Noblesville gets \$10.3M in new funds for roads, including Pleasant Street bypass plan

The City of Noblesville has received a total of \$12,219,034 from the Indianapolis Metropolitan Planning Organization (IMPO). This includes a new award of \$10,359,670 for three major infrastructure projects within the city and increased financial support in the amount of \$1,859,364 for two previously awarded projects. The IMPO governing board approved the grants during its meeting Wednesday morning.

"We are grateful to have IMPO's and the Noblesville Common Council's partnership and support with these projects," Mayor Chris Jensen said. "All of the new projects and the previously awarded trail projects will provide better and safer mobility in our city."

Noblesville had three of the 30 central Indiana projects that were awarded a total of \$78 million.

Carmel Dads Club proud to officially open sports complex

Last Wednesday afternoon, the ribbon was officially cut on the new Carmel Dads Club fieldhouse, called the CDC Sports Complex, located at 5459 E. Main St. The project was financed by the Clay Township administration as part of its 19-part Community Impact program. The 120,000 square-foot fieldhouse, located in Badger Memorial Park, will permit year-round athletic practice and competition. The new facility houses four full-size basketball courts, three batting cages, an indoor turf field and a track area around the turf field. David Mundy to return April 11 as Sheridan Schools Superintendent

The Sheridan Community Schools Board of Trustees announced at its Feb. 14 meeting its intent to ratify a contract with Dr. David Mundy as the new superintendent.

Dr. Mundy will follow Mary Roberson, who announced her retirement earlier this year. As required by Indiana Code, the Sheridan School Board posted the terms of the superintendent contract and held a hearing on the proposed contract Monday. Official action on the contract

will take place on Monday, Feb. 21.

Mundy, who is currently Associate Superintendent at Noblesville Schools, will be returning to Sheridan, where he previously served as superintendent from 2014 to 2017. In his role at Noblesville, Mundy has been

"I'm so incredibly honored and thankful for the opportunity to return and work with all the outstanding students,

teachers, leadership, and entire community of Sheridan," Mundy said. Fishers announces mixed-use project, roundabout coming to 96th & Allisonville

CRG Residential has announced a \$98 million mixed-use project at the northwest corner of 96th Street and Allisonville Road in Fishers. The project will include multi-family homes, townhomes, and commercial retail space situated next to the recently announced 98-acre park land to the west.

The City of Fishers, in close partnership with CRG, also announced the reconstruction of the Michigan Left intersection into a roundabout.

Additionally, CRG Residential has committed to donate the land required for the roundabout and an additional 25 acres of

non-floodplain land to increase the size of adjacent parkland, totaling 123 acres for the White River passive

nature park.

“This project will enhance the southwest corridor of our community in multiple ways,” Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness said. “The new park, and now the additional buffer zone donated by CRG, will serve as a key amenity for our city and region, providing expanded public access to one of our community’s greatest natural assets – the White River. And as we bring the roundabout intersection online, the additional vehicular traffic will be able to better access the local businesses in the area as a gateway to our city.”

The mixed-use development from Carmel-based CRG will include 380 multi-family units, 66 townhomes for sale and 35,000 square feet of new commercial retail space. It will also include infrastructure improvements to support the city’s new park.

CRG has significant experience with similar public-private partnerships in Indiana, throughout the Midwest and eastern United States. CRG is finishing construction of the Nickel Plate Station in downtown Fishers as well as projects

in Greenwood, Westfield, Evansville, Elkhart, Newport, Ky., West Des Moines, Iowa, and Traverse City, Mich., among others.

“We are excited about the opportunity to invest in this important corridor of the city and to enhance its value to the community,” said CRG President and Fishers resident Christopher Reid. “There are so many dynamic pieces to this development, particularly the park and greenspace along the White River which will provide access to the overall community. We look forward to working with city officials, Councilors, key partners and the community to develop a project that instills pride in the community.”

At its meeting on Monday, Feb. 21, the Fishers City Council will consider project agreement approval after hearing from Fishers Economic Development officials and CRG leaders. Their presentation will include more project details and proposed bond financing, which includes \$23 million in developer-guaranteed bonds over a term of 25 years for land and infrastructure.

Emergency Rental Assistance program helps 1,380 county households through pandemic

The Hamilton County Township Association (HCTA) on Feb. 14 released its 2021 Annual Report on the Hamilton County Emergency Rental Assistance Program (HC ERAP).

The report outlines how the program helped stabilize the rental market during 2021. A total of \$7,771,772 was awarded in rental/utility assistance to Hamilton County residents. Specifically, \$7,266,070 was awarded in rental assistance and \$505,701 in utility assistance, helping 1,380 unique households from being homeless due to the effects of COVID-19.

“The median combined household income of applicants receiving assistance is \$17,297, so clearly, we are assisting county residents really struggling to make ends meet,” said Danielle Carey Tolan, HCTA President and Westfield Washington Township Trustee. “As the winter months continue to bring spikes in COVID-19 along with inclement weather and dangerous temperatures, this program is more important than ever and vital to many of our renters and landlords.”

“Not only is this helping our struggling residents, but it’s also helping our landlords, who have invested in our county, get paid the money they are owed,” said County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt.

“This program served 97 veteran households and 337 households with disabilities. It also helped households where the primary worker needed to be at home to care for children out of school, or family members ill with COVID. Forty-three percent of applications were in these three categories, so we had a real need. Taking advantage of federal funding to help our residents is something we should all be proud of.”

“There has been a concern among some residents that programs like ERAP have been contributing to the labor shortage,” Tolan said. “We know businesses are hurting, and in an economy operating at full employment a top priority is for us to keep a roof over someone’s head so they can stay in our community and retain or identify employment. Evidence shows that when that housing stability falters the ability to effectively work or participate in education or training goes with it.”

Fifty-seven percent of the households served by ERAP had at least one resident working.

Out of the 3,618 total applications received in 2021, 511 were denied assistance due to either fraud or not meeting eligibility. To be eligible for financial assistance from HC ERAP, you must be a renter in Hamilton County, at least one adult in your household must have experienced a loss of income due to COVID-19, and your household income is at or below 80 percent of the area’s median income.

The online application can be found at [HCTAIndiana.com](#). A call center (317-618-3125) is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday to assist renters and landlords. The website also provides a list of local partners throughout the county available to help residents with the application process. You can visit your local library or a partner site if you need internet access.

Background

The Hamilton County Emergency Rental Assistance Program is included in two stimulus packages from the U.S. Department of Treasury. Six Indiana counties, including Hamilton County, were allocated funds in terms of grant dollars for COVID-19 relief assistance for rent and utilities, with the purpose of stemming homelessness and helping the economy.

Congressional redistricting forces countless precinct changes

Voters will receive notice by mail first week of April

Hamilton County voters can expect changes to nearly every precinct in the Primary Election on Tuesday, May 3. Indiana is required by state and federal law to redraw its Statehouse and congressional maps following the results of the 2020 nationwide census.

“There were some changes to the Senate and House districts, some county council districts, and some school board districts,” said Elections Administrator Beth Sheller. “Some precincts also were combined, split, or given new names.”

By law, each precinct must have at least 600 eligible voters and no more than 2,000. There are a few exceptions to this rule. A precinct may not cross a congressional or state legislative district line.

New maps showing these changes can be found at [hamiltoncounty.in.gov](#) under the “Election Office” tab and the “Precinct and District Maps” tab. Printed copies of the map are also available in the Elections Office for \$3 per map.

“Each voter that moved precincts, had a precinct name change, or has a polling site change, will receive a yellow card in the mail around the first week of April,” Sheller added. “This card will let the voter know what precinct they are in and where their polling site will be.”

Heights school board approves adjustment in voting process for board members

At its meeting last Wednesday, the Hamilton Heights School Board of Trustees approved the recommended adjustments in its organization plan involving the way school board members are elected. This process, originally established with the formation of the corporation in 1965, was designed to ensure all areas of the district were represented.

This adjustment was made after county clerks from around the state were notified by the Indiana Elections Division that some districts may not be following Indiana Code (IC 20) which requires that the populations in their districts be equal. This is not a requirement for all school districts but varies depending upon the school board’s organization plan.

Heights will continue to have two members residing in White River Township, two members residing in Jackson Township, and one At-Large member. The individuals seeking a specific seat in Jackson or White River townships will still need to live in the township they are seeking to represent for at least one year prior to filing to run, as has been the case in the past.

Going forward to best meet state code requirements while honoring the intentions of the first Hamilton Heights School Board, ALL voters in Jackson and White River townships can vote for the candidate of their choice regardless of residence.

Board members say they are optimistic about the school corporation’s bright future and excited about Dr. Mundy leading the Blackhawks.

“We are thrilled to have Dave coming back to Sheridan to serve as our superintendent,” Board President Todd Roberts said. “We know Dave is a great leader and look forward to his leadership in the future.”

There will be a period where Roberson and Mundy work together to insure a seamless transition and continuation of programming and projects. The terms of the posted contract call for Mundy’s start at Sheridan to be April 11.

Mundy is a graduate of Ball State, Indiana Wesleyan, Olivet Nazarene, and Oakland City universities.

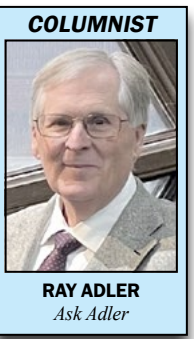

Joyce is volunteering stocking that same pantry. Up walks a young lady, a neighbor who frequently shops at that pantry for herself and her boyfriend. We don't engage with neighbors shopping from a pantry unless they choose to engage with us. In this case that's exactly what happened.

This young lady – we will call her Margie – took several minutes while gathering some meals to explain to Joyce how important the pantries are in her present situation and how it helps her and her boyfriend make ends meet. Margie reported that in weeks prior, she took the un-iced cookies and icing that was in the pantry. She went on to explain that her boyfriend had a rough upbringing. He had never had Christmas cookies, and he had never made cookies, let alone put icing on them to enjoy a special treat. It made a big difference

in their holiday as they were able to have meals, they were able to create special holiday memories, and as he was able to make and enjoy iced Christmas cookies for the first time in his life.

With over 27,000 food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County, FeedingTeam.org provides outdoor 24/7/365 no-questions-asked free food pantries throughout Hamilton County.

Neighbors ask, "Why do this? What's in it for you?" The answer is always the same: Serving people feeds my soul. It is a calling, not work.

There were many suppers when we as a young couple with young kids could only afford Dinty Moore beef stew and a potato for dinner. Surreal moment. This is why the pantries exist. As a typical young family, we could not always make ends meet.

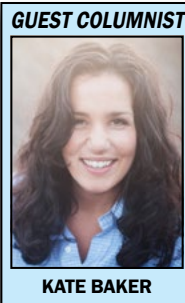

IMPO funding include the Little Chicago Road Trail and the Stony Creek Trail.

The Little Chicago Road trail will provide a 10-foot, multi-use path on the east side of Little Chicago Road from Elderberry Road to Carrigan Road, including widening the existing bridge to accommodate the trail.

The Stony Creek Trail will provide a connection under SR 37 along Stony Creek from Clover Road to Mercantile Boulevard. The 10-foot-wide trail will connect existing trails and remove a vehicular barrier to pedestrians. Each of these projects is expected to be constructed in 2023.

The Indianapolis MPO is responsible for planning and programming federal transportation funds in an eight-county central Indiana region, and this funding allocation is an annual IMPO process. The recipients were selected from a highly competitive pool, and each funded project requires a local match and is judged based on relative technical criteria including impacts to air quality, improvements to congestion, pavement quality and safety.

"The financial support lessens the burden on our city as we make these necessary improvements to address traffic issues and enhance pedestrian connectivity," Noblesville City Engineer Alison Krupski said.

Noblesville's projects include:

Pleasant Street Phase I: \$7M

The Reimagine Pleasant Street project is a multi-year initiative that city officials say will result in improved east-west connectivity and accessibility. The plan for the corridor is to relieve traffic congestion off State Road 32 by connecting Hague Road to State Road 37 and provide an additional bridge crossing over the White River.

"As the 10th largest city in Indiana, this project is crucial to mobility in Noblesville and across Hamilton County, especially considering the growth we have experienced and expect going forward," Jensen said. "The roadway design will provide Noblesville residents, local businesses, and visitors with many improvements that will enhance mobility and public

safety while also honoring the urban character and historic features of the project area."

Phase I is the largest portion of the three phases and includes work from River Road to 10th Street. The city will solicit bids and select a construction firm later this year, with construction beginning in early 2023. Phases II and III are expected to go to bid in 2023.

Midland Trace Trail: \$1.5M

The 12-foot-wide extension of the Midland Trace Trail will be constructed as a part of the Pleasant Street project. The trail project will be constructed in three phases like the roadway. The trail corridor will ultimately connect from SR 32 to SR 37. The Midland Trace trail provides regional multi-use path connectivity. It will be extended more than two miles from SR 32/Hague Road to SR 37, connecting Westfield and Nobles-

ville. Phase I of the project will connect to the existing Riverwalk, which connects to downtown Noblesville and the Plum Prairie Historic District. It will also connect to the future Nickel Plate Trail and Fishers.

141st Street & Promise Road Roundabout (2024): \$1.86M

Noblesville will change the current four-way stop at 141st Street and Promise Road into a roundabout at the border with Fishers. This improvement will lower gas emissions, and city officials say it will better serve motorists and will aid in safely maneuvering the intersection, especially for students on bus routes. Officials say the addition of this roundabout, along with a future roundabout at 141st Street and Howe Road, will significantly improve traffic progression along the nearly three mile stretch of 141st Street east of SR 37.

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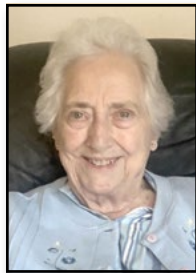

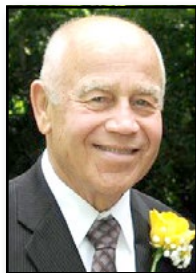

State lawmakers have approved a proposal expanding the number of people eligible for anticipated \$125 payments this spring under the state's automatic taxpayer refund law. 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Millers run back to state

Second-quarter spurt puts Noblesville in control

LOGANSPORT - For the first time in 32 years, it will be Miller Time at state.

The Noblesville girls basketball team is finally heading back to the state finals after yet another outstanding performance last Saturday night. This time, the No. 5-ranked last Millers stepped it up at the Class 4A north semi-state at Logansport, where Noblesville used a second-quarter run to get past defending 4A state champions and No. 4-ranked Crown Point, 62-41.

The Millers thus qualified for the state finals since their sensational state streak of four years in a row, from 1987 to 1990. Noblesville fans young and old filled up the Berry Bowl, and they were cheering throughout the game and afterwards.

"I'm so glad to go with such a great group of girls and such an awesome crowd," said junior Dani Mendez.

"This community's amazing," said Millers coach Donna Buckley. "I knew we were going to pack it out tonight."

Noblesville never trailed during the game, although it was a close first quarter. Reagan Wilson opened the scoring with a 3-pointer for the Millers, which the Bulldogs' Lilly Stoddard answered with a layin.

Noblesville was able to stay a basket or two ahead of Crown Point for most of the quarter, making back-to-back baskets on two occasions. Brooklyn Smitherman scored on consecutive layins, then Meredith Tippner scored five straight points to put the Millers up 12-6.

The Bulldogs came back to tie the game at 14-14 when Emily Phillips hit a 3-pointer and Jessica Carrothers made a layin. But the period ended with Ashlynn Shade getting a

LOGANSPORT – It was the calm that was needed for Noblesville to take care of business as they usually do. From the opening tip, there was quite the adrenaline flowing between the two highly-touted teams.

It was obvious that Crown Point would put a lot of focus on Ashlynn Shade, but it was a matter for the Millers who would be able to make things happen once Shade was defended well enough. Reagan Wilson managed to be that player (again) and that helped propel Noblesville to the semi-state crown in a 62-41 convincing victory over the defending state champion Bulldogs to win the Class 4A north semi-state.

As Reagan Wilson goes, so do the Millers

That calm for the Millers is sophomore point guard Reagan Wilson. She got the game started with a three-point bomb from a Kaitlyn Shoemaker pass that erupted the Noblesville faithful, which literally filled half of the Berry Bowl with its contingent of fans.

Wilson's trey put the Bulldogs in a hole that they could never climb out of. She had two assists in the quarter and five in the first half as she helped control the flow of the game at both ends of the floor.

"I know my role, that's who I am and that's who I'm going to be every night. Good game, bad game or indifferent," said a confident Wilson.

"I know I have to come out here and be the leader of the team and know that we are going to get done what we want to get done," continued Wilson on her role as the point guard.

Wilson is one of those players that doesn't have to be told what to do out there by the coaches, she just does things knowingly.

"Those are two of the best players in the state," said Noblesville head coach Donna Buckley of Wilson and Shade.

"We've got a lot of kids to go with them, but those two in their class, Ashlynn's one of the best players in the country and Reagan's one of the best players in the state, no doubt," continued Buckley on her two leaders in Shade and Wilson.

Reagan does a lot of the little things that don't show. The way that she is the floor general just speaks volumes of the coaching.

"Our kids believe in defense, our 1-3-1 and box-and-1 that we ran both times against Crown Point. They didn't question anything. They just go out and do it. We believe in what we do and you have that kind of talent, good things will come from it," stated Buckley on her team's defensive capabilities.

Things just continued to click on both ends of the floor for Wilson and the Millers and nothing seemed to stop them en route to the semi-state championship.

Not many teams can do this, but the Millers are a defense first team and then their offense flows. Once their defense sets the tone, it makes room for their offense to get into a groove.

"We know we have to capitalize on the defensive side and defense makes us offense," said Wilson on the Millers' and their defense to offense strategy.

"We capitalize in transition, so that's what helped us win this game," continued Wilson on what it took for the win.

University had two possessions to pull closer, but they ended with a turnover pass out of bounds and a missed shot. Forest Park made a three pointer and scored again at the buzzer to restore the lead to 10 points at 39-29.

Chikamba ended with 12 points, six rebounds and six steals. Seay added 11 points and six rebounds while DuBois had eight points and five boards.

Amber Tretter, a 6-1 junior, led Forest Park with 17 points and 5-9 Carley Begle added 13.

University ends the season 23-5 while Forest Park advances at 25-3 to face Frankton in the Class 2A state championship game.

Wrestling state finals

'Rocks get two top three finishers

Platonov 2nd at 285, Vest 3rd at 120 . . . Huskies' Tilton 8th at 182

Westfield had a successful day at the IHSAA state wrestling finals, as two Shamrocks wrestlers finished in the top three at the meet, which took place last Saturday at Gainbridge Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

Senior Mihail Platonov made his way to the state championship match, winning two tough decision to get to the final at 285 pounds. Platonov first beat New Prairie senior Hunter Whitenack in the quarter-finals by a 4-2 decision, then defeated Brownsburg junior Leighton Jones in the semi-finals in an 8-5 decision.

In the championship match, Platonov took on Rochester senior Marshall Fishback. The two went through six minutes of regulation, eventually going to an ultimate tiebreak, which Fishback won 3-2. Platonov thus finished as runner-up, completing his season with a 39-8 record.

Westfield senior Braxton Vest took third place at 120 pounds. Vest beat Belmont senior Isaac Ruble in a 10-8 decision to win his quarter-final match, but fell to Warren Central sophomore Kyrel Leavell

(the eventual 120-pound champion), in a 5-2 semi-final decision. That sent Vest to the third-place match, and he would finish third by getting a third-period fall over Garrett junior Hayden Brady. Vest finished his senior season 41-7.

Those two performances helped the Shamrocks to a strong finish in the team standings. Westfield tied for 11th place, scoring 33 points. Crown Point won the team state championship with 178 points, well ahead of runner-up Brownsburg's 105 points.

Hamilton Heights junior Evan Tilton finished eighth in the 182-pound class. Tilton dropped his quarter-final match to Fort Wayne Snider freshman De'Alcapo Veazy in a first-round pin. In the wrestleback round, Tilton lost to Hobart senior Jacob Simpson in a 5-4 decision, then fell to Roncalli junior Luke Hansen in a 7-4 decision in the seventh-place match.

Tilton completed his season with a 46-4 record. He scored three team points for the Huskies, which tied them for 60th place.

The other five swims were all close enough that they could receive callbacks to state, which means the times are fast enough to fill a field of 32 in an event. Callbacks will be determined on Tuesday as two sectionals in northern Indiana delayed their finals until Monday.

The Greyhounds won all 11 of the swimming events. Aaron Shackell, Ryan Malicki and Gregg Enoch were all three-time winners.

First, Shackell and Malicki teamed with Sean Sullivan and Christopher Holmes to win the medley relay in a state cut time of 1 minute, 29.38 seconds.

Shackell was back in the water right away, and swam to victory in the 200 freestyle. The junior later was the winner in the butterfly event.

Enoch also had a quick turnaround, swimming to a win in the 500 free, then joining Leo Han, Andrew Robertson and Graham Seaver to take first in the 200 free relay. Enoch and Sullivan were also part of the victorious 400 free relay, with Rikito Iwase and Emile Haig.

Meanwhile, Malicki sailed to first place in the individual medley, then easily won the breaststroke event, where sophomore Brandon Malicki placed second. Both swam in state cut times. Rounding out the individual wins were Holmes in the 50 free, Sullivan in the 100 free and Han in the backstroke.

Carmel's qualifiers by state cut time were: Enoch and Iwase in the 200 free, Michael Gorey and Brandon Malicki in the IM,

Han and Holmes in the butterfly, Robertson in the 100 free, Connor Lathrop and Carson Szotek in the 500 free and Gorey in the breaststroke.

RUNNER-UP MILLERS
Noblesville finished second at the sectional, scoring 401 points. The Millers had two swims qualify for state, starting with the medley relay team of Jeremiah Ledwith, Aidan Biddle, Cavan Cameron and Wyatt Wade. Cameron would later become a two-time qualifier, as his breaststroke time of 56.29 seconds was nearly two seconds below the state cut.

Noblesville also had two divers place in the top four, which qualifies them for the Fort Wayne South Side regional on Tuesday. Parker Mutter placed third and Aiden Kless finished fourth.

SIX QUALIFY FOR 'ROCKS
Westfield took third as a team with a score of 331 points. The Shamrocks also had six swims qualify for state.

Noah Brauer and Evan Lake both were four-time qualifiers. The duo were part of the qualifying 200 and 400 freestyle relays, joining Bennett Morse and Aiden Yonkus to finish well under the cut time in both events. Brauer also got state cuts in the IM and butterfly, while Lake swam cut times in the 200 and 500 freestyle.

Guerin Catholic placed sixth as a team, totaling 134 points. Quinn Sweeney had two fifth-place finishes in the 200 free and butterfly, while Drew Wilhite took fifth in the backstroke. Both swimmers joined Sam Miller and Grant Bricking to place fifth in the 200 free relay.

A RESOLUTION INITIATING AN AMENDED AND RESTATED PLAN OF ORGANIZATION CHANGING GOVERNING BODY COMPOSITION AND MANNER OF ELECTION
WHEREAS, the Board of School Trustees of Hamilton Heights School Corporation ("Board") currently consists of a five-member, non-partisan elected Board with:
(i) two (2) members elected (a) as residents from within one of two geographically defined areas within the school corporation and (b) by voters residing within the same one of two geographically defined areas within the school corporation;
(ii) two (2) members elected (a) as residents from within the second of two geographically defined areas within the school corporation and (b) by voters residing within the same second of two geographically defined areas within the school corporation; and
(iii) one (1) member elected (a) as an at-large member who may reside anywhere within the boundaries of the school corporation and (b) by voters residing anywhere within the school corporation; and
WHEREAS, the Board has concluded that it should initiate a proposed plan to change the composition and method of electing the Board; and
WHEREAS, Indiana Code ("I.C.") 20-23-8, et. seq., provides the Board with the authority and process by which it may initiate a proposed plan to change the composition and method of electing a governing body of a public school corporation; and
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this Board that pursuant to I.C. 20-23-8-10(a)(2), it adopts the following changes in the Hamilton Heights School Corporation Organization Plan by which members of the Board are to be elected following the Effective Date (as defined below).
(End of Recitals - Here Follows Plan Change)
Plan for Governing Body Composition Change

A. **Board of School Trustees**
1. **Number & Residential Districts** - The governance of Hamilton Heights School Corporation shall be vested in a non-partisan Board composed of five (5) members elected at a November general election in accordance with I.C. 20-23-4-29.1. There shall be two (5) geographically defined and limited residence districts from which two (2) members residing therein each, two from each district, shall be elected to the Board (thereby comprising a total of four (4) resident members) and an "at large" district comprised of the entire area of the Hamilton Heights School Corporation, from which one (1) member shall be elected. All five (5) members shall be elected by all voters residing within the school corporation. The Board intends that this manner of election be that option in I.C. 20-23-4-27(c)(2). The two residence districts, each from which two (2) members of the Board shall reside, shall be as follow:
a. White River Township Residence District - That portion of the Hamilton Heights School Corporation bounded by the boundaries of White River Township, Hamilton County, Indiana.
b. Jackson Township Residence District - That portion of the Hamilton Heights School Corporation bounded by the boundaries of Jackson Township, Hamilton County, Indiana.
2. **Term of Office** - Membership on the Board shall constitute a "lucrative office" as the term is used in Article 2, § 9 of the Constitution of the State of Indiana. Members shall be elected to a term of office of four (4) years commencing on January 1 of the year following the year of their election.
3. **Organization and Appointment of Officers** - The Board shall annually organize within fifteen (15) days after the commencement date of the members' terms of office, or within such time as might otherwise be required by law. The Board shall elect from among its membership a president, vice president, and secretary each of whom shall be a different member of the Board. The Board may make such other appointments as permitted by, and in accordance with, applicable law.
4. **Compensation** - Members shall be entitled to compensation for the performance of their duties on the Board, as limited by applicable law, and as determined, from time to time, by resolution of this Board.
5. **Eligibility for Membership on Board** - To be eligible to serve on the Board, a candidate for election to the Board must have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years before the candidate's term of office would begin. Candidates running for election to the Board from one of the two geographically limited and defined residence districts must have been a continuous resident of that residence district for at least the one (1) year immediately prior to the general election on which the candidate's name appears on the ballot for election to the Board. Candidates running for election to the Board as an "at-large" member must have been a continuous resident of the school corporation for at least one (1) year immediately prior to the general election on which the candidate's name appears on the ballot for election to the Board. Property ownership shall not be an eligibility requirement for a candidate seeking election to the Board.
6. **Vacancies on Board** - Vacancies on the Board existing because of the death of a school board member shall be filled in the manner provided by I.C. 20-26-4-4.5, as from time to time amended. Vacancies on the Board existing for any reason other than the death of an elected, qualified, and acting school board member shall be filled in the manner provided by I.C. 20-26-4-4(c), as from time to time amended.
B. **Transition Plan Pending Board Elections**
1. **Schedule of Current Board Terms** - The terms of office of the current members of the Board, their current corresponding election district, the date their current term began, and the date their current term ends, all as determined by the law and the Hamilton Heights School Corporation governing body selection plan then in effect at the time of their election, are:

2. **Transition from Election District to Residence District Representation:** The representation of the existing election districts shall be transitioned to residence district under this proposed plan change in the following manner:
