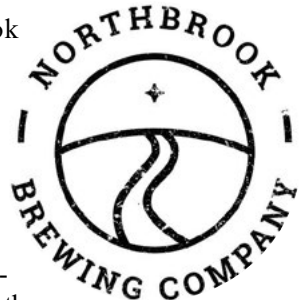
Arcadia getting craft brewery next summer

Noblesville H.S. jazz director named National Grammy Finalist

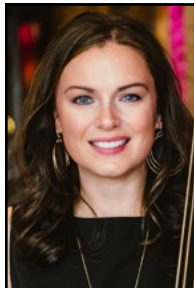

Noblesville Schools has announced that Noblesville High School's (NHS) jazz director and assistant band director Bethany Robinson has been named a top 10 national finalist for the 2022 Grammy Music Educator Awards.

Robinson was selected from over 1,100 nominees across the country and will now compete for the top spot, which includes a \$10,000 honorarium and matching grant for NHS.

"We couldn't be prouder of Bethany and the expertise, dedication, creativity and care she brings to her students and our school every day," said NHS Principal Dr. Craig McCaffrey. "We're lucky that she shares her talents with us and are excited to support her as she continues to make her mark in the world of music education."

Opening in summer of 2022, Northbrook Brewing has begun the design process with the Indianapolis-based firm Curran Architecture. The 5,000 square-foot space will be renovated into a welcoming taproom and brewery that will give locals and visitors the opportunity to stay and enjoy a drink or pick up a growler to bring home.

“I am from a small town myself, and I understand and appreciate the special relationships that are created in a close community,” Longenecker said. “We are thrilled and humbled to be part of the Arcadia family.”

When completed, the building will have multiple spaces to gather and socialize, including a vibrant taproom and a spacious patio. The spaces will be joined by large garage doors that can be opened in the warm and buzzing summer months to expand the space. Northbrook will also be partnering with local Hoosiers in the culinary world to bring Arcadia not only a delicious and defined menu, but the perfect pairings to compliment the bold flavors of the brews.

Northbrook Brewing Company's goal is to grow the passion for craft beer and to continue the propensity for the artistic endeavor.

Robinson began teaching music in 2005 at Noblesville Schools, and currently serves as the jazz band director and assistant band director at Noblesville High School. She is chair-elect for the National Association for Music Education Jazz Council, and president of the Indiana Jazz Educators Association. Robinson was named 2014 Indiana Jazz Educator of the Year, 2015 Noblesville Schools Teacher of the Year and was a 2016 Indiana Teacher of the Year semi-finalist. She is a two-time Lilly Teacher Creativity Fellow and recent keynote speaker for the 2021 Australia National Band and Orchestra Conference.

Robinson's top jazz ensemble placed second at the National Jazz Festival in 2021 and was also named a finalist for the 2021 Jazz at Lincoln Center Essentially Ellington Jazz Festival, landing one of the coveted 15 spots out of all the High School Jazz Bands in North America.

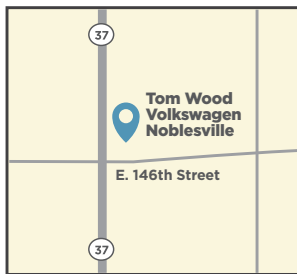

Sen. Robert Dole’s recent passing reminded me of the perennial boxing contender who finally gets his title shot well past his prime; or the legendary actor who receives a “Lifetime Achievement Award” instead of the elusive Oscar. Most of us would, or should, be proud of such a legacy.

New Carmel Police Chief Jeff Horner, who takes office on Jan. 8, 2022, has announced he will appoint Lt. Joe Bickel to replace him and serve as his Deputy Chief of Administration.

F.C. Tucker: Still seller’s market

Indianapolis-based F.C. Tucker Co. says the seller’s market continued last month with an increase in both home sales and home prices. The real estate company says half of Central Indiana counties saw housing inventory increases in November.

F.C. Tucker says year-to-date home sale prices increased 12.2 percent last month. The average home sale price for the 16-county

region was \$288,685, an increase of 11.3 percent.

“The increase in available inventory in some counties is providing additional opportunities for Central Indiana residents looking to purchase a home,” said F.C. Tucker Co. CEO Jim Litten. “However, we’re still experiencing a strong residential real estate seller’s market with home prices continuing to increase. I anticipate we’ll see this trend continue through

the end of the year and into 2022.”

The company says 3,478 Central Indiana homes were purchased last month, up 6.9 percent from November 2020. Brown County showed the greatest increase in pending home sales with 66.7 percent growth while Bartholomew County pending sales had the greatest decrease with 8.3 percent fewer homes sold in November 2021 compared to last year.

RQAW helps establish engineering scholarship at Indiana State University

RQAW, a Fishers-based engineering and architecture services firm, has committed \$100,000 to establish the RQAW Civil Engineering Endowed Scholarship at Indiana State University. The gift advances the company’s commitment to building the pipeline of professional engineers in the state.

“Currently, there is a real shortage of professional engineers in the state of Indiana, not just at RQAW but with companies all over the state,” RQAW President and CEO Troy Woodruff said. “We must be producing not only highly-skilled engineers, but we need to keep them in the state of Indiana.”

RQAW specializes in services relating to architecture, engineering, construction inspection, transportation, environmental services, and water infrastructure.

The RQAW Civil Engineering Endowed Scholarship will be available to ISU students studying civil engineering technology and engineering with civil

In recognition of RQAW’s gift, ISU’s Board of Trustees approved the naming of the RQAW Engineering Classroom in the Myers Technology Center.

“Indiana State University is committed to graduating a diverse and skilled pipeline of talent for the state,” ISU President Deborah J. Curtis said. “RQAW employs ISU graduates, and now, the company’s generous investment will advance opportunities for our students and help fill an identified need in the state’s

workforce.”

Woodruff is a 1998 graduate of ISU with a degree in communications studies and a minor in marketing. He credits the class sizes and connection among students, faculty, and staff in helping him achieve his career goals.

“Indiana State University is a place that is very important to me,” Woodruff said. “It was the place that prepared me for my professional career. If I can give back and help pay it forward to those students like me that will thrive in this type of environment, then I want to help with that.”

Huskies get big win for Pink Out game

ARCADIA - Tuesday was a special night at Hamilton Heights, and the Huskies' girls basketball team delivered a great win, and a meaningful one, too.

Heights hosted Bishop Chatard and won a scrappy game 52-37. It was the Huskies' annual Pink Out game, which raised funds and awareness for breast cancer. Heights raised \$2,780 for the IWIN Foundation, presenting the check to a representative of the foundation after the game.

The Huskies also celebrated breast cancer survivors before the game, one of which was special to Heights senior MyKayla Moran.

"My aunt is one of the survivors, Sheila Hebenstriet, and today's her birthday," said Moran. "So it meant a lot to me to play on this day and have a good win for her and for the rest of the survivors, too."

"It was a great evening," said Huskies coach Keegan Cherry. "The Pink Out, that was started last year by Jillian Osswald and her family for the IWIN Foundation and the cause for the cancer warriors. It was such a special evening. And really the touching thing about it is, there's obviously families that are close to the program. There are moms where they had daughters in the program. I challenge anyone that doesn't know someone who hasn't been impacted or affected by cancer. So to have those families back and share this night with us and to win convincingly like we did was a great evening."

Moran helped the Class 3A No. 7 Huskies get off to a great start, scoring Heights' first six points of the game, including two putbacks. She scored eight points in the first quarter, which finished with the Huskies leading 15-7.

"One of our first plays was a back screen to get me open and to just get points on the board and start the game running quick and to get our defense up," said Moran. "Just to get the momentum going."

"It was really important for MyKayla to establish herself down low," said Huskies coach Keegan Cherry.

Heights slowly built its lead during the

second quarter, going on a 7-0 run to hold a 27-13 advantage, Mia Shields and Camryn Runner both made two free throws, with Ella Hickok hitting a 3-pointer in between. Hickok had another 3 earlier in the quarter.

The Trojans' Anna Thompson made a 3 to end the half, but Heights was still ahead 27-16. Thompson opened the third quarter with a layin, and the Huskies responded with a 7-0 run. Hickok and Moran made layins, then Shields drained a triple to put Heights ahead 34-18.

The Huskies led 36-21 after three quarters, and maintained its lead around that margin for the entire fourth period.

Heights' biggest advantage was 18 points, which it held twice in the last two minutes. Runner hit two free throws to put the Huskies up 47-29, and Hadleigh Cherry made a pair of foul shots with 46.2 seconds left to give Heights a 50-32 lead.

Four Huskies players finished in double figures. Runner led the way with 14 points, followed by Moran with 12, Shields with 11 and Hickok with 10. Keegan Cherry said that his team's balance was "really good, and we need that. Teams are going to key on Camryn and when they do, other girls have to step up."

Heights is 8-3 and hosts Delta on Thursday.

Carmel leaves MIC, applies to HCC

The Indianapolis-area world of high school athletics was dealt a significant shakeup on Monday afternoon, as two big schools are out one of the biggest conferences in the state - and have an eye on joining one of Indiana's other powerhouse leagues.

Carmel and Center Grove high schools are leaving the Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference (MIC). Both schools were charter members of the league since its founding in 1996, but are now former members. Hours after the announcement, both Carmel and Center Grove announced they have formally applied for membership to the Hoosier Crossroads Conference (HCC), which contains four other Hamilton County schools: Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern, Noblesville and Westfield. Other schools in the HCC are Avon, Brownsburg, Franklin Central and Zionsville.

At 3:09 p.m. on Monday, *Indianapolis Star* reporter Kyle Neddenriep posted on Twitter that Carmel and Center Grove had been voted out of the MIC by the principals of the conference's six other schools: Ben Davis, Lawrence Central, Lawrence North, North Central, Pike and Warren Central.

The MIC later released a statement on the changes. The statement said that during the fall "it came to our attention that for athletic reasons, as well as a desire to 'culturally align' (as reported in the media) with surrounding suburban schools, Carmel and Center Grove were seeking placement in a different conference. We value the historical relationships with these two communities, and while this news was sad to those of us who understand the rich history, we also understand that these two schools no longer share the vision that we are more than an athletic conference, that athletics should not drive our decisions, and that our unique characteristics are what make us strong."

The statement said that the remaining principals then "made the difficult decision to vote Center Grove and Carmel out of the conference. Article V, section 4 of the MIC Constitution allows for the removal of other schools with a unanimous vote of the remaining schools and just cause. This vote will allow these two schools to seek a conference that aligns with their visions."

Once the news broke, speculation immediately began about one or both schools joining another conference, with all signs pointing to the HCC. Later that afternoon, Carmel High School athletic director Jim Inskeep sent out a joint statement from Carmel and Center Grove confirming that both schools had formally applied to join the HCC.

The statement reads:

"Center Grove High School and Carmel High School have submitted a formal petition to join the Hoosier Crossroads Conference (HCC). We respect the coaches, faculty, administrators, and student-athletes of the MIC Conference. We have had long-standing and positive relationships with the MIC Conference and appreciate the 26 years of collaboration and competition with the MIC schools. The decision to request to change conferences is rooted in the belief that this move would provide our schools with the collaboration, competition, and support necessary to grow our programs over the next 20 years."

The contracts between Carmel and Center Grove and the six MIC schools will be honored through the 2022-23 school year, but the MIC will begin as a six-team conference in the spring of 2022.

Carmel and Center Grove were both charter members of the MIC. When the league formed in 1996, the other six schools in the conference were Ben Davis, Lawrence North, North Central, Terre Haute North, Terre Haute South and Warren Central. The Terre Haute schools left the MIC in 2013, with Lawrence Central and Pike joining from Conference Indiana that same year.

Prior to the founding of the MIC, Carmel had been a charter member of the Sagamore Conference when it began in 1967. The school left the Sagamore in 1974 to join the Olympic Conference, and stayed a member of that league until the MIC began.

Cass was a member of the Millers' 1987 undefeated state championship team, which itself was inducted into the Hall of Fame earlier. Cass will join teammates Courtney Cox Cole and Krissi Davis in the Hall of Fame when the 2022 class is honored on April 30.

The Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame wrote the following on its website about Cass:

"Cass was the starting point guard for Noblesville's 1987 undefeated state championship team and 1988 state runner-up squad. Her senior season, she was the team's leader in assists and 2nd in points, rebounds and steals, teaming with 2015 Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Courtney (Cox) Cole.
