Judge Bardach has served 15 years on the bench after having served about 12 years as judge of Carmel City Court. The judge and her husband, Lee,

Bardach are both graduates of Indiana University and longtime Carmel residents.

The county court administration office confirmed the retirement plans but could not say if the departure date was June 1, June 30 or some date between. The vacancy will result in the appointing of a judge by Gov. Eric Holcomb. That appointee will fill the unexpired term running through Dec. 31, 2024.



# Carmel's three new paramedics ready to faithfully serve city

Congratulations to the Carmel Fire Department's (CFD) three newest paramedics, Garrett Locke, Jared Schultz, and Riley Cheatham. These three were the first to participate in an online hybrid class. With a majority of the classroom portion being online, extreme dedication was required to stay focused. Combined, they additionally put in over 1,300 clinical hours in emergency rooms working with doctors and nurses. Over the last year, they have taken countless exams and demonstrated their competency by passing the psychomotor and cognitive portions of the National Registry, and each has taken hundreds of ambulance calls with a CFD paramedic preceptor. The national pass rate of first-time test takers is 69 percent, but these guys all rocked it on the first attempt.

- polls are open • If they are a voter with disabilities
- If they have official election duties outside of
- their voting precinct • If they are scheduled to work the entire 12 hours that
- the polls are open • If they are observing a religious discipline or religious holiday during the entire 12 hours the polls are open
- If they do not have transportation to the polls
- If they are a member of the Indiana National Guard deployed or on assignment in Indiana or a public safety

'If you're planning to request an absentee ballot, please do so as early as pos-

sible," said Hamilton County Election Administrator Beth Sheller. "It's as easy as submitting an application online or downloading a form and returning it to our office."

Those wishing to vote absentee must submit an application by midnight on Thursday, April 21. The application can be downloaded at indianavoters.com. You can also call (317) 7768476 and make a request for an application over the phone.

Once you have voted, you can submit your ballot by mail or return it in person. All mailed-in ballots must be received by the Election Office on or before 6 p.m. on Election Day. You can also drop off your ballot in person at the Clerk's Office in Noblesville.



tion, where each David is one of the quieter person looks out for their Both left knowing that if own interests as well as the interests of the other party; or (3) the power method, where the parties don't really negotiate and one person acts as the bully while the other party folds to every demand.

> The power method, the foulest of business transactions, elicits images of Ebenezer Scrooge or back-alley loan sharks. This scheme represents a zero-sum game because there are clear winners and losers. The party in power uses its leverage to manipulate and exploit the weaker party.

> The arm's length transaction represents nearly all our daily transactions and is generally thought to be a positive method of negotiation. This is the principle behind Adam Smith's "invisible hand" doctrine whereby mutually beneficial exchanges arise out of individuals seeking their own self-interest. The arm's length transaction is the free market system at its best.

> Lastly, reverse negotiation. The concept of reverse negotiation may appear foreign to many of my readers, but it is actually a concept found in the Bible. Not only does reverse negotiation create mutually beneficial exchanges, but it also provides greater personal satisfaction and trust among the transacting parties. It is best

explained by an illustration. An Amish neighbor came to buy 10 bushels of corn from my father worth \$2 a bushel. An arm's length transaction would likely result in a \$20 purchase. My father, however, took a different approach. evator and it's worth \$4 a bushel for my time and trouble. I would not think of paying you less than \$40." After several intermediary back-and-forths, they split the difference at \$2 a

Of course, reverse negotiation only works when both parties are willing to participate. A variation of reverse negotiation is the widow and orphan track. Dad sent me to the agent to buy hogs when I was 14. I advised the factor was much more knowledgeable and he would take advantage of me. Dad replied that he negotiated by the widow and orphan rules, looking out for the weaker negotiator more than yourself and there were widows or orphans or unsophisticated opposing parties.

I have a few reverse negotiation friends. My partner, Seth, and real estate business friend, Jeff, negotiate in this manner. Jeff and I have so invested in reverse negotiation that we don't even keep books on the amounts we may owe each other because he always thinks he owes me and I always think I owe him, which makes our person-to-person accounting seem irrelevant. We both have greatly benefited from reverse negotiation.

In my law practice, I have witnessed all three forms of negotiation. It boils down to God's way of negotiating (reverse negotiation); man's way of negotiating (arm's length negotiation), and the gutter negotiation (power negotiation). May we all seek to care for one another and develop trusting relationships with our

### One neighbor's story of resilience ing the restaurant same: Serving

This month's column is about a neighbor Lisa and I met while loading the pantry at the Hamilton County Fire Fighters Local 4416 on South 14th Street.

We have been doing food charity service work for over 16 years in inner-city

Indianapolis with Shepherd Community Center before launching Feeding Team a few years ago. Over all the years and all the neighbors, we never encountered a story or situation quite like Pamela's (not her real name).

Pam lives in Noblesville. She works locally in fast food and often works extra shifts to make overtime income. We met Pam on a Friday in the early afternoon as she was shopping for a meal she would have for dinner later that evening. We do not engage with neighbors at a pantry unless they want to talk, and that was clearly the case here as Pam explained her story. You see, she has just completed a transplant surgery where she was the recipient. Pam explained that because of her worsening health condition she was unable to work and as a result did not have food. Pam was embarrassed that she needed help but grateful to the community for providing it. The anonymity of getting food from one of the pantries made her comfortable in doing so.

What makes Pam's story so unique was that she was on her way to her very first shift at the restaurant after her







# Royals girls edge out Millers, 11-10

It was the first win of the season for the Royals, who are 1-1 for the year, also giving new head coach Rex Holliday his first victory as well. Southeastern trailed at halftime, came back in the second half with a four-goal burst to take control of the game, then held off a late charge by the

"We were down early, they fought back, took the lead," said Holliday. "Got down to the end of the game, gave up a couple bad passes toward the end, gave them opportunities. But at the end of the game, they kept composure and stuck to it.'

The Royals scored right away, with Jessie Lyons finding the back of the net just eight seconds into the game. Emma Hammond answered for the Millers seconds later to tie things up, then Lyons scored again to give Southeastern a 2-1 lead. All of that happened in the first minute

Noblesville scored three consecutive goals for a 4-2 lead, with Nataley Blackburn putting in the first two scores and Marisha Woehler getting the third. The Millers would go on to hold a 6-5 advantage at halftime, with Blackburn and Woehler both scoring again. Ellie Fitzpatrick, Jenna Jenkins and Sydney Schena all added goals for the Royals.

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
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
