Due to an aggressive attack, fire crews kept the fire from spreading to Mr.


Scott's house and two other homes near the garage. The Scott house and two others did have heat-related damage to siding and shingles.

Proposed Improvement to State Road (SR) 32 in Westfield, Hamilton County
The City of Westfield and the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will host a public hearing on Wednesday, January 26, 2022 at the Grand Park Sport Campus Event Center, 19000 Grand Park Blvd, Westfield, IN, the hearing will begin at 6:00 pm. The purpose of the public hearing is to offer all interested persons an opportunity to comment on current preliminary design plans to improve SR 32 in Westfield, Hamilton County, IN. The purpose of the proposed project is to mprove corridor mobility along SR 32 through the downtown Westfield area for both motorists and pedestrians alike. Currently, the existing corridor does not provide a safe traveling environment for motorists or pedestrians, as the existing roadway is congested.

As proposed, the project consists of widening and reconstructing SR 32 from just east of the Poplar Street roundabout to just east of Timberbrook Run. Outside of the boundaries of the Stultz-Stanley House (209 W Main Street) and the Westfield Historic District (NR-2521), the existing 2-lane section of SR 32 will be reconstructed to consist of four, 11-to-12-foot wide travel lanes (two westbound, two eastbound), with a raised 13-foot wide center median, curb and gutter, and 8-foot wide sidewalks separated by 6-foot wide grass buffers on both sides of the roadway. Along SR 32 left turns will be restricted with left turn movements only available at Westlea Drive/ Mill Street and Union Street. This reconstruction will result in widening the roadway to the south by approximately 25-feet.

In front of the Stultz-Stanley House (209 W Main Street), SR 32 will be shifted north by approximately 34-feet, and the typical section of SR 32 will remain the same

with the exception of no 6-foot wide grass buffer along the south side of the roadway between the sidewalk and roadway. Within the boundaries of the Westfield Historic District (NR-2521), SR 32 will be reconstructed to consist of four, 11-to-12-foot wide travel lanes, an 11-foot wide turn lane, a 2-foot wide raised center curb with 1-foot wide curb offset, curb and gutter, and 8-foot wide sidewalks separated by 6-foot wide buffers on both sides of the roadway. This will result in widening SR 32 to the south by approximately 25-feet and result in the removal of four buildings from the Westfield Historic District: 101 S. Union Street, 102 S. Union Street, 103 S. Union Street and 111 E. Main Street.

Moving east outside of the district, the intersection of SR 32 and East Street will be reconstructed to a two-lane roundabout with 15-foot wide travel lanes (two westbound, two eastbound) with 8-foot wide sidewalks separated by 6-foot wide grass buffers on all sides. North of the roundabout, East Street will be reconstructed to consist of two 11-foot wide travel lanes (one northbound, one southbound) with 6-foot wide sidewalks adjacent to the curb and gutter on the west side of the roadway. East Street will be realigned to provide the appropriate transition into the roundabout as well as to straighten out the existing S-curve along East Street, north of Penn Street. East of the roundabout and extending to just east of Timberbrook Run, SR 32 will be reconstructed to consist of four 11-to-12-foot wide travel lanes (two vestbound, two eastbound).

The existing 186-foot long 6-foot tall by 10-foot wide box culvert between Westlea Drive and Camilla Court, which conveys the unnamed tributary (UNT) to Grassy Branch under SR 32, will be replaced with a 220-foot long 6-foot tall by 14-foot wide box culvert to account for the widening of SR 32. Throughout the project area the existing overhead utilities along the south side of SR 32 will be moved underground beneath the new sidewalk.

The Maintenance of Traffic (MOT) plan for the project is proposed as phased construction that will maintain at least one-lane of traffic in each direction during construction. Closure of Union Street and East Street will be required during certain phases of the project. Union Street traffic would be detoured utilizing 181st Street, Wheeler Road/Westfield Park Road, and 169th Street. East Street traffic would be detoured utilizing 181st Street, Wheeler Road, 186th Street, and Grassy Branch Road. Pedestrian detours will be provided during each phase of construction to route pedestrians around the various construction areas. A full closure of SR 32 is currently being evaluated between Poplar Street to Union Street for a period of time during construction to determine if it would minimize the construction timeline, as well as reduce construction costs. If a full closure of SR 32 is determined to be the preferred MOT, the public will be notified of the revised MOT. Access to all properties within and adjacent to the project limits will be maintained at all times during project construction.

The project will require approximately 3.34 acres of permanent right-of-way (ROW) and 1.62 acres of temporary ROW from residential and commercial properties. The

project will result in the relocation of thirteen buildings. State and local funds are proposed to be used for construction of this project. INDOT has determined that this project poses minimal impact to the natural environment. An Environmental Assessment (EA) has been prepared for the project. 

'Rocks win showdown with 'Hounds

WESTFIELD boys basketball game between Westfield and Carmel that took place last Saturday at the Shamrocks' CSI Gymnasium will go down in the best high school contests in Indiana this season.

It was a true tug of war between the Shamrocks and the Greyhounds, with Westfield prevailing 43-42 in front of a sold-out crowd. The victory ran the Shamrocks' win streak to seven games in a row, and it was the first time Westfield had beaten Carmel since Jan. 9, 2016.

"It's been a while," said 'Rocks coach Shane Sumpter. "We've had some close ones and we've had some not-so-close ones with them. They've beat us four out of the last six years in the sectional, so it's tough. They're a very good basketball program, very good team, very well-coached. Just really proud of our guys and our effort tonight."

While the Carmel-Westfield rivalry is big enough to stand on its own, this game took on new significance when the first high school basketball polls of the New Year came out last Monday, and the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association's oneclass poll had the Greyhounds at No. 1 and Westfield at No. 3. DEFENSIVE PLAYS

Neither team led by more than seven points on Saturday, as both squads played defense strong enough to not allow the other to escape their gravitational pull. Thus, it seemed appropriate that defensive plays wound up deciding the game.

beating Yorktown 68-36 in an away game. The Shamrocks had


control of this game early, leading 20-2 after the first quarter. Haffner scored seven points in that period, while Depasquale had five.

8-45 AND 8-48 OF THE CARMEL CITY CODE.

Synopsis: Ordinance amending the civil penalties collected by the Ordinance Violation Bureau for violations of any provision of Chapter 8, Article 5 of the Carmel City Code and further regulating the parking and stopping of motor vehicles on City streets within proximity of school property.
WHEREAS, the City of Carmel ("City"), pursuant to Indiana Code Chapte
3-36-2, has established the City of Carmel Ordinance Violation Bureau

nder Carmel City Code § 3-58 and, under Carmel City Code § 8-45, has orrespondingly set civil penalties collected by the Ordinance Violation Bureau or violations of provisions under Carmel City Code, Chapter 8, Article 5; WHEREAS, the City, pursuant to Indiana Code § 9-21-1-3, within the easonable exercise of its police power, may by ordinance regulate vehicular tanding and parking;

WHEREAS, the City has previously regulated vehicular parking within its

orporate limits, such regulation being codified, in part, under Carmel City Code 8-45 and 8-48; and WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City now finds that it is in the

nterests of public safety and welfare to amend the civil penalties collected by the Ordinance Violation Bureau for violations of any provision of Carmel City Code Chapter 8, Article 5 and to further regulate the parking and standing/stopping of notor vehicles on City streets

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Common Council of the City of Carmel, Indiana, as follows:

Section 1. The foregoing Recitals are fully incorporated herein by this reference Section 2. The following subsections of Carmel City Code Section 8-45 are ereby amended and shall read as follows: § 8-45 General Provisions.

vehicle a notice to the owner/operator thereof that such vehicle has been parked in violation of same and advising that such person may, on or before the date nd time set forth on the ticket to appear before the City of Carmel Ordinance Violation Bureau Clerk, pay to the City of Carmel Ordinance Violation Bureau clerk, as a fine for and in full satisfaction of such violation, the sum of twentyive dollars (\$25.00) for the first violation and a sum of one hundred dollars \$100.00) for each subsequent violation, except that, in the case of a vehicle that is unlawfully parked in a properly marked handicapped parking space, or that has been backed into a parking space in violation of § 8-50 of the City Code, such fine shall be in the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the first violation and a sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) for each subsequent violation. If this fine is not paid in full on or before the date and time set forth on the icket to appear before the City of Carmel Ordinance Violation Bureau Clerk, Corporation Counsel shall initiate proceedings in a court of competent jurisdiction gainst the owner/operator who has been issued said ticket who shall be subject to the general penalties provided for violations of the provisions of Article 5 of this Chapter. (4) On the north side of Main Street between its intersection with the Monon Greenway to a point 186 feet east of the intersection of Main Street and Rangeline Road. On the south side of Main Street from a point 147 feet east of the intersection of the Monon Greenway and Main Street to a point 343 feet east of the intersection of the Monon Greenway and Main Street, from a point 42 feet eas of the intersection of Main Street and 1st Avenue S.W. to a point 217 feet east of he intersection of Main Street and 1st Avenue S.W.

(f) No person shall Stop or Park a motor vehicle within a roadway segment, ocated within the City's corporate limits and within two thousand five hundred 2,500) feet of any Carmel-Clay School property, from 7:00 a.m. EST to 5:00 p.m. EST, Monday through Friday, while Carmel-Clay Schools are in session, and where "No Stopping or Parking" signs, or an equivalent

hereof, have been installed by the City of Carmel.

(1) All requests for the City to install or remove applicable signs under ubsection (f) shall be made by the Department of Engineering to the City of Carmel Board of Public Works and Safety for its review and approval.

(2) Subsection (f) shall not apply to following:
(i) Where Stopping or Parking of a vehicle is at the direction of a police officer

(ii) When temporarily Parked or Stopped during the actual performance of bona fide City business, commercial service, construction, sales, or delivery of goods, equipment, or persons to a neighboring residential or commercial property not including schools); and

(iii) The Stopping or Parking of Authorized Emergency Vehicles. (g) Notwithstanding the above, the provisions of subsection (f) shall not apply to any vehicle which properly displays a valid resident vehicle sticker or temporary guest parking permit issued pursuant to this subsection.

(1) Resident vehicle stickers shall, upon request, be issued hereunder by the

Carmel Police Department for any vehicle that is lawfully driven by a person who resides at an address that abuts any of the streets or street segments where signs have been installed under subsection (f). To receive a resident vehicle sticker, an applicant must provide to the Carmel Police Department the registration of the vehicle that will display the sticker and proof of residency at the address in question via a valid Indiana driver's license or via a valid photo ID and a locument issued within the last 60 days verifying the applicant's addressacceptable documents include, but are not limited to, mail (with a legible ostmark), statements, bills, or lease agreen ssued at no cost and are not transferable.

(2) Up to five (5) temporary guest parking permits shall, upon request, be ssued hereunder by the Carmel Police Department for each residence that abuts

ny of the streets or street segments where signs have been installed under subsection (f). Temporary guest parking permits must be displayed on the rearview mirror of a vehicle, visible from the outside of the vehicle, and must have the property address for which the permit was obtained written thereon. Unless otherwise stated, a temporary guest parking permit shall allow parking within four hundred (400) feet of the property address for which the permit was obtained for up to two (2) hours on roadway/streets or street segments where signs have been installed under subsection (f). Up to five (5) temporary guest parking permits shall be issued at no cost and are not ransferable. Upon request and at the discretion of the Carmel Police Department additional temporary guest parking permits may be issued for a limited timeframe that extends beyond the standard two (2) hour limit but does not exceed thirty (30) days. Any additional or replacement temporary guest parking permits may be issued at the discretion of the Carmel Police Department, with the cost of the

permit(s) paid by the applicant. (p) A one-hour parking zone, Monday through Friday only between the hours outheast corner of 1st Avenue NE and 1st Street NE.

(q) A one-hour parking zone, Monday through Saturday between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., is established for the parking lot located behind the Lion's Club building located at 141 East Main Street, the same being generally east of 1st Avenue S.E., south of East Main Street, west of Bryn Mawr Lane, and orth of 2nd Avenue S.E. However, parking may be further restricted in this lot during certain Lion's Club meetings and events, at which times the public parking igns located in the lot shall be masked in a manner approved by the Carmel Police Department for the duration of the meeting or event only.

(r) Notwithstanding the above, the provisions of subsection (q) shall not apply o any vehicle which properly displays a valid merchant vehicle sticker issued ursuant to this subsection. Merchant vehicle stickers shall, upon request, be ssued hereunder by the Carmel Police Department for any vehicle registered to or lawfully controlled and driven by a person who is employed by a merchant ocated within one mile of the parking lot identified in subsection (q) above. A merchant vehicle sticker shall authorize the vehicle to which it is issued to park in the parking lot identified in subsection (q) above while the registered owner or perator thereof is at work within the City's corporate limits, and for 30 minutes before and after such person's work shift. Merchant vehicle stickers shall be issued t no cost and are not transferable.

(s) A two-hour parking zone between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday only, is established on the north side of Main Street from a point 227 feet east of the intersection of Main Street and Rangeline Road to point 930 feet east of the intersection of Main Street and Rangeline Road. The Carmel Street Department shall post appropriate signs or markings setting orth the above parking limitations and indicating that the above location is a "tow way" zone.

Section 4. All prior ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, to the extent of such inconsistency only, as of the effective date of this Ordinance, such repeal to have prospective effect only. However, the repeal or amendment by this Ordinance of any other ordinance does not affect any rights or liabilities accrued, penalties incurred or proceedings begun prior to the effective date of this Ordinance. Those rights, liabilities and epealed or amended ordinance as if this Ordinance had not been adopted.

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
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
