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# Fishers Paralympian Noah Malone honored with Senate recognition

State Sen. Kyle Walker (R-Lawrence) on Feb. 7 honored Fishers native and Paralympian Noah Malone with Senate Concurrent Resolution 26, congratulating him on his inspirational life and performance at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games.  
A graduate of Hamilton Southeastern High School and current Indiana State University student athlete, Malone competed as a Paralympian for the USA Paralympic National Team in the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games. He brought home individual silver medals in the 100-meter and 400-meter races and a gold medal in the 400-meter mixed relay race.  
“On behalf of the Indiana Senate, I’m honored to present

Noah Malone with a Senate Concurrent Resolution congratulating him for his tremendous accomplishments representing Fishers, our state and country in the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games,” Walker said. “Noah’s spirit, perseverance and achievements are unmatched, and we’re so proud he calls Fishers home.”  
Malone has a rare genetic condition known as Leber Hereditary Optic Neuropathy, which impacts his sight. At Indiana State, Malone is one of the only legally blind athletes on scholarship in NCAA Division I sports, anchoring a team that set a school record in the 400-meter relay and setting the T12 world record in the 200-meter.  
Malone also won the 2019 IHSAA 200-meter champion-

ship and set several school records while at HSE, including the fastest time in the 100- and 200-meter.  
The resolution was authored by Sen. Walker and sponsored by Speaker of the House Todd Huston (R-Fishers).

## Lindsey Bennett awarded Noblesville’s ‘Stake in the Ground’

The Noblesville Common Council recognized City Attorney Lindsey Bennett as the 2021 Stake in the Ground honoree at its recent meeting.  
Bennett began working for Noblesville in 2020 in the newly created position to better assist the city in navigating increasingly complex legal issues associated with major infrastructure projects, new challenges in public health and safety, and economic development.  
“Lindsey walked into a hornet’s nest at the beginning of 2021,” Councilman Mark Boice said. “She had an awful lot of different things to deal with – from acquiring parcels for the Pleasant Street project to working on a class action lawsuit on opioids to try and go against the product manufacturers that are providing this poisonous drug and hurting so many people in our community. We are all very proud of Lindsey Bennett and the work she’s done for our great city.”  
Prior to joining Noblesville, Bennett was the assistant city attorney for the City of Fishers and the associate city attorney in Fort Wayne. She has a broad background in municipal law, contracts, real estate and utility issues. Bennett received her JD degree from the University of Tulsa College of Law, is a Noblesville resident, and is on the Board of Directors for Noblesville Youth Assistance Program.  
“This is my dream job, this is what I aspire to do, and I feel honored to be here every day,” Bennett said. “We have an incredible team here at the city and our team is the reason we’ve been able to accomplish so much the last two years. I love working with Mayor Jensen, City Council and our city staff. I truly appreciate this recognition and the way I’ve been welcomed to the city.”

## Carmel sophomore Jack Moe earns big bucks with online gaming

Carmel’s own Jack Moe is living the adolescent dream. At only 16, he’s making tens of thousands of dollars playing video games at home.  
Esports is a growing multi-billion-dollar industry that is becoming increasingly popular amongst the younger generations. This form of competition often manifests as organized multiplayer video games. Individuals and teams compete against one another in tournaments where members can win cash prizes ranging from hundreds to millions of dollars.  
Esports is the fastest growing sport in the world and draws from every continent. Gamers are using their skills by competing in esports tournaments around the world and turning their love for video games into a profession.  
Universities and schools around the world are incorporating esports into their awarding of scholarships, extracurricular activities, and some, like Butler University, are turning this profession into a minor.  
Currently, Fortnite – owned by Epic Games – is the most popular battle royale game in the world with 350 million registered users in 2021. It is the

# Sheridan public safety boosted with \$4K in grants

The Sheridan Police and Fire departments are the recipients of two safety grants from the Indiana Public Employers’ Plan, Inc. (IPEP). The purpose of the grants is to promote a safe work environment and assist with stretching each department’s risk management resources.  
According to Sheridan Clerk-Treasurer Elizabeth Walden, Sheridan Police received a \$1,936 grant to purchase first aid kits for police cars, AED pads, and miscellaneous safety items. Sheridan Fire’s grant of \$1,933.98 was used to purchase 50 high-visibility safety vests. Each depart-

*The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime* is the first play Larry Adams has ever directed, and he’s doing so for Carmel Community Players this month at the Cat, 254 Veterans Way, Carmel, from Feb. 25 through March 6.

“A few years ago, I was doing a show and telling the director that this was one of my favorite books ever,” Adams told the Reporter. “I am a family physician, and a neurologist I was working with handed me this book one day. I thought it was a weird title and how good could this possibly be? Once you start reading the book you just instantly get hooked into it. It’s just one of my favorite novels ever.”

*The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime* is based on the novel by Mark Haddon and was adapted for the stage by Simon Stephens.

The story centers on

15-year-old Christopher, who has an extraordinary brain. He is exceptional at mathematics but ill-equipped to interpret everyday life. He has never ventured alone beyond the end of his road, he detests being touched, and he distrusts strangers.

Now it is seven minutes after midnight, and Christopher stands beside his neighbor’s dead dog, Wellington, who has been speared with a garden fork. Finding himself under suspicion, Christopher is determined to solve the mystery of who murdered Wellington, and he carefully records each fact of the crime.

“I know I had that conversation with one of the folks out of Carmel and they needed somebody to direct this show,”

Adams said. “They called me because of my interest in it. I remember saying, ‘If you had told me any other show, I would have told you no, I won’t direct.’ But this one? I just couldn’t pass it up.”

Adams has been involved in community theater for at least 30 years, but this is his first time at the helm. He said this is an honest story that the has an im-

portant message.

“It’s a story about being different – a feeling to which I think each of us can relate at various points in our lives – and about seeing the world in a unique way, but it doesn’t romanticize away the challenges that come with those differences,” Adams said. “It’s funny, it’s dramatic, it’s poignant – but above all, it’s honest.”

When the song ended, I thanked Sarena profusely.

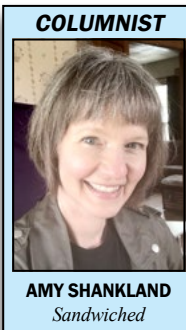
“Sarena, that meant so much to me,” I sobbed, “Especially since tomorrow is my dad’s birthday.”

County makes plans to close COVID-19 mass vaccine clinic

The COVID-19 vaccine clinic at the 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville will close its operation after Friday, Feb. 18.

“The demand for vaccinations has leveled off and there are now enough additional vaccine sites to fill the need,” said Chris Walker, emergency preparedness coordinator for the Hamilton County Health Department. “That means we no longer require as much space or staff to accommodate those still wanting or needing the COVID-19 vaccines.”

The Health Department will move its vaccination clinic back to its office at 18030 Foundation Drive, Noblesville, starting Mon-

day, Feb. 23. Appointments can still be made at [ourshot.in.gov](https://ourshot.in.gov) or by calling 2-1-1.

“Working from our office again will also allow us to get back to our primary role of providing childhood vaccinations alongside the COVID-19 vaccine,” said Jason LeMaster, administrator for the Hamilton County Health Department. “If there is another surge in demand, we’ll be prepared for it, but for now we feel we can manage it in-house.”



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# Paper Moon & other movies with Mom CODA Camp

We didn't finish *Paper Moon*. We started watching it last fall at my childhood home where I first saw the Peter Bogdanovich masterwork on TV as a kid sometime after its theatrical release in 1973.

*Paper Moon* is one of my favorites. It's a charming, funny, feel-good film. Mom was in a movie mood one afternoon. She hadn't seen *Paper Moon* before, and if not then, she likely never would. She was nearing the final throes of stage four colon cancer.



I'd fallen asleep. In that one-eyed moment, Debra Winger did make me forget about Jane. Maybe Mom was onto something after all.

A week later, Jane and I reunited, inspiring me to replay my Peaches and Herb "Reunited" 45 record, so much so that it started to snap, crackle and pop. Then Jane and I broke up again. Then we got back together. Then, during college, we parted for good. Suddenly, love seemed nothing more to me than a record that skipped, predictable chaos amidst the rpms, a shattered heart of glass.

In 2020, I published a book of essays about Mom, titled *What Are You Going To Write About When I'm Gone?* The introduction references another awkward movie experience with her, this time regarding Blake Edwards' *10*, a movie my underage buddies and I snuck into: "My mom made a surprise appearance during the movie after realizing her freshman son had deceived her by sneaking into an R-rated movie just to see Bo Derek change from her bathing suit into her birthday suit. She somehow found me in the dark theater and ordered me to leave with her. Luckily my buddies' eyes were too glued to Bo Derek's corn rows (or something like that) to witness my kidnapping. Even now, at 49, I still can't bring myself to rent *10*, too scared mom

will kick in my front door."

Even now, at 57, and even though Mom is now underground, I don't dare watch *10*. I'm sure she's watching over me – if not for that reason alone – ready to re-release her wrath thru the incessant, deafening tintinnabulation of windchimes that a friend gifted in her memory and that Bynne and I subsequently installed on our balcony. The chiming reminds us of her.

*Paper Moon* did what I had hoped. Ryan and Tatum O'Neal as Great Depression-set grifters made Mom laugh at times. Laughter had been the glue of our mother-son relationship. I took great comfort being able to watch the movie with her, even though her laughs sounded more like whispers then. She fell asleep before the movie's midpoint. A couple weeks later, when things had gotten worse for her, much worse, she said from her hospice-provided bed, "We should finish watching *Paper Moon*."

"We will," I said, but looking down at the husk of a woman that once was, I knew we wouldn't. There was scant laughter left to squeeze

from her. Even a hand squeeze was rare. She seemed satisfied with my answer, though, as if I'd given her hope that there was still time to un-pause the movie.

Last Christmas, the first without her, our small family visited Mom's grave, shared stories, cried some, and toasted her memory. We left a tiny, plastic cup of wine on her tombstone before heading home to claw through a Christmas that didn't seem like Christmas.

Dad, after one of his daily gravesite visits, called to let me know the cup was empty now, that Mom had finished her wine. "That or there are some very drunk birds flying around," I said.

I can't help but think about the opening lyrics to the American Standard, "It's Only A Paper Moon," from which *Paper Moon* got its title: "I never feel a thing is real / When I'm away from you . . ."

Mom's passing remains surreal. I wish she was still around to finish *Paper Moon*. I'm tempted to stream *10*, just to hear her chimes.

Most KODAs know sign language since their parent(s) is/are deaf, but some KODAs don't. I am a KODA and my brother is as well. Our dad is deaf and sign language is our first language. My mom is hearing, knows sign, and works at the Indiana School for the Deaf. Even though I have one deaf parent, and not two, I am not any less of a CODA than someone with two deaf parents.

Last summer I went to KODA Camp Midwest. This camp is for kids aged 6 to 16 who have at least one deaf parent, and it is located in Wisconsin.

To be honest, I was not excited at all: Two weeks away from my friends, my phone, my pets, my parents, and worst of all, my bed. I was so nervous to go to camp, but I knew I would be okay since my brother was a camp counselor. I was in a cabin with seven other campers and two counselors. I knew a few of the counselors because they went to camp with my brother, and I had met them before.

The first night at camp was terrifying to me. I had only made three new friends who weren't from Indiana, and I already thought some campers didn't like me, especially Juju. Juju had neon pink hair and I thought it was so cool. I tried to talk to Juju and get to know her, but I was getting bad vibes. I assumed Juju didn't like me and I didn't really talk to her the first few days of camp. Long story short, KODA love brought us together, and now Juju and I are really good friends.

Eventually, I started talking to more people and sitting with different people each mealtime. I became friends with a counselor named Taylor and the whole younger cabin really liked me, so I usually hung out in their room when we had free time. Taylor was the lead counselor in the younger cabin, so it made perfect sense to be down there.

My favorite part about camp was being in that environment, hanging out with the people who complimented me and made me feel good. It was also really cool to have a special connection to everyone at camp. Taylor has a video of me and my camp BFF Lilo dancing and screaming and jumping around to the song "transparent soul" by WILLOW.

CODA camp was probably the best time of my life. Though I did not admit it at first, I truly did enjoy KODA camp.

Though very fun and very enjoyable, KODA camp did have its downsides.

First of all, morning calisthenics were the worst things I've ever experienced. You get woken up at 6:45 in the morning and get forced outside in the cold, in your pajamas. You have to sit in a circle in the middle of a parking lot and exercise. This did not last very long because the counselors didn't want to wake up either.

Secondly, some of the campers were very rude and snobby. I did have problems with some campers who thought of themselves very highly. There were definitely cliques at camp and that made it difficult sometimes. There were the 16-year-olds who thought they were superior and deserved everything at hand.

Next, the food was decent most days, but every once in a while, there were some bad batches of food. Karen's famous mac and Spam deserves a shoutout in this column because it slaps. I did enjoy mealtimes, as I had a lot of fun chatting with people from different states.

## Humane Society for Hamilton County wins Best New Construction Award

The Humane Society for Hamilton County (HSHC) was awarded the Best New Construction Award of 2021 at OneZone Awards Ceremony on Jan. 26 for its new facility located at 106th Street and Hague Road in Fishers.

Rebecca Stevens, President & CEO of the Humane Society for Hamilton County, shared the story of her dream for a brighter future for Hamilton County and Hoosier animals.

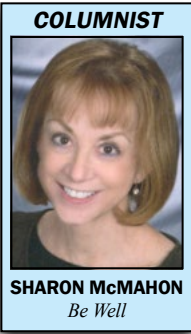

## Reflections on Soylent Green and our future

sources, but today we are going to look at just a few:\*

Sugar – high in fructose and fructose intake has been linked to many serious conditions, including obesity, type 2 diabetes, metabolic syndrome, and fatty liver disease. Excess sugar has also been linked to breast and colon cancer.

One observational study of more than 35,000 women found that those with the highest sugar intakes had double the risk of developing colon cancer as those who consumed diets low in sugar. I know, I know ... I have a "sweet tooth" too! Don't completely deprive yourself, just modify!

Seafood consumption is the largest contributor to mercury accumulation in humans. Plants that grow in mercury-contaminated waters are consumed by small fish, which are then consumed by larger fish, working its way up the food chain to human consumption. Mercury is a neurotoxin, meaning it can damage the brain and nerves. A 2014

analysis found that in several countries, mercury levels in the hair and blood of women and children were significantly higher than the World Health Organization recommends, particularly in coastal communities. Some fish, such as king mackerel and swordfish, are extremely high in mercury and should be avoided. Fortunately, low-mercury fish include salmon, herring, sardines and anchovies, which are high in omega-3 fats.

Other issues of which to be aware include foods with trans fats which lead to inflammation, having profoundly negative effects on heart health. Chronic inflammation is at the root of many other serious conditions such as insulin resistance, type 2 diabetes and obesity. Researchers have also reported that high intakes of PAHs from grilled meats increase the risk of kidney cancer. The strongest association appears to be between grilled meats and cancers of the digestive tract. The connection to colon cancer has only been seen in red meats such as beef, pork, lamb, and veal.

The bottom line is this: *Know what you are eating!* The best food sources are single-food sources; the

more packaged ingredients the more hidden items you may be consuming. Know where your food comes from; more and more of our grocery items are sourced from other countries. Our food is regulated; however, recently the number of USDA inspectors has been reduced per manufacturing facilities. If you consume animal products, find what foods, hormones or drugs these animals have ingested. You are worth it! We spend time researching which cars, stocks, and furniture to purchase, should we not give more time to what ends up in our bodies? I think so!

So if you enjoy science fiction or are a fan of Charlton Heston, I encourage you to check out *Soylent Green*, and if you wish to enjoy good health, check out your food sources!

## County's primary ballots just got more expensive

At last Thursday's Hamilton County Election Board meeting, a written request filed by Democratic Election Board Member Greg Purvis has forced the county to change the 2022 Primary Election ballots.

Purvis filed a written request to list, without exception, all candidates of the Democratic Party who have no opponent in the primary. This will include candidates for Democratic Precinct Committeeman and State Convention Delegates in 2022.

Purvis made the request following instructions from Dayna Colbert, the Hamilton County Democratic Party Chair. The request

was filed pursuant to Indiana Code 3-10-1-5.

That statute reads, in relevant part, "The names of unopposed candidates for election as a precinct committeeman or a delegate to a political party's state convention are not required to be placed on the primary election ballot unless an appointed member of the county election board affiliated with the political party files a written request that these names be printed on the primary election ballot."

According to comments made at the meeting, Democrats are trying to avoid the situation where people think there is no Democratic candidate because the Democratic candi-

date is unopposed in the Primary.

Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams will now need to modify the ballots. There was also discussion on whether the extra cost will add benefit to the election process.

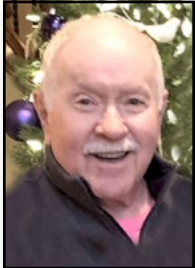

Burial followed at Crown View Cemetery in Sheridan. Pastor Mark Knapp officiated.

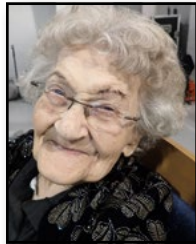

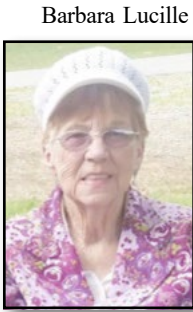

# Rep. Cook's bill would offer new protections for victims of violent crimes

The Indiana House of Representatives unanimously supported State Rep. Tony Cook's (R-Cicero) legislation to help safeguard Hoosier victims of violent crimes like rape who often face harassment by their offender long after there's been a conviction. Cook said he authored House Bill 1137 after hearing the story of a woman from Noblesville who was raped in 2003 as a student at Butler University. After the offender was released from prison, the victim was forced to obtain a protective order because he repeatedly harassed her. In Indiana, protective orders expire every two years, and the victim and offender must appear before a judge before it can be renewed. "This victim had to go

back to court every two years to renew their protective order, which gave her attacker another chance to be with her and continue harassing her," Cook said. "It's not right to put this emotional burden on the victim of a violent crime. This legislation would put a stop to it by allowing victims like her to apply for a lifetime order against their attacker." Cook said HB 1137, which now heads to the Senate for consideration, would allow for a victim to request an indefinite protective order against their attacker if the person is listed as a lifetime sex or violent offender. In 2020, there were 32,200 petitions for protection orders filed in Indiana courts. Currently, about 10,500 people are registered on Indiana's sex and violent offender registry.

be the last player standing on an island by fighting in-game enemies. The game is currently in its first chapter of its third season. There are four chapters a year and each season is two years. The game features Marvel's Spiderman as well as Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson. Jack Moe of Carmel, a sophomore high school student at the Indiana Agriculture and Engineering Academy, is an esports professional ranked as the 36th best Fortnite player in North America. Moe has grown up with video games and has been playing the game since it was released. His inspiration to start gaming came from his older brother, Chris Moe, who has also played competitive video games. Moe is a straight-A student who recently made the transition from Carmel High School to online schooling so he could dedicate more of his time to his esports profession. Being a full-time online student allows Moe to manage his time and create his own schedule to fit his gaming profession. "Ever since I've been doing online school, I've been doing my school at times that are best for me," Moe said. "Most people I play with are not on till later in the day so I can do all my [schoolwork] earlier."

Denise Moe, Jack's mom, has always been supportive of her son when it comes to his passion for esports. "I am very proud of Jack. He is as good in esports as if he were a 16-year-old going to the NFL, Juilliard or the Olympics," Denise said. "It's something that the parents should take seriously. As long as the child makes good grades and is keeping up their end of the bargain, esports can be absolutely beneficial and positive because not every kid is athletically inclined or outgoing. All children have

different talents and skills, and professional gaming takes extraordinary dedication, hard work, effort and determination." According to Denise, Jack puts in the same amount of time, dedication, and commitment it takes to be a professional in the esports world and can make the same amount of money. On Jan. 1, Moe was recruited by TheCartel Esports, a professional esports organization, to become a content creator for the association. From the organization, he gets paid \$20,000 for the year and keeps 100 percent of his tournament earnings. Last year, he won \$24,000 from tournaments while attending in-person school full-time and maintaining his grades. Including his salary, he could make \$44,000 this year as a 16-year-old. Moe uses the majority of his earnings towards new and upgraded equipment to keep his computer and gaming system up to date for his tournaments. He builds most of the equipment himself. What money he isn't spending on equipment he plans to save for future expenses like college tuition or a car. Moe wants to pursue a degree in engineering at Purdue University but still plans to maintain his esports profession. "Being a full-time professional and having [esports] as your full-time job [can be] very difficult," Moe said. "You should always have a backup plan." As the esports industry continues to grow, so does Moe and other esports professionals. According to Allied Research Market, the esports industry is expected to generate \$4.75 billion annually by 2030, which is a 17.5 percent increase from 2021. These numbers are projected to increase even more as the esports industry continues to globally expand.

### Girls state swimming finals

# Senior leadership, 'youthful exuberance' sends Carmel to 36<sup>th</sup> straight state title

**INDIANAPOLIS** - There's always something fun about watching young athletes announce their arrival on the scene, or in the Carmel girls swim team's case, in the pool.

The Greyhounds welcomed two freshmen to their state championship fold last Saturday at the IHSAA state finals, which took place at the IU Natatorium. Those two ninth-graders won some events, set some records, and played a big part in continuing Carmel's historic state title streak.

The 'Hounds won their 36th straight state championship with yet another dominating performance. Carmel scored 461 points, the second-highest state meet total in history, behind only the 479 points the Greyhounds rang up at last year's meet. Carmel won six events, including its usual sweep of the relays. Those events always provide the perfect opportunity to bring the young and the experienced swimmers together, and that carried over into the individual events.

"I thought we had a really good mixture of senior leadership combined with youthful exuberance," said Greyhounds coach Chris Plumb, who earned a record 16th state championship as a girls swimming coach. "You put those two things together and you get a passionate team that's excited to be here, but can navigate the challenges that the meet presents."

Carmel started the meet off with a bang, winning the medley relay by improving on its state record time from Friday night. The team of junior Berit Berglund, junior Vivian Wilson, freshman Alex Shackell and junior Meghan Christman clocked in at 1 minute, 38.55 seconds, lowering its preliminary time by 0.31 seconds. That old mark was set by the Greyhounds' 2015 team, which is historically thought of as one of the best teams ever.

"You just know you're headed in the right direction when you can start with a state record," said Plumb.

Carmel had three swimmers compete in the championship final of the next four swimming events. The 'Hounds got their next victory in the butterfly race, where Shackell won in a new state record time of 51.71 seconds. A little later, freshman Lynsey Bowen triumphed in the 500 free with a time of 4:49.13. Bowen had tied the state record in that event during the prelims, at 4:45.15.

Next up was the 200 free relay, where senior Gretchen Lueking, sophomore Grace Dougherty, senior MacKenna Lieske and Christman won in a time of 1:32.28. Berglund followed that with a victory in the backstroke, her third consecutive win in that event. Berglund's time of 51.50 tied the state record that she had set in the Friday prelims.

"This team has been close than ever, I believe, and it's just so much fun and I'm so grate-

ful to race with all these girls," said Berglund. "And for the 100 back, I'm happy with it. I've definitely been faster and we have a lot of things I can clean up for next year, and I'm just really excited for next year, too."

The Greyhounds finished the meet with a victory in the 400 free relay, where Lueking, Shackell, Berglund and Bowen clocked in at 3:19.54.

In all, Carmel earned 21 medals at the meet, which means the Greyhounds had 21 swims finish in the top eight in their respective events. Shackell also finished as runner-up in the 50 free, while four more Greyhounds got third-place results: Lueking in the 200 free, Hayley Reed in the butterfly, Alexandra Ward in the 500 free and Vivian Wilson in the breaststroke. #### TIGERS REPEAT AS RUNNERS-UP

Fishers placed second at the state meet for the third year in a row, scoring 283 points. That total is easily the most-ever points for the Tigers, and it marked the first time a team finished second three years in a row since Hamilton Southeastern did so from 2007 to 2009.

"It was awesome day to be a Tiger," said Fishers coach Joe Keller. The coach also pointed out that those 283 points is the second-highest point total for a state runner-up in meet history. Southeastern scored 317.5 points at the 2008 meet.

"For us to be over 280, that's a big step this year," said Keller.

Fishers had 12 swims compete in the championship heat, which translated into 12 state medals. The Tigers also had the top diver in the county, with Gretchen Osmun placing eighth in that event.

In the pool, Fishers had four runner-up finishes. Junior Jo Jo Ramey was the runner-up in the 200 free, while Kate Mouser and Avery Stein placed 2-3 in the individual medley. Mouser would later come back to take second in the 500 free, and the Tigers finished the meet as runners-up in the 400 free relay. Mouser, Emma Schumacher, Nalanie Cortez and Ramey swam in that race. Ramey also placed third in the backstroke.

#### ROYALS PLACE THIRD

Hamilton Southeastern had a great meet as well. The Royals edged out Concord in a battle for third place, scoring 164 points to Concord's 162. It's the first time Southeastern had finished in the top three at state since 2018.

"I'm really happy with how we did," said HSE coach Christian Hanselmann. The coach said the team came in with goals at the beginning of the season, and the swimmers followed through.

"They swam hard, focused, high-energy, stayed positive," said Hanselmann. "I'm really proud of all our girls, how they did."

The Royals earned six medals at state, including strong performances from all three relays. In fact, the medley re-

lay placed second, with Grace Newton, Kennedy Fisher, Audrey Crawford and Ashley Saple swimming to a runner-up finish in 1:42.04.

Crawford later placed second in the butterfly race, while Fisher was the breaststroke runner-up. The Royals also had five consolation heat swims, including some performances where they moved up in position. A good example is Eloise Harrison: She was seeded 16th in the breaststroke, but moved up to a 14th-place finish in the finals. That was a pickup of two points, and every point makes a difference.

"To finish third overall, it comes down to the relays, everyone who jumped in on relays, consolation swimmers," said Hanselmann. "Anna Stolle had two great swims in the 'B' final in the 200 IM, in the breaststroke. Eloise Harrison came in as a 16th seed and she moved up a couple spots. You have to do that to get top three."

#### MILLERS' McDONALD FIFTH IN BREASTSTROKE

Noblesville sophomore Maya McDonald had a nice debut at the state meet, as she picked up a fifth-place medal in the breaststroke.

"Honestly, it's insane," said McDonald, who finished her race in 1:03.14. "My goal coming into the season was to just be underneath the state cut, and I think I really surpassed that. It was just a lot better than I was expecting."

In addition to McDonald's medal, the Millers had two relays swim in the consolation heat. The 200 free relay squad of McDonald, Mia Field, Exley Tricker and Caroline Santerre placed a strong 10th, while the medley relay foursome of Sophie Resner, McDonald, Emily Knott and Field finished 15th. Noblesville finished 16th as a team with 32 points.

#### FOURTH STATE APPEARANCE FOR WESTFIELD'S HOAGLAN

Westfield senior Macy Hoaglan finished her high

school career off with another appearance at state, marking the fourth time she competed at the big meet.

Hoaglan placed 13th in the 500 free and 16th in the individual medley. Her five points gave the Shamrocks a tied-for-30th finish.

"It's been really fun, especially with the good team atmosphere," said Hoaglan.

Boys basketball roundup

Numerous all-county games highlight last week

Several all-county boys basketball games took place last week. Here is a recap of the week for each team.

**NOBLESVILLE-HEIGHTS**

The Noblesville boys basketball team got going in the second half in its all-county game at Hamilton Heights last Wednesday, running away with a 70-46 victory over the Huskies.

The Millers, who hadn't played since Jan. 29 due last week's winter storm, held a six-point halftime lead, but then dominated in the second half, scoring 42 points and cruising to their third consecutive win.

"Really good second half for us," said Noblesville coach Scott McClelland. "I thought we had some different guys step up. I just thought we played harder."

The Millers led 11-8 after the first quarter was completed. Aaron Fine had a nice quarter, scoring eight points. The Huskies were staying with Noblesville in the second half, but the Millers stayed in front at halftime, leading 28-22. Luke Almodovar poured in 10 points for Noblesville in the second period, while Tillman Etchison had six points for Heights.

"The first half, I was pleased," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "We played the style that we needed."

The Millers began to open things up in the third quarter, outscoring the Huskies 20-6. Isaac Tuma started the period with a layin to cut Noblesville's lead to 28-24, but Almodovar hit two straight baskets, the second one a 3-pointer, and the Millers were up 33-24.

Noblesville later finished the third on an 11-0 run. Cooper Bean scored four points, Almodovar threw in another triple, Preston Roberts turned a steal into a dunk, and Fine made a layin. The Millers led 48-28 going into the fourth, and Bean scored to open that quarter, stretching Noblesville's run to 13-0.

"The guys responded," said McClelland.

The Millers led 56-32 midway through the period, the first of three times their lead would reach that margin. Heights' Luke Carroll made a personal 7-0 run to cut that lead to 56-39, but Noblesville answered that with a 7-0 spurt. The Millers stayed out in front by at least 20 points until the final buzzer.

Almodovar scored 23 points, including three 3s. Fine totaled 16 points, while Bean scored 10 points.

Carroll led the Huskies with 19 points and six rebounds, while Etchison scored 11 points.

"There were a few possessions that I thought if we played a little bit different, the halftime score would've been different," said Ballenger. "We could've controlled it a little bit more. And in the second half, they hit shots."

**HEIGHTS-WESTFIELD**

Westfield scored an overwhelming all-county victory last Friday, as the Shamrocks beat Hamilton Heights 68-33 at CSI Gymnasium.

Westfield was in control from the start, scoring the game's first seven points. Cam Haffner began the contest with two free throws, then Trey Buchanan and Nic Depasquale each made layins. Alex Romack then hit a foul shot, and the 'Rocks were up 7-0 just a minute and a half into the game.

Etchison got the Huskies on the board with a jumper. Haffner made his own jumper and a Buchanan 3-pointer started a 13-4 run for Westfield, which led 20-6 after the first quarter.

"I thought we got off to a good start tonight, which I think was critical, and had a lot of guys contribute," said 'Rocks coach Shane Sumpter.

The Shamrocks would steadily build their lead throughout the game. A 6-0 run put Westfield up 28-10 midway through the second quarter; Romack scored four points sandwiched between a Depasquale layin.

"A lot of guys came in and gave us some good, solid minutes, and we're going to need everybody down the stretch,"

said Sumpter.

Haffner finished the game with 19 points and three 3-pointers. Romack added 17 points and Depasquale scored 10.

"Good team win for us all around," said Sumpter. "I thought we got better as a basketball team tonight."

Etchison led Heights with 11 points.

"Our guys knew the level they are, and we competed," said Huskies coach Chad Ballenger. "For the most part, we competed. I thought we could've made a few more runs. We took some quick shots and played into their hand a little bit, their length, and they sped us up, so it was hard. We were trying to be patient. But they're really good."

**WESTFIELD-FISHERS**

Fishers boys basketball team clinched an outright Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship last Saturday, beating Westfield 73-48 in an all-county game.

Bryce Williams and Jeffrey Simmons both scored 18 points for the Tigers, with Simmons hitting four 3-pointers. Payton Weemer also had four 3s for 12 points. Depasquale led the 'Rocks with 14 points, followed by Haffner with 13 (including three 3s) and Buchanan with 12.

**OTHER GAMES**

Noblesville fell to Brownsburg 75-60 in an away Hoosier Crossroads Conference game last Friday.

The Bulldogs led 22-10 after the first quarter and 37-25 at halftime. Preston Roberts scored 11 points for the Millers in the first half. Brownsburg expanded its lead to 61-44 after three periods; Noblesville had 19 points in that quarter. E.J. Smith made two 3-pointers on his way to nine points, while Aaron Fine scored eight.

Four Millers players scored in double figures, led by Fine with 15 points. Smith added 14 points. Roberts and Cooper Bean both scored 11 points.

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Westfield was among the boys basketball teams that got an unplanned week off due to last week's winter storm, which meant that the Shamrocks' game with Harrison last Tuesday at CSI Gymnasium was their first in 10 days.

Westfield made its return a winning one, as the 'Rocks beat the Raiders 63-53. Westfield led 11-10 after the first quarter, then extended its lead to 27-19 by halftime. Haffner scored seven points in the second period, while Buchanan

made two 3-pointers in the first quarter.

# Huskies defend title in overtime

The Hamilton Heights girls basketball team had to battle in order to defend its Class 3A Sectional 24 championship last Tuesday, but the Huskies eventually prevailed.

Heights fell behind to New Castle at the start of the game, then came back. That scenario repeated itself in the second half, with the No. 8-ranked Huskies clawing back to force overtime. Finally, Heights won it in the extra period, 51-50, securing a second straight sectional title. It's the sixth in program history and the first time the Huskies won back-to-back sectionals since 2012-13.

"We definitely had the will to win. Our girls didn't quit," said Heights coach Keegan Cherry.

The Huskies trailed 12-5 after the first quarter, but stormed back to tie the game at 20-20 by halftime. Kaylee Rhoton got hot in the second period, making three 3-pointers.

The Trojans again pulled ahead in the third quarter, taking a 35-28 lead into the fourth period. But the Huskies came back again and held a 44-41 lead late in the period before New Castle made a shot to tie the game.

The contest was tied at 44-44 at the end of regulation. In the overtime, Heights got down by four, but made one more come-

back, eventually outscoring the Trojans 7-6 in the extra period. Camryn Runner helped out by making 3 of 4 foul shots, while Ella Hickok hit a 3.

The Huskies were stymied all night by New Castle's defense, which Cherry called "an inverted triangle and two." But Heights was able to pull it out at the end.

"All we have to do is score one more point than they do," said Cherry. "And sure enough, that's what we did. We scored one more point than they did."

Rhoton drained six 3-pointers on her way to 19 points, while Runner was 10-of-13 from the line while scoring 14 points.

"Kaylee Rhoton was really good tonight," said Cherry. "She made some timely baskets. Camryn Runner was Camryn Runner late in regulation and overtime. She made free throws down the stretch."

**HUSKIES FALL IN REGIONAL**

Hamilton Heights saw its season come to a tough end Saturday in the semi-finals of the Class 3A Belmont regional, as the No. 8 Huskies lost in overtime to No. 2 Garrett 50-48.

The Railroaders took a 17-9 lead in the first quarter. Heights started a comeback in the second

period, cutting Garrett's lead to 22-17 by halftime. Runner scored five points during that period.

The Huskies tied the game up at 31-31 after three quarters. Runner hit two 3-pointers in the third. The score was still tied at 37-37 at the end of regulation; Garrett outscored Heights 13-11 in the extra period.

Runner totaled three 3-pointers and 21 points, while senior MyKayla Moran added nine points and senior Mia Shields scored eight.

"It was a great basketball game between two really good teams," said Cherry. "Garrett threw a knockout punch early. Our girls stayed the course

and battled back. Being able to close the gap prior to halftime was critical. Once we got settled in, I was confident our girls would continue to grind and we'd be fine. The grit and poise we showed in the second half is a direct reflection of the character of our girls. The girls gave all they had. And that's all

**NOBLESVILLE** - A great season for the Guerin Catholic girls basketball season came to an end last Tuesday, as the Golden Eagles hosted Bishop Chatard in the championship game of Class 3A Sectional 27.

Weitzel's two free throws got the Golden Eagles within 41-31 at the 6:34 mark of the fourth quarter, and Fernandez added a foul shot to cut the lead to nine. But the Trojans' Grace Adams hit a 3 to push the lead back up to 44-32, and Chatard stayed ahead by double digits after that.


Loso and Fernandez each scored 13 points for Guerin Catholic. Loso was one of four seniors on the Golden Eagles team, the others being Katie Koger, Halley Buehler and Mia Thompson.

The Golden Eagles finished their season 14-11.

"We've improved our record each year," said Quaranta, who finished his third year as the Guerin Catholic head coach. "But our schedule's tough, so even if we lost more games this year than last year, just the style of play and the culture and environment that we've built here, I couldn't be happier."

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# University easily defends sectional, regional titles

The Class 2A No. 6 University Trailblazers defended their Sectional 43 championship last Tuesday night with a hard-fought 41-28 win over Park Tudor.

Patty Chikamba and Payton Seay each had 12 points to lead the Trailblazers to their eighth sectional championship in 17 seasons of IHSAA competition. The title was University's fourth in the last five seasons.

University trailed for only 30 seconds in the contest and led by more than one possession throughout the last three periods, but every time they threatened to take total control of the game, Park Tudor scrapped back within shouting distance.

The Trailblazers got out to an early 4-2 lead on baskets by Chikamba and Kelsey DuBois before Park Tudor scored three straight points at the foul line. Jordan Patterson put University up for good at the 3:52 mark of the first quarter at 6-5. Emily Adamowicz stole the ensuring inbound pass and fed Patterson for a lay-in just seven seconds later forcing a Park Tudor timeout.

Seay scored off a DuBois assist for a 10-5 lead before Chikamba blocked a Panther shot, picked the ball out of the air and drove the length of the court for an easy basket and a 12-5 lead. The Trailblazers led 13-6 after the opening quarter.

The University girls defended their IHSAA Class 2A Regional championship last Saturday with a pair of comfortable wins at Southmont High School.

The Trailblazers defeated North Putnam 64-38 in the championship game after beating Union County 59-24 in the morning game.

University (23-4) advances to the semi-state at Jasper High School on Saturday, where they will face Forest Park (24-3) at 4 p.m.

The Trailblazers removed all doubt in the third quarter, outscoring North Putnam 18-5, ending the quarter on a 10-0 run. DuBois scored six points in the quarter on a three point shot and an old fashioned three point play. Payton Seay and Chikamba kicked in five points each in the third as the Blazers led 52-26 entering the final quarter.

Payton Seay led University in scoring with 19 points. Chikamba had 16 and DuBois 14 as the Blazers placed three in double figures.
