led the discussion and were available to help answer questions.

parents may feel surrounding the pandemic and the COVID vaccine," Dr. Pandian said. "But I had my kids vaccinated and feel strongly it's in our kids' best interests to do so."

Drs. Belcher, Kreutzer, and Pandian discussed the difference between the pediatric and adult doses of the Pfizer vaccine, the potential side effects of the vaccine, and efficacy of the vaccine versus natural immunity. They also spent time answering any questions participants had.

"There's a lot of bad information out there, we're here to set the record straight," Dr. Belcher said. "As someone who has treated kids gravely ill with COVID-19, I'm here to assure you that the benefits of the vaccine far outweigh the risks associated with contracting the virus."

Shamrocks cruise to season-opening win

**WESTFIELD** - The Westfield boys basketball team has been ready to go for a while now, and the Shamrocks proved it on Tuesday when they finally got to play their first game of the season.

Westfield, ranked No. 7 in the Class 4A Associated Press poll and No. 6 in the IBCA one-class poll, cruised past Pendleton Heights 71-36 at its own CSI Gymnasium. The 'Rocks scored the first seven points of the game and never looked back, leading by 20 points by the second quarter.

"We were just anxious to play somebody," said Westfield coach Shane Sumpter. "We were tired of playing, practicing against each other. It's nice to get a game under our belts, especially before Friday night, Zionsville, big game. I thought our guys played well. We played hard and that's what is expected of our guys here at Westfield. Good effort, good opening game."

The first points of the season went to senior Braden Smith. The Purdue commit got the 'Rocks on the board with a 3-pointer. Fellow senior Kai Butterworth was next, as he scored on a layin, then hit two free throws.

The Arabians scored a layin for their first points, but Westfield skipped off on a 19-4 run that led to a 26-6 lead early in the second quarter. Trey Buchanan helped out with two 3s, and Cam Haffner finished the first quarter with a triple. The Shamrocks led 20-6 at the end of the period, and Smith began the second by scoring off a Haffner steal. Jonah Spinner added a putback, and Smith scored on a floater.

"Anytime you can have some balanced scoring, a balanced attack, that's good," said Sumpter.

Westfield led 34-16 at halftime. The balance continued into the third period, as junior Alex Romack scored all seven of his points in that quarter. Haffner threw in two more 3s, and Sam Bishop finished the period with his own 3-pointer, putting the Shamrocks up 55-27.

"He's just a winner," said Sumpter of Dorton. "I say that to everybody. Plays hard, just a gritty kid. tough, hard-nosed kid."

Smith and Haffner each scored 17 points, while Butterworth added 12 points. Romack led the rebounds with eight, followed by Smith, Dorton and Butterworth with six rebounds each.

Smith and Haffner both dished out five assists. Haffner made four 3-pointers.

"I thought Kai played a great game," said Sumpter. "He had a lot of offensive rebounds and took the ball to the glass hard. He did a lot of good things for us. We're going to need him. We're going to need all these guys."

Westfield hosts Zionsville on Friday to begin Hoosier Crossroads Conference play.

# Tony Etchison, Doug Mitchell to be inducted into Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame

Two Hamilton County basketball legends are among the 17 members of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's 2022 Men's Induction Class, which was announced Tuesday by the organization's Board of Directors.

Tony Etchison, a 1991 graduate of Noblesville and Doug Mitchell, a 1975 Hamilton Heights graduate who was a long-time coach at North Central, will both be honored along with the other inductees at the 60th Men's Awards Banquet on Wednesday, March 23, 2022. The day's events will include a reception at the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame museum in New Castle that afternoon with a banquet that evening at the Primo Banquet Hall in Indianapolis.

Etchison was a four-year varsity starter at Noblesville High School, where he scored 1,357 career points and led Noblesville to three consecutive sectional titles in 1989, 1990 and 1991. He was named all-county four years, all-sectional and all-regional three years, all-conference, all-Indianapolis Metro and was the 1990 and 1991 Hamilton County Player of the Year. Etchison averaged 22.8 points, five rebounds and four assists per game as a senior. On scholarship at Mercer University, he was a two-year starter earning all-academic honors four years and led the TransAmerican Conference in three-point shooting. He died in 2019 at the age of 47.

Mitchell established North Central as a state power. In 25 seasons leading the Panthers, his teams won 428 games (71 percent) and a pair of IHSAA 4A championships while coaching nine Indiana All-Stars and four All-Americans. Leading the North Central program from 1992-2018, Mitchell's teams claimed four MIC conference titles, four Marion County Tournament championships, won 11 sectionals, four regionals, and three semi-states, claiming 1999 and 2010 4A championships and 2007 4A state runner-up. He coached four Indiana Mr. Basketball winners (Jason Gardner, AJ Ratliff, Eric Gordon and Kris Wilkes) each who were recognized as McDonald's All-Americans. Mitchell was an assistant coach in the 2003 McDonald's All-American game, an assistant for USA Basketball multiple times and head coach of the 2008 Gold Medal USA Basketball Junior National Team. Prior to his coaching success, he was a standout as a player at Hamilton Heights, where he totaled 1,167 career points, was the 1975 Hamilton County Player of the Year and led the Huskies to a 1975 sectional championship, the first for the school in 35 years. A scholarship player at Butler University, he received the Hilton U. Brown Mental Attitude as a senior in 1979. He resides in Fishers.

Westfield High School graduate Chris Denari was inducted into the Hamilton County Basketball Hall of Fame on Tuesday, prior to the Shamrocks' varsity boys basketball game with Pendleton Heights.

Denari, a 1979 Westfield graduate, played for his father, Coach Bob Denari and was an outstanding player for the Shamrocks. He was twice named to the All-Rangeline Conference team, and was also named to the Noblesville Daily Ledger's All-County team. Denari was also selected to the Academic All-State team by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association. He averaged 14.9 points per game his senior year and held the Westfield free-throw record at 88.6 percent.

"It means a lot," said Denari. "I grew up the son of a coach and I had the great fortune to play for my dad, and so it's a special honor. When Dave (Nicholson) called me, it meant a lot. I only wish my dad was here to see it, but my mom is here. It's really neat. Hamilton County has produced so many outstanding basketball players. It's just a real thrill to be a part of it."

Denari attended Wabash College, where was a two-year letter winner and was inducted into the Wabash College Hall of Fame in 2013.

Denari has been the television play-by-play announcer for the Indiana Pacers for the past 16 years, and also called games for the Indiana Fever and Butler University men's basketball team for 17 years. He announced games for the University of Indianapolis men's basketball team for three years and has served as the radio and television play-by-play announcer for several IHSAA state basketball championships. Denari is a member of the Indiana Sportswriters and Sports-casters Association Hall of Fame and was named the organization's Broadcaster of the Year in 2004.
