Bennett began working for Noblesville in 2020 in the newly created position to better assist the city in navigating increasingly complex legal issues associated with major infrastructure projects, new challenges in public health and safety, and economic development.

"Lindsey walked into a hornet's nest at the beginning of 2021," Councilman Mark Boice said. "She had an awful lot of different things to deal with - from acquiring parcels for the Pleasant Street project to working on a class action lawsuit on opioids to try and go against the product manufacturers that are providing this poisonous drug and hurting so many people in our community. We are all very proud of Lindsey Bennett and the work she's done for our great city."

Prior to joining Noblesville, Bennett was the assistant city attorney for the City of Fishers and the associate city attorney in Fort Wayne. She has a broad background in municipal law, contracts, real estate and utility issues. Bennett received her JD degree from the University of Tulsa College of Law, is a Noblesville resident, and is on the Board of Directors for Noblesville Youth Assistance Program.

County makes plans to close COVID-19 mass vaccine clinic

The COVID-19 vaccine clinic at the 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville will close its operation after Friday, Feb. 18.

"The demand for vaccinations has leveled off and there are now enough additional vaccine sites to fill the need," said Chris Walker, emergency preparedness coordinator for the Hamilton County Health Department. "That means we no longer require as much space or staff to accommodate those still wanting or needing the COVID-19 vaccines."

The Health Department will move its vaccination clinic back to its office at 18030 Foundation Drive, Noblesville, starting Mon-

day, Feb. 23. Appointments can still be made at ourshot. **in.gov** or by calling 2-1-1.

"Working from our office again will also allow us to get back to our primary role of providing childhood vaccinations alongside the COVID-19 vaccine," said Jason LeMaster, administrator for the Hamilton County Health Department. "If there is another surge in demand, we'll be prepared for it, but for now we feel we can manage it in-house.'

We started watching it last fall at my childhood home where I first saw the Peter Bogdanovich masterwork on TV as a kid sometime after its theatrical release


Paper Moon is one of my favorites. It's a charming, funny, feelgood film. Mom was in

bleakly with a mother's burial. The right side of Mom's face was on a pillow as she watched, a throw blanket veiling her mouth and nose. It was awkward watching the cemetery scene with my cancer-riddled mother. Her own prepaid plot awaited.

It was not my only uncomfortable movie moment with Mom. In 1982, she and I saw An Officer and A Gentleman at the cinema just after my high school sweetheart Jane and I had parted ways. My pathetic moping was sucking the oxygen from our house - Toto's "I Won't Hold You Back" replaying on the turntable didn't help matters - so Mom figured it would be a good idea to go out for a movie – a ROMANCE movie! – to help loosen the tentacles from her firstborn's tortured heart. I suspected her motive was not to help my heartache but to see cinematic heartthrob Richard Gere. I hoped she hadn't seen American Gigolo two years earlier.

Luckily, there were no other 17-year-old boys on a date with their mothers that evening. No witnesses.

A week later, Jane and I reunited, I forgot that the movie opened inspiring me to replay my Peaches and Herb "Reunited" 45 record, so much so that it started to snap, crackle and pop. Then Jane and I broke up again. Then we got back together. Then, during college, we parted for good. Suddenly, love seemed nothing more to me than a record that skipped, predictable chaos amidst the rpms, a shattered heart of glass.

In 2020, I published a book of essays about Mom, titled What Are You Going To Write About When I'm Gone? The introduction references another awkward movie experience with her, this time regarding Blake Edwards' 10, a movie my underage buddies and I snuck into: "My mom made a surprise appearance during the movie after realizing her freshman son had deceived her by sneaking into an R-rated movie just to see Bo Derek change from her bathing suit into her birthday suit. She somehow found me in the dark theater and ordered me to leave with her. Luckily my buddies' eyes were too glued to Bo Derek's corn rows (or something like that) to witness my kidnapping. Even now, at 49, I still can't bring

Even now, at 57, and even though Mom is now underground, I don't dare watch 10. I'm sure she's watching over me - if not for that reason alone - ready to re-release her wrath thru the incessant, deafening tintinnabulation of windchimes that a friend gifted in her memory and that Brynne and I subsequently installed on our balcony. The chiming reminds us of her.

Paper Moon did what I had hoped. Ryan and Tatum O'Neal as Great Depression-set grifters made Mom laugh at times. Laughter had been the glue of our mother-son relationship. I took great comfort being able to watch the movie with her, even though her laughs sounded more like whispers then. She fell asleep before the movie's midpoint. A couple weeks later, when things had gotten worse for her, much worse, she said from her hospice-provided bed, "We should finish watching Paper Moon."

"We will," I said, but looking down at the husk of a woman that once was, I knew we wouldn't. There Still, that didn't offset the ensuing myself to rent 10, too scared mom was scant laughter left to squeeze gmail.com.

from her. Even a hand squeeze was rare. She seemed satisfied with my answer, though, as if I'd given her hope that there was still time to unpause the movie.

Last Christmas, the first without her, our small family visited Mom's grave, shared stories, cried some, and toasted her memory. We left a tiny, plastic cup of wine on her tombstone before heading home to claw through a Christmas that didn't seem like Christmas.

Dad, after one of his daily gravesite visits, called to let me know the cup was empty now, that Mom had finished her wine. "That or there are some very drunk birds flying around," I said.

I can't help but think about the opening lyrics to the American Standard, "It's Only A Paper Moon," from which Paper Moon got its title: "I never feel a thing is real / When I'm away from you . . ."

Mom's passing remains surreal. I wish she was still around to finish Paper Moon. I'm tempted to stream 10, just to hear her chimes.

You may have read the title of this article and been confused. What is a CODA, you may ask? Well, CODA stands for Child/Children of Deaf Adult, and KODA stands for Kid of Deaf Adult. Some KODAs prefer to use a C over a K and vice-versa. The terms can be used interchangeably.

Most KODAs know sign language since their parent(s) is/are deaf, but some KODAs don't. I am a KODA and my brother is as well. Our dad is deaf and sign language is our first language. My mom is hearing, knows sign, and works at the Indiana School for the Deaf. Even though I have one deaf parent, and not two, I am not any less of a CODA than someone with two deaf parents.

Last summer I went to KODA Camp Midwest. This camp is for kids aged 6 to 16 who have at least one deaf parent, and it is located in Wisconsin.

To be honest, I was not excited at all: Two weeks away from my friends, my phone, my pets, my parents, and worst of all, my bed. I was so nervous to go to camp, but I knew I would be okay since my brother was a camp counselor. I was in a cabin with seven other campers and two counselors. I knew a few of the counselors because they went to camp with my brother, and I had met them be-

The first night at camp was terrifying to me. I had only made three new friends who weren't from Indiana, and I already thought some campers didn't like me, especially Juju. Juju had neon pink hair and I thought it was so cool. I tried to talk to Juju and get to know her, but I was getting bad vibes. I assumed Juju didn't like me and I didn't really talk to her the first few days of camp. Long story short, KODA love brought us together, and now Juju and I are really good friends.

Eventually, I started talking to more people and sitting with different people each mealtime. I became friends with a counselor named Taylor and the whole younger cabin really liked me, so I usually hung out in their room when we had free time. Taylor was the lead counselor in the younger cabin, so it made perfect sense to be down there.

My favorite part about camp was being in that environment, hanging out with the people who complimented me and made me feel good. It was also really cool to have a special connection to everyone at camp. Taylor has a video of me and my camp BFF Lilo dancing and screaming and jumping around to the song "transparents oul" by WILLOW.

CODA camp was probably the best time of my life. Though I did not admit it at first, I truly did enjoy KODA camp.

Though very fun and very enjoyable, KODA camp did have its downsides.

First of all, morning calisthenics were the worst things I've ever experienced. You get woken up at 6:45 in the morning and get forced outside in the cold, in your pajamas. You have to sit in a circle in the middle of a parking lot and exercise. This did not last very long because the counselors didn't want to wake up either.

Secondly, some of the campers were very rude and snobby. I did have problems with some campers who thought of themselves very highly. There were definitely cliques at camp and that made it difficult sometimes. There were the 16-year-olds who thought they were superior and deserved everything at hand.

Next, the food was decent most days, but every once in a while, there were some bad batches of food. Karen's famous mac and Spam deserves a shoutout in this column because it slaps. I did enjoy mealtimes, as I had a lot of fun chatting with people from different states.

Plankton's dying! It's people - Soylent Green is made out of people! They're making our food out of people! Next thing they'll be breeding us like cattle for food! You've gotta tell them, you've gotta tell them!" Charlton Heston as Det. Thorn in "Soylent Green," 1973 Eew - right?! If you

have not seen the movie Soylent Green I highly recommend it as it is not only a sci-fi classic but unfortunately a glimpse into some aspects

of our future, perhaps. Not that I believe, at least I canwould devolve into this type of behavior; however, our food sources and the components of those "foods" are sometimes purposely mysterious. I understand there is often little that we can do about this, but awareness and knowledge can play an important role in our eating habits and overall health. There is a myriad of information available pertaining to additives and toxins in our food



are going to look at just a few:*

Sugar - high in fructose and fructose intake has been linked to many serious conditions, including obesity, type 2 diabetes, metabolic syndrome, and fatty liver disease. Excess sugar has also been linked to breast and colon cancer.

One observational study of more than 35,000 women found that those with the highest sugar intakes had double the risk of developing colon cancer as those who consumed diets low in sugar. I know, I know ... I have a "sweet tooth" too! not fathom, that our human race Don't completely deprive yourself, just modify!

Seafood consumption is the largest contributor to mercury accumulation in humans. Plants that grow in mercury-contaminated waters are consumed by small fish, which are then consumed by larger fish, working its way up the food chain to human consumption. Mercury is a neurotoxin, meaning it can dam-

sources, but today we analysis found that in several countries, mercury levels in the hair and blood of women and children were significantly higher than the World Health Organization recommends, particularly in coastal communities. Some fish, such as king mackerel and swordfish, are extremely high in mercury and should be avoided. Fortunately, low-mercury fish include salmon, herring, sardines and anchovies, which are high in omega-3 fats.

Other issues of which to be aware include foods with trans fats which lead to inflammation, having profoundly negative effects on heart health. Chronic inflammation is at the root of many other serious conditions such as insulin resistance, type 2 diabetes and obesity. Researchers have also reported that high intakes of PAHs from grilled meats increase the risk of kidney cancer. The strongest association appears to be between grilled meats and cancers of the digestive tract. The connection to colon cancer has only been seen in red meats such as beef, pork, lamb,

more packaged ingredients the more hidden items you may be consuming. Know where your food comes from; more and more of our grocery items are sourced from other countries. Our food is regulated; however, recently the number of USDA inspectors has been reduced per manufacturing facilities. If you consume animal products, find what foods, hormones or drugs these animals have ingested. You are worth it! We spend time researching which cars, stocks, and furniture to purchase, should we not give more time to what ends up in our bodies? I think so!

So if you enjoy science fiction or are a fan of Charlton Heston, I encourage you to check out Soylent Green, and if you wish to enjoy good health, check out your food sources!

County's primary ballots just got more expensive

At last Thursday's Hamilton County Election Board meeting, a written request filed by Democratic Election Board Member Greg Purvis has forced the county to change the 2022 Primary Election ballots.

Purvis filed a written request to list, without exception, all candidates of the Democratic Party who have no opponent in the primary. This will include candidates for Democratic Precinct Committeeman and State Convention Delegates in 2022.

Purvis made the request following instructions from Dayna Colbert, the Hamilton County Democratic Party Chair. The request

was filed pursuant to Indiana Code date is unopposed in the Primary. 3-10-1-5.

That statute reads, in relevant part, "The names of unopposed candidates for election as a precinct committeeman or a delegate to a political party's state convention are not required to be placed on the primary election ballot unless an appointed member of the county election board affiliated with the political party files a written request that these names be printed on the primary election ballot."

According to comments made at the meeting, Democrats are trying to avoid the situation where people think there is no Democratic candidate because the Democratic candi-

Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams will now need to modify the ballots. There was also discussion on whether the extra cost will





Moe is a straight-A student who recently made the transition from Carmel High School to online schooling so he could dedicate more of his time to his esports profession. Being a full-time online student allows Moe to manage his time and create his own schedule to fit his gaming profession.

'Ever since I've been doing online school, I've been doing my school at times that are best for me," Moe said. "Most people I play with are not on till later in the day so I can do all my [schoolwork] earlier."

Denise Moe, Jack's mom, has always been supportive of her son when it comes to his passion for esports.

'I am very proud of Jack. He is as good in esports as if he were a 16-year-old going to the NFL, Juilliard or the Olympics," Denise said. "It's something that the parents should take seriously. As long as the child makes good grades and is keeping up their end of the bargain, esports can be absolutely beneficial and positive because not every kid is athletically inclined or outgoing. determination." According to Denise, Jack puts in the same amount of time, dedication, and commitment it takes to be a professional in the esports world and can make the same amount of money.

On Jan. 1, Moe was recruited by TheCartel Esports, a professional esports organization, to become a content creator for the association.

From the organization, he gets paid \$20,000 for the year and keeps 100 percent of his tournament earnings. Last year, he won \$24,000 from tournaments while attending in-person school full-time and maintaining his grades. Including his salary, he could make \$44,000 this year as a

16-year-old. Moe uses the majority of his earnings towards new and upgraded equipment to keep his computer and gaming system up to date for his tournaments. He builds most of the equipment himself.

What money he isn't spending on equipment he plans to save for future expenses like college tuition or a car. Moe wants to pursue a degree in engineering at Purdue University but still plans to maintain his esports profession.

"Being a full-time professional and having [esports] as your full-time job [can be] very difficult," Moe said. "You should always have a backup plan."

As the esports industry continues to grow, so does Moe and other esports professionals. According to Allied Research Market, the esports industry is expected to generate \$4.75 billion annually by 2030, which is a 17.5 percent increase from 2021. These numbers are projected to increase even more as the esports industry continues to globally expand.

Girls state swimming finals

Senior leadership, 'youthful exuberance' sends Carmel to 36th straight state title

INDIANAPOLIS There's always something fun

about watching young athletes announce their arrival on the scene, or in the Carmel girls swim team's case, in the pool.

The Greyhounds welcomed two freshmen to their state championship fold last Saturday at the IHSAA state finals, which took place at the IU Natatorium. Those two ninth-graders won some events, set some records, and played a big part in continuing Carmel's historic state title streak.

The 'Hounds won their 36th straight state championship with yet another dominating performance. Carmel scored 461 points, the second-highest state meet total in history, behind only the 479 points the Greyhounds rang up at last year's meet. Carmel won six events, including its usual sweep of the relays. Those events always provide the perfect opportunity to bring the young and the experienced swimmers together, and that carried over into the individual

"I thought we had a really good mixture of senior leadership combined with youthful exuberance," said Greyhounds coach Chris Plumb, who earned a record 16th state championship as a girls swimming coach. "You put those two things together and you get a passionate team that's excited to be here, but can navigate the challenges that the meet presents."

Carmel started the meet off with a bang, winning the medley relay by improving on its state record time from Friday night. The team of junior Berit Berglund, junior Vivian Wilson, freshman Alex Shackell and junior Meghan Christman clocked in at 1 minute, 38.55 seconds, lowering its preliminary time by 0.31 seconds. That old mark was set by the Greyhounds' 2015 team, which is historically thought of as one of the best teams ever.

"You just know you're headed in the right direction when you can start with a state record," said Plumb.

Carmel had three swimmers compete in the championship final of the next four swimming events. The 'Hounds got their next victory in the butterfly race, where Shackell won in a new state record time of 51.71 seconds. A little later, freshman Lynsey Bowen triumphed in the 500 free with a time of 4:49.13. Bowen had tied the state record in that event during the prelims, at 4:45.15.

relay, where senior Gretchen Lueking, sophomore Grace Dougherty, senior MacKenna Lieske and Christman won in a time of 1:32.28. Berglund followed that with a victory in the backstroke, her third consecutive win in that event. Berglund's time of 51.50 tied the state record that she had set in the Friday prelims.

"This team has been close than ever, I believe, and it's just so much fun and I'm so grate-

ful to race with all these girls," said Berglund. "And for the 100 back, I'm happy with it. I've definitely been faster and we have a lot of things I can clean up for next year, and I'm just really excited for next year, too."

The Greyhounds finished the meet with a victory in the 400 free relay, where Lucking, Shackell, Berglund and Bowen clocked in at 3:19.54.

In all, Carmel earned 21 medals at the meet, which means the Greyhounds had 21 swims finish in the top eight in their respective events. Shackell also finished as runner-up in the 50 free, while four more Greyhounds got third-place results: Lueking in the 200 free, Hayley Reed in the butterfly, Alexandra Ward in the 500 free and Vivian Wilson in the breaststroke. NOBLESVILLE - A great season one. for the Guerin Catholic girls basketball season came to an end last Tuesday, as the Golden Eagles hosted Bishop Chatard in the championship game of Class 3A Sectional 27.

It seemed like a rivalry game too, as Guerin Catholic brought a huge student section to the Eagles Nest, and Chatard had a goodsized crowd as well.

The Golden Eagles fans were cheering early, as a layin by Kathryn Loso and a 3-pointer from Hannah Weitzel got Guerin Catholic ahead 5-2. But the Trojans' defense ignited a 10-0 run and they held the lead from that point forward. The last six points all came off baskets from steals, with junior Caroline Bell getting two baskets

Golden Eagles coach Marc Quaranta said that Chatard has been "great all season" when it comes to getting early leads, and that was the case on Tuesday, saying that "they come out aggressive, they want to get steals and run, and they were able to get a few of those in the first quarter and go on a 10-0 run."

Chatard led 14-8 after the first quarter, then extended that lead to 32-16 by halftime. Early in the second period, Natalie Fernandez's 3 got GC within 16-11, but the Trojans went on a 16-5 run that ate up most of the quarter.

'We couldn't quite put the ball in the basket," said Quaranta. "We gave them 16, 17 extra opportunities in that first half and when a team does that, they're going to score more points than

The Golden Eagles started the third period with a 6-0 run. Fernandez made back-to-back baskets and Ava Bills'

layin cut Chatard's lead to 32-22. That initial spurt helped keep Guerin within 41-29 at the end of three quarters.

Weitzel's two free throws got the Golden Eagles within 41-31 at the 6:34 mark of the fourth quarter, and Fernandez added a foul shot to cut the lead to nine. But the Trojans' Grace Adams hit a 3 to push the lead back up to 44-32, and Chatard stayed ahead by double digits after that.

Loso and Fernandez each scored 13 points for Guerin Catholic. Loso was one of four seniors on the Golden Eagles team, the others being Katie Koger, Halley Buehler and Mia Thompson.

The Golden Eagles finished their season 14-11.

"We've improved our record each year," said Quaranta, who finished his third year as the Guerin Catholic head coach. "But our schedule's tough, so even if we lost more games this year than last year, just the style of play and the culture and environment that we've built here, I couldn't be happier."

University easily defends sectional, regional titles

The Class 2A No. 6 University Trailblazers defended their Sectional 43 championship last Tuesday night with a hard-fought 41-28 win over Park Tudor.

Patty Chikamba and Payton Seay each had 12 points to lead the Trailblazers to their eighth sectional championship in 17 seasons of IHSAA competition. The title was University's fourth in the last five seasons.

University trailed for only 30 seconds in the contest and led by more than one possession throughout the last three periods, but every time they threatened to take total control of the game, Park Tudor scrapped back within shouting distance.

The Trailblazers got out to an early 4-2 lead on baskets by Chikamba and Kelsey DuBois before Park Tudor scored three straight points at the foul line. Jordan Patterson put University up for good at the 3:52 mark of the first quarter at 6-5. Emily Adamowicz stole the ensuring inbound pass and fed Patterson for a lay-in just seven seconds later forcing a Park Tudor time-

Seay scored off a DuBois assist for a 10-5 lead before Chikamba blocked a Panther shot, picked the ball out of the air and drove the length of the court for an easy basket and a 12-5 lead. The Trailblazers led 13-6 after the opening quarter.

Seay scored after a Kamryn Washington steal before Park Tudor scored their fist field goal in over ten minutes of game time to cut the lead to 15-8. Baskets by Seay and Chikamba helped University to a 19-12 halftime lead as both offenses bogged down in the second quarter.

Park Tudor's Halle Shelt hit a three pointer to open the second half scoring, before University ran off ten straight points for a 29-15 advantage with 1:59 left in the third quarter. Chikamba p.m.

started the run with an easy basket off a Patterson steal. Chikamba added a foul shot, Seay made two free throws and Adamowicz fed DuBois for a basket to force a Park Tudor timeout at 26-15.

Taylor Seay added a foul shot and Payton Seay's basket with 1:59 left put University up 29-15. Park Tudor wouldn't go away as Dominae Butler scored the last seven points of the third quarter, including a 30 foot three pointer at the buzzer.

Patterson opened the fourth quarter scoring with a three pointer to put University up 32-22. DuBois had a basket off a Patterson pass before Park Tudor climbed back to within 34-28 with 5:05 remaining. The Blazers were patient on offense before Chikamba drove for a basket with 3:18 remaining. University got the ball and Payton Seay scored at the rim for a 38-28 lead with 2:13 left.

Taylor Seay scored from the baseline with 28 seconds left and Chikamba added a foul shot as University scored the last seven points of the game and held Park Tudor scoreless for the last 5:05 of the contest.

Patterson finished with seven points and DuBois six.

Chikamba and DuBois led University with eight rebounds each while Adamowicz pulled down six. Chikamba had four of the Blazers' 12 assists.

The University girls defended their IHSAA Class 2A Regional championship last Saturday with a pair of comfortable wins at Southmont High School.

The Trailblazers defeated North Putnam 64-38 in the championship game after beating Union County 59-24 in the morning game.

University (23-4) advances to the semi-state at Jasper High School on Saturday, where they will face Forest Park (24-3) at 4

University began to open up their lead in the second quarter. The Blazers scored eight straight points to take a 26-14 lead with 4:38 left in the period. Chikamba and Payton Seay each had four points in the run. University led by as many as 16 in the quarter and took a 34-21 lead to the locker room at half time. The Cougars had no answer for Payton Seay's post up game in the first half as the 5-5 junior scored 12 first half points. Chikamba had 11 points in the first half.

The Trailblazers removed

Payton Seay led University in scoring with 19 points. Chikamba had 16 and DuBois 14 as the Blazers placed three in double figures.

University dominated the boards against the Cougars, pulling down a season-high 51 rebounds. DuBois led with eight rebounds, Adamowicz and Chikamba had seven each. Kamryn Washington pulled down six rebounds while Jordan Patterson had five. Taylor Seay and Alex Feeney each had four rebounds.

Patterson had a team-high five assists while Chikamba handed out four helpers.

University advanced

the championship game with a dominant performance against Union County, defeating the Lady Patriots 59-24. The game had a running clock for the last 11 minutes.

The Trailblazers defensive pressure overwhelmed Union County, leading to 21 University steals, including several that led to easy baskets. Chikamba had eight steals and Taylor Seay had

University's scoring was again led by its big three of Chikamba (16), DuBois (11) and Payton Seay (11).

University substituted liberally throughout the game and none of the Blazers' starters played in the last 10 minutes of the contest.

The Trailblazers jumped out to an 11-3 lead in the first three minutes. Seay started the game with two foul shots before a Du-Bois rebound basket. Patterson hit a three pointer and DuBois scored again off a Chikamba re-

bound. Washington made it 11-3 on a fast break that was triggered by a Chikamba blocked shot. University led 16-8 after the first quarter.

University led 33-14 at halftime, scoring the last eight points of the quarter. Chikamba had 11 first half points and DuBois added nine.

The Trailblazers held Union County scoreless for the first six minutes of the third quarter, while scoring the first 19 points to stretch their scoring run to 27 straight. The running clock started with 3:00 left in the third quarter after Adamowicz stole a pass and scored a layin.

North Putnam's season ended at 18-9 while Union County bowed out at 12-9.

The Regional championship was University's third in four seasons and fifth in school history. The Trailblazers will be looking for their second semi-state championship, to join the 2008 state runner-up squad.

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


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
