



Gearing up for Hamilton County winter weather

Hamilton County Councilors Steve Schwartz, Sue Maki and Ken Alexander visited the Hamilton County Highway Department on Nov. 30 as part of their monthly Highway Department Committee meeting. The purpose of their visit was to ensure the department has everything they need as winter approaches and we are moving closer to snow season.

“When we get to this time of year, we always make sure the highway department has everything they need,” Schwartz told The Reporter. “They provide us with a checklist. Of course, they are the experts, not us. We are the funding body, but we always like to ensure they have everything they need going into snowplow season.”

According to Schwartz, if there is a snow emergency the Highway Department will typically contact the commissioners if they need assistance.

“Of course, if they need additional funding the commissioners would get ahold of the council and we would provide special funding if there are special needs,” Schwartz said. Schwartz also noted that due to the level of preparation done each year, he has never needed to approve special funding during his tenure.

The Hamilton County Highway Department maintains 14 large snow trucks, two large brine application trucks, along with nine pickup trucks to cover approximately 1,200 lane miles of roads in the county.

The department has a more than adequate amount of pre-treated salt on hand going into the winter. Salt is pretreated with magnesium chloride to increase its effectiveness. Hamilton County has 6,500 tons of pretreated salt under contract for refilling the highway department’s inventory as salt is used.

According to Cargill, who

supplies salt for Hamilton supply chain issues for winter County, there should be no delivery.

Fishers to launch free autonomous shuttle service

Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC) and the City of Fishers have joined with May Mobility, a leader in autonomous vehicle (AV) technology and shuttle operations, to inaugurate a free, public autonomous shuttle service on Dec. 20 to serve the area surrounding the Nickel Plate Cultural District in Fishers.

The AV shuttle service is part of the Together in Motion Indiana initiative announced earlier this year by TMF and ESN that previously provided a similar autonomous shuttle service in downtown Indianapolis for six months.

May Mobility will manage a fleet of autonomous, shared vehicles that will operate along a three-mile fixed-route loop with nine designated stops to service the live, work, and play districts of downtown Fishers. The hop-on, hop-off service connects the residential area at Pullman Pointe and South Pointe Village apartments to the commercial district along Commercial Drive and Fishers Corner Boulevard, Municipal Drive and 116th Street, including a stop along the new Nickel Plate Trail.

“With our commitment to innovation, technology, and entrepreneurship, it was a natural fit for Fishers to serve as the first suburban site for May Mobility’s autonomous vehicle fleet,” said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. “Our Nickel Plate Cultural District is the perfect test site for this technology as our partners identify the nuances of a suburban environment for autonomous technology.”

Noblesville Schools unveils Duke Energy Community Room

Noblesville Schools announced last Thursday the naming of the Duke Energy Community Room, located in the new Noblesville Schools Community Center.

Duke Energy is supporting the 7,500 square-foot multi-purpose room, and the school and community members it serves, through a \$22,500 investment over the next three years.

The space, designed for community meetings, practices and receptions, is equipped with hard

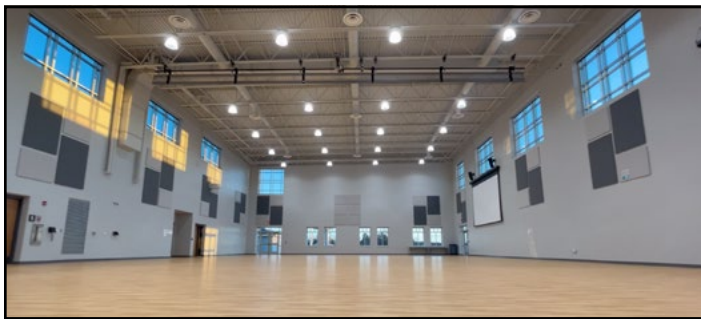

The Reporter spoke to Open Doors Christmas Toy Coordinator LeAnne Zentz about the organization’s work throughout the year and how you can help

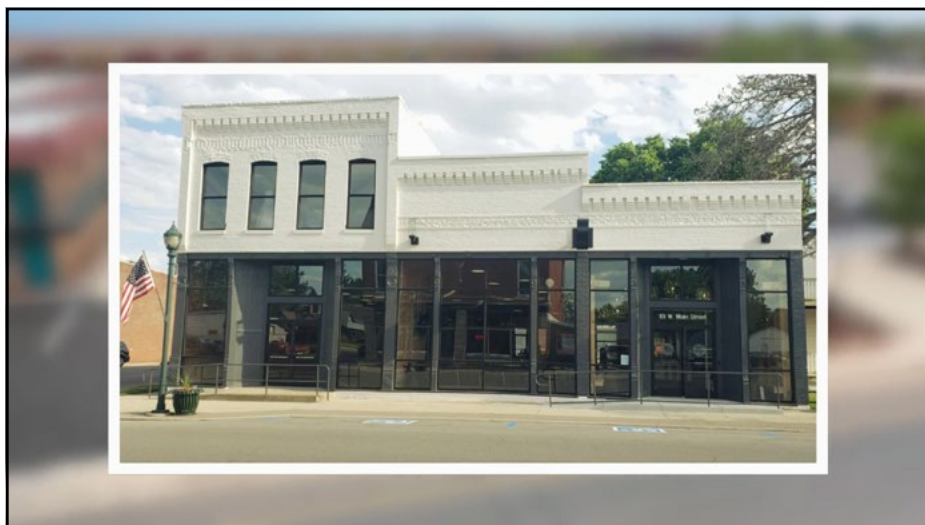

White Christmas comes to Westfield

Seats are selling fast, so get your tickets before they’re all gone

If you are dreaming of a white Christmas, Main Street Productions has you covered. The timeless musical classic *White Christmas* is hitting the stage from Dec. 9 through 19 at Westfield Playhouse, 220 N. Union St., for just eight shows, all of which are selling out fast.

The Reporter spoke to Director Andrea Odle about the years-long road to bring this show to local audiences.

“This was scheduled to be up in 2020,” Odle told The Reporter. “I submitted this show to the board almost two and a half years ago. Everything got put on hold for COVID, but now it’s back, so it’s good!”

When asked why she wanted to direct this show, she said it’s all about the name.

“Honestly it is the name,” Odle said. “It’s a big draw and in a brand-new building it’s fantastic. It is probably my favorite Christmas movie of all time. The fact that I can take my favorite Christmas movie and put it on stage is kind of magical.”

This is Odle’s fifth time directing in a stage career than spans decades.

For this show, she said she has the best choreographer she has ever worked with, and a huge cast.

“We have a cast of 21 and we have a crew of 15,”

Odle said. “It is a lot. It is like herding cats a little bit, but honestly, I have an AD [Assistant Director] who keeps track of everyone, which is nice. My stage manager has been doing this for probably longer than I have. She herds all the cats backstage and I herd them all up front, so it’s good.”

Odle said the casting was hard given the pandemic, but she is exceptionally pleased with everyone involved in this production.

“The cast has been together for a long time and a couple of the crew have been here, but as a whole they were together for the first time as a crew for rehearsal Monday night [Nov. 30] and they were rock stars,” Odle told The Reporter. “It was uninterrupted; it was beautiful.”

The cast has been rehearsing in masks until just last week, and they will be unmasked on stage. Due to COVID-19 protocols, the

audience will have to wear masks during the entire performance.

The show is playing four nights each week for only two weeks. Thursday, Friday and Saturday shows are at 7:30 p.m. and both Sunday shows are at 2:30 p.m.

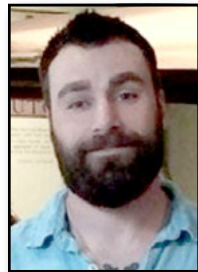

Apparently, I had given my current wife my ex-wife’s name. I had pushed the proverbial fool button. A life-and-death scenario was at hand. 2. Chapter 34, Section 34.22 shall be amended to include two new Sections and titled as follows:
(E) Town Labor Rates:
Manual Labor (not otherwise listed) \$75.00/Hour /Employee
Sewer Camera \$ 100.00/Hour
Tool Truck \$75.00/Hour
Dump Truck \$ 100.00/Hour
Surface Restoration Equipment \$100.00/Hour
Backhoe \$125.00/Hour
All labor rates above are billed in 15-minute intervals, rounded up.
(F) Payment of Fees: The payment for equipment rates listed in (E) above shall be made payable to the Town of Atlanta within 30 days after services are provided.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 51 OF TITLE V OF THE ATLANTA CODE OF ORDINANCES REGULATING THE SEWERS
WHEREAS, the Town of Atlanta, Indiana (Town) operates a Sewage Works utility for the benefit of the Town's citizens and the surrounding area;
WHEREAS, the Town has adopted various ordinances regarding the policies and procedures for the Sewage Works and the establishment of sewage rates, fees and charges;
WHEREAS, the existing rates, fees and charges are set forth in the Town of Atlanta, Indiana Code of Ordinances §51.69;
WHEREAS, pursuant to Ind. Code §8-1.5-3-8, the Sewage works fees and charges must be sufficient to pay necessary expenses incident to the operation of the utility, provide a sinking fund, provide a debt service reserve for bonds or other obligations, provide adequate money for working capital, provide adequate money for making extensions and replacements;
WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Town Council that the existing fees are inadequate to fund the Sewage Works utility, and therefore should be amended and modified as provided for in this Ordinance;
WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Atlanta finds it necessary and in the best interest of its residents to implement an ordinance regulating the connection to the Sewage Works system owned and operated by the Town of Atlanta; and
WHEREAS, the Town incurs expense related to each new customer who connects to the Sewage Works system such that the Town Council has determined that all new customers who require connection to the Town's Sewage Works system must cover the costs thereof.
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF ATLANTA, INDIANA, THAT:
1. The foregoing Recitals are fully incorporated herein by this reference.
2. Chapter 51, Section 51.31 (A) shall be amended as follows:
§51.31 (A)
(A) Building Sewer Permit. There shall be two classes of building sewer permits: for residential service, and for service to establishments producing industrial waste. In either case, the owner or his or her agent shall make application on a special form furnished by the Town. The permit applications shall be supplemented by any plans, specifications, or other information considered pertinent in the judgment of the inspector.
3. Chapter 51, Section 51.47 shall be amended as follows:
§51.47 Installation and maintenance; Responsibility.
The Customer shall install and maintain at Customer's expense that portion of the service from the main to Customer's premises.
4. Chapter 51, Section 51.48 (C) shall be amended as follows:
§51.48(C) In the event that the Town excavates and plugs a private sewer to disable its use due to non-payment, this cost shall be paid by the customer at the rates approved and updated in §34.22 plus the cost of any material utilized by the town. If the customer desires to reconnect, in addition to any past due bills, and reconnection fee, the customer must pay for all labor, equipment and material costs relating to the physical reconnection plus a turn-on charge in the sum of \$35.00.
5. Chapter 51, Section 51.69 (A) and (B) shall be amended as follows:
§ 51.69.
(A) The Town will charge the rates as outlined in §34.22 for the services of municipal employees in performing sewer hookups.
(B) All sewer hookups shall be at the expense of the customer in accordance with §51.31(B). In no event shall the agreement between customer and their contractor be considered a public works contract within the meaning of state law. The town utility employees may assist with performing the physical connection to the public sewer main as much as is practical, as part of their regular duties, if deemed reasonable by Utility Superintendent. Upon completion, the Utility Superintendent shall inspect all hookups upon completion prior to filing the sewer line and after final grade is completed (including the replacement of any surface improvements).
(E) The prospective customer shall be responsible for town's actual costs associated with Tapping into the Sewage System which shall include, but not limited to, the costs associated the following:
(1) Tapping a trunk line or lateral sewer;
(2) Constructing connective spurs for sewer;
(3) Pavement reconstruction or other costs in connection with a connective spur; and,
(4) Fees for inspection.

Ordinance No. 2021-10-02
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 50 OF TITLE V OF THE ATLANTA CODE OF ORDINANCES REGULATING THE WATER UTILITY
WHEREAS, the Town of Atlanta, Indiana (Town) operates a waterworks utility for the benefit of the Town's citizens and the surrounding area;
WHEREAS, the Town has adopted various ordinances regarding the policies and procedures for the waterworks and the establishment of water rates, fees and charges;
WHEREAS, the existing rates, fees and charges are set forth in the Town of Atlanta, Indiana Code of Ordinances §50.02(D);
WHEREAS, pursuant to Ind. Code §8-1.5-3-8, the waterworks fees and charges must be sufficient to pay necessary expenses incident to the operation of the utility, provide a sinking fund, provide a debt service reserve for bonds or other obligations, provide adequate money for working capital, provide adequate money for making extensions and replacements;
WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Town Council that the existing rates are inadequate to fund the waterworks utility, and therefore should be amended and modified as provided for in this Ordinance;
WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Atlanta finds it necessary and in the best interest of its residents to implement an ordinance regulating the connection to the waterworks system owned and operated by the Town of Atlanta; and
WHEREAS, the Town incurs expense related to each new customer who connects to the waterworks system such that the Town Council has determined that all new customers who require connection to the Town's waterworks system must cover the costs thereof.
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF ATLANTA, INDIANA, THAT:
1. The foregoing Recitals are fully incorporated herein by this reference.
2. Chapter 50, Section 50.02 (D) shall be deleted in its entirety.
3. Nine new Sections, in Chapter 50 shall be added and titled Follows:
§ 50.03 - Connection with water main; permit.
a. When any person desires to connect with any water main in the Town, he shall first obtain a written permit from the Utility Superintendent to do so. The permit will state the number of the lot, block and street number where the connection is to be made, the size of the connection and the proposed plumber who will complete the installation.
b. The permit shall be filed with the superintendent of the water works of the Town at least 7 days prior to the time of such connection. The superintendent shall keep a record of all such permits and connections in a book to be kept for that purpose.
§50.04 Protection of Water Meters, curb stop
It is unlawful for any person, not an employee of the Town water department or a plumber pre-approved by the town, to use, handle, molest, interfere with, or disturb any meter or any curb stop of the Town water department within the Town, or any street valve or appliance connected therewith or belonging thereto, or to turn on or to turn off water at the same time or by means thereof. In the event of a leak, persons must call the Town Hall during business hours, or contact Hamilton County Dispatch after business hours for a Town representative to turn off the water service.
§50.05 Charges for Connecting to Town Water System
Persons seeking connection to the Town Water System, fixing an incorrectly installed tap, or completing an incomplete installation will be charged the Availability Fee in addition to the actual costs of installation incurred by the Town to include but not be limited to the labor and resources needed to complete the installation and remediation of the surrounding substrate, grade or finish.
§50.06 Service
a. Until a contract for water service has been executed and a meter has been installed, water will not be turned on at any premises by anyone but a Town water utility employee or authorized representative.
b. There will be a charge of \$500.00 per day or each unauthorized water use either from a service line or fire hydrant.
c. In order to prevent possible damage from leaks, a representative of the owner must be on hand at the premises before water will be turned on by Town personnel. When additional visits must be made to turn on the service due to a leak not the fault of the Town, an additional service fee of \$35.00 will be charged.
d. Conditions for new municipal service water connection.
1. Prior to the closing of the sale of any premises within the Town and the title to the premises being transferred (as a result of a sale, gift, inheritance, etc.), and the premises have been, are being or are to be supplied with water service by the Town's water utility, any existing water service shall be discontinued and/or any municipal service water connection shall not be connected to the Town's public water system, as the case may be, until such time as:
i. A contract for water service has been executed by each User occupying or intending to occupy each apartment, dwelling or business space within the premises;
ii. Each User has paid the then-applicable water meter deposit to the Town's water utility; and
iii. One of the following:
1. If the premises is a multi-unit dwelling or business space, the number of permitted units within the premises is modified so that each unit complies with the requirement of subsections [2.a.—2.d.], below. For example, a three-unit premises may be converted to a two-unit premises; or
2. Each apartment, dwelling or business space within the premises shall have:
a. Separate, private water service lines installed at the expense of owner, if, as determined by the Town's water utility superintendent, the existing or proposed water service line is not of a size sufficient to adequately serve the multiple units;
b. Shut off valves installed for each unit at the expense of the owner, which shall be located so as to be readily accessible to water utility employees for the purpose of discontinuing or terminating water service;
c. Necessary plumbing is performed at the expense of the owner to accommodate and allow the installation of a separate water meter for each unit; and
d. Separate water meters are provided and installed by the Town's water utility at the customers expense.
a. A new service line on private property serving a single residence must be a minimum of ¾ inch in diameter and the pipe material must be as specified in the Standard Specifications of the Town and the construction cost thereof shall be borne by the customer. Charges for installing the service line within the public right-of-way shall also be borne by the customer. Upon approval of the User's choice of construction contractor by the Town, the User may arrange for the construction of the service line within the public right-of-way.
b. Connections within the public right-of-way must be adequately sized and cannot be made unless approved by the Town.
c. Each service line extending from the water main to the meter location shall be installed perpendicular to the water main. (Service lines must not be placed under driveways or other large paved areas to prevent freezing.) For service lines three inches and larger, a valve shall be installed immediately adjacent to the main. A hot tap shall be used for all taps larger than two inches in diameter.
d. The Town reserves the right to locate the curb stop:
a. Between the curb and the sidewalk;
b. On the customer's side of the meter pit; or
c. On the property line;
Whichever, in the judgment of the Town, will provide the most protection.
e. The customer shall, at his own expense, install and maintain the service pipe on private property beginning at the curb stop or meter pit.
f. Any person responsible for disturbing or damaging water services or valve boxes, once the services have been properly installed, is responsible for the cost of repairs.
§50.08 - Metering.
1. Typical service installation requires a meter pit. The meter pit should be located on the Town's property, near the property line; however, in the event no suitable location is available on the Town's property at the discretion of the Town, the meter pit may be located on the Customer's Property. Installation close to the property line, or on Town property will eliminate the need for a curb stop. The Customer is responsible for the maintenance and future replacement of the water line and equipment from the "Meter 90" to the building. Barring Customer's negligent destruction of the waterline, the Town will cover the costs associated with the repair and replacement of equipment from the water main to the meter.
2. In the event the Town determines that a meter pit is not suitable, the customer shall provide for this purpose, free of expense to the Town, a suitable area near the service line entrance to the premises either in the basement, or in a location which is approved by the Town before installation. Residential meters shall be installed three feet to three feet six inches above the floor and as shown in the Standard Specifications of the Town. The customer shall provide and install approved full-port ball valves on the inlet and outlet sides of the meter.
3. The customer shall provide and maintain suitable means of access to the meter with no obstructions of any kind within three feet of the meter. In the event a meter is installed in a building, a remote reader antenna will be installed on the outside of the building. In addition to this, a curb stop will also be installed to allow for Town to shut off the service for non-payment, or at property owner request at the customer's expense. The Customer shall be responsible for repair and maintenance of the waterline to the Curb stop.
4. All new construction shall provide for the horizontal installation of the water meter inside the structure in a heated, protected, and accessible location.
5. The Town reserves the right to determine the type and size of meter to be used on any service line. Water supplied to each customer shall be measured by a meter supplied and installed by the Town unless otherwise specified by the Utility Superintendent.
6. When the customer requires for use and convenience one or more additional meters on a single property, the customer may purchase the additional meter or meters from the Town.
7. Properly authorized agents of the Town shall have the right to enter upon the premises of the customer at all reasonable times for the purpose of inspecting, reading, testing, repairing, or replacing the meter, meter reading equipment used in connection with its service, and removing the meter upon the termination of the contract or the discontinuance of the service. Security and safety measures of the customer will be observed by Town employees and the customer shall provide any and all specialized safety equipment for access to the meter. In the event access to the meter or reading device of the customer is limited such as to hinder or restrict meter reading, the Town may elect to install a remote reading device at the expense of the customer.
8. All meters or other equipment which are furnished by the Town remain the property of the Town. The customer shall protect such property from freezing and from loss or damage and only employees or the authorized agents of the Town are permitted to repair, replace, or remove such property.
9. Ordinary repairs to meters will be made by the Town without expense to the customer. Repairs of damage caused by carelessness or negligence on the part of the customer, including damage therefrom, including the cost of a replacement meter, will be charged to the customer. The Town may discontinue service until the customer properly protects the meter from damage.
§50.09 Maintenance of Service Lines
A. All service lines one inch and smaller in diameter will be maintained at the expense of the customer from the meter where a meter pit is used, or from the curb stop where an interior installation has been used, as applicable. Town will maintain service lines from the public water main to the meter pit, or to curb stop, as applicable.
B. Existing services which extend to a customer not adjacent to a water main, whether through public or private property, are considered to be a private service line the maintenance of which shall be solely at the customer's expense.
C. When an unmetered leak is detected by the Town, the property owner will be notified in writing and given appropriate time from the date of the letter to eliminate the leak. If the leak is not repaired within this time, the Town will take appropriate corrective action and all costs will be billed to the property owner.
4. Ordinances and Code Provisions consistent with the above ordinances remain in full force and effect.
5. This Ordinance shall take effect upon adoption in accordance with Indiana law.

Mr. Purvis' prayer

I stood there that day, that final day in my classroom at the end of my career; and I read aloud to the silence Emily's soliloquy from Thornton Wilder's *Our Town*, and I prayed for each and every student I had ever taught:

I prayed that they would always look at the ones they love that they would never take them for granted.

I prayed that they would notice and love all the little things, clocks ticking, the smell of new clothes, flowers, a child's laughter, a light rain touching an upturned face, a full moon in the black sky.

I prayed that they would understand how wonderful is life each and every moment as they lived life.

I prayed that they be saints! That they be poets!

I turned out the lights ... one last time. I closed the door ... one last time. I walked down the hall ... one last time.

It was 1996 and these are the words from the essay of Mr. David Purvis, my teacher, my mentor, and most of all ... my friend.

And so, a few days ago, I, along with my childhood friend, Susan Zinn Crandall, made our way west, a few miles, to the home of David and his wife Judi. We were on a mission to thank the teacher who had impacted our lives and our writing careers.

It was an afternoon of embracing the gift of time well spent. The mutual laughter of friends. The sweetness of Judi Purvis' pumpkin chiffon pie. The nonstop "remember when?" The hugs your heart feels when you know you are in the company of such caring souls. These are the moments we will remember for the rest of our lives. Moments that tell us just how wonderful life is.

It had been since 1974 that we had seen him. It had been even longer since we had sat in his classroom.

What began as an English/Literature class at Noblesville Junior High School in the late 1960s continued as he followed the Class of 1974 into high school.

And for the next 50-some years we would still hear his teaching voice.

A voice that taught us words that would accessorize our writings. Susan, with her fiction novels that include best sellers *Whistling Past the Graveyard* and *The Myth of Perpetual Summer*. Me, with my non-fiction and weekly column in The Hamilton County Reporter.

His voice told us it was okay to think for ourselves. He taught us to capture our reader's mind with hooks and to bring characters into a scene with pomp and circumstance or a quiet whisper so that the reader would feel the same emotions as our characters.

We would learn that our words are important and that a really good writer would leave the reader wanting more pages to turn.

Lessons taught that would help us create stories and characters that readers would embrace as part of their lives for a few chapters. Characters that the reader would feel abandoned them at the end of a story or book.

Metaphors. Pontification. Innuendos. Words that affirm a belief. Words written from the heart. Words, when written, beckon the heart to stay longer or run for dear life.

Mr. Purvis taught us the power of a story. He brought classical fiction to life. Why did characters think the way they did? Why did the writer say what he or she said? He invited us to think for ourselves. That, my dear friends, is a gift that keeps on giving.

Susan and I may not ever be called saints or even poets, but we just might be called writers and authors. And if we are? We have to thank, in part, our beloved teacher and friend, Mr. David Purvis.

David, you made a difference in our lives and the lives of so many other students who were blessed to call you ... Mr. Purvis. You made us think. You made us respond. You made us grow.

And now, 25 years after you prayed that prayer and turned out the lights in your classroom at Noblesville High School, Mr. Purvis, perhaps you realize ... your prayers were answered.



No more "hair days" – for now

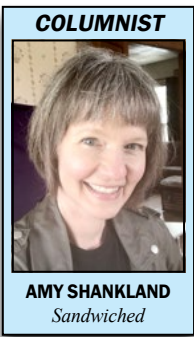
I just discovered a recent crisis at my mom's assisted living facility. No, it's not a lack of health care professionals or a spread of the virus (thank goodness).

As I sorted through Mom's mail and flyers the other day, I stumbled across a piece of paper on the facility's letterhead stating that their on-site beautician had left. I quickly raised my head and looked at Mom.

"Oh my gosh ... your hairdresser is gone?" I asked. Mom nodded.

"Yep," she replied.

I was surprised at her calm demeanor. Mom is one of the thousands (millions?) of older women who goes to the salon once a week



for her "wash and set." For her and for them, this is *sacred*. Ask most any hair stylist – they'll tell you they have older ladies with a standard appointment every Friday. Or, at least, most of the time it's on a Friday.

Before COVID-19, Mom's wonderful helper Michelle drove her to a nearby salon once a week. I was grateful for this because with my work schedule I couldn't commit to doing this every Friday. Obviously the pandemic brought this practice to a halt.

Due to Mom's severe arthritis now, she has to move any significant distances by wheelchair. This

means our only way of traveling is through the Hamilton County Express van or Riverview Health Rides. While both of these are wonderful, we can't use these services for weekly hair appointments.

So Mom was happy to switch to her on-site stylist. Not only did she get her hair done each week, Brenda painted her nails every other week – also a sacred ritual that I've written about in a previous column.

In fact, before I saw the flyer, I was surprised to see Mom's nail polish sitting on her walker one evening. As I shared before, Mom *cannot* paint her nails herself – she's ruined many items in the past – so we've kept her nail polish at the salon. Mom doesn't quite understand this, however, and we've "buted heads" on this topic.

I was trying to figure out how

to get the nail polish out of her room when she asked me to drape a cardigan over her walker before I left. I quickly did as she instructed, nonchalantly swiping the nail polish in the process and quietly putting it in my pocket. I left the nail polish with the receptionist with instructions to please give it to the salon the next day.

The flyer said that the facility was looking for a new beautician. I know in this day and age it could take some time. Of course, the CNAs will help her wash her hair when they assist Mom in the shower. And yes, I could paint her nails ... but I am pretty dreadful at this task. I don't even paint my own. Heck, I may even ruin her things.

Let's hope this crisis is resolved fairly soon... I'll be praying for a Christmas miracle!

Why did Medicare Part B premiums go up 14.5% for 2022?

The short answer is inflation, COVID and a new Alzheimer's drug.

Last year there was legislation put through for COVID relief that artificially kept the price of Medicare Part B lower than it should have been. You, like the rest of the nation, neither noticed that gift from the government, nor were appreciative. It went unnoticed. This year we have to incorporate that rate increase we avoided last year on top of the regularly schedule rate increase. COVID caused more pressure on Medicare, as well as overall medical inflation. If that wasn't enough (and it was) we also have the unprecedented new Alzheimer's drug Aduhelm to thank.



Aduhelm is the first drug to come along in years to treat Alzheimer's. With millions of Medicare members suffering from this disease, this was heralded as bright spot in 2020. However, there is no proof that this drug works. The FDA approved it because of its promise.

I've had Alzheimer's in my family, and I like the sound of this. But on closer inspection, there is no clinical proof of the efficacy of this drug. Why do you care? Because a course of treatment costs \$56,000 per year. If you have a Medicare Supplement, expect higher than usual rate increases in 2022 as the companies plan to absorb this rate

increase. If you have a Medicare Advantage plan, enjoy a year without impact. You won't see the reverberations from this till 2023. If you ONLY have original Medicare A & B (which I highly recommend that you don't) you could be out \$11,200 or 20 percent of the cost of Aduhelm versus \$0 on a Medicare Supplement or a copay on a Medicare Advantage plan.

The Cleveland Clinic and Mount Sinai hospitals announced they would not be administering this drug, which is an infusion in a doctor's office, not a pill. With such big names rejecting this drug, I'm shocked that Medicare moved ahead with it. I hope that it proves to work, but the precedent is alarming. Every person on Medicare Part B is paying a few extra dollars each month for this and the prospect of

other high-dollar drugs to come.

If you are on Medicare, a 14.5 percent monthly increase in Part B means that the average American will pay \$170.10. If you have very low income, Google "Indiana Medicare Savings Program" to see if you are eligible for assistance with Part B.

If you are ready to retire and wondering what the historical increase to Part B has been, in the past four years it averaged about 4 percent. So this is a very high-water mark and not the news we need heading into another COVID winter.

How to improve your sleep quality, Part III

"A good laugh and a long sleep are the best cures in the doctor's book." – Irish Proverb

When I began "Sleep Part I" of this series, I thought I could easily include my opinions, research, and suggestions in a three-part series. Part I discussed the definition of disturbed sleep, Part II addressed the possible repercussions of sleep deprivation, and today I will address possible remedies or suggestions.

(NOTE: As I am not a licensed health care practitioner, I will not suggest specific remedies based on pharmaceutical or herbal modalities.)

I now realize I could have made this a "10-part series" as there is so much information AND misinformation out there! Disturbed sleep is more than an inconvenience affecting more than 60 million Americans that leaves you dragging the next day: It can affect your emotional and physical health. It negatively affects your memory, concentration, and mood, and it boosts your risk for depression, obesity, type 2 diabetes, heart disease, and high blood pressure.¹

Nonprescription sleep medications contain antihistamines that can make you drowsy, but they're



not intended for regular use. Talk to your doctor before you take these, as antihistamines may cause side effects, such as daytime sleepiness, dizziness, confusion, cognitive decline, and difficulty urinating, which may be worse in older adults.² Do keep in mind that sleep disturbances are more common in older adults,

although it is not a given that aging will cause those sleep issues. Some of the options practiced at the Mayo Clinic include Cognitive Behavioral Therapies for insomnia might include Stimulus Control Therapy, Relaxation Techniques, or Light Therapy. As noted previously, a full physical exam and diagnosis by a physician would be the proper protocol for any of these recommendations.

I have come to the conclusion that insomnia, sleep deprivation, or disturbed sleep must be a prevalent issue among many Americans. It is difficult to get through a TV show without a commercial advertising either prescription or OTC sleep aids. While strolling the vitamin aisles in the supermarkets or drug stores you will find the shelves stocked amply with OTC items such as noted above as well as herbal remedies. I would suggest

that you forego self-treatment with any of these until you speak with your physician. Remember, too, that any OTCs or herbal items can interfere or cause harm if you are taking other prescription drugs.

While we are looking for scientifically-based information on vaccines or any medications, why on earth would we rely on anyone other than our own physicians? If we do not trust their advice ... maybe we should change physicians rather than take our medical advice from media personalities, our neighbors, or any random person on any given day... Oh, well, just a thought!

In struggling with the most common sleep disturbance issues be sure to follow the common sense protocols of which we are most familiar: No electronic activity in the bedroom as it interferes with your own body's production and regulation of melatonin, thermostat turned down, physical exercise of some description each day, no caffeine after mid-afternoon at the latest, no eating or drinking alcohol one to two hours before bedtime, and may I also suggest tuning out the daily bad news of the world prior to turning in! Practice deep breathing as you relax, inhaling through your nose (smell the flowers!) and exhaling through your mouth (blow out the candles!) and you will find that breathing properly will have a calming effect both

physically and mentally. This type of breathing comes naturally to babies and small children – let's learn from their deep sleeping habits!

In your plan for the best sleep, try the protocols mentioned above, then proceed to medical advice if those are not working for you. You and your physician can devise a plan that is safe and quite possibly effective in helping you to get the proper rest that your body and your mental capacities need.

I hope that this sleep series has been beneficial. Readers, as I believe that our society is in great need of more and better relaxation during these stressful times we have all faced of late during the pandemic and the unrest in our country and the world. Take care, and as my Scots ancestors would say, "Oidheche aisling mhath agus bruidar" – Good night and sweet dreams!

Tigers beat Millers in uptempo game

FISHERS - Even this early in the season, one thing is clear. Depth is not going to be a problem for either the Fishers or Noblesville boys basketball teams.

Both the Tigers and the Millers put that depth on display last Friday night at the Tiger Den. It was a close game in the first quarter, but Fishers began to pull away in the second period, then maintained the lead in the entire second half to win 76-65.

It was the first Hoosier Crossroads Conference game of the season for both teams, and it was played in front of a big, loud crowd. The first period gave everyone plenty to cheer about, as both squads had their offenses going right away.

"We wanted to be able to play fast and push the pace," said Tigers coach Garrett Winegar. "We really trust our guards to make the right decisions, even when it's a fast game. We had two senior guards that are starting and then a freshman starting who makes really good decisions. We feel like we're at our best when we can push the pace and play fast and play dynamic."

Fishers led 5-2 early after Charlie Smith hit a 3-pointer. Noblesville responded with a 10-0 run to go up 12-5. E.J. Smith and Preston Roberts both scored five points each in the run, with both Millers making a 3 along the way.

The long-range shot got the Tigers back into it, as Jeffrey Simmons and Bryce Williams both nailed triples to bring Fishers back within 12-11. Noblesville pushed its lead back up to 16-12 on an E.J. Smith layin, but Jalen Haralson brought the Tigers within one with a 3-pointer, then Myles Stringer made a putback to get Fishers in front 17-16.

Both teams then traded baskets to end the quarter, and thus kept trading the lead. E.J.

Smith's 3 got the Millers in front, Sean Millsaps answered for Fishers with a triple, then Smith's layin during the final seconds gave the Millers a 21-20 first-quarter lead.

Williams opened up the second period with a 3-pointer, and the Tigers never trailed again after that. Fishers would use an 8-0 run to lead 33-24, with Haralson beginning the run by making an emphatic one-handed dunk. Simmons finished the half with a layin, and the Tigers were up 37-30 at the break.

Simmons' basket was actually the beginning of a 10-0 run. Haralson opened the third quarter with a layin, Williams made back-to-back baskets, and Stringer's layin gave Fishers its largest lead of the game at 45-30.

Noblesville came back with a 10-0 run of its own. Roberts delivered six points of the run, with his basket getting the Millers with 45-40. Williams stopped the run with a basket, which would turn out to be the last score of the third quarter. With that, Fishers led 47-40, and Millsaps drained a 3 to open the fourth period. The Tigers were back up 10.

"We didn't quit, I'll say that," said Noblesville coach Scott McClelland. "We didn't let the game get away from us. Against a team like that, the first half, our self-inflicted wounds, our quick shots really hurt us. And you can't do that against a team like that."

From there, Fishers kept its lead around that margin. Luke Almodovar hit two 3-pointers, both times cutting the Tigers lead to seven points. But a quick 6-0 run got Fishers out of trouble. Williams made two baskets, sandwiched between a Simmons layin. Millsaps made two more 3s in the fourth quarter, with his second triple getting the Tigers back up by 15 points.

"Any game, especially against a good team like Noblesville, you're going to have

runs," said Winegar. "And our experience just allows us to weather those runs. halftime lead.

Millers escape HSE, beat Marian, are 9-0

FISHERS - The Noblesville girls basketball team was going crazy last Wednesday night as the Millers' game at Hamilton Southeastern was right at the end.

The only Noblesville player who was staying calm was Dani Mendez. The irony is that Mendez was the reason everyone was going crazy, although it was a good reason: Mendez had just made the game-winning layin for Noblesville, allowing the Millers to escape the Royals' gym with a 66-64 victory, keeping them unbeaten for the year at 8-0 overall, 3-0 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

Yet even in all the excitement, Mendez still in game mode. She thought there was still time on the clock.

"Everything was going on, I didn't know what to do," said Mendez. "Just thought there were seconds left and getting back on defense."

The many fans who were at the game would understand. The Millers-Royals game was a dramatic one, with Southeastern taking big leads in the first and fourth quarters, and Noblesville coming back both times. There was also a ton of energy at the gym, as the Royals were honoring retired coach Chris Huppenthal, who had been the Southeastern coach for the past 16 years, compiling a 282-86 record for the Royals, and winning the 2019 Class 4A state championship.

With all that going on, Millers coach Donna Buckley knew HSE would be fired up.

"I thought they'd come out hot," said Buckley. But Noblesville was able to handle it, coming back from 60-49 down with five minutes left in the fourth quarter.

"We showed so much toughness tonight," said Buckley. "Just incredible toughness to get that win."

Southeastern had built its 11-point lead after freshman Maya Makalusky hit back-to-back 3-pointers. The Millers responded with a quick 10-0 run to get within 60-59. Freshman Meredith Tippner started the comeback with a triple and a free throw, then Ashlynn Shade hit a jumper. Mendez made a layin, then Tippner drained two more foul shots.

A basket by Riley Makalusky got the Royals back up 62-59, but Noblesville's Brooklyn Ely tied it up with a 3. Shade then gave the Millers a lead with a layin, but Riley Makalusky matched that with a jumper.

That's hard to do when you're the best player in the gym to make that pass and to trust, and she did that. And then Dani to just make that play. She made a couple huge plays for us down the stretch, so really proud of her and proud of everybody executing on that last play."

Mendez said that she was just thinking about the play that was drawn up, then "just to take the shot and make it." Mendez remembered the last time she hit a game-winner: It was in middle school, during a game with Fishers.

Noblesville's comeback was a big one, especially since the Millers were down by double digits twice in the game. Southeastern got off to a spectacular start, leading 12-2 midway through the first quarter. Riley Makalusky had eight points by that time. Olivia Brown scored the game's first basket off a steal, and she would be brilliant on defense all game long, getting seven steals on the night.

Noblesville got back to within 17-10 before a quick 6-0 run by HSE gave the Royals their largest lead of the game at 23-10. Maya Makalusky hit a 3, then Brown scored off a steal again, this time while getting fouled. She made the ensuing free throw for the traditional three-point play.

"I loved the energy the girls played with, especially the way we came out," said Royals coach Brian Satterfield. "Got a great start."
