## Great American Songbook Foundation adds songwriter collections to growing archives

Historical collections from three noted songwriters are among the latest acquisitions for the Great American Songbook Foundation's Songbook Library & Archives in Carmel.

Founded in 2008, the Songbook Library & Archives has become a major repository for the preservation of artifacts and arrangements from the 20th century golden age of American popular music. The collections attract musicians and scholars from around the world and provide content for the Foundation's gallery exhibits and educational programs.

"These materials hold so many untold stories from the history of American popular music and the culture in general," Songbook Foundation Executive Director Christopher Lewis said. "It is vitally important to catalog and preserve them for future generations of scholars and music lovers."

The new acquisitions come from the personal collections of the following three men:

**Kenneth Jacobson (1930-2021)**

Jacobson was a musical theater composer and songwriter whose work was performed and recorded by an amazing range of artists, including Ella Fitzgerald, Frank Sinatra, the Andrews Sisters, Count Basie, Jerry Lee Lewis, Jackie Wilson and the Partridge Family.

He also is remembered for his AIDS activism with the ACT UP organization.

Acquired materials include: musical arrangements, scores, orchestrations and scripts written for concert, theatrical and television performances; demos and published recordings; photos, press clippings and correspondence; and notebooks with handwritten character sketches, lyrics and notes.

**Howard Johnson (1887-1941)**

Johnson was a leading Tin Pan Alley lyricist and a charter member of ASCAP who penned over 100 songs, including "I Scream, You Scream, We All Scream for Ice Cream" and "M-O-T-H-E-R (A Word That Means the World to Me)." He was named to the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1970.

Acquired materials include: two bound volumes of sheet music with lyrics written by Johnson; miscellaneous typed and handwritten lyrics, song titles and correspondence; various news clippings; and a handcrafted wooden tabletop honoring his ASCAP membership.

**Earl Shuman (1923-2019)**

Perhaps best known for "Hey There Lonely Girl," a No. 2 hit in 1970 for R&B singer Eddie Holman, Shuman wrote lyrics sung by Barbra Streisand, Sammy

# Shaffer responds to Worrell's letter

Dear Editor:  
The **chairman of the Carmel City Council Finance Committee (CCCFC) scorned** my 215-word letter to the editor (Feb. 2, 2002, **Shaffer: Carmel's debt service payments serve as warning for rest of county**) but missed the mark:

1. The letter highlighted the growing debt service requirements and potential difficulty meeting them. CCCFC offered an opinion but no evidence to dispute that claim.
2. CCCFC labels a "misleading generalization" the citing of \$86 million debt payment due by the end of the year. The number came from the city to the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance (IDLGF). CCCFC knows that, and they also know the \$86 million will grow 23 percent next year to \$105.9 million.
3. CCCFC claimed the city's finances are solid and used property tax stability as proof, writing, "It has not been necessary to raise the city prop-

erty tax rate in six years." Six years ago, the rate was 0.7007 and this year, 0.7877, up 12.5 percent, according to the Hamilton County Treasurer.

4. CCCFC said water and sanitary sewer bonds are paid by "not a dime of tax money." My letter never claimed they were. Those bonds will be repaid by increased water and sewer utility bills – a hidden tax.

5. "Historically low interest rates" claimed by CCCFC is a terminological inexactitude supported by no data. In fact, the three Proscenium bonds CCCFC endorsed totaled \$16.9 million in principal and \$19.3 million in interest, again according to data the city provided the IDLGF. That's an effective interest rate of 54 percent, a bit above any historically low level.

6. "Inflation will make it easier not harder for Carmel to retire the debt," CCCFC opined. What? Inflation is a hidden tax that hits hardest those on fixed incomes, the poor and the under-employed hardest.

The CCCFC chairman voted for virtually every dime of the city's \$1.5 billion debt. He sat on the Carmel Redevelopment Commission virtually from Day One. According to the finance committee's investigation of the Hotel Carmichael cost overruns scandal, CCCFC knew of the overruns a year before they were disclosed to the public. The report states: "Council members Kevin Rider and Jeff Worrell CCCFC met with redevelopment officials Jan. 2, 2019 to discuss the updated \$53.5 million estimate at length." Overruns were disclosed in January 2020.

If anyone should understand the precarious nature of Carmel's redevelopment experiment, the CCCFC chairman should.

Instead of attacking the messenger, the CCCFC chairman should be informing the public accurately and honestly.

Your readers deserve it.

Carmel is one of more than 400 municipalities and counties who have achieved a SolSmart designation since the program launched in 2016 and one of 108 Silver-designated cities.

"We are honored to receive this Silver SolSmart designation and it validates our historical work of clim-

inating red tape, promoting energy independence while improving local air quality and reducing CO2 emissions," Mayor Jim Brainard said. "Additionally, solar creates good paying jobs while also increasing Carmel residents' property values. It's a win-win all around for Carmel."

As a Silver level SolSmart designee, Carmel is helping solar installers and residents reduce the barriers and costs of solar installations. This allows even more local homes and businesses to obtain affordable, clean and reliable electricity through solar. The program uses objective criteria to award points to communities based on the actions they take to streamline solar energy development. Communities that take sufficient action are designated either gold, silver or bronze.

As part of the SolSmart program, a team of national experts provides no-cost technical assistance to help communities achieve designation. All municipalities, counties, and regional organizations are eligible to join the SolSmart program and receive this technical assistance. ## Hoosiers begin to receive fourth COVID shot

More and more people are getting a fourth dose of COVID-19 vaccine in Indiana. On Friday, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released new guidelines for people with weakened immune systems.

People who are immunocompromised, such as those who have cancer or an HIV infection, are the most vulnerable right now. So, the CDC is now recommending that they receive a fourth shot of Moderna or Pfizer at least three months after their third shot.

"When I read the CDC

guidelines that stated I should wait five months from a previous dose, I got online and I scheduled my appointment," said Bryan Headrick, a Noblesville resident.

On Monday, Headrick stopped by the vaccine clinic at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds for his fourth COVID-19 shot.

"I have leukemia and I was diagnosed eight years ago," Headrick said.

That means he's immunocompromised. Headrick has already tested positive two times.

"For me, because I am immunocompromised, I felt that it was very important to have that fourth dose," Head-

rick said. "The CDC guidelines say that my initial battery of doses would be three, so this finally is my booster."

"The fourth shot will be their booster versus people who aren't immunocompromised. It's a two-shot series followed six months later by a third-shot booster," Vice President of Medical Affairs at Franciscan Health, Dr. Christopher Doehring, said.

WISH-TV News 8 asked the Hamilton County Health Department how many people have gotten a fourth shot at the fairgrounds, but they say it's not something they track.

Headrick says that for him, the vaccines are neces-

sary.

"I just want to stay safe from COVID and I am anticipating that it will be an annual shot," Headrick said.

Doehring says the less robust your immune system, the harder it'll be to fight the disease.

"It's really an approach to try to preserve as optimal of immunoprotection as you can possibly have under the limitations of being immunocompromised," Doehring said.

For anybody who got the one-shot Johnson and Johnson vaccine, Doehring says it's recommended they get a booster shot at least two months later.

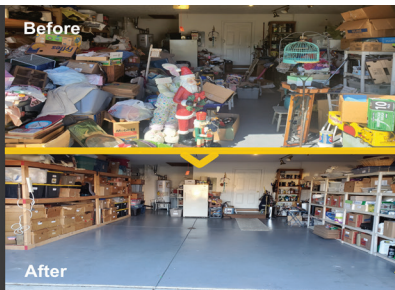

# Efficient Golden Eagles get tough win over Indianapolis Washington

**NOBLESVILLE** - The words of the evening for the Guerin Catholic boys basketball team were efficiency and composure, when the Golden Eagles hosted Indianapolis Washington Thursday at the Eagles Nest.

The Continentals came in to the game with 15 wins, a tough press defense and a hot-shooting night for one of its stars. The Golden Eagles kept their composure while navigating those things, and were extremely efficient from the field and the free-throw line, which added up to a 59-53 victory.

"They're a very good team," said Guerin Catholic coach Bobby Allen. "They've won 15 games for a reason. They're well-coached. They play hard. They're going to be a very dangerous team."

The Golden Eagles led for the majority of the game, with the exception of the start, when Washington's Latraveon Enright scored the first basket. Lucas Parker and Robert Sorensen answered with 3-pointers to get Guerin Catholic ahead 6-2. Parker drained another 3 later in the quarter, and baskets by Jack Cherry and Matthew Etchison gave the Golden Eagles a 13-5 lead at the end of one.

The Continentals started the second period with an 8-0 run, including back-to-back 3s by Ammon Burns, who was just getting warmed up. That tied the contest at 13-13. Patrick Baird got GC ahead with a layin and Will Grissom made two foul shots to end the run.

Burns' third triple of the game pushed Washington ahead 18-17, but Cherry answered with a traditional three-point play. Guerin was able to hold that lead until halftime, when the score was 22-19.

Parker opened the second half with another 3 to put the Golden Eagles up 25-19. Guerin Catholic wouldn't trail again, although the had to absorb Burns' scorching shooting, as he made four 3s in the period. One of those triples tied the game at 28-28, but Aden Cannon made an and-1 to get the Golden Eagles ahead for good at 31-28. Kamea Chandler and Cherry later hit 3s, with Cherry's basket finishing the third quarter and giving GC a 41-34 lead.

"We were balanced tonight," said Allen. "We shot the ball well from the perimeter. We were 6-of-12 from the 3-point line. It was nice to see Lucas Parker knock a couple

down and then Robert Sorensen hit one early for us. Jack Cherry had 12 points and six rebounds for us. He's someone who's been playing a lot more aggressive here down the stretch and I think that's a big difference for us. When he goes hard, I think the other guys respond well to him.

Cherry hit a layin early in the fourth to give the Golden Eagles a 43-35 lead, matching their biggest advantage of the game. Washington continued to play tough throughout the quarter, but Guerin Catholic stayed in front thanks to a perfect fourth period from the free-throw line. The Golden Eagles made all 12 of their free-throw attempts. Allen noted that Guerin Catholic was 17 of 18 overall from the line.

Sorensen led the Golden Eagles with 13 points, followed by Cherry's 12 points. Parker finished with 11 points, including

three 3s. Sorensen collected five rebounds and Grissom dished out five assists, also scoring nine points. All nine GC players that took to the floor scored at least two points, and the team collectively shot 53 percent, from the field, making 18 of 34 attempts.

"We're trying to share the ball more," said Allen. "When we move the ball, we feel like we have mismatches out there. We have a lot of guys that can shoot the ball, we have guys that can drive. But tonight, it came down to us making a couple more plays than them in the fourth quarter without turning the ball over, then knocking down free throws and that's what we needed."

Burns finished the game with 26 points, including eight 3-pointers.

The Golden Eagles are 11-8 and host Roncalli Tuesday to finish Circle City Conference play.

The No. 8 Huskies play No. 2 Garrett in the first semi-final at 10 a.m. The Railroaders are 25-1, with their only loss to Noblesville, 79-57 back on Nov. 13.

Garrett won Sectional 21 at Woodlan, beating Angola 40-32 in the semi-finals and Bishop Dwenger 47-29 in the championship. Junior Bailey Kelham is the Railroaders' leading scorer at 16.5 points per game, with senior Moran Ostrowski adding 12.0 points and 8.7 rebounds. Another senior, Nataley Armstrong, averages 9.1 points and 9.1 assists per game.

University took care of business at Sectional 43 at Western Boone. The 'Blazers beat No. 8 Cascade 63-51 in the first round, Covenant Christian 61-28 in the semi-finals and Park Tudor 41-28 in the championship.

Junior Payton Seay is the leading scorer for 21-4 University, averaging 15.1 points per game. Senior Patty Chikamba adds 13.8 points, while junior Kelsey DuBois contributes 13.0 points and leads the rebounds with 7.9 per contest. Chikamba and Seay both average 6.4 rebounds per game.

North Putnam and Heritage Christian will play in the noon semi-final at Southmont. The championship game is set for 8 p.m.
