I still remember: "I'm the littlest one in my family, but I can do my part. I want to live for Jesus and have Him come into my heart."

I am the oldest member of my family (except for my husband) and I still can say those words with conviction.

You see, there is joy in my world, even in the midst of its bleakness and sorrow.

For unto us a baby was born in Bethlehem. There is still joyous good news. We can still hear the words "Fear not," for there is peace and goodwill to all men ... and women. We just have to keep seeking.

I'm turning up the volume on the radio and I'm singing. "A thrill of hope, this weary soul rejoices."

I wish you all a Blessed and Merry Christmas! May you feel the hope and the joy in your memories. And maybe, just maybe, a few of you will find a box of chocolate-covered cherries under the tree.

Dick proudly served his country in the United States Marine Corps during the Korean War. In 2016 he was privileged to be selected for the Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. 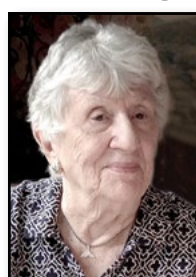

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In double overtime . . .

Tigers boys win the Mudsock

FISHERS - What a difference a year makes.

When the Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern boys basketball teams played the 2020 Mudsock game last year, the Tigers had a new coach and were learning a new system. They had talented players, but coach Garrett Winegar called the team "completely coached." Fishers lost the Mudsock game last year.

This year, playing the big rivalry game last Friday at the Royals' gymnasium, the Tigers showed they have come a long way in the previous 12 months. With a big and very loud crowd screaming after every basket made and everything else, Fishers survived a double overtime epic with Southeastern, winning 70-68 to claim the Mudsock Trophy.

"I think that's a game last year we'd probably lose with these same guys," said Winegar. "We weren't very resilient, especially on the road. We've talked about that a lot, and I just thought tonight, no matter what happened, you could see Jeffrey Simmons and Charlie Smith and Bryce Williams and our seniors who really have a lot of experience step up and make plays throughout the game."

As most Mudsock games are, this one was close all the way through. Fishers looked to be on its way to victory late in the fourth quarter when the Royals went on a 9-0 run in the last two minutes to send the game into the first overtime. The Tigers led again late in the extra period when Southeastern's Caleb Smock hit a 3-pointer to send the game into a second OT.

The Royals led 65-64 with a minute-and-a-half left in the second overtime after Reph Stevenson scored a layin. Williams got Fishers in front for good by making a three-point play with 1:27 left, putting his team ahead 67-65. The Tigers then got the points they needed during the final minute, two free throws by Simmons and one from Josh Forbes, and it was enough to win.

While the crowd was screaming, Winegar said he wanted his players to be talking on the floor, especially his afore-mentioned seniors.

"You get into a game like that, they can't hear me on the sideline," said Winegar. "Those guys have to be talking, they have to be player-led, especially when you got Jalen (Haralson) out there, who's a freshman in those moments for the first time. Guys like Charlie, Bryce and Jeffrey out there have to talk and lead him. And I just think their growth, all three of them, has been through the roof over the last 12 months and I'm really proud of those guys."

"It's been fun," said Simmons. "We live three miles apart from each other. You grow up with these guys, you play junior high with them and they go to different schools. Just playing against them is something special. It's honestly some thing I can't describe. You've got to experience it. That's what I tell people."

Fishers led 10-7 after the first quarter, with Smith and Simmons each scoring four points. The Royals came to play too, with Sam Jacobs also scoring four points, including a dunk.

Payton Weemer opened the second period with a steal and basket, pushing the Tigers ahead 12-7. Joshua Jones then hit a 3 for Southeastern, and that began a 13-3 run for the Royals that would give them a 20-15 lead. Jacobs contributed five points to the run, including a 3, and Tyler Lacy made a pair of free throws. Southeastern led 23-19 at halftime.

Simmons began to take over in the third quarter, scoring seven points early to give Fishers a 26-25 lead. All three of his baskets were putbacks - one of them became an and-1 - and he made a fourth putback late in the quarter to push the Tigers ahead 32-27.

Lacy made a layin for the final basket of the third, cutting the Fishers lead to 32-29. The fourth quarter began with another and-1, this one from Matt Brewer. His three-point play gave the Tigers a 35-29, which became their largest lead.

Simmons is headed to Miami University (Ohio) to play football, a Division I school, but Winegar believes the senior's basketball play is just as high-level.

has it going, he's as good as anybody in the state," said Winegar. "Him not being a Junior All-Star last year was the biggest snub in Junior All-Star history. He has been a dominant player at Fishers since his freshman year. He's only getting better and better. He's handling it better. He's shooting it better. He's leading better. I think when he has it going, he's as good as anybody in the state."

Simmons was proving it, making a 3-pointer in the fourth quarter to get Fishers up 40-36, this after the Royals had cut the lead to one. Jones scored five points, all from free throws, to help get his team close. A Stevenson dunk then got HSE within 40-38.

Simmons then made another three-point play, and Myles Stringer helped out with an and-1 of his own, rushing in for a basket after making a huge defensive rebound. Fishers now had a seven-point lead, 46-39.

"We've been encouraging Myles to do what Myles is good at, which is attack," said Winegar. The coach said they have been working on getting Stringer to finish through the backboard.

"It was like I could see our hours and hours of work together, and it just came through in

the perfect moment and really happy for him," said Winegar. "He hasn't scored a ton this year because he's not selfish, and he knows that we got a lot of guys who can score, so he's been willing to just defend and do what we ask and pass, and in that situation we needed him to score and he stepped up when we needed a big bucket."

The Tigers' lead swelled to 48-39 after Simmons made a layin. But Southeastern then blasted through a 9-0 run of its own. Deion Miles started it with a layin, Jacobs hit two foul shots, Stevenson scored his own layin, then Jacobs nailed a 3. Just like that, overtime.

Fishers got the tip for the first extra period, and Haralson quickly scored to get the Tigers in front 50-48. Lacy then hit a triple, and Southeastern led by one. The back and forth continued until the 1:23 mark, when it seemed Fishers got a little separation after Williams made a three-point play to get the Tigers up 57-54.

Miles made two free throws to cut the lead to one (again), and Simmons answered that with two free throws. But the game wasn't done yet. Smock made sure of that with his 3-pointer. The score was 59-59, and it was on to double overtime.

"There's two or three times we could have just folded and packed it in, so super proud of our kids to fight back and send it to overtime and then send it to double overtime," said Southeastern coach John Ashworth. "And again, you just can't count out the Royals. We're a tough team and we're going to continue to get better throughout the season."

The call-and-respond continued in the second OT. Haralson scored off a putback, Jacobs tied the game with free throws. Simmons scored on a floater, Smock made a pair of foul shots. Stevenson's layin would mark the first lead of the second overtime for the Royals, but Williams' three-point play

Just ask the Fishers girls basketball team. The Tigers were young coming in to this season, but they're starting to play like poised veterans. That maturity helped Fishers to another Mudsock trophy win last Saturday night at the Tiger Den.

The Tigers won the Mudsock for the third consecutive year, beating Hamilton Southeastern 69-61. It was a typical rivalry game, with both teams playing well and at a high intensity level. Such a contest might be difficult for a young team to handle, but Fishers did that pretty well.

"I thought they responded very well," said Tigers junior Olivia Smith. "This isn't our first big game. We've had Noblesville, Zionsville. Just them stepping up, cheering, playing the role that they know how to play and just sticking together as one team."

The first quarter was close until the final couple minutes. Both teams played to a 14-14 tie, with the young players stepping up. Royals freshman Maya Makalusky scored 10 points during that run, including a pair of 3s. Karina Scott hit two triples as well.

Then Joirdyn Smith took over. The Fishers sophomore went on a personal 8-0 run to finish the quarter, nailing two 3s and a floater to give the Tigers a 22-14 lead after one. Smith then made it a 10-0 run by hitting two free throws, putting her team up 24-14.

"The biggest thing with Joirdyn is to be our point guard and to make sure that we're facilitating things and the ball keeps moving," said Fishers coach Lauren Votaw. "And obviously, she shoots it really well, so when she has those opportunities, we want her to take advantage of those."

The momentum from that run kept the Tigers in front for a

while, even when Southeastern made its runs. Talia Harris also started hitting long-range shots, with two 3s and eight points in the quarter. Meanwhile, the Royals' Olivia Brown also scored eight points in the second period as well.

Fishers led 37-30 at halftime. Southeastern made a move in the third quarter; Riley Makalusky began to shine by scoring eight points, and Lauren Stewart hit a 3 to get HSE ahead 44-43.

Olivia Smith continued to show her leadership in the period, with seven points in the third, including a triple that pushed Fishers back up 46-44. The back and forth continued for the remainder of the quarter, which ended with the score tied at 50-50.

The Royals quickly went up 55-50 after Maya Makalusky hit a 3 and Makayala Hinshaw made two free throws. The Tigers responded with a 7-0 run; Harris poured in five points to tie the game, and Olivia Smith made two free throws for a 57-55 lead.

Brown tied the game with a layin, but Fishers used another quick 6-0 run to take the lead for good. Joirdyn Smith drained a 3, then Olivia Smith was good on a three-point play. A layin by Hailey Smith gave Fishers a 66-58 lead with a minute to go, and the Tigers held on from there.

"First of all, credit to Southeastern," said Votaw. "They hit some big shots. Olivia Brown was outstanding. I just was really proud of the way our kids responded."

Votaw said she challenged her team before the fourth quarter "to really separate themselves, and we separated ourselves perhaps the wrong way to start the fourth. But then they did, they battled back. And we just had contributions from a lot of different people tonight."

"We definitely had some ups and downs throughout this game, but we knew we have to come together in order to win this game," said Hailey Smith. "We made some adjustments

Shamrocks heat up, beat Millers

WESTFIELD - Despite a cold-shooting first half, Westfield never lost its cool.

Instead, the Shamrocks decided to heat things up in the third quarter.

Westfield hosted Noblesville last Saturday afternoon at CSI Gymnasium, and recovered from a double-digit halftime deficit to score a 47-42 Hoosier Crossroads Conference victory over the Millers. With the win, the 'Rocks extended their win streak to eight games.

In order to keep its streak intact, Westfield had to not only overcome the Millers, but its own shooting woes. The Shamrocks only made 16 percent of their shots in the first half.

Meanwhile, Noblesville scored the first seven points of the game and skipped out to a 16-5 lead late in the first quarter. Brooklyn Smitherman scored six points, while Ashlynn Shade made two 3-pointers for six points.

Westfield trimmed the Millers' lead to 16-8 by the end of the first quarter, but Noblesville pushed its advantage back up to 24-11 midway through the second period. Shade hit two free throws, and Meredith Tippner hit a triple.

There were some bright spots for the Shamrocks in the first half. Hailey Remaks drained a 3 for Westfield's first basket of the game, and Mikayla Rudolph made three straight free throws after getting fouled while shooting a 3-pointer. Both would be coming attractions for the second half.

But first, the 'Rocks had to dig out of a 28-15 halftime deficit.

"At halftime, I could've done a thousand different things, probably," said Westfield coach Ginny Smith. "Yell was not one of them. I just said, 'Girls, it could not get any worse than this.' I believe in my heart, there's no way we'll shoot 16 percent again in the second half. We're going to make shots. We're going to continue to defend."

Sure enough, Westfield opened the third quarter with a 3-pointer by Olivia Robey. Meredith Tippner answered that with a basket, and Noblesville led 30-18.

After that, the Shamrocks took over, going on a 13-0 run that lasted for over half the quarter. Ellie Kelleher threw in two 3s during the run, and Remaks made another triple. Meanwhile, Alyssa Crockett contributed from the free throw line, making four foul shots, including two that gave Westfield its first lead of the game, 31-30 with 2:36 left in the third.

"It's just a great boost, because we haven't been shooting it well lately," said Kelleher.

Smith said the difference "was just the mentality," and that the Shamrocks mixed up their defenses. The coach also noted that once Westfield's shots started falling, its defense began to pick up.

"If you think about it, the first half, when you're not making shots, your defense is always in a jam, because they're coming at you downhill, right?" said Smith. "Off misses every time. But when you can make a shot, it allows you to get set and really make some adjustments and do some things. That was a big piece of it, too."

The two teams traded free throws for the balance of the third quarter, which ended with Noblesville ahead 34-33. Dani Mendez opened the fourth with a pair of foul shots, and the Millers were up 36-33.

Emmrey Collinsworth then nailed a 3 for the 'Rocks, and the game was tied again at 36-36. Smitherman made a floater to put Noblesville back up by two, but Crockett stepped up with back-to-back triples. Westfield now led 42-38, and the 'Rocks would stay in front until the buzzer.

"This group of kids, they're just resilient," said Smith. "They just keep on keepin' on. And that's what they did today."

Crockett finished the game with another double-double, this

one 16 points and 10 rebounds, and also blocked two shots. Remaks collected five rebounds, while Kelleher had nine points and four steals, including the two big 3s.

"I've been trying to adapt," said Kelleher of trying to score more. "Just during AAU, that's been more of my role. Transitioning to high school, I've really been working on that."

Shade scored 16 points for the Millers, while Tippner reached double-double status with 13 rebounds and 11 points. Shade had six rebounds and Kaitlyn Shoemaker dished out four assists.

"We just didn't match their intensity in the second half," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley. "And Crockett's awesome. She's probably right now playing as well as anyone in the state. The first half, we did a pretty good job on her, the second half, she got going."

Westfield is now 3-1 in HCC play and 11-2 overall. The Shamrocks continue conference action Tuesday at Franklin Central.

The Millers are 3-2 in the conference and also 11-2 overall. Next up for Noblesville is a Wednesday trip to the Bedford North Lawrence tournament, where the Millers play Crown Point in their first game.

EARLIER GAMES

Westfield cruised past Avon 64-38 last Tuesday in an away Hoosier Crossroads Conference contest.

The Shamrocks took care of business early, leading 25-6 after the first quarter. Westfield then held a 41-17 halftime advantage.

Three Shamrocks players reached double figures. Crockett scored 24 points, including three 3-pointers, and also had six rebounds, six steals and five assists. Robey added 12 points, making two 3s, and handed out four assists. Kelleher contributed 10 points.

Noblesville picked up two wins during the week. First, the Millers beat Anderson 84-25 last Tuesday at The Mill.

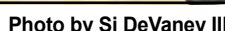
