## So, you want to run for office?

So, you want to run for office?

The Election Board at its last meeting had the difficult task of removing several people from the May ballot because they had improperly filed their application to run for office. Applications must be filed under oath and need to be accurate.

To file for a political party office, such as a State Delegate or Precinct Committeeman, an applicant must have voted in the previous two primaries for that party, or in the alternative, they must have a letter of approval from their County Party Chairman. They must make the choice on the application of which type of qualification they are choosing: primary voting or party chair. Those not complying with the rules may be removed by the Election Board on its own motion or any person may challenge a candidate.

## County getting ready for severe weather season

Hamilton County Emergency Management (HCEM) is preparing for this year's Severe Weather Preparedness Week, March 13-19. The goal is to educate the public about severe weather hazards and help them be better prepared for the upcoming storm season. Severe convective weather is winds greater than 58 mph, hail one-quarter of an inch or larger, and/or the presence of a funnel cloud or tornado.

Severe Weather Preparedness Week also includes a statewide tornado drill. This year's drill will occur on Tuesday, March 15. HCEM will activate the Hamilton County Emergency Operations Center before the tornado drill, just as it does for every severe thunderstorm and tornado watch. The National Weather Service will issue a test warning to signal the start of the drill sometime between 10 and 10:30 a.m. HCEM will activate the outdoor warning sirens for the statewide drill. Everyone is encouraged to take the time to exercise your plan by going to your safe place during the drill.

To prepare for the statewide drill, Hamilton County will resume weekly testing of



### How can you prepare for severe weather?

1. Buy an all-hazards weather radio. It is like a smoke detector for emergencies and does not rely on the internet.
2. Download the HCEM Indiana App from the App Store or Google Play to receive weather alerts, access preparedness information, view power outages, listen to a live stream of the National Weather Service radio, and much more.
3. Register with [smart911.com](http://smart911.com) to link your cell phone with your home address. It saves time by helping 911 know your lo-

cation. You can also sign up to receive severe weather alerts.

4. Build an emergency kit by having emergency supplies for you, your family, and your pets for at least three days, including food, water, medicine, and more.
5. Ensure you have a

plan, and your family members understand the plan.

Recent instances show some close calls. We had a young lady who had an out-of-county address because she lived at the edge of the county. She was a Hamilton County resident. She applied to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles for registration and was wrongfully placed in Madison County. This was first discovered when she came to vote in the last election. The Precinct Committeeman, rather than permitting a provisional ballot, which would have been proper, merely indicated it would be cleared up by the next election, thus barring the candidate from meeting the qualifications of voting in two prior primary elections. Since she had selected voting in the primary

as her means of qualification and was challenged, the Board had to remove her candidacy.

You might ask, “Wasn’t that close enough to allow her to run?” As President of the Election Board in what is thought of as a highly Republican County, I was named as the Republican Representative of Indiana Election Boards in a recent Federal lawsuit by Common Cause, suing to change election rules. While we were ultimately successful, I never want to be in the position of being called to testify in Federal Court about whether Hamilton County sometimes does not follow election rules.

Election Administrator

Beth Sheller and County Clerk Kathy Williams are both well versed in the election rules in Hamilton County and can assist applicants who have questions when they file. At the last meeting, the Republicans and the Democrats were united in following the rules even when sometimes the cases make it exceedingly difficult to do so.

I encourage all voters in Hamilton County to register, check your registration, vote regularly, and participate in the election process.

# State Senate approves bill banning transgender girls from girls' K-12 sports teams

The Indiana Senate has passed a bill that would ban transgender girls from participating in girls' K-12 sports teams.

The measure passed 32-18.

Last week, **Senate Republicans defeated multiple attempts to change the bill**, according to News 8's Garrett Bergquist.

Tuesday's vote capped more than a month of some of the most intense debate of this year's legislative session.

At hearings in both chambers, Hoosiers, including many who are transgender or are parents of transgender children, lined up for hours to testify against the bill, saying it amounted to legalized discrimination. A smaller number of parents testified in favor, saying they wanted their daughters

to face a level playing field.

Those arguments played out again on the Senate floor on Tuesday. Sen. Stacey Donato, R-Logansport, who sponsored the bill in the upper chamber, said her aim was to protect the integrity of girls' sports, nothing more.

"This bill is simply about protecting fair competition in girls' sports," Donato said. "Federal anti-discrimination laws, or Title IX, have long recognized that it is reasonable to give boys and girls separate athletic opportunities in school because of biological differences that give boys an edge in many sports."

Several Democrats pressed Donato on the reasoning behind the bill, her views on transgender people and the potential impacts of the legislation. Donato repeatedly did not answer their questions directly, instead repeating that the bill

is about the integrity of girls' sports.

Sen. J.D. Ford, D-Indianapolis, spoke against the bill for more than half an hour. Ford, who is the only openly LGBT member of the General Assembly, recalled his own struggles growing up.

"I did not choose this life," Ford said. "Why in the world would I subject myself to names, being harassed, or even being bullied? Why would I choose that? I didn't choose that. These kids aren't choosing this. It's who I am and it's who they are."

The bill now heads to Gov. Eric Holcomb's desk. Holcomb has indicated he supports the bill, though he told reporters last week he would review the bill carefully before deciding whether to sign it.

The ACLU has already said it plans to sue if the bill becomes law.

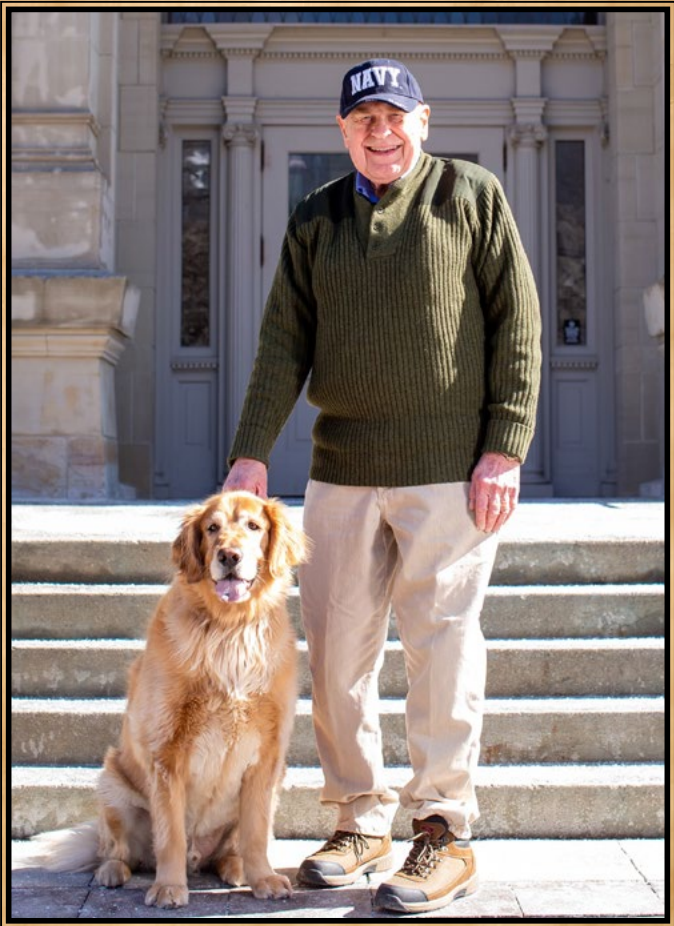

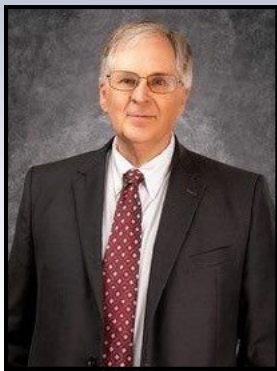

# Kate Clarke, Alyssa Crockett, Ashlynn Shade named to 'Supreme 15' lists

Three Hamilton County girls basketball players are among the 15 seniors and 15 underclass players that have earned IBCA/Franciscan Health "Supreme 15" All-State honors for 2021-22, it was announced Tuesday.

Three Hamilton County players are on the list of Hoosier Basketball Magazine's Top 60 senior girls' basketball players for 2021-22 as compiled by Hoosier Basketball Magazine.

These girls were selected from approximately 1,400 senior players statewide. Statistical evaluation, game observation and statewide research were conducted during the season and throughout the state tournament to determine Hoosier Basketball Magazine's Top 60.

Carmel's Kate Clarke, Westfield's Alyssa Crockett and Hamilton Heights' MyKayla Moran are the Hamilton County players that will be participating. Hamilton Southeastern's Ryan Viele was also selected, but is unable to participate due to injury.

Two sessions of the 41st annual Top 60 Senior Workout will be hosted by Hoosier Basketball Magazine in conjunction with the IHSAA and the IBCA on Sunday, March 6th at Beech Grove High School in Indianapolis (5330 Hornet Ave., Beech Grove, Indiana 46107).

Half of the Top 60 girls, primarily from northern and southern Indiana, will participate in the first session (1 to 3 p.m.). The remaining players, primarily from central Indiana, will compete during the second session (3:30 to 5:30 p.m.).

The Top 60 Senior Workout includes 10 of the state's top scorers—Zoe Stewart (Terre Haute North - 24.8 points per game), Lilly Maple (Maconaquah), Madilynn Hudspeth (Oregon-Davis), Teresa Maggio (McCutcheon), Kelly Ratigan (South Bend St. Joe), Darryn Hood (Tindley), Marissa Shelton (South Bend Adams), Mila Reynolds (South Bend Washington), Jessica Carrothers (Crown Point) and Trinity Barnes (Gary West) all averaged more than 20 ppg.

There are eight players that will participate in the Top 60 Workout who are also part of the 2022 IHSAA state finals—Kurn Brunson and Ashlyn Traylor from Franklin, Reynolds and Shamarah Allen from South Bend Washington, Kynidi Mason-Striverson and Emme Rooney from Silver Creek, Lauryn Bates from Frankton and Kaybree Oxley from Tecumseh.

Heading to Hoosierland Division I Universities include Jessica Carrothers, Crown Point and Teresa Maggio, McCutcheon (IUPUI), Lilly Stoddard, Crown Point (Purdue), Mason-Striverson, Silver Creek and Rayah Kincer, Franklin Central (Evans-

ville) — Kincer is injured and unable to participate. Also highlighting the Top 60 Workout are three players headed to Big Ten teams — Reynolds, South Bend Washington (Maryland), Kate Clarke, Carmel and Alyssa Crockett, Westfield (Michigan).

State Championship coach DeeAnn Ramey (North Central) will direct both sessions. Other outstanding Indiana girls' high school coaches from the IBCA have been invited to join the 2022 Top 60 staff—Danny Brown (Columbus East), Mark Hurt (Mooresville), Julie Meeks (Sullivan) and Steve Reynolds (South Bend Washington).

ville and Jason Simpson of Greensburg in Class 3A; Justin Jordan of Whitko, Matt Crawford of Delphi, Cassie Wiseman of Heritage Christian; and Hollie Anson-Eaves of South Knox in Class 2A; and Rick Budka of Morgan Township, Don Helmick of Clinton Central, Scott Smith of Jac-Cen-Del and Amy Schilling of Edinburgh in Class A.

Franciscan Health Sports Medicine is making a financial contribution to the IBCA Scholarship Fund as the presenting partner of the IBCA all-state teams. # Pacers rally, beat Magic in overtime

It felt like déjà vu for the Pacers for much of Wednesday night in Orlando. After being outscored 35-19 in the third quarter in a loss to the Magic on Monday, the Pacers once again struggled after half-time. Orlando outpaced Indiana 29-18 in the third quarter on Wednesday.

But this time around, the Pacers fought back. Indiana rallied from an 18-point deficit to take a lead late in the fourth quarter. Some late-game miscues allowed the Magic to force overtime, but the Pacers (22-42) made the plays needed in the extra session to come away with a 122-114 victory.

It certainly helped that the Pacers had Malcolm Brogdon this time around. The sixth-year guard sat out Monday's game on the second night of a back-to-back as he continues to recover from an Achilles injury, but he was back on the court Wednesday and a key catalyst in Indiana's comeback.

Brogdon tallied 31 points, 11 rebounds, eight assists, and two steals in 41 minutes to help Indiana split a two-game set with Orlando (15-48).

"Best player on the floor tonight," Pacers head coach Rick Carlisle said. "He's our old pro. He's the best all-around player on our team and when he plays it's a different ball game out there."

Tyrese Haliburton (21 points and six assists) and Buddy Hield (17 points, five boards, three assists, and two steals) also played key roles down the stretch.

The Pacers trailed 91-76 entering the fourth quarter, but mounted a charge in the final frame. Hield buried a 3-pointer, Duane Washington Jr. converted a three-point play, and then Brogdon — playing into the fourth quarter for the first time since returning from injury — knocked down a trey during

a 9-0 run in less than 70 seconds to bring Indiana back within six with 8:19 to play.

"Tonight was a night to test it," he said of building up strength in his Achilles. "We'd been sitting out the fourth quarter of the last couple games, so tonight was the night to push it and see how it responded. And so far it's responded really well."

Terrence Ross answered with a three for Orlando, but the Blue & Gold continued their run. Back-to-back baskets by Brogdon and Hield forced an Orlando timeout. After the break, Hield's 3-pointer made it a 97-95 game with 6:53 remaining.

Brogdon came up with a steal on the other end and the Pacers had three looks to tie or take the lead, but couldn't convert. Franz Wagner scored on the other end, but Brogdon came right back down and drilled a three to make it a one-point game. After the Pacers forced a stop, Brogdon drove left to the baseline, then kicked out to Haliburton on the right wing.

The 22-year-old knocked down the three just as the clock ticked under five minutes, giving the visitors their first lead since it was 2-0 at the start of the night.

The Magic tied the game twice over the next couple minutes and moved back in front at 106-104 on Wagner's jumper with 2:20 remaining. Brogdon drew a foul on Mo Bamba at the rim on the other end and hit both free throws to knot the score once again.

After Wagner missed a hook shot, Hield dishd to Haliburton on the left wing and the second-year guard once again delivered, knocking down another go-ahead triple.

Magic rookie Jalen Suggs got to the rim and scored on the other end to cut Indiana's lead to one. Brogdon then missed a layup, opening the door for Orlando, but the Pac-

ers locked down with stout defense, forcing Magic guard Cole Anthony into a desperate heave that resulted in a shot clock violation with 26.7 seconds left.

The Magic elected to foul Brogdon, who hit the first but missed the second with 16.6 seconds left. Orlando pushed the break, with Anthony getting to the rim. He missed, but Bamba was there for the tying putback with 5.8 seconds remaining.

Brogdon raced back the other way and nearly won the game with a reverse layup, but it bounced up off the rim and out as the buzzer sounded, sending the game to overtime.

Both teams managed just one basket over the first three minutes of the extra session. The Pacers surged ahead with 1:52 left in overtime, after Haliburton drove and kicked to Hield for three.

On Indiana's next possession, Brogdon missed a stepback jumper, but Oshae Brissett corralled the offensive rebound, then kicked out to Haliburton for another trey to extend Indiana's lead to 118-102 with 1:05 left. Orlando never got back within one possession the rest of the way.

Second-year big man Jalen Smith tallied a double-double with 15 points and 15 rebounds off the bench for Indiana in the win. Rookie center Isaiah Jackson went 8-for-8 from the field and amassed 16 points and seven boards in 23 minutes before fouling out.

Bamba got the Magic off to a fast start. The fourth-year center connected on his first four shots, including two 3-pointers as well as an old-fashioned three-point play, tallying 11 points as Orlando jumped out to an 18-8 lead.

The Pacers clawed back, trimming the deficit to 24-20 with 1:07 remaining in the

first quarter. But the Magic outscored Indiana 7-2 in the final minute of the frame to take a 31-22 lead into the second quarter.

The Magic used a 7-0 run early in the ensuing quarter to stretch their lead to 43-30, but the Blue & Gold fought back once again. Back-to-back dunks by Jackson and Hield made it a 51-47 game with 3:18 to play in the first half. After Bamba scored on the other end, Hield knocked down a three to make it a three-point game.

Indiana got within two a short while later following a layup by Brogdon, but that would be the closest they would get in the half. Orlando took a 62-58 lead into half-time.

The hosts broke the game open shortly after the intermission. Rookie of the Year candidate Wagner scored 10 points — including a pair of 3-pointers — as the Magic opened the second half with a 14-4 run.

Orlando led by as many as 18 points in the third quarter and dominated the frame, outscoring Indiana by 11 to take a 91-76 lead into the fourth, but the Pacers turned things around from there.

"We started moving it better," Carlisle said. "Our unselfishness on offense energized our defense and we were able to make a run. Almost had the thing won in regulation, then obviously a great job in overtime closing it out."

Wagner led six Magic players in double figures with 28 points, going 10-for-18 from the field and 4-for-6 from 3-point range. Bamba (19 points and 12 rebounds) and Wendell Carter Jr. (13 points, 18 rebounds, and five assists) both recorded double-doubles for Orlando in the loss.

The Pacers will wrap up a four-game road trip this weekend, playing in Detroit on Friday and Washington on Sunday.
