Fishers welcomes ABC Prep Academy

Associated Builders and Contractors of Indiana/Kentucky (ABC) Commercial Construction Prep Academy held a ribbon-cutting ceremony last Friday for the grand opening of its new location at 11837 Technology Lane, Fishers. Gibson Commercial Construction renovated the new location.

According to ABC Prep Academy Director Robert Kneberg, the ABC Prep Academy is currently serving students from six high schools and three homeschool groups. The academy is currently accepting junior and senior enrollments for the 2022-2023 school year.

ABC is a national construction industry trade association providing the availability of apprenticeships for individuals who want to begin a career in the trades. ABC President JR Gaylor said the academy represents around 700 contractors and employs 175,000 construction workers.

“The industry needs young people,” Gaylor said. “There are many, many openings and we hope that you continue in the pipeline towards further training, employment, and a great career. This program is and has always been about you the students and their career and opportunities.”

Kneberg said the ABC prep academy is designed for students to discover what the trades are available, and which might be the right fit for each of them.

With the ABC program, a student can come from high school, go directly into

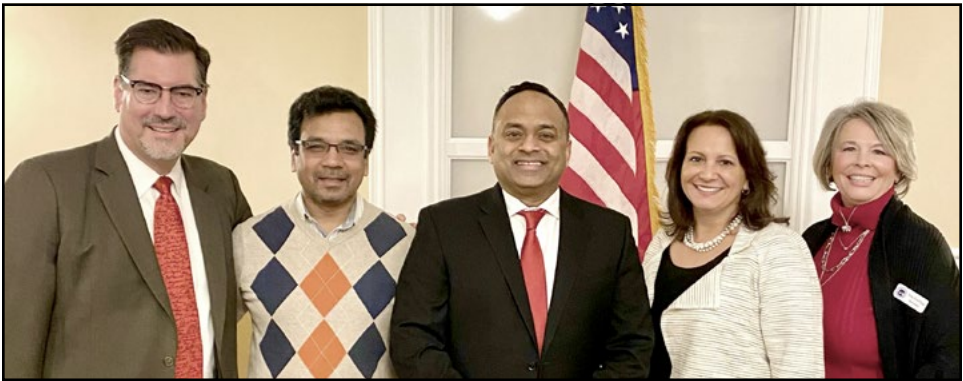
Meet Mario Massillamany County GOP chair elected in uncontested caucus

Hamilton County Parks gets 129 acres on White River in Noblesville

A significant amount of land in Hamilton County has been transferred by Central Indiana Land Trust, Inc. (CILTI) to Hamilton County Parks and Recreation (HCPR).

The transfer will result in the county park department gaining 129 acres of non-developed land, referred to as Burr Oak Bend, which is comprised of land parcels adjacent to and near an existing canoe landing HCPR currently owns and maintains.

Go all-in with Westfield Lions Club on biggest charity poker event to hit Midwest

The Westfield Lions Club’s Poker for Sight Tournament is coming back this spring.

In what has become the largest charity poke event in the Midwest, it draws players from across North America and is now an international success, as last November’s winner, Jack Dick, came all the way from Canada to take the top prize of \$10,000.

Thompson appointed NPD Deputy Chief

Noblesville Police Chief John Mann announced last Thursday that Lt. Jason Thompson has been appointed to the rank of Deputy Chief of the Support Division. Thompson replaces Shane Ginnan, who is now the Town Marshal of Yorktown.

“In the system we have setup here with staff, we’re really six working as one (police chief, assistant chief and four deputy chiefs). It is a true team effort,” Mann said. “Jason has the right chemistry, which he’s built up over his 17 years in the department, to be a perfect fit within our team approach.”

The support division includes the school resource officer program with No-

blesville Schools, traffic division, community service officers, intelligence division and the civilian staff.

Thompson has served the City of Noblesville for 17 years. For the past four months, he was the lieutenant with the criminal investigations division. Prior to that, he worked in the patrol division and also served as a field training officer and on the Emergency Services Unit.

Thompson graduated from Mount Vernon High School before attending the University of Southern Indiana, where he earned an undergraduate degree in political science and advertising in public relations. Thompson and his wife, Jennifer, have four children.

Westfield reveals State Road 32 plan

A new plan will expand State Road 32 to four lanes through much of downtown Westfield.

The plan publicly revealed last week would add lanes to State Road 32 from just east of U.S. 31 to just beyond Timberbrook Drive.

The project calls for widening other sections of State Road 32 and adding a roundabout at East Street.

City leaders cite worsening traffic congestion in

downtown Westfield as the reason for the project, which will require moving or demolishing 13 buildings.

The current plan calls for keeping at least one lane of traffic open at all times, but project leaders admit they are considering a full shutdown of State Road 32 from Poplar Street to Union Street at some point during construction.

City leaders are accepting public comment on the plan through Feb. 10.

Some business owners say although they’re excited about the changes they’re

concerned about its impact on their businesses.

“I know there’s going to be a lot of construction right around the corner for us for quite some time,” said Angela Gapinski, the owner of Root 31 plant nursery. “We’re very hopeful that our customers will still be here for us as we’ll still be here for them, and I think we can make it through this and then in the long run I think the payoff will be how many more people will be able to utilize our downtown as opposed to just us locals.”

“Parking, infrastructure,

and, hopefully, the city can work through those details because they are extremely important,” said Keith Dusko, the owner of Chiba, a Japanese restaurant. “My business is about increasing consideration and not the opposite, so if people are concerned about parking and infrastructure, they might go somewhere else. It’s good and bad overall.”

Work is set to begin in the spring 2023.

Westfield Chief of Staff Todd Burtron to retire, Jeremy Lollar appointed

Westfield Mayor Andy Cook announced last Friday that Chief of Staff Todd Burtron is retiring after 26 years of service to the city.

“Todd is a natural leader and a man of deep faith,” Cook said. “He’s chosen to put those attributes together and take his skills to the next level as a future attorney. He has served Westfield with distinction and with honor and I am grateful for the many years he has dedicated to our wonderful city.”

Burtron first served as a firefighter, followed by five years as

Westfield fire chief. He was appointed Chief of Staff by Mayor Cook in 2011. In that role, he was instrumental in developing Westfield’s Grand Park Sports Campus, negotiated the \$91 million sale of the city’s water and sewer utilities, implemented a fiscal Sustainability Strategy and helped move city employees to a self-funded insurance program.

His retirement from Westfield comes after he was recently accepted to Indiana University Robert H. McKinney School of Law.

“There are not enough words

lead such a dynamic team who have transformed Westfield in so many positive ways.”

Mayor Cook has appointed the current director of the Department of Public Works, Jeremy Lollar, as the new Chief of Staff. Lollar began his career with Westfield in 2005 as a water supervisor and then assistant director before becoming director of public works. Lollar graduated from Indiana Wesleyan University with a Bachelor of Business Administration degree.

“Working with Todd over

the last seven years has been a highlight of my professional career,” Lollar said. “He has been an exceptional mentor, leader and friend during my tenure as director of public works and the city is forever changed by the impact of his service. It is an incredible honor to be following in his footsteps and I look forward to continuing to advance this community in the direction that he and the mayor have guided us over the last 10 years.”

Burtron’s last day with the city is Feb. 27.

as Vice Chair. As the new chairman, Massillamany will appoint a replacement after a short transition period.

Riley then presented Outgoing Chairwoman Laura Campbell with an award for her six years of volunteer service as party chair. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. Outgoing Chairwoman Campbell then took a vote to suspend the rules, and 160 voting members of the caucus verbally voted in Mario Massillamany by acclamation. While Massillamany ran unopposed, the party still

needed to hold the caucus to officially elect him as the new chairman.

All Precinct Committeemen and Vice Committeemen on the official Hamilton County Republican Precinct list were eligible to vote. Massillamany’s ex-wife and mother to his children and sitting Hamilton County Councilor Amy Fuson Massillamany introduced Mario.

This just might be in a chapter of the book I am writing ... just saying.

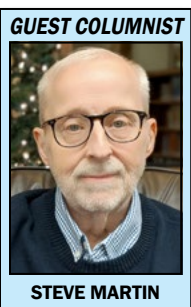

Salute to Sheridan's own Ron Stone

A few weeks back, I wrote a tribute to some of Sheridan's important women who have helped to hold our community together over the years. I would like to take this opportunity to honor one of the men who has played a key role in keeping this community ongoing.

Ron Stone has been a friend as well as a stalwart supporter of the Sheridan community for years. I first met and worked with Ron during the Sheridan sesquicentennial celebration year of 2010. Ron was heavily involved in the celebration as the co-chair. His primary job was organizing the high school class reunion program, but he was also involved in other activities, most notable for me the Sesquicentennial Time Capsule project, which he and I cooperated on putting together.

One of 10 children, Ron has lived in the Sheridan community all his life. When he graduated from high school, he decided he wanted to continue his education, so he went to Indiana Wesleyan in Marion and earned a degree in education. Ron and wife Mary, whom he met in college, were both hired as teachers at Hamilton Heights. Both were elementary teachers, and Ron did an eight-year

stint as a principal before returning to the classroom. He retired in 2009 after many enjoyable years as a fourth-grade teacher as well as a few years teaching fifth and sixth grades, as well as the aforementioned principalship.

Ron has been the president of the Sheridan Historical Society for 11 years.

During his presidency, the Society has experienced growth and stability. His most important project to date has been to oversee the transition from the old museum at 308 S. Main to the newer and larger museum across the street at 315 S. Main. Ron was instrumental in the purchase and remodeling of what was a formerly a motorcycle repair shop, doing most of the work himself along with a little help from some skilled trades people such as electricians, plumbers, HVAC, and others.

The museum is nearly complete now and Ron's attention is turning to the rescue, restoration, and repurposing of the old Sheridan Monon Train Depot. He is also currently completing his second term on the Adams Township Advisory Board and one of his duties as a member of that Board is to serve as the Adams Township Coordinator for the Hamilton County Bicentennial Committee.

Deaf family's kindness opens my eyes

This month's column is about a mom and her two children that rightsized my attitude and refreshed my thinking.

Feeding Team volunteers regularly experience first-hand the generosity of our neighbors in Hamilton County. On occasion we see the flip side too. We have the opportunity to see neighbors desperate who take more than a reasonable amount of food. We often say that you can't steal from a pantry, we're giving it away, but admittedly it's discouraging to come across someone with a blanket spread out, dozens of meals on the blanket and you watch as the blanket becomes an extra-large knapsack walking away full of food. The pantries are intended to feed as many neighbors as we can, a few meals at a time as needed. They are not intended to be used as a grocery store.

Less than a week ago, my attitude got rebooted as a mother and her children approached a pantry with a large blue cooler on wheels. My mistaken assumption was that they were at the pantry to take too much food. Boy was I wrong! Instead, they were here this day to teach me a lesson – a lesson that will not soon be forgotten.

Initially, the mom and a young boy hopped out of the van and headed toward the pantry, blue cooler in tow. As the two arrived at the pantry the mother began to speak with the youngster in sign language. She opened the pantry door and methodically signed to him for several minutes with what turned out to be instructions on the pantry, where things

went, and I presume why they were donating food. The boy, compliant with the direction, proceeded to open the cooler and remove items, placing them meticulously on the proper shelf. With each addition, the mom continued to sign, presumably offering encouragement and direction. After about 10 minutes, the boy returned to the van, and he was replaced by a young girl. The entire previous 10 minutes repeated with the mom and the daughter.

We all can fall victim to assumption from time to time. In this case, two young children and their mother set an example for me to learn from. Teaching future generations the value of giving back and taking care of others is a vital life lesson. Teaching an older dog to not assume another person's motive is also a life lesson. Thank you to a mother and her two children who I will likely never meet. Together we help hungry neighbors, welcome to the Feeding Team.

Neighbors ask, “Why do this? What's in it for you?” The answer is always the same: Serving people feeds my soul. It is a calling, not work.

There were many sup-

pers when we as a young couple with young kids could only afford Dinty Moore beef stew and a potato for dinner. Surreal moment. This is why the pantries exist. As a typical young family, we could not always make ends meet.

This is why feedingteam.org exists – all starting from a can of beef stew. Thank you for embracing the pantries. We love serving with you.

In future columns we will share more stories from neighbors about how your generosity served them in times of need. Be assured that the face of hunger in Hamilton County is not what you may think.

In practical terms, this straightforward way to help neighbors is having real impact on lives, families, and our communities. Thank you. A few meals can change the course of a person's life. A can of green beans means so much more when you have nothing to feed your kids. Would you like to get involved? We are in the process of evaluating our next 10 pantry locations. “This is absolutely wonderful and thank you very, very much for the donation,” MSP Vice President Bill Miller said. “In honor of the donation, we on the board have decided that we are going to change the name of the physical building of our home here from the Westfield Playhouse to the Basile Westfield Playhouse. We are already three-quarters of the way to getting [the new signage] up, so you will see it on the front of the building very soon.”

Frank Basile said he was the one who should be thanking MSP for the change to help promote the arts in Westfield and beyond.

“I want to thank you and the board and the theater for giving Katrina and me the opportunity to do this – to use our resources for something that is this important in the community,” Basile said.

Miller and the rest of the board are looking forward to being able to offer even more to Hamilton County because the donation comes with no strings.

“The donation that they have given us is going to let the theater go to the next level,” Miller said. “One of the very important things is that this is an unrestricted gift, so we are going to take a large part of that and put it into operations. As most of you know, community theaters have very limited budgets.

It was not that long ago that we were hand to mouth. Everything we took in from the plays we turned around and spent for the plays.”

MSP Board Member Tom Smith, who Miller called MSP's “anchor to the community” interjected, “It was August of 2020 when Kevin [Shadle] said we have \$19 in the operations account.”

Thanks to the Basile donation and the level of community support for the new playhouse, MSP is on much more solid ground now than they were before the pandemic.

According to MSP President Brandi Davis, “The donation from Frank and Katrina Basile will help guarantee that we will continue to be able to produce the high-quality entertainment that Westfield has come to expect from MSP.”

Frank and Katrina Basile thanked the MSP board repeatedly for the opportunity to be a part of the Westfield and Hamilton County arts community. The gratitude for this new partnership clearly goes both ways.

“It was a joy to work with Mr. Basile on this donation,” Miller said. “He believes strongly in our mission and wanted to help us take our theater to the next level. In the coming several months you will see new improvements to our home to enhance your experience while at our playhouse.”

Our summer was spent exploring the southern Indiana countryside and lazily whiling away in the shade shifts until sunset and the flicker of fireflies, just a boy and his dog. Twilight knew no better best friends. Timmy and Lassie had nothing over us. I loved pulling the day’s ticks off her nightly, just as Mom did for me. My Lady.

One day, Lady went missing. I inquired about her whereabouts. My straight-faced parents informed me that she was taken to the St. Meinrad seminary. They assured me the monks would take good care of Lady.

I don’t recall being told why Lady was taken to live with the monks. Had she killed a neighbor’s chicken? I’m not sure our neighbors even had chickens. Perhaps I am mixing that up with a Lassie episode. Seems like chickens were always dying on that show, with Lassie catching the blame before proving her innocence by the closing credits.

At the time, I would’ve preferred that Lady had been taken to “the farm” that I had always heard about. It seemed a better place for a dog, especially since I knew a lot of kids whose dogs had been taken there. I imagined a farm with tons of relocated dogs playing with one another. Never a lonely day on a dog farm. What a lovely thought.

My straight-faced parents told me maybe we could visit her sometime, but that never happened. Apparently, monks needed a lot of quiet time and seldom were allowed visitors. At least Lady was in a place where she was undeniably safe and loved.

Lady had successors, each outdoor dog meeting its violent demise. Rural routes can be tough on dogs. Patches was hit by a car, a little lifeless lump of white fur that I spotted in a snowy ditch. Barney met her tragic end in a neighbor’s barn while giving birth to her final litter of pups. Barney had popped out so many litters in her lifetime that she should’ve been in the *Guinness Book of World Records*. (My Aunt Carol, knowing we were heart-broken about Patches, found Barney for us. She told us Barney was a male. Aunt Carol was a nurse. We trusted she knew the difference between male and female dogs. But then the pups started popping out of our new dog. Much to our surprise, Barney was really a Bernice. Still, we stuck with the Barney name.) Schooner was another roadside casualty, as was Captain, as was Jack.

But Lady. She was something special. I never had to deal with the death of Lady. She was protected by monks – a surety always carried within my heart. Nothing bad could happen to her out there with God’s people in a land so special it was named after a saint. She was in heaven before she was in heaven. A lovely thought.

Fast forward to 2012. I was 48. To celebrate my folks’ 50-year wedding anniversary, I decided to gift them with a professional photo session using the bucolic seminary as a backdrop.

As we crossed the seminary’s campus, I recalled Lady. I hadn’t thought about her in decades. Finally, after all these years, my parents and I actually visited the seminary grounds together for the first time. I said to them, “Hey, I wonder if Lady is still here.”

I knew there was no way that Lady could still be alive. Still, it was a comforting thought.

My parents stopped dead in their tracks. They looked at each other without saying a word. After 50 years of living together, I’m sure telepathy came easily for them. They finally looked at me.

“What did you say?” Dad asked.

“You guys brought Lady out here to live.”

“We didn’t bring Lady here,” Mom said.

“Lady and the monks,” I said.

“We didn’t bring a dog here,” Dad said.

“Lady and the monks,” I said again. They were getting up there in years. Obviously, their fading memories needed a jump-start.

They looked at each other again. They both smiled, as if freed from the burden of an ancient lie.

“Lady and the monks?” I persisted.

“We didn’t bring Lady here.”

“My God. All my life I believed Lady was here.”

I recalled Mom telling me about the pet bunnies she and her siblings always got as gifts on Easter. How they were the cutest things. How they would mysteriously vanish after a few months. How fried rabbit was served for dinner the day after each disappearance. This vicious cycle went on for years.

“What the hell happened to Lady?”

I braced myself for an awful truth. She was run over. Shot by a chicken farmer. Fell down a well. My God, did we eat Lady for dinner?

Mom started to relay the bad news, but Dad butted in. “We took Lady to the farm.”

It took a few seconds to process the news. “Thank God,” I said. “I was scared something bad had happened to my Lady.”

Learning to live by 10/10/80 rule

In previous columns we talked about goal planning, smarter goals, and life goals. Today we talk about an extremely important topic: money goals. When it came to money, my father, a hardworking teacher/farmer, had one simple rule. He called it 10/10/80. His theory under 10/10/80 was to give away 10 percent, save 10 percent, and live off 80 percent.

As a Christian, my father believed that we are made in God’s image and specifically designed to worship Him. As an act of worship to God and in recognition that all our blessings come from Him, we give 10 percent back to Him. Even if you do not believe in God, giving away 10 percent, be it a non-profit or other charity, has positive practical consequences. When we freely give, it prevents us from obsessing about money and becoming greedy. For money is not itself an end, but merely a means to an end. Moreover, giving spreads your influence. As we discussed in the column on LIFE Goals, giving enables us to build lasting

connections and relationships, and may provide unforeseen opportunities and blessings.

It was my father’s goal to save enough money to cover his own expenses and to leave an inheritance for his children and grandchildren as his parents and grandparents had done for him. Thus, he was committed to saving 10 percent of his earning. At the dinner table one night, I asked when do you spend the 10 percent that is saved? He had an easy, five step response:

1. Do you want it? If not, don’t buy it.
2. If you want it, do you need it? If you don’t need it, don’t buy it.
3. If you want it and need it, do you have money in savings to purchase it? If you don’t have money in the saving account, don’t buy it.
4. If you want it, and you need it, and you have money set

back to buy it, you ask could you *really* do without it?

5. If you want it, and you need it, and you have the money set back to buy it, and you can’t do without it, then go ahead and buy it. Otherwise keep the money in the bank!

My father’s theory on saving certainly takes discipline and self-control, yet, from my observation, served him well and enabled him to leave an inheritance for both me and my children.

Finally, are you willing to live off the 80 percent? In an age of credit cards, the internet, and Amazon Prime; where anything and everything you desire can be dropped on your doorstep within a matter of days, living within your means has become increasingly difficult. Our society values excess over temperance, extravagance over moderation. Living off the 80 percent requires discipline and perse-

We all have something in common with Olympians: The need for flexibility!

The Winter Olympics are on the horizon! And while I do not catch every sport, there are several that I will not miss seeing: figure skating, Alpine skiing, luge, and curling, to name a few! While I have certainly never been (nor have most of you I am assuming!) the caliber of an Olympic athlete, we actually do have something in common with them if we are serious about our exercise and activity level.

What do we have in common with Olympic athletes as well as top-tier athletes in every sport? The need for FLEXIBILITY! Yes, stretching before any physical activity is part of *every* athlete’s regimen AND should be part of our daily schedule as well. Whether you are a 16-year-old tennis player, an 80-year-

old golfer, or anyone in between, proper stretching will enable you to perform better and most importantly to avoid injury. In particular, as we age stretching becomes even more important to ward off age-related stiffness and to promote coordination and balance.

Many of you readers may take a regular yoga class or use DVDs, etc., and that is great. And some of you readers may be somewhat intimidated by imagining yourself in a yoga class, and I understand – yoga is not for everyone. However, we can all increase our flexibility with some level of participation in a regular stretching routine. If you have issues with your back, knees, or hips – or know that you have low bone

density – you should look for well-trained teachers who provide alternative poses and options. Please remember that not all teachers are trained to do this. Modifications are very important as we are all different and no class or program is “one size fits all.” In particular, avoid strenuous twists and bending from the hips if you have osteoporosis. And, please, be sure to check with your physician to find out if any movements are contraindicated for your situation.

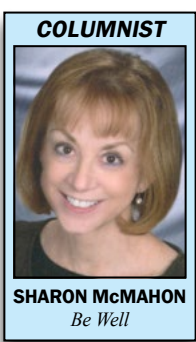

Gleaners Food Bank of Indiana does more work in Hamilton County than many people realize, in large part because there is a greater need here than is often perceived. In addition, the work they do to help directly with food for those in need, they also offer a great deal of information, resources and assistance for people who struggle with food insecurity. The Reporter spoke with Gleaners CEO John Elliott about the work they do and a new series of videos that offers even more information online. “I think people would be surprised at the level of food insecurity in Hamilton County,” Elliott said. “That applies to SNAP eligibility, WIC eligibility and other programs as well. Just the size of the population in Hamilton County even with small percentages still adds up to a lot of people.”

According to [Gleaners.org](#), Hamilton County has 27,190 food insecure people, 7,440 of whom are children. Hamilton County has a 5 percent poverty rate and 21 percent of the population is working but not earning enough. Gleaners Food Bank recently launched a new video series called “Feeding the Future: A Bite-Sized Series,” featuring short videos educating Hoosiers on the services Gleaners offers throughout their 21-county service area and beyond. One of the recent videos focuses on SNAP, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. You can see all the Gleaners videos at [gleaners.org/feeding-the-future](#). “Gleaners and most of the 200 Feeding America food banks are involved in helping neighbors deter-

mine eligibility for SNAP and, depending on the state statutes, help them sign up. It is a supplemental program; that’s the ‘S’ in SNAP,” Elliott told The Reporter. For families who are in poverty or facing some mix of barriers, it is often hard work to find access to and then to fully utilize the opportunities. “You’ll typically have some earned income, with SNAP and/or WIC, but for many households that’s still not enough, depending on the number in the family and their circumstances,” Elliott said. “The non-profit sector then fills that remaining gap.” In the last two years, people from all walks of life have been experiencing – often for the first time in their lives – the need for non-profit organizations like Gleaners and others.

According to Elliott, data is not as solid now, during the pandemic, as it was pre-pandemic, but he told The Reporter before the pandemic Hamilton County had consistently been at about 5 percent food insecurity and at a little over 5 percent poverty rate for years. Since its inception, Gleaners has distributed over 460 million pounds of food and critical grocery products through more than 500 hunger relief agencies and partners serving needy Hoosiers. In addition to food distribution to agencies, Gleaners serves Indiana’s most vulnerable populations, seniors and children, through specialty programs. 'Hounds win seventh straight title, Huskies get first team win since 2009

Two Hamilton County schools won wrestling sectional championships last Saturday.

One of the schools continued a long dynasty, while the other school claimed a title for the first time in over a decade.

Carmel won its seventh consecutive sectional championship, scoring 267.5 points to win at Frankfort's Case Arena. The Greyhounds pulled away in the placement rounds with six wrestlers winning individual titles, and that helped Carmel finish comfortably ahead of runner-up Hamilton Southeastern's 215 points. It's the 27th sectional title for the Greyhounds in program history.

The 'Hounds started the finals with two champions, as 106-pound sophomore Tamir Halevi and 113-pound junior Gavin Thompson winning both their matches by fall. That gave Carmel bonus points. Isaac Ward was the next Greyhounds champion, taking the 126-pound match by a 3-1 decision. Carmel then had three middle weights win all in a row, and all by pin: Nayl Sbay at 145, Eitan Halevi at 152 and Nathan Powell at 160.

The Greyhounds had 12 wrestlers finish in the top four, thus qualifying them for next Saturday's North Montgomery regional. Caleb Mattingly (120) and Michael Major (132) both placed second; Luke Farling (138), Joseph Del Busto (195) and Jack Milligan (285) both finished third and Samuel Johnson (182) took fourth.

Southeastern had three individual champions and qualified 11 wrestlers on to the regional. The Royals were solid in the heavier weights, with Ryan Cast winning the 170-pound championship match by fall. Max Broom won the 195 final with a pin, and Dom Burgett toughed out a 2-1 decision for the title at 285.

Three Southeastern wrestlers finished as runners-up: Zach Lang at 138 pounds, De Shawn Ternoir at 160 and Charlie Irish at 220. Third-place Royals were Nick Anderson (113) and Ryan Hartig (145), while Tyler Jackson (106), Riley Fredericksen (132) and Nick Jakubs (152) all placed fourth.

Westfield finished a close third as a team, scoring 212 points. The Shamrocks had two champions, starting with Braxton Vest, who won the 120-pound title match by fall. Ike O'Neill then claimed the 138-pound title by a 5-4 decision in the final.

Westfield qualified 12 wrestlers out to the regional. Runners-up were Chase Camire (106), Porter Temples (113) and Mihail Platonov (285). Boys basketball

Millers finish busy week 2-1

The Noblesville boys basketball team played three games against county opponents last week at The Mill.

First, the Millers dropped a 69-52 Hoosier Crossroads Conference game to Westfield last Tuesday. Noblesville rebounded last Friday to beat Hamilton Southeastern 74-65 in another HCC contest, then defeated Guerin Catholic 67-57 last Saturday.

HOT SHOOTING

Westfield's win over the Millers was significant win for two reasons.

First, the Shamrocks are having to adjust to playing without Braden Smith, who is sidelined for the next few weeks with a foot injury. Smith was there to cheer on his team from the bench during the game.

And the second reason?

"A lot of people probably don't realize this: This is our first conference win this year," said 'Rocks coach Shane Sumpter. Westfield was 0-3 in HCC play before finally breaking through.

The 'Rocks never trailed during the contest. Cam Haffner scored the game's first baskets, both on floaters, to give Westfield a 4-0 lead. Aaron Fine got the Millers on the board with a three-point play.

The Shamrocks slowly built their lead throughout the game, outscoring Noblesville in each quarter. Westfield never went on any long runs during the game; in fact, a 7-0 run at the start of the second quarter was their longest spurt of the game. But the Sham-

rocks did have several instances of consecutive scores, while allowing the Millers to do that only three times in the game.

"We're having to adjust here on the fly with really one practice since we haven't had Braden," said Sumpter. "We've played two really good basketball games where we've moved the basketball, we've shared the ball. We've done a lot of good things, and that's all we can do. We played really well tonight. We made a lot of shots."

A Haffner 3 put Westfield up 11-5 late in the first quarter before Fine's layin and a Luke Almodovar steal and dunk cut the lead to 11-9. That would be the score at the end of the first period, and that's when the 'Rocks went on their 7-0 run. Sam Bishop drained a 3, then Alex Romack hit two free throws and Haffner scored on a jumper.

Everyone was getting into the act. Reiner Obray came off the bench in the second quarter and made a 3-pointer to push Westfield's lead into double digits (23-12) for the first time. Almodovar began heating up for the Millers in the second period as well, pouring in 14 points (including four triples). His fourth 3 got Noblesville within 30-25, but Haffner's jumper and Bishop's and-1 with 0.6 seconds left in the half gave Westfield a 35-25 advantage at the break.

The pattern continued in the second half. Westfield threw in four more 3s in the latter half of the third quarter, with Haffner making two and

Bishop and Trey Buchanan each making one. Almodovar hit two 3s for Noblesville, and Fine had a triple as well. But Haffner had the last word, and his second 3 of the quarter gave Westfield a 53-37 lead heading into the fourth.

Haffner threw in three more 3s in the fourth quarter. He finished the game with six triples and lead all scorers with 32 points. Romack had 16 points and Bishop scored 10.

"Just a total team effort," said Sumpter.

Almodovar made seven 3-pointers for the game and finished with 25 points. Fine scored 12.

"They deserved to win," said Noblesville coach Scott McClelland. "The tougher team won tonight by far. They just kicked us all night. They just out-toughed us. They wanted it more. Credit to their kids and their coaching staff. They just kicked us."

MILLERS CAN'T MISS

There are some nights when a basketball team can't miss, and Noblesville's boys had a night like that last Friday.

With a nice-sized crowd cheering them on, the Millers put together a great shooting performance during their win over Southeastern. Noblesville is now sitting in a three-way tie for second place in the conference with a 3-2 record.

"All those HCC game are tough," said McClelland. "There's no easy ones."

Southeastern got off to a good start, leading 6-2 within the first couple minutes of the

game. Sam Jacobs, Donovan Hamilton and Reph Stevenson each scored baskets for the Royals.

Then Almodovar took over. The junior made a 3-pointer and followed that with a layin to put Noblesville ahead 7-6. Jacobs answered that with a layin, but then the Millers went on a quick 8-0 run. E.J. Smith hit two 3s, with Fine making a layin in between. Noblesville led 15-8 and would not trail again.

The Millers were up 19-15 at the end of the first quarter. Noblesville slowly increased its lead throughout the second period; a basket from Cooper Bean and a 3 by Fine pushed the Millers ahead 29-19 late in the quarter. Later, Smith drained a long 3 to give Noblesville a 34-23 advantage.

Hamilton's putback kept Southeastern within 34-25 at halftime. The second half began with five quick points from Bean, a triple and a basket off a steal, and the Millers were suddenly up 39-25.

"I thought we played better, certainly better than Tuesday night," said McClelland. "I still think this group's got plenty of room to grow."

Two free throws by Tyler Lacy cut Noblesville's lead to 43-35 with 3:53 left in the third, but the Millers went on a 9-0 spurt to reach their largest advantage of the game at 52-35. Fine and Smith made baskets, Almodovar was good on a three-point play, and Bean finished up the run with a dunk.

Hamilton County will host a public information meeting on Wednesday, February 9, 2022 at the Delaware Township Community Center, 9094 East 131st Street, Fishers, IN 46038, the information meeting will begin at 6pm and will conclude by 7:30pm. The purpose of the information meeting is to offer all interested persons an opportunity to review current preliminary design plans to the intersection of 146th Street and Allisonville Road in Hamilton County, Indiana.

The need for the project is based on the overall function of the 146th Street and Allisonville Road Intersection. This intersection operates poorly under peak hour traffic conditions. Traffic counts were collected at the project intersection in early December of 2017. Based on the traffic data, it was determined the traffic signal is metering the traffic flow, and the demand on the signal is greater than what is currently being served.

The projected 2023 AADT for 146th Street is 37,102 vehicles per day and Allisonville Road is projected to be 15,675 vehicles per day. Traffic is projected to increase to 48,549 vehicles per day along 146th Street and 20,511 along Allisonville Road by the year 2043. The intersection is congested during peak hour traffic (5:00 p.m. -6:00 p.m.) traffic. The predicted capacity issues will result in user delays and could result in traffic patterns shifting to other roadways.

The project will construct 146th Street over Allisonville Road via a new overpass bridge. There will be exit and entrance ramps connecting 146th Street to the roundabout on Allisonville Road below. Further, the project will include new storm sewer systems throughout the entirety of the project limits, whose pipe networks will discharge into the White River. New or reconstructed 8-foot-wide HMA pedestrian paths will be installed on the west, south, and east legs of the project. The project will also include the reconstruction of the northern portion of the roadway that circles the Northridge Retirement Facility in the southwest quadrant of the intersection, a new entrance to the Willow Crest neighborhood in the southeast quadrant of the intersection, and a new frontage road to provide access to six residential properties in the northeast quadrant of the intersection. The westbound (29-0230W) and eastbound (29-0230E) bridges carrying 146th Street over White River are located approximately 900 feet west of the Allisonville Road intersection. Under Des. No. 1801865 (westbound) and 1801866 (eastbound), these bridges would be widened to accommodate the additions of both an acceleration and deceleration lanes.

The Maintenance of Traffic (MOT) plan for the project involves closing northbound/southbound traffic on Allisonville Road. SR 37 will provide an alternative route for northbound/southbound traffic. The following is a description of the traffic sequencing during construction:

Phase 1: Construct crossover pavement in the grass median west of Allisonville Road. Remove median curbs along 146th Street and Allisonville Road within the project limits.

Phase 2abc: Traffic will be shifted on existing pavement to allow the construction of the ramps off-ramp. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained in the eastbound and westbound directions, while one lane will be maintained in the northbound and southbound directions. Right turns will be allowed for every direction during this phase. The 146th Street Bridge over the White River will be widened during this phase and traffic will be shifted on the bridge during several sub phases to allow construction.

Phase 2d: Allisonville Road will be closed to construct the pavement connecting the newly constructed ramps. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained in each direction on 146th Street.

Phase 3a: Allisonville Road still closed to construct the rest of Allisonville Road to the north and south and the piers for 146th Street bridge over Allisonville Road. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained in each direction on the newly constructed ramps.

Phase 3b: Allisonville Road is reopened with one lane north and southbound with right turns only. 146th Street traffic remains on the ramps while 146th Street, the retaining walls, and the bridge are constructed.

Phase 4: Traffic is open in all directions with some single lane closures to allow for removing temporary pavement throughout the project; finalize curb, gutter, and pedestrian path construction; reconstruct center curbs; and to allow milling and overlay on the eastern end of the project.

The preferred project alternative will require 1.7 acres of additional new permanent right-of-way, 1.11 acres of temporary right-of-way and 16 relocations of which 11 have already been acquired in anticipation of the project.
