#### Great American Songbook Foundation adds songwriter collections to growing archives

Historical collections from three noted songwriters are among the latest acquisitions for the Great American Songbook Foundation's Songbook Library & Archives in Carmel.

Founded in 2008, the Songbook Library & Archives has become a major repository for the preservation of artifacts and arrangements from the 20th century golden age of American popular music. The collections attract musicians and scholars from around the world and provide content for the Foundation's gallery exhibits and educational programs.

"These materials hold so many untold stories from the history of American popular music and the culture in general," Songbook Foundation Executive Director Christopher Lewis said. "It is vitally important to catalog and preserve them for future generations of scholars and music lovers."

The new acquisitions come from the personal collections of the following three men:

#### **Kenneth Jacobson** (1930-2021)

Jacobson was a musical theater composer and songwriter whose work was performed and recorded by an amazing range of artists, including Ella Fitzgerald, Frank Sinatra, the Andrews Sisters, Count Basie, Jerry Lee Lewis, Jackie Wilson

He also is remembered for his AIDS activism with the ACT UP organization.

Acquired materials include: musical arrangements, scores, orchestrations and scripts written for concert, theatrical and television performances; demos and published recordings; photos, press clippings and correspondence; and notebooks with handwritten character sketches, lyrics and notes.

#### **Howard Johnson** (1887-1941)

Johnson was a leading Tin Pan Alley lyricist and a charter member of ASCAP who penned over 100 songs, including "I Scream, You Scream, We All Scream for Ice Cream" and "M-O-T-H-E-R (A Word That Means the World to Me)." He was named to the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1970.

Acquired materials include: two bound volumes of sheet music with lyrics written by Johnson; miscellaneous typed and handwritten lyrics, song titles and correspondence; various news clippings; and a handcrafted wooden tabletop honoring his ASCAP membership.

#### **Earl Shuman** (1923-2019)

Perhaps best known for "Hey There Lonely Girl," a No. 2 hit in 1970 for R&B singer Eddie Holman, Shuman wrote lyrics sung by Barbra Streisand, Sammy

# Shaffer responds to Worrell's letter

The chairman of the Carmel (CCCFC) scorned my 215-word letter to the editor (Feb. 2, 2002, Shafserve as warning for rest of county) but missed the mark:

1. The letter highlighted the growing debt service requirements and potential difficulty meeting them. dence to dispute that claim.

2. CCCFC labels a "misleading generalization" the citing of \$86 million debt payment due by the end of the year. The number came from the city to the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance (IDLGF). CCCFC knows that, and they also know the \$86 million will grow 23 percent next year to \$105.9 million.

3. CCCFC claimed the city's fistability as proof, writing, "It has not been necessary to raise the city prop-

erty tax rate in six years." Six years ago, the rate was 0.7007 and this year, the Hamilton County Treasurer.

4. CCCFC said water and sanitary fer: Carmel's debt service payments sewer bonds are paid by "not a dime of tax money." My letter never claimed they were. Those bonds will be repaid by increased water and sewer utility bills – a hidden tax.

5. "Historically low interest rates" CCCFC offered an opinion but no evi- claimed by CCCFC is a terminological inexactitude supported by no data. In fact, the three Proscenium bonds CCCFC endorsed totaled \$16.9 million in principal and \$19.3 million in interest, again according to data the city provided the IDLGF. That's an effective interest rate of 54 percent, a bit above any historically low level.

6. "Inflation will make it easier not harder for Carmel to retire the debt," CCCFC opined. What? Inflation is a nances are solid and used property tax hidden tax that hits hardest those on fixed incomes, the poor and the underemployed hardest.

The CCCFC chairman voted for virtually every dime of the city's \$1.5 City Council Finance Committee 0.7877, up 12.5 percent, according to billion debt. He sat on the Carmel Redevelopment Commission virtually from Day One. According to the finance committee's investigation of the Hotel Carmichael cost overruns scandal, CCCFC knew of the overruns a year before they were disclosed to the public. The report states: "Council members Kevin Rider and Jeff Worrell CCCFC met with redevelopment officials Jan. 2, 2019 to discuss the updated \$53.5 million estimate at length." Overruns were disclosed in January 2020.


