Gearing up for Hamilton County winter weather

Hamilton County Councilors Steve Schwartz, Sue Maki and Ken Alexander visited the Hamilton County Highway Department on Tuesday as part of their monthly Highway Department Committee meeting. The purpose of their visit was to ensure the department has everything they need as winter approaches and we are moving closer to snow season.

"When we get to this time of year, we always make sure the highway department has everything they need," Schwartz told The Reporter. "They provide us with a checklist. Of course, they are the experts, not us. We are the funding body, but we always like to ensure they have everything they need going into snowplow season."

According to Schwartz, if there is a snow emergency the Highway Department will typically contact the commissioners if they need assistance. "Of course, if they need additional funding the commissioners would get ahold of the council and we would provide special funding if there are special needs," Schwartz said. to the level of preparation done each year, he has never needed to approve special funding during his tenure.





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

Zen is open for lunch and dinner seven days a week. They have a full list of appetizers, with egg rolls, edamame, chicken, and several salads. They also feature quite a few vegetarian and vegan selections and even have nuggets, fried rice, and fries on their "kitchen" menu for the children or unadventurous

My date and I split the Spicy Tonkotsu Ramen Bowl. Pork bone broth, chaoshu, two boiled eggs, red ginger, wood ear mushroom, corn, bamboo shoots, scallions, spicy paste and two slices of pork. As you can see by the picture, it is a work of art. So fresh, flavorful and the broth so full of depth and taste, I was literally blown away. Even though it was billed as "spicy" I did not find it overwhelming, and it was definitely just perfect for my date's palate.

Next, we partook in the Zen Special Roll made with Shrimp Tempura, spicy tuna, cream cheese and topped with avoca-

gave a great little crunch to the delicious soy sauce. and savory roll, and everything had perfect flavor, texture, and visual appeal.

Then we REALLY got cooking and heated things up! A foil package came to our table and the owner lit it ON fire in front of us. It cooked, smoked, and burned out right in front of us. The smoke smelled delicious and lent the dish a terrific, never-before-tasted-by-me smoky flavor. The Flaming (literally) Hot Roll: Cream cheese, asparagus, shrimp tempura, topped with avocado, cooked shrimp, Japanese mayo, smoked over fire. This one is a must-have and I believe very unique to this restaurant. This will wow the table, your date, and your taste buds!

Last on our list (and where my date taught me how to properly use chopsticks) was the Zen Sashimi Lover Platter with 15 Pieces Sashimi (salmon, yellowtail, white tuna, tuna, and shrimp) and some Dragon Rolls. Just look at those colors and freshness! And my favorite part ... the lemon do and fried onion and sweet mayo. Yum, made into a snail! How cute! Everything yum, yum is all I can say. The fried onion is served with fresh ginger, wasabi, and

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

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Mendez makes the game winner . . .

Millers escape HSE, stay unbeaten

By RICHIE HALL FISHERS - The Noblesville girls basketball team was going crazy Wednesday night as the Millers' game at Hamilton Southeastern was right at the end.

The only Noblesville player who was staying calm was Dani Mendez. The irony is that Mendez was the reason everyone was going crazy, although it was a good reason: Mendez had just made the game-winning layin for Noblesville, allowing the Class 4A No. 1 Millers to escape the Royals' gym with a 66-64 victory, keeping them unbeaten for the year at 8-0 overall, 3-0 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

Yet even in all the excitement, Mendez still in game mode. She thought there was still time on the clock.

"Everything was going on, I didn't know what to do," said Mendez. "Just thought there were seconds left and getting back on defense."

The many fans who were at the game would understand. The Millers-Royals game was a dramatic one, with Southeastern taking big leads in the first and fourth quarters, and Noblesville coming back both times. There was also a ton of energy at the gym, as the Royals were honoring retired coach Chris Huppenthal, who had been the Southeastern coach for the past 16 years, compiling a 282-86 record for the Royals, and winning the 2019 Class 4A state championship.

With all that going on, Millers coach Donna Buckley knew HSE would be fired up.

"I thought they'd come out hot," said Buckley. But Noblesville was able to handle it, coming back from 60-49 down with five minutes left in the fourth quar-

"We showed so much toughness tonight," said Buckley. "Just incredible toughness to get that win."

Southeastern had built its 11-point lead after freshman Maya Makalusky hit back-to-back 3-pointers. The Millers responded with a quick 10-0 run to get within 60-59. Freshman Meredith Tippner started the comeback with a triple and a free throw, then Ashlynn Shade hit a jumper. Mendez made a layin, then Tippner drained two more foul shots.

A basket by Riley Makalusky got the Royals back up 62-59, but Noblesville's Brooklyn Ely tied it up with a 3. Shade then gave the Millers a lead with a layin, but Riley Makalusky matched that with a jumper.

So, the score was now 64-64. After a succession of timeouts, Noblesville had the ball with 3.8 seconds left. Tippner inbounded the ball to Shade, who rushed up the court and sent it to Mendez under the basket. Mendez made the easy layin, and the Millers had the win.

"We wanted to hit Ashlynn on the move, knowing that they would have to draw some defenders over," said Buckley. "We had Dani at the 3-point line, just told her to dive. I had Beely (Brooklyn Ely) in the corner in case they helped off, because I felt like either one of those kids were going to have a chance to make a play if they helped off Dani. Credit Ash. That's hard to do when you're the best player in the gym to make that pass and to trust, and she did that. And then Dani to just make that play. She made a couple huge plays for us down the stretch, so really proud of her and proud of everybody

executing on that last play."

Mendez said that she was just thinking about the play that was drawn up, then "just to take the shot and make it." Mendez remembered the last time she hit a game-winner: It was in middle school, during a game with Fishers.

Noblesville's comeback was a big one, especially since the Millers were down by double digits twice in the game. Southeastern got off to a spectacular start, leading 12-2 midway through the first quarter. Riley Makalusky had eight points by that time. Olivia Brown scored the game's first basket off a steal, and she would be brilliant on defense all game long, getting seven steals on the night.

Noblesville got back to within 17-10 before a quick 6-0 run by HSE gave the Royals their largest lead of the game at 23-10. Maya Makalusky hit a 3, then Brown scored off a steal again, this time while getting fouled. She made the ensuing free throw for the traditional threepoint play.

"I loved the energy the girls played with, especially the way we came out," said Royals coach Brian Satterfield. "Got a great start."

The Millers began to close the gap, and were within 23-15 by the end of the first quarter. Noblesville then tied things up at 28-28 with a 3 from Kaitlyn Shoemaker and a putback from Shade. But Maya Makalusky was there with another triple, and the Royals led 31-28.

The Millers used a 6-0 run to get their first lead of the game at 37-36 with seconds left in the first half. Shade put Noblesville in front by making a steal, then rebounding her own miss and getting the putback. Southeastern would have the halftime lead, though, as Lauren Stewart nailed a 3 to give her team a 39-37 lead.

In the third quarter, the Millers got

Pacers drop another tough one to Atlanta

The Pacers gave a red-hot Atlanta Hawks team all they could handle at Gainbridge Fieldhouse. However, when the final whistle sounded, Indiana found itself in an all-too-familiar position.

The Blue & Gold (9-15) dropped another heartbreaker, 114-111, to the Hawks (12-10) in the first game of their six-game homestand.

With 30.5 seconds remaining and the Pacers trailing 112-108, Jeremy Lamb drilled a tough fadeaway three on a second-chance opportunity to close the gap to one. On the Hawks' ensuing possession, Young mishandled the ball, and Chris Duarte scooped it up.

Duarte sprinted down the court for a layup, appearing to draw contact from Kevin Huerter while rising. Unfortunately, the ball kicked off the front of the rim and back into the hands of Young. The star guard then sank two free throws with just 1.2 seconds left, and Malcolm Brogdon's halfcourt heave narrowly bounced off the rim. Five Pacers finished in double figures on the night. Brogdon led the way with 27 on 10-of-20 shooting, six rebounds, and nine assists. Domantas Sabonis tallied a double-double with 22 points and unanswered. 10 rebounds, while Myles Turner added 17, nine rebounds, and two blocks. Young led everyone with 33. Indiana trailed 65-57 at halftime before battling back in the third to bring a lead into the fourth.

The 38 points were a season-high for a Pacers opponent in the first quarter.

The Pacers' bench helped close the deficit to 43-42 over the early minutes of

the second. Brad Wanamaker started the frame with a three-point play, and Jeremy Lamb tallied six over the first 4:07 to counter the Hawks' attack. At the 5:45 mark, Oshae Brissett's triple on a second-chance opportunity finally tied the score at 47 apiece.

Later, with the score tied at 53, the Hawks used the three ball once again to create some separation for the break. Huerter and John Collins knocked in treys as part of a 10-2 spree that grabbed a 63-55 Hawks lead with 1:04 to play.
