As I read the sign, I am quite glad I am not drinking anything as it would have probably spewed out of my mouth. Talk about a timely reminder. I was just asked to join a circus.




Actually, I am

Westfield Fire Dept. gets new engine

Westfield Fire Department (WFD) last week unveiled its newest fire engine. The truck has a 1,500 gallons per minute pump and holds 750 gallons of water. It joins WFD's two other frontline engines with two reserve engines. It took 14 months to build and six weeks to mount the equipment needed to place it in service. The seat belts, airbags, and some of the other safety features on the engine were developed by Westfield's IMMI.



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


A plan for gradually cutting Indiana's individual income tax rate over the next seven years has been signed into law by Gov. Eric Holcomb.

The governor's office announced last Wednesday that Holcomb had signed the bill approved by legislators that will reduce the state's current income tax rate of 3.23 percent to 2.9 percent in small steps until ings.



Congratulations to the Carmel Fire Department's (CFD) three newest paramedics, Garrett Locke, Jared Schultz, and Riley Cheatham. These three were the first to participate in an online hybrid class. With a majority of the classroom portion being online, extreme dedication was required to stay focused. Combined, they additionally put in over 1,300 clinical hours in emergency rooms working with doctors and nurses. Over the last year, they have taken countless exams and demonstrated their competency by passing the psychomotor and cognitive portions of the National Registry, and each has taken hundreds of ambulance calls with a CFD paramedic preceptor. The national pass rate of first-time test takers is 69 percent, but these guys all rocked it on the first attempt.



His mission is to make a difference.

"This is something personal to me," said Barnes, who will graduate from Indiana University Kokomo's Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) program in May.

"In my experience, it can be difficult to receive competent or accurate health care geared to my needs as someone from the LGBTQ+ community," he said, adding that he did his senior research presentation about health care for this population.

He learned that most providers receive minimal education about this group – but noted that Dea Kent, director of IU Kokomo's Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) track, has incorporated it into the curriculum, and brought in a guest speaker to specifically address the topic.

'We talked pretty openly about it in class, and when I gave my presentation, I was able to provide them with some screenings that should be done for certain people in the LGBTQ+ community," Barnes said. "You can't always approach these pasame way you can everyone else."

Barnes previously earned his Bachelor of Sci-

A feeling that he was ready to grow in his career brought him back to campus to become a family nurse practitioner.

"I had reached a point in my career that I was ready to branch out to something new in nursing, or go back to school," he said. "I felt like I wanted to do more, and have more involvement in advocating for patients, and providing them the best care they can have."
