After studying the We the People curriculum, participating classes research and prepare for competition. Students prepare statements covering six units of study, present those to a panel of judges in a Congressional hearing format, and then answer questions related to the topic. Classes are then scored by a panel of three judges.

Carmel Police Chief Jim Barlow retiring after 38-year career

Carmel Police Chief Jim Barlow has announced he will retire after a 38-year career with the Carmel Police Department (CPD), the last five years as Chief of Police. Barlow's last day will be Jan. 7, 2022. Mayor Jim Brainard has appointed Deputy Chief Jeff Horner to replace Barlow as Chief.

Barlow has been Chief since June 1, 2017. During his time with the Department, he served as one of the department's firearms instructors for more than 30 years and he spent 20 years as part of the SWAT team, six of those years as SWAT Commander.

"Chief Barlow has played an integral role in making our Police Department one of the best in the

country and one that continues to earn professional accreditation," Mayor Brainard said. "He has gone above and beyond in his dedication to serving the residents, visitors and business owners in Carmel and he will be missed. We wish him well in his well-deserved retirement."

Barlow is a graduate of Indiana University and the FBI National Academy. He has worked as an investigator in both the Criminal Investigations Unit and Special Investigations Unit and

served as the Director of the Hamilton County Drug Task Force as well as the Commander of the Operations Division and Support Division. In January 2011, he was promoted to Assistant Chief of Police.

Deputy Chief Jeff Horner has 28 years of experience in law enforcement with CPD. He received his bachelor's degree from Ball State University and is a graduate of the FBI National Academy. He began his career with the Carmel Police Department in January 1994 and spent the first 13 years on the department in the Operations Division, where he was promoted to the rank of lieutenant. He then spent several years supervising

Westfield Youth Assistance Program reaches new record on Giving Tuesday

Residents and loyal supporters of the Westfield Youth Assistance Program (WYAP) have again exceeded expectations this year by raising \$13,442.60 during the month-long Giving Tuesday campaign.

Thanks to a loyal donor, George Kristo, on behalf of his late wife Linda, George supported the organization by matching up to \$12,500 donations received, raising the total to \$25,942.60, far exceeding last year's total contributions of \$2,420.

WYAP Board member Debbie Laird said, "We are incredibly thankful for George Kristo's kindness, generosity, and belief in our programs. Donors were excited when they learned their donations would be doubled due to George's support."

"Words cannot express our gratitude to George and the dozens of individuals who contributed to this year's Giving Tuesday campaign," said WYAP President Steven La-tour. "Just a few weeks ago,

the WYAP Board approved a \$25,000 budget for tutoring Westfield students, a \$23,000 increase, because of the generosity of the community. The pandemic has long term effects on youth, so with the success of the Yellow Tie Gala and now Giving Tuesday, the Board of Directors was thrilled to put those dollars to work right here in the community."

Giving Tuesday, a worldwide day set aside for charitable giving, was also a day to celebrate the Westfield Youth Assistance Program (WYAP), a local public charity founded in 2010. WYAP serves as an early intervention advocate for youth ages 3 to 17 facing challenging life circumstances. Services are voluntary, confidential, and are provided at no cost to the family and include mentoring, tutoring, food, clothing, financial assistance, camps, and enrichment opportunities, to name a few.

Applicants seek \$70M in Rescue Plan Act funds

Hamilton County officials have received 109 applications for funds from the American Rescue Act grant of \$65.5 million received from the federal government. The money is designed to compensate local government agencies, small businesses and non-profit community assistance organizations for losses suffered during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The applications total \$70,041,611. Thus, not everyone is going to get all that they requested, but most will benefit substantially. This became clearer last Wednesday when county commissioners and council members gathered to review applications from small business owners. No final decisions were made but will likely be known this week when officials meet again.

The huge relief grant comes in two parts: \$32.7 million this year and the same amount in June of next year. The grant was made to county government while millions more were given to

Youth archers find success at local, national competitions

When Tony Girt decided to form an archery team for youth five years ago, he had no idea how quickly the team would become competitive at both the local and national level.

In fact, the current team, appropriately named “The Wolfpack” comprised of only eight young men and women, won a combined total of four Indoor State Championships, three Outdoor State Championships, finished in the top three in more than 20 regional Indoor and Outdoor tournaments, and earned four Outdoor state records, as well as placed in the top five finishes in three national tournaments.

The team of young archers, aged 12 through 17, came from as far away as Avon and even Lafayette to participate on the team. Members of “The Wolfpack” competed in every available youth class, including Traditional, Olym-

Hamilton County's eight cities and towns, based largely on population.

County government agencies and offices are seeking \$10.9 million, with about half of this already approved for massive drainage improvements, parks

and other county operated facilities and services.

Sixty-one private businesses have applied for \$6.75 million. No awards have been granted pending more investigation. Action is likely to be taken on these applications on Tuesday,

Dec. 14.

Thirty-nine non-profits and charitable groups within the county have applied for \$19.2 million with three approvals granted for \$3.3 million so far. A decision on the remaining 36 requests is expected this week.

At age 19, he shipped out to Da Nang, South Vietnam. Having driven Harger Farms tractors as a teenager, he had a natural knack for heavy machinery. Upon entry into the Navy, he was assigned the rank of 3rd Class Petty Officer as a member of The Fighting Seabees. When he returned from active duty, his service to his country (and the GI Bill) paid for three more years of Purdue University, where he obtained a biology degree.

Roger worked for 37 years for the Indiana Department of Natural Resources as a wildlife biologist, property manager and specialist at Hovey Lake, Glendale, and Indianapolis. He was universally respected by colleagues, hunters, employees, farmers, campers, and fishermen, and was integral in implementing increased wildlife conservation efforts. In his "spare time," Roger scouted, harvested, hauled, split, and delivered thousands of loads of the finest firewood to Daviess and Hamilton County families.

Roger worked tirelessly, using only a Rand McNally atlas and guidebooks to plan once-in-a-lifetime summer vacations for his family to Yellowstone, Yosemite, Redwood National Forest, Crater Lake, the Grand Canyon, the Alamo, and Alaska. He found unlimited pleasure in the outdoors and cherished every second he spent there. He was a lifelong member of Union United Methodist Church. He loved The Beach Boys, pickup trucks, Gene Keady, the St. Louis Cardinals, changing his own oil, Budweiser, bluegill fillets, firm handshakes, Red Wing boots, and his father's 1950 Ford 8N tractor.

Roger encouraged his children, nieces, nephews, and grandchildren to never stop learning. To ask questions. To respect your elders. To be fearless. To take your lumps. He taught them to do something right the first time, that nothing is ever broken, and, most importantly, to leave the world a better place than what you found it.



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Wealthy seniors pay more for Medicare Part B – How much?

It's official. I am old. Well, maybe not *old* old, but let's say vintage.

This week I received my first Social Security check. Full retirement at 66 years and two months. I do not understand that particular time qualification. I just know it was when I qualified for full benefits. It's got to do with being born in 1955.

I remember when my mother was 66. I thought she was old. I just can't get my mind around being considered old. I walk. I go to yoga classes at the gym. I am constantly busy.

But then, I get a not-so-gentle reminder that my body parts are aging. My hip has been waking me up at night on a regular basis. The pain moves down the side of my leg. My chiropractor tells me my sacrum goes out of alignment. I just say that I have a hitch in my get-a-long. My husband thinks I may need a hip replacement. I keep thinking I am too



young for a hip replacement. I was asked this week for the name of a lady I used to work with at the dealership. I could give the name of her daughter and where her daughter lives and that her daughter is a florist. I could remember the name of her grandson. I could not think of her name for the life of me. Later in the day, I remembered. I think I have too many tabs open in my brain sometimes.

When I go to the doctor for anything, one of the first questions I am asked is if I have recently fallen. "Not really ... but." I let them know that I only fall when I trip or slip on a wet surface. I am not sure what they write in their notes, but I have no problem staying on my feet unless the sidewalk jumps up in front of me or my foot finds water or oil to slide on or my stocking feet slip on the wooden stairs. But no, I don't actually fall because of my age. That's

my story and I'm sticking to it.

Recently my granddaughter, Leah, who is eight years old, was sitting beside me at a restaurant. She looks at me and says, "Grandma, why do you have lines around your lips?" Her mother said, "Leah, that is not a nice thing to ask." I told Leah they were lines you get when you get older. Leah assures me that she will not be getting those lines. I didn't want to burst her young bubble and tell her that she will probably inherit them from me like she did my extremely small mouth. Time will tell.

Recently, our Pastor, Jen Steuble-Gibbs, gave a message where she said that people over 60 are vintage. I like that. Vintage is a good word. It won't get old being called vintage.

If the government declares me as old, that is OK with me, as long as they keep sending me those checks. Now if I can just remember where I put my reading glasses, I can see the amount of the check that was deposited.

The good news is you are rich. The bad news is you will pay much more for Medicare Part B than the average American. Medicare Part B will cost \$170.10 per month, starting in January 2022 for most people. What you pay is based on your modified adjusted gross income from two years prior. If you are getting ready to retire, pull out your 2020 tax returns to find out what you'll pay in 2022.

Medicare does not have an asset test. It doesn't matter how much you have in the stock market or the value of your real estate. How much did you earn in 2020?

As a single person, if it was between \$91,000 and \$114,000, you triggered the Rich Penalty and will pay \$68 more per month for Part B. But wait – there's more. You will also pay more for Medicare Part D, the drug coverage. While I won't go into all those brackets here, you can easily find them on the internet.

There are five brackets

go up even higher? How about making Warren Buffet pay commensurate with his income? The government has been moving in that direction, expanding the brackets, but still barely scratching at the top 1 percent.

If you are married filing jointly, the first tier of Rich Penalty starts at incomes between \$182,000 and \$228,000. If you are thinking about retiring in two years, you can do a little planning that could possibly save you some money. If you are going to take a withdrawal from your 401k that puts you over the limit by \$1 – don't do it. A bit too much income could cause both spouses to pay the extra amount each month for a year. These numbers are adjusted for inflation each year. What you pay will always be a reflection of what

you earned two years prior.

"But I only made \$40,000 in 2020, I should have to pay this because my spouse made \$200,000. We are separated and this isn't fair." I've encountered this many times. People assume they can beat the system by filing married but filing separately. As long as you resided with your spouse – even one day – in that past 12 months, you'll still hit this Rich Penalty, even if you don't file jointly.

You can file an appeal with Social Security if you had a "Life Changing Event" such as the death of a spouse, marriage, divorce, you stopped working or reduced your hours; you lost incoming-producing property due to a natural disaster, fraud or other circumstances or loss of pension. Just call your local Social Security office and they can help you file the appeal.

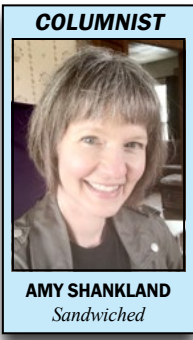
This worry shelf is about to break

Charitable bail fund responsible for my son's death

The holiday season was approaching, and my family was just beginning to make plans to celebrate. It had been a year since we'd seen my oldest son, Dylan McGinnis, due to travel restrictions related to the pandemic and we were so excited to be seeing each other.

Dylan was spending the week with us in Arizona to celebrate his 24th birthday. Celebrations were in full swing, as we gathered for special dinners, a trip to Sedona and a staycation at a Scottsdale Resort. As he prepared to return to Indiana, I told him to think about whether he wanted to come back and visit during Thanksgiving or Christmas – or both. He loved the season because that was when he was able to spend extra time with his family and friends. I gave Dylan a hug and a kiss goodbye and told him that I was proud of him and that I loved him. As I watched him walk towards the airport terminal, I had no idea I had just embraced my son for the last time.

On Oct. 1, Dylan was a victim of gun violence while counseling a friend who was

battling substance abuse. Upon learning the devastating news, my world instantly fell apart and my mind flooded with questions. How could this happen to somebody like Dylan?

Dylan grew up in Hamilton County, attended Brooks School Elementary, Maple Glen Elementary School, Westfield Middle School and was a 2016 Graduate of Westfield High School. He enjoyed sports such as little league baseball, youth football and rugby. Birthday celebrations growing up were spent at our favorite local restaurants. As a young adult, he lived in Noblesville, on Morse Reservoir, where he enjoyed boating and water sports with his family and friends. He was always so kind to everyone and would give up the shirt on his own back to help another in need. He did not like conflict and would avoid it if possible. As recorded in the probable cause affidavit, Dylan was heard apologizing to his shooter just moments before being shot.

Approximately three weeks after his death, I received a call informing me that the individ-

ual who shot Dylan had a record as a violent offender. This person had been bailed out of jail on a \$5,000 bond, with pending felonies, by a charitable bail organization called The Bail Project. I wasn't aware that such organizations existed or how they operated but decided to quickly become informed due to the impact that it had on my family.

I learned that the City of Indianapolis financially supports this organization with taxpayer dollars. Additionally, they operate without regulation, meaning they can bail out whomever they want, regardless of the charge (felony or misdemeanor). Furthermore, once out on bond, the offender is not accountable to the charitable bail organization and the organization does not have any oversight of the offender once released.

It quickly became my mission to develop more of an understanding and immediately begin to take action to ensure that what happened to my family doesn't happen to others.

Charitable bail organiza-

moved to Indiana when he was six. He graduated from Michigan City Rogers High School before going to IU and earning a degree in Public Affairs and Criminal Justice. He was hired by CPD a few months after graduation.

Barlow and his wife have two sons and a daughter and four grandchildren, all of whom live in Hamilton County. He plans to remain in Carmel and spend time with his grandchildren, golfing, bike riding, hunting, and taking time to travel.

County Council plans for future as year nears end

The Feeding Team meets a veteran at local food pantry

November was a difficult month, and I am overjoyed to see the calendar flip to December.

The County Council was relatively unexciting, but we did have a lively discussion about the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 and the plans for the County 4-H Fairgrounds.

Following that, I was diagnosed with acute bronchitis, which overwhelmed me. Even though I felt terrible, the urgent care clinic wasn't too worried, as I had no temperature and my issues were mild compared to some COVID patients.

In hindsight, I should have asked for a COVID test. Now symptom-free, I took a COVID test and am positive, which has canceled a trip to Texas for a conference on economic development and sports tourism.

I am sharing all of this very personal information because we are in the midst of the cold and flu season and it is really easy to overlook things as we try to return to normal. COVID is still a concern, and we all need to do our best to prevent the spread. Your health and our economy's health are at stake.

The December Council meeting was relatively similar to previous meetings, but we had a work session, and I also attended the county highway meeting, did a project walkthrough of State Road 37 and participated in our ARPA meetings.

Our Council work session, which is a public meeting, occurred right before our regularly scheduled Council meeting. The main topic of the work session was a discussion over our planned investment in a new Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) and Human Capital Management (HCM) system for the county. This is a very important decision and one that affects every employee and department. We have not invested in this system in nearly 20 years, and it will lead to many efficiencies and improve user experiences once it is up and running. Over the past year, the county has had a team of people evaluating the different systems and companies that would support the various products. In the end, they have narrowed it down to two teams.

While it was a lively discussion, the Council recognizes the importance of the upgrade and is prepared to invest in the new product, but as the fiduciary arm of the county, our role is to be prepared to fund the project while the Commissioners will make the selection. We are prepared to support the decision to invest in the new ERP system, and I want to thank the county employees and departments who shared their opinions to support this process. Sometime in 2022, we will start the transition, and I will be happy to share more at that time.

The County Council had several appropriations and transfers as the departments

closed out their plans for 2021. We will have a final meeting in late December that will close out the different funds, but we try to handle the vast majority of this at our regularly scheduled December meeting.

A few that I'd like to share are additional appropriations to support maintenance and materials. I bring this up because the impact of the pandemic is still wreaking havoc on our economy, and the county is impacted in many of the same ways as our friends in the private sector. Our budgets and projects are budgeted with existing conditions in mind and a slight variable for inflation. Today we are seeing spikes that are far outside a normal inflation rate of 2.5 percent. These impacts are being felt at every level of our organization.

The Hamilton County Highway Department has seen spikes in oil that are leading our resurfacing program to be more expensive per lane mile. Costs of certain products have risen by nearly 20 percent and that might not be the end of it. The transfer to cover the remaining paving for 2021 was bid out and needed an additional \$80,000 to finish the planned scope.

Equipment availability has led to extreme cost increases. A 20-year-old roller that we initially planned to replace was priced more than \$100,000 more than what the cost was just nine months previously. We are using the transfer of dollars to fund a different piece of equipment and will hope prices level out next year before we make this investment.

The Building & Grounds team has done an exceptional job of trying to minimize supply chain impacts by buying in bulk and doing purchases for the entire county in lieu of everyone doing it themselves. However, shortages of some products due to supply chain meltdown along with the cost of materials being at an all-time high have shot prices up and we are being told to expect a possible larger increase to come in the first half of 2022. In general, paper products and cleaning supplies are up 15 percent. Maintenance is in some cases triple the cost from a few years ago due to workforce shortages coupled with 17 percent increases in the maintenance materials. Standard equipment parts like pumps and motors used to be on-the-shelf items. In some cases, we are now looking at six-month delays, which can have real consequences as some of our buildings are older and in need of ongoing maintenance.

Things are not good, and I feel obligated to be straightforward about it. I'm sure you have seen your grocery bill go up or maybe your local coffee shop is changing hours because of a lack of workforce. Many of these things are the wants in life. Our county is focusing on many of the needs

and we will continue to support them. We are blessed to live in America and especially blessed to live in Hamilton County. While things are hurting, we are in a strong financial position to continue to support the needs of this county and we will continue to challenge the status quo to make sure that your taxpayer dollars are being spent wisely.

This is my last article of the year, a year that has been very memorable with accomplishments.

A new parking garage to support our workforce will open in 2022. An investment was made to support our schools, businesses and economic development by spearheading and funding the start-up of the Hamilton County Career Center. A new Humane Society building was opened thanks in part to the financial support of county government. We started an efficiency study to understand the opportunities to better support our departments and subsequently our residents and businesses who depend on our services.

It has been a great year and there are many people to thank, but it starts with our employees who fought through a pandemic and continued to support this county in ways that many will never truly understand. We have a remarkable workforce, and I thank them for their dedication.

The elected officials in our county also deserve credit as they help shape the discussions and have a willingness to work together to support this county. This includes our County Council, which has been extremely active this year, and without the support of the Auditor and her staff, we would not have been able to achieve the things we pursued.

Lastly, someone said to me that it is nice to have a County Council with such diverse backgrounds as we each seem to have our own unique expertise that we bring to the council which helps us achieve. We have gotten a lot accomplished and that is through the collaborative approach of this group.

It has been a memorable year and it would be remiss if I didn't thank the Hamilton County Reporter for allowing me to write a monthly column and you, the readers, and residents of Hamilton County, for reading it and being engaged in the discussion. This month's column is about a neighbor we met almost two years ago while stocking pantries in Northern Hamilton County. This was our first encounter with a veteran in need.

We have come to learn that much of Northern Hamilton County is a food desert, and meeting "Arch," who was already at the pantry that Friday we learned a great deal more.

You see, Arch was a retired Navy veteran with a big, bushy, full beard. His hat proudly reflected his service in Vietnam – it was pristine and showed zero wear. He was dressed well, sporting full old-school suspenders, and he walked with the aid of a cane. Arch is in his eighties and lived alone in a small apartment nearby. He had no transportation but walks to the pantry every few days to collect meals.

He immediately engaged us as we walked up with crates of food to load. "Why are you doing this," he wanted to know, "are you part of some church or are you just nuts?" He laughed as he asked the question. We answered his questions and explained what Feeding Team is about and our mission is to always have a meal available when any neighbor is hungry.

Arch explained that he has a pension, and after paying his rent and utilities, he was left with slightly over \$100 to feed himself each month. Living in a food desert, he could get eggs and milk at the gas station but relied on the pantries to get meals. We thanked him for his service and helped him load up his bag with whatever he wished. Arch was both thankful and gruff. He appreciated the anonymity that the pantries afforded and at the same time resented his need for them.

It was disheartening to see a veteran living in Hamilton County in such a situation. We explained that hundreds of neighbors come together to support food-challenged neighbors just like him.

Arch and the thousands of other food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County are why we do this. Many friends ask, "Why do this? What's in it for you?" The answer is always the same: Serving people feeds my soul. It is a calling, not work.

There were many sup-

pers when we as a young couple with young kids could only afford Dinty Moore beef stew and a potato for dinner. Surreal moment. This is why the pantries exist. As a typical young family, we could not always make ends meet. Arch needs food too.

This is why feedingteam.org exists – all starting from a can of beef stew. Thank you for embracing the pantries. We love serving with you.

In future columns we will share more stories from neighbors about how your generosity served them in times of need. Be assured that the face of hunger in Hamilton County is not what you may think.

NOBLESVILLE - The defense of the Tigers ruled the night at Noblesville last Friday, as Fishers clashed with the Millers in a big Hoosier Crossroads Conference girls basketball game at The Mill.

The Tigers used their solid defense to take control during the middle quarters, then held firm in the fourth to beat the Millers 57-45. It was an important win because both teams were unbeaten in HCC play coming into the game. Fishers is now all by itself on the top of the conference standings at 3-0.

Noblesville skipped out to a 6-0 lead, with Brooklyn Smitherman scoring four of those points. Ashlynn Shade was on fire early as well, hitting three 3-pointers on her way to 11 first-quarter points. Shade's third 3 of the period gave Noblesville its largest lead of the game at 12-5.

The Tigers began to work their way back into it during the last part of the first, cutting the Millers' lead to 17-15 by the end of the quarter. Joirdyn Smith and Talia Harris both had 3-pointers for Fishers.

Kate Thomas finished the period with a putback, and that started a 9-0 run for the Tigers. Ava Carter made two baskets to start the second quarter, then Thomas nailed a 3. Fishers led 22-17 and would never trail again.

"I was really proud of our kids," said Tigers coach Lauren Votaw. "We told them coming in that Noblesville is a phenomenal shooting basketball team, and we had to make sure that we were there on the catch.

Obviously, early we gave them some looks. Shade hit a few over us early, we gave up a couple more in the first half, and we really just talked about, 'You've got to be there on the catch. You got to be there in the catch. Nothing easy.' That was our goal and I was really proud of our kids. I truly believe they left about everything they had out there tonight."

Fishers led 27-25 at halftime, but opened the second half on a blistering 14-2 run to lead 41-27 with 4:46 left in the third quarter. Thomas started the run with a layin, then Karina Scott threw in a 3.

After that, Hailey Smith took over. After missing the last few games with a concussion, Smith came back in a big way, scoring nine points in the third quarter. Her three-point play pushed the Tigers' lead up to 14 points, their largest advantage of the game.

"They were just awesome on the defensive side and we didn't handle that challenge very well," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley. It was the first time this season that the Millers had been held to under 50 points.

Smith showed her toughness throughout the game, including taking a second-quarter charge.

"I stayed on the floor a little longer, because I was like, 'All right, let me regather everything,'" said Smith. "But after that, I was like, 'I'm cool.'"

"They had to be tough," said Votaw of her team. "They were tough. I was proud of them. Hailey

Fishers led 43-33 after three quarters. The Millers didn't go away, of course, cutting the Tigers' lead to five points on three different occasions. Two free throws from Kaitlyn Shoemaker kept Noblesville within 50-45 with 41.2 seconds left.

But Fishers finished the

game from the free-throw line, making seven of eight foul shots during the last 29 seconds. Harris went 4-of-4 from the line, giving the Tigers their final points.

"I'm just going out there, leading my team, doing whatever we need us to do," said Harris. "Rebounding, taking charges, whatever."

Smith finished the game with 17 points, six rebounds and four assists, while Harris had 11 points and six rebounds. Thomas also had a strong game, with nine points and nine rebounds.

Shade led the Millers

with another double-double of 19 points and 14 rebounds. Shoemaker had nine points and four steals.

"We got to get better at handling pressure, defensive pressure and just physicality," said Buckley. The coach said the loss was "good for us," as it showed what her team needed to work on.

"Unfortunately, we didn't get out with a win this time, but at the end of the day, all of our goals are still ahead of us and we're going to work to get better starting tomorrow," said

Buckley.

Fishers is 9-1 for the season and hosted Pendleton Heights on Monday. Stats from that game will appear in the Reporter's Wednesday edition. The Tigers then host Hamilton Southeastern in the Mud-sock game on Saturday.

Noblesville is 3-1 in HCC play and also 9-1 overall. The Millers begin a busy week on Tuesday by hosting Anderson, then welcome Tri-West to The Mill on Wednesday before playing an HCC game at Westfield Saturday afternoon.

The Carmel boys basketball team picked up two wins over Hamilton County teams this past weekend.

First, the Greyhounds used a strong defensive second quarter and an equally strong offensive third quarter to score a 64-49 win over Noblesville last Friday at the Eric Clark Activity Center.

The Millers led the 'Hounds 12-11 after the first period. E.J. Smith scored four points, while Cooper Bean and Cameron Karns both hit a 3-pointer. Carmel's defense took over in the second period, allowing Noblesville only three points. Meanwhile, the Greyhounds scored 10, and they held a 21-15 advantage at halftime. Peter Suder scored 11 in the first half.

"They were pretty good defensively in the first half," said Carmel coach Ryan Osborn. "I thought our movement got better as the game went on. We're still trying to figure out how to stay connected, how to play together, what that looks like in the half court. They came in with a good plan, their kids played well to start the game. Our guys did a good job of sticking with it."
