Nickel Plate Heritage Railroad names new director

Long-time Noblesville resident Emily Reynolds will serve as the new director of the Nickel Plate Heritage Railroad (NPHRR), operator of the Nickel Plate Express which runs for 12.5 miles Noblesville and Atlanta.  
The NPHRR Board said they chose Reynolds because of her varied skill sets, passion for non-profit management, experience, and knowledge of the community.  
Reynolds brings over a decade of experience as a trusted leader in the nonprofit industry. In her previous role as Director of Outreach for Servants at Work, she was instrumental in growing the volunteer program, implementing the strategic plan, engaging new audiences through social media, and expanding their fundraising efforts.  
"I remember seeing a train coming through town as a child and the magic it held," Reynolds said. "This is an opportunity to support the preservation of history in Hamilton County while also bringing families together for a truly unique experience."  
Reynolds assumes the role at a strategic point in the railroad's growth. This summer, it will move operations to a new welcome station in Forest Park that the City of Noblesville and Noblesville Parks Department are developing. The 1950s historic train will depart from a covered platform boarding and provide significantly improved visitor amenities.  
"We are excited about this next step in our development and think Emily is the perfect leader to help us grow again," said NPHRR Board Treasurer Toni Dickover. "With our strong history, her background and knowledge, a passionate staff and volunteer pool, and our partners at the city and county, we are excited about what the coming years bring."  
The Nickel Plate Express is a program of the Nickel Plate Heritage Railroad. The 12.5 miles of Nickel Plate Track is owned by the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority.

Fishers student artists will lead public in community art project on March 11

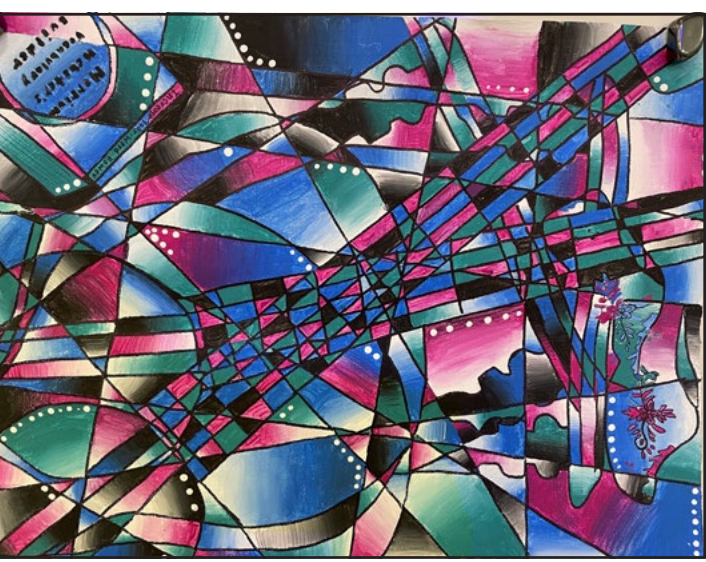

Fall Creek Township held its board meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 16 to review and approve the 2021 Annual Report. A few highlights from 2021 noted at the meeting is that Fall Creek Township has the second-lowest tax rate of townships within Hamilton County. "I am proud that we are able to continue to keep our township tax rate low in the mist of the challenges over the past year due to the pandemic," said Fall Creek Township Trustee Doug Allman. The township has a food pantry available to Fall Creek residents experiencing food insecurity. "Our food pantry is supported by donations through our Pantry Partner Program, as well as local non-profits and community service groups," Allman said. "We

have such a giving community to be able to support our residents in need solely through donations." The township partners with over 20 nonprofit organizations within Hamilton County to help meet the needs of residents who find themselves in a temporary challenging financial situation. Hamilton County's townships were responsible for administrating COVID relief and Hamilton County Township Association grants. "In addition to the day-to-day activities, there were 379 applications that our staff handled in conjunction with the HCTA program," Allman said. 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# Role reversal

# Lead me not to be funny turned

When someone asks me what is the hardest part of being in the sandwich generation, I immediately reply “the role reversal.” After decades of your mother or father parenting and advising *you*, it seems like all of a sudden you have to parent *them*. And it involves a roller coaster of emotions.

After meeting someone new, I’ll sometimes explain to them that I have a 21-year-old child, a 19-year-old child, and an 89-year-old child. I don’t mean any disrespect to my mother with that, but it helps lighten the mood.

Mom’s hospice nurse Laurie (one of her many angels) called me Tuesday to update me on what she is seeing. Mom’s pain continues to worsen, which is heartbreaking. It’s also not surprising with her advanced cancer. And she’s refusing to take showers, which a hospice aide tries to help her with two times a week.

I can understand that. Right now, any movement hurts, even with pain medication. However, once Mom’s in the shower, it soothes those aches and pains tremendously.

Laurie and I tried to figure out how to convince Mom to suffer through some pain in order to get great relief. I explained to Laurie that I could talk to Mom about it, but she’d forget the conversation as soon as I walked out the door.

“Would you be able to come over one morning when the aide comes to try to convince her?” Laurie asked. I looked over my schedule and was once again thankful to work for myself. I told Laurie that I would make myself available to do so for the next three days.

As soon as I hung up the phone I sighed (sighing is a tremendous help in the sandwich generation by the way ... it’s an alternative to screaming and can be done in public.)

I instantly felt that role reversal. I pictured myself in Mom’s apartment talking to her gently and trying everything in my power to persuade her to get in that shower. It felt like I was a mom to young ones again trying to coax them to take a bath after they repeatedly refused.

The whole thing is a delicate line. You certainly can’t treat your elderly parent like a child – they’ve earned your respect. You don’t want to be patronizing. But you also have to be firm.

I often utilize a principle I learned when I taught the Dale Carnegie Human Relations course – put yourself in the other person’s shoes. As I write this, I haven’t seen Mom yet, but I’m thinking I’ll explain to her that I know she’s hurting. I can’t even imagine the pain.

I’ll work with the aide to explain how good she’ll feel once she sits on the shower seat and lets that warm water surround her. Her aide will also give her a gentle massage, which will be soothing.

Let’s hope this role reversal yields a good outcome.

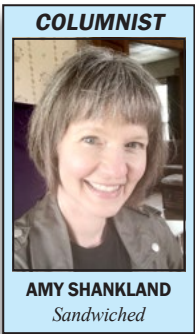
That being said, CCHS asks the public to give them a few more weeks to get settled before any visits.

Getting sideways meant she was a bit miffed or madder than an old wet hen. I knew just how sideways she was by the tone of her voice.

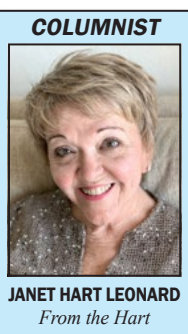
I also knew that whenever she was sideways the house would get an extra cleaning. To this day I follow her passion for cleaning whenever I get sideways.

# The Girl Across The Field Revisited

*The field just sat there day and night  
That’s all they said it could do  
But I know that’s not entirely right  
For it took me from here to you.*

I was 15 when I wrote those lines, a high-school freshman’s first crack at song verse and an inaugural attempt to woo a girl with writing.

She was the girl across the field. To visit her – there were hundreds of visits – I ran down my parents’ driveway, crossed Brushy Fork Road, leapt a ditch, ran through the grass and clover, the field gradually inclining then declining only to rise again like a camel’s hump, the barking of a neighbor’s beagle keeping time with my footfalls until finally I passed between front porch pillars and rang the doorbell.

She smiled from the other side of the front door’s glass, and my field-racing heart pounded even faster. She, with city roots, was of a cultured upbringing, a refreshing transplant to our little river town. Ensnconced in a rural route existence, I was barely better than a wilding.

Often we sat on the porch with our kneecaps touching, discussing movies, music and books. She loved “Family Ties,” and told me Alex P. Keaton reminded her of me. In her basement, we’d shoot pool – my eyes discretely seeking out all the right angles as she pressed her body against the rails and aimed her shots (geometry finally bringing meaning to my life) while listening to Devo, Blondie, Neil Diamond’s “Love on the

Rocks” and the theme from “Arthur,” her favorite movie then.

I started to write song-poems because of her. I did this to separate myself from the pack of jocks that she, as cheerleader, was obligated to fall for short-term. I wrote to be different, creating a niche to be noticed. My words vied for her attention as she cheered on baskets and touchdowns. It worked. Not how I hoped. We remained woefully platonic during our wonder years.

In 1983, after high-school graduation, we gradually lost touch, she attending private college on the east side of the city, me making do at a public one on the west side, the kind of college where students wore other college names on their sweatshirts. From mid-1986 to the late 1990s, we lost contact. Then, in 1999, on the day I returned from Disney World with my son, I learned from my mother that “the girl across the field” was dying.

I commenced immediate correspondence, despite my then wife’s reluctance. “Thanks for the letter,” she e-mailed. “It was so uplifting to just see your handwriting again.” When I asked to see her, she responded, “I’ve decided I’m too sick and ugly and I’d rather you wouldn’t.”

I flooded her with “remember when?” recollections that

she didn’t remember.

She forgot the old-fashioned sodas at Dairy Queen. She forgot how I watched her porch light from my side of the field, its glow telling me she was still dragging Main with some lucky athlete, how I raced up the field when her date’s car backed down her driveway, and how she waited for me to emerge breathlessly from the shadows to hear her report.

“I can’t believe you remember so much. I remember very little...the chemo has wiped out some of my memory banks,” she responded. “We went to ‘E.T.’ together? You mowed our grass?”

Her e-mails focused mostly on the present references of white and red cell counts; chemo and CAT scans; ovarian cyst, biopsies and malignancy; Taxol and Topotecan; nausea and fatigue; lost hair and hair returning (“My hair is coming in strong now. It has really given me hope. I feel invincible.”).

Sometimes, though, she expressed appreciation for our reconnection. “Thanks again for your friendship.” “You always lift my spirits.”

The last e-mail she sent to me before relying on a distribution list to simultaneously update her friends and family on her health status ended with, “Michael J. Fox was on ‘Rosie’ the other

day. He reminded me so much of you ... of how much fun you are to be around.”

I smiled. Finally, she remembered something from our past.

On 4-26-99, she reported to all of us, “I have 4 tumors.”

On 5-8-99, the e-mails coming from her e-mail account were actually written by her husband, due to, as he put it, her health declining “considerably.” His subsequent e-mails became bleaker. Phrases like “a short time to live” and “deteriorated drastically over the weekend” darkened our in-boxes.

On 6-20-99, he reported that her 14-month cancer battle was over.

This year, I saw recent wedding photos of her daughter, Claire, who was only a few years old when her mother died. The close resemblance between Claire and her mother sent me on a helpless mind drift back to Brushy Fork Road and The Girl Across The Field.

Even now, almost 23 years later, I don’t know what any of this is supposed to mean to me. I do know she died at 34, leaving behind two children and a husband. I do know she would be 57 this year. I do know that she was buried on the same day my own daughter was born. # So, you want to run for office?

So, you want to run for office?

The Election Board at its last meeting had the difficult task of removing several people from the May ballot because they had improperly filed their application to run for office. Applications must be filed under oath and need to be accurate.

To file for a political party office, such as a State Delegate or Precinct Committeeman, an applicant must have voted in the previous two primaries for that party, or in the alternative, they must have a letter of approval from their County Party Chairman. They must make the choice on the application of which type of qualification they are choosing: primary voting or party chair. Those not complying with the rules may be removed by the Election

Board on its own motion or any person may challenge a candidate.

Recent instances show some close calls. We had a young lady who had an out-of-county address because she lived at the edge of the county. She was a Hamilton County resident. She applied to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles for registration and was wrongfully placed in Madison County. This was first discovered when she came to vote in the last election. The Precinct Committeeman, rather than permitting a provisional ballot, which would have been proper, merely indicated it would be cleared up by the next election, thus barring the candidate from meeting

the qualifications of voting in two prior primary elections. Since she had selected voting in the primary as her means of qualification and was challenged, the Board had to remove her candidacy.

You might ask, “Wasn’t that close enough to allow her to run?” As President of the Election Board in what is thought of as a highly Republican County, I was named as the Republican Representative of Indiana Election Boards in a recent Federal lawsuit by Common Cause, suing to change election rules. While we were ultimately successful, I never want to be in the position of being called to testify in Federal Court about wheth-

# Tegry Bistro in Fishers offers quality Japanese fare with classy atmosphere

This week we were off to Fishers to try the Tegry Bistro, an Asian-inspired restaurant that combines modern cuisine with traditional culture in an upscale ambiance.

We learned that the Fishers location is the third of three family-owned restaurants specializing in a large variety of Japanese sushi and Asian-inspired dishes. The first opened in 2006 in Brownsburg and the second in Indianapolis at Trader’s Point.

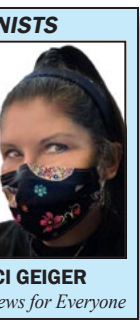
We made 5:30 reservations, and upon arrival, we were warmly greeted at the host desk and whisked off to a cozy seat in the back of the restaurant. At that time there was only one other person in the restaurant, and he was seated at the traditional sushi bar.

The décor was very classy with dark wood tables and bar, along with crystal raindrop chandelier style lighting and lovely Japanese art.

The menu came with a dry erase pen to mark your choices on the menu. I thought that was a clever way to order. Along with sushi, the menu offered several other varieties of cooked Asian dishes. I must admit I’m not a fan of raw fish, so I was happy to see they offered several cooked choices.

I enjoyed a glass of Santa Margherita Pinot Grigio from Italy (\$10) and John had a \$5 Preacher’s Daughter, a nice Amber Ale from Indiana’s Fountain Square Brewing Co. They serve a variety of sake drinks as well.

We started with two dif-

ferent types of sushi rolls. One was an avocado Hosoto Maki (\$6), an avocado wrapped in a thin layer of seaweed and rolled in rice. The other was a Mexican House Roll (\$7) with cream cheese, avocado, cucumber, and shrimp tempura. The presentation was lovely, but the rolls weren’t very fresh-tasting. We both only had one of each.

John had the Miso Soup (\$3), a traditional Japanese soup and considered to be one of the two basic soup types of Japanese cuisine. Miso is a broth-like soup and can contain various ingredients such as chopped scallions, dried seaweed, kale, mushrooms, and tofu. This particular soup didn’t have any of that, and I admit I was disappointed.

We both really enjoyed their Gyoza (\$7), a Japanese-style potsticker or dumpling that’s both pan-fried and then steamed. These were both crispy and soft outside with delicious pork and cabbage filling inside.

Out of the eight donburi rice bowls offered, John chose the NY Steak Teriyaki with broccoli and carrots over rice (\$17). They also offered chicken and salmon as well as curry versions.

He enjoyed the whole dish.

I had a Chicken Bento Box (\$15) which is also offered with steak or salmon. The presentation was a beautiful and colorful single-portion compartmentalized rectangular plate with tender glazed chicken, crispy egg rolls, rice, and veggies. Everything was cooked perfectly and

delicious.

Everything on the menu is offered à la carte as well as a wide variety of combination platters and house specials that we didn’t try, such as both Nigiri and Sashimi sushi. Nigiri is the style made with thin slices of raw fish pressed over rice, while Sashimi is usually a larger amount of fish with no rice.

Additionally, Tegry Bistro offers BBQ eel, tuna, yellowtail, halibut, scallop, seabass, octopus, shrimp, crabstick, mackerel, salmon, smoked salmon, salmon roe (eggs), and flying fish roe.

As John mentioned in our review of 9th Street Bistro, dessert is my favorite part of the meal, and unfortunately, they had no desserts available the night we were there. It was very disappointing. So, we went to McDonald’s and got ice cream for dessert.

Our server was nice very nice and attentive – and apparently under 21, as the chef brought us our drinks. Everyone was kind and professional. We ended up spending two and a half hours there and never felt rushed.

Ever since opening its doors, Tegry has consistently been one of Indiana’s most popular spots for sushi and Asian-inspired dishes. If you want to try high-quality Japanese dishes in a relaxed, and classy environment, head to Tegry.

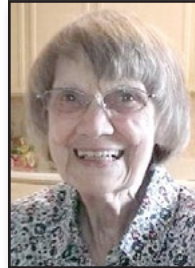

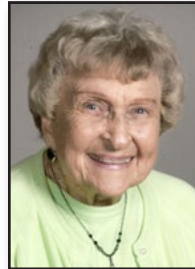

# Shamrocks make history

## Westfield holds off Carmel to win first-ever sectional title

By RICHIE HALL

**NOBLESVILLE** - After 104 years, the Shamrocks are finally sectional champions.

The Westfield boys basketball team entered the winner's circle for the first time in school history last Saturday by claiming the Class 4A Sectional 8 championship at The Mill in Noblesville. The Shamrocks held off Carmel, the two-time defending 4A state champions, 59-54 in an exciting game in front of a standing-room only crowd at The Mill. Westfield took a big lead by halftime, weathered an inevitable Greyhounds comeback in the third quarter, and surged ahead in the fourth quarter by making big plays and free throws at the end of the game.

When the game was over, the Shamrocks players were cheering, and soon the floor was filled with Shamrocks fans. Some of them had been waiting decades for this moment.

"There's people that played here 50 years ago coming up to me after the game crying, because they know what we've been through and we've never won one of those before," said 'Rocks senior Braden Smith. "It's something we've all worked for and put work in for. It's exciting and we're super, super excited."

"This sectional title's for every player that has ever played at Westfield, every coach that's ever coached, our entire school and our entire community," said Shamrocks coach Shane Sumpter.

Even those that played back in 1918.

The Shamrocks, ranked No. 11 in the IBCA coaches poll, and the 'Hounds, rated No. 3 in the Class 4A Associated Press poll and No. 4 IBCA, spent most of the first quarter trading the lead. Nic Depasquale got Westfield on the board first with two free throws just 20 seconds into the contest. Carmel then made back-to-back baskets, with Sam Orme connecting on a layin and Jared Bonds making a dunk.

A layin by Charlie Williams later put the Greyhounds up 8-6. That's when the Shamrocks went on a run, a 10-0 spurt to get them ahead 16-8. Cam Haffner hit a 3-pointer, Alex Romack was good on a traditional three-point play, then Smith made consecutive baskets.

"It's taken us two years to get here, and just the

amount of emotions right now is overwhelming," said Romack. "It's really exciting to finally win this."

Peter Suder hit a jumper to finish the quarter, keeping Carmel within 16-10. Smith opened the second period with a triple, and Westfield stayed in front by a relatively comfortable margin for the remainder of the first half, never letting its lead dip below six points. Smith scored eight points during the quarter, including a pair of 3-pointers. A 3 from Haffner was the last word of the half, which finished with the 'Rocks up 33-23.

"That was our main goal from this whole sectional," said Smith. "Just start off strong, go quick and then play from there, because we can play with the lead."

Smith scored the first basket of the second half, which was a 3-pointer (of course). That gave Westfield its largest lead of the game at 36-23. After that, the Greyhounds dominated the third quarter, going on a 19-4 run to take the lead. Williams played brilliantly during the run, scoring nine points. Garwey Dual was just as good, with seven points. Both Carmel players made and-1s during the course of the spurt.

Not to be left out, Suder nailed a 3-pointer to tie the game at 40-40, then a Greyhounds steal led to a basket by Dual that put the 'Hounds in front for the first time since the opening quarter. Carmel led 44-43 after three periods, then Orme made a layin to push the Greyhounds ahead 46-43.

But Westfield responded with an 8-0 run and would not trail again. Haffner scored all eight of those points, draining two 3s before scoring off a steal. With that, the Shamrocks led 51-46.

"It's a game of runs," said Haffner. "We knew being up 10 that it wasn't over. Our coach always says it's a 32-minute game. It's not over till it's over. We came back and we ended up on top."

Carmel kept battling, but Westfield would answer each Greyhounds score with a basket of its own, and Carmel would answer back. Depasquale made a layin with just over a minute to go that put the 'Rocks up 55-49, but Suder hit a 3 to cut the lead in half.

Bonds got Carmel within 55-54 with a layin, after

which Westfield called a timeout. Haffner was fouled right out of the timeout and put on the line in a one-and-bonus situation, and made both free throws with 23.3 seconds left.

The 'Rocks would get the ball back and Depasquale was fouled with 3.4 seconds on the clock. Thus, the game ended where it began: Depasquale made two free throws, and the Shamrocks celebration was on.

"I've played with these guys for my whole life, since fourth grade," said Depasquale. "I just want to do it for them. All that momentum, the crowd was cheering. I knew if I hit those, we'd win, and that was just carrying me to hit those. And I knew I was not missing those."

"You just knew this game was going to come down to that," said Sumpter. "It wasn't going to be a lopsided affair either way. I've got all the respect in the world for (coach) Ryan Osborn and Carmel. I think it's fitting that you just have to go through Carmel. A lot of respect for them and really proud of these guys."

"We gave everything we had and they were the better team tonight," said Osborn, whose team finished the season 18-6. "They did a good job and they hit big shots. They did a good job of closing the game. Wouldn't do anything differently and I

wouldn't ask my kids to do anything differently. Special group of kids and I'm so proud of them, love all of them."

Smith made four 3-pointers on his way to 22 points, and also had six assists and five rebounds. Haffner added 18 points, including three 3s. Depasquale led the rebounds with six.

"Those three guys have started since they've been sophomores," said Sumpter. "Those are the guys that made the plays down the stretch."

Romack added 13 points and made three blocked

shots; both he and Trey Dorton collected three rebounds. Sumpter said Romack was "easily" the most improved player for the Shamrocks this season.

"From the Hall of Fame on, he just turned it on and he's huge for us," said Sumpter.

Suder, a varsity player since his freshman year, led the Greyhounds with 14 points.

"Pete is a special dude," said Osborn. "He means a lot to me. He's given everything unselfishly and he's one of the most amazing kids I've ever coached."

Williams added 11 points, while Orme collected eight rebounds. Dual and Bonds both pulled five rebounds. Dual made three blocks and Orme had two blocks.

Westfield is 21-6 and advances to the Logansport regional, which takes place Saturday at the Berry Bowl. The Shamrocks play Homestead in the second semi-final game, which will tip off around noon. The first semi-final starts at 10 a.m., with Kokomo facing off against Fort Wayne Snider. The championship is set for 8 p.m.

# 'Hounds, 'Rocks breeze to Sectional 8 final

**NOBLESVILLE** - Carmel and Westfield advanced to the Class 4A Sectional 8 championship game by breezing through semi-final contests last Friday.

First, the Greyhounds overcame a shaky start to cruise past host Noblesville 64-41. Following that, the Shamrocks used a hot-shooting 3-point effort to beat Hamilton Southeastern 77-50.

**RUNNING GREYHOUNDS**

The Millers were in control of the first quarter, skipping out to an 11-2 lead. Preston Roberts and Aaron Fine both scored four points during that period, with Cooper Bean throwing a 3-point basket. Fine's layin put Noblesville up nine.

"You play them here in the tournament, you can always count on a close game," said Carmel coach Ryan Osborn. "And they came out with some fire early, some confidence. They're playing well, doing a lot of good things."

Carmel's Charlie Williams finished the quarter with a lay-in, making the score 11-4 going into the second period. Williams' basket would be the start of a 15-0 run for the 'Hounds. Sam Orme took over the game during most of that stretch, scoring nine points, including a dunk.

"Man, I liked what I saw from him," Osborn said of Orme. "I know that. I liked his aggressiveness. He was assertive. He was making plays."

Peter Suder added a couple of baskets to the run as well. When the dust settled, Carmel led 17-11. Fine halted the run with a free throw, followed by a pair of foul shots from E.J. Smith.

Another Fine layin cut

the Greyhounds' lead to 19-18 with under two minutes to go in the half. Carmel pushed the lead back up to five when Josh Whack made a floater and Garwey Dual scored off a steal. Fine finished the half with another layin, and the Greyhounds led 23-20 at the break.

"I thought the first quarter we played very well," said Millers coach Scott McClelland. "I thought the first half we played well. I thought we were in a great spot at halftime."

Noblesville took a 26-25 lead early in the third quarter after Hunter Walston drained a triple. But Carmel took over after that, outscoring the Millers 23-5 over the remainder of the period. This time, it was Dual's turn to dominate, as he scored nine points during the Greyhounds' run. He also scored a basket early in the third, giving him 11 points for the quarter. Orme added seven points, including a 3-pointer.

Osborn said the success came because of "our guys allowing our defense to get stops and flow into our offense. When we were walking the ball up the floor, it was hard to get that rhythm," said the coach.

The third quarter finished with Carmel leading 48-31. Noblesville managed to get within 54-41 with 5:23 left in the fourth after Bean made a three-point play, but the Greyhounds finished the game by scoring the final 10 points. Whack started the spurt with a layin, followed by back-to-back baskets from Charlie Williams.

"Give credit where credit's due," said McClelland. "They're the champs. Trying to crack that shell of theirs on defense is

very, very challenging with their length, their discipline, their organization."

Carmel shot the ball exceptionally well from inside, making 27 of its 34 two-point attempts. Four players reached double figures for the 'Hounds, led by Orme's 18 points. Dual scored 13, Suder added 11 and Williams contributed 10 points.

Orme led the rebounds with eight, while Williams collected five rebounds. Suder dished out four assists, and Dual and Orme each had two blocked shots.

Fine led the Millers' scoring with nine points, followed by Smith and Bean with eight

points each. Roberts made six steals.

Noblesville finished the season 13-11, but got quite a bit accomplished. The Millers tied for second in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference and won their first sectional game since 2017.

McClelland said he was proud of the Noblesville seniors: Smith, Luke Wilson, Cameron Karns and Evan Wright.

"I'm their third coach in four years, and I'm not sure that's an easy thing to do," said McClelland. "And I thought those kids adjusted to what we wanted them

to do. I'll always admire what they tried to get done for us."

**HOT-SHOOTING ROCKS**

The second semi-final was tied at 6-6 early before Westfield jolted ahead, using 15-3 spurt to go ahead 21-9. The Shamrocks were hot from 3-point range, with Braden Smith draining three triples and Cam Haffner making two. Smith hit back-to-back 3s, then Trey Dorton scored off a steal to push Westfield up by 12.

Southeastern's Reph Stevenson ended the run with a layin, but an Alex Romack basket put the 'Rocks up 23-11 at the end of one. In the second quarter, Westfield made a quick 7-0 run to lead 32-14. Haffner started it with an and-1, then a Smith steal led to a dunk, followed by another basket by the Purdue commit. Haffner added another seven points late in the second quarter, which helped the Shamrocks to a 40-23 halftime lead.

"I thought everybody played well defensively," said Westfield coach Shane Sumpter. "I thought early in the first quarter, we really struggled to guard them. They hit us with a lot of cross screens in the interior and we had to make some adjustments there. Our guys responded and then we were able to get a lead and just grind away. We shot the ball well."

The Royals got their offense going in the third period, scoring 18 points. Sam Jacobs had a strong quarter, getting 10 points for Southeastern.

But Westfield kept its offense hot as well, pouring in another 25 points during the quarter, increasing their advantage to 65-41 by the end of the

third. Romack scored seven points, while Haffner threw in two more 3s. Nic Depasquale hit a 3 as well, and Smith drained another one right after.

"I thought we came out and played hard and settled in a little bit," said HSE coach John Ashworth. "But anytime you're playing against Braden Smith and Haffner and they're making shots like that, it's going to be a struggle."

The fourth quarter began the same way with Trey Buchanan hitting a triple, and Smith following that with his fifth 3 of the night. Haffner also made five triples, and was Westfield's leading scorer with 24 points. Smith added 22 and Romack had 15 points. Overall, the Shamrocks were 12-of-24 from 3-point range, exactly 50 percent.

Depasquale led the rebounds with six. Smith dished out eight assists, while Dorton handed out five. Perhaps the most popular two points of the night came from Alex Wolfe, who made the Westfield student section erupt after making a layin.

"Just a tremendous kid," said Sumpter. "Unbelievable kid, so I was really happy that he had a moment like that."

Jacobs led the Royals with 20 points. Stevenson handed out eight rebounds, while De-ion Miles dished out six assists. Southeastern finished its season 9-14.

"We saw some really good things," said Ashworth. "Obviously we need to make some major improvements collectively. I think our kids can hang our hats and be proud of the season we had."

## Huskies fall to Jay County in semi-final game

Hamilton Heights dropped its Class 3A Sectional 24 semi-final game to Jay County last Friday, falling 55-46 at the New Castle Fieldhouse.

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# 'Rocks' overwhelm Tigers      Millers cruise past Eagles

**NOBLESVILLE** - The regular-season game between Westfield and Fishers was not that long ago – only 17 days stood between that game and the two team's sectional date.

So it was very fresh in the minds of the Shamrocks, who lost that game by 25 points. Westfield completely reversed the result last Tuesday night in a first-round game of Class 4A Sectional 8 at Noblesville, as the Shamrocks overwhelmed the Tigers, ranked No. 2 in the IBCA one-class poll and Class 4A Associated Press poll, 62-44. Westfield, ranked No. 11 in the IBCA poll, advanced to the semi-finals with the win.

The star of the game for the Shamrocks was Braden Smith. He didn't play in the regular-season game due to a foot injury that had sidelined him for several games.

"I told our team all along, I thought we could become a better basketball team because we really had to learn how to play without him," said Westfield coach Shane Sumpter. "But obviously, we're a lot better when he's out there. And that's a tough kid, playing with a broken foot."

Smith scored the first basket of the game on a 3-pointer, then Nic Depasquale scored to get the Shamrocks off to a 5-0 lead. Fishers got within 9-8 late in the quarter, but Smith nailed another 3, then an Alex Romack hook shot gave Westfield a 14-10 lead at the end of the period.

Romack's basket started an 18-3 run by the 'Rocks that lasted until midway through the second period. Smith had scored 10 points during the first quarter, and he promptly drained another 3 to start the second. He added 10 more points in the second quarter, giving him 20 first-half points.

Westfield led 30-13 once the spurt was finished. Jalen Haralson made back-to-back layins for the Tigers, and Sean Millsaps scored off a steal to end the half, but Westfield still led 32-19 at the break.

The Shamrocks continued to dominate in the third quarter, using a 15-3 run to take a 47-22 lead with 2:50 left. Alex Romack had six points and Depasquale scored four during that spurt.

The third quarter ended with two baskets by Fishers' Bryce Williams, so Westfield's lead was 47-26 going into the fourth. The 'Rocks held their largest advantage early in that quarter, when a

Romack layin and Cam Haffner triple put Westfield up 52-26.

Sumpter said it was "better that we drew them" in the first round "because we had a week to prepare, because Fishers can cause you a lot of problems." While Smith was absent for that game, Sumpter wouldn't use that as an excuse. He also mentioned Westfield's improved defense as one of the reasons for the different result.

"I thought we were really good," said Sumpter. "Kept them out of the lane. The first game that we played them, they made 13 3s."

The coach said he thought his team solved that issue, among others.

"We had to solve the turnover issue," said Sumpter. "Last time we played them, they were able to create a lot of offense through their defense because we were turning the ball over. That couldn't happen again. We solved those things."

Fishers made things interesting during the fourth quarter by making a 12-0 spurt to get within 55-42. Haralson poured in nine points in that run, with Jeffrey Simmons making a 3. But Westfield used a 7-0 run to stop

any comeback attempt. Haffner made a layin, Smith was good on a three-point play and Romack scored as well.

Smith finished the game with 28 points, including five 3-pointers. Three more Shamrocks reached double figures: Haffner and Romack scored 12 points each and Depasquale added 10 points. The Shamrocks are 19-6 for the season.

Haralson, a freshman, led the Tigers with 19 points. Williams scored 12 and Simmons, playing his final game for Fishers after outstanding basketball and football careers, added 10 points. There were seven seniors on the Tigers team this season, including Williams and Simmons. The other seniors were Sean Millsaps, Josh Forbes, Charles Smith, Matt Brewer and Payton Weemer.

"What I just told them is, the first level of making an impact is information, give someone information," said Fishers coach Garrett Winegar, whose team finished the season 21-3 and won a Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship. "The second level is imitation. And those guys have left a mark that anybody who comes through Fishers should want to imitate."

**NOBLESVILLE** - Noblesville ended a long drought with style last Tuesday as the Millers began hosting Class 4A Sectional 8 at The Mill.

In the opening game of the sectional, Noblesville took care of Zionsville 67-53. It's an upset on paper, as the Eagles are ranked No. 16 in the IBCA one-class poll. But the Millers had beaten Zionsville in the regular season, and took care of business in the post-season, scoring its first sectional game win since 2017.

The Millers led 14-6 after the first quarter. E.J. Smith and Luke Almodovar both scored five points, with Smith hitting a 3-pointer. Cooper Bean added four points as well, including the final basket of the period.

Seth Hogg added 15 points and Larry Pierce 12 as the Trailblazers won their first sectional championship in 2A and fifth overall.

University never trailed in the contest as the Blazers got out to a fast start, built an eight-point halftime lead, then pushed the lead to 18 late in the third quarter. Heritage Christian mounted a charge in the fourth quarter but never got closer than 10 points as University made enough plays to salt away the win.

Coach Brandon Lafferman was effusive in praise for his team. "Our senior leadership on the floor tonight was huge from Larry Pierce and Nate Jeffrey. The defensive game plan worked out really well. Our guys did a good job holding (Myles) Colvin under his average." Colvin, a Purdue commit, did not play in the first quarter and scored 12 points.

Lafferman remarked that his squad played with a chip on its shoulder. "In the locker room at halftime our guys were talking about how no one picked us this season to win any of our games against our major sectional opponents, including last night and tonight. After beating those teams during the regular season we wanted to prove we belong here and we have a spot to keep going in the post season."

Pierce got the Blazers on the board just 20 seconds in to the game, scoring at the rim after a set up from Hogg. Robert Russell hit a corner three pointer on the University's next possession for a 5-0 lead. Cain hit his first three pointer of the night before Pierce added four straight Blazers points on a rebound basket and a pair of foul shots and University held a 12-6 lead.

The Eagles battled back to tie the game at 14 and then again at 15 before University took the lead for good in the closing seconds of the first quarter. Jeffrey kicked the ball to Cain for a three pointer and then Jeffrey added a rebound basket for a 20-15 University lead after one period.

The scoring pace slowed

down in the second quarter. Heritage Christian's Tyler Allemeier opened the quarter with a three pointer but the Eagles went nearly five minutes with scoring just one foul shot as University opened a 29-21 lead. Cain scored with 11 seconds left and University went to the half up 31-23.

Hogg hit a couple of huge three pointers midway through the third quarter for University, connecting from the right wing and right corner to give the Blazers a 39-27 lead. Heritage Christian cut the lead to 10 on several occasions in the fourth quarter but the Blazers scored their last 10 points on foul shots and made 11 of 17 free throws in the final period to finish out the win. Russell was 2 of 2 from the stripe in the final quarter and Hogg was 4 of 5, making his last four.

Jeffrey had six points with Russell and Ozlowski adding five each to round out University's scoring.

Covenant Christian senior Brock Buckley answered with the last of his 20 points to tie the game at 49. After a University turnover, the Warriors' Donovan Royster scored for a 51-49 advantage. The Trailblazers came right down and Pierce knotted the game at 51 with 1:30 remaining.

The Warriors went inside to Royston, but Jeffrey made

another terrific defensive play forcing a missed shot and the rebound went out of bounds to the Trailblazers. University used its last timeout with 22 seconds left and bled the clock until Cain dribbled to the right wing. The Warriors triple teamed Cain at the three point line, but the sophomore threaded a jump pass to Ozlowski cutting through the lane from left to right and the junior laid the ball in for the winning points.

Covenant Christian used two timeouts with 3.4 on the clock before inboundng the ball to three quarter court and calling timeout with 3.0 left. The Warriors followed up with another timeout to set up their final play. Pierce applied pressure on the inbounder, forcing the pass to be completed in the backcourt. The Warriors could not get off a shot before the horn sounded.

The Warriors threatened to run away with the game early, scoring the first 11 points of the game. Cain's three pointer with 2:12 left in the opening quarter was University's first points of the game. Covenant Christian led 16-5 at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter opened as a defensive slog. Neither team scored until Covenant Christian made a pair of foul shots with 4:11 left for an 18-5 lead, their largest of the game. University still trailed by ten as the clock wound down, before Ozlowski made a three pointer for his first points of the game to cut the Warrior lead to 23-16 at halftime.

Ozolski made a three pointer ten seconds in to the third quarter and Pierce cut the lead to 23-21 with a basket. University finally pulled even with 3:22 left when Ozolski scored on a rebound to knot the game at 27. Covenant jumped back in front but baskets by Ozolski (Jeffrey assist) and Pierce (Ozolski assist) kept University close. Cain had an old fashioned three point play before the Blazers took their first lead of the game at 37-35 on an Ozolski three pointer at the buzzer off a Cain assist.

Russell drilled a corner three to open the third quarter and Hogg completed a 10-0 University run by splitting a pair of foul shots after making yet another steal. The Blazers led 41-35 and looked ready to put

the game away, but University didn't score for the next five minutes as Covenant Christian scored 10 straight points for a 45-41 lead. Ozlowski broke the drought by grabbing a defensive rebound and dribbled the length of the floor for a score. Covenant Christian answered with a bucket by Jack Fulbright for the 47-43 lead that set the stage for the late University heroics.

Lafferman was thrilled with his team's heart and effort. "Our youth showed as we fell in to an 11-0 hole to start the game. I'm really proud of our team. It was a group effort, digging in and finding a way to stay in the game in the first half when we were playing poorly. We came out of the locker room in the second half and stuck to the game plan. The ball started to move, guys got to the right spot. We settled in and found a way to pull it out against a well-coached team that was prepared, physical and tough. They had us on the ropes and I'm proud my guys were able to get back in the game and win it."

The win was University's second nail biter over Covenant Christian this season as the Blazers won 53-52 on Jan. 22.
