I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about. But when I was introduced to Prevail of Central Indiana, I was shocked by the number of individuals who are affected by domestic violence. horrible it was in Ukraine and how I feel so sorry, but I don't have a bunch of money to send them, but my God, we've all got to do something. We really put this together at neck-breaking speed. I asked, "Who knows somebody in Ukraine that we can do a benefit for at Crackers Comedy Club and get this ball rolling?" Jennie told me about Last Bell. Right then and there in like five whole minutes the who thing got put together."

Hershey spoke to the Reporter about what led to her involvement with Last Bell.

"I first got involved with Last Bell through my church, who was sending groups over to serve in Ukraine," Hershey said. "I had spent 10 years working with homeless youth in Indianapolis and felt compelled to take next steps in working with this similar youth population

across the globe in Ukraine. I'm inspired by the long-term commitment our staff makes to build healing relationships with youth who have no family system and no future to consider without the intervention of loving relationships, educational and physical assistance, and long-term work to repair early trauma and loss so many have lived through."

According to Hershey, prior to the war, Last Bell's staff mentored orphaned youth in Zhytomyr's trade schools, meeting their needs in the areas of housing, education, job skills, parenting classes, medical and dental advocacy, and more.

Since the invasion,

Last Bell has been evacuating many vulnerable orphan-parented families – especially single moms with their children – and distributing food and other supplies to orphaned youth in Zhytomyr. Some donated funds go toward fuel, vehicle maintenance, and other supplies for evacuations, as well as resources for evacuated families. Other funds go toward bulk purchasing and distribution of food, water, diapers, hygiene kits, and medications to students and families. Donations also help with delivering humanitarian aid to families in rural areas, a vital service that

only those with vehicles and drivers can provide.

My mother-in-law (okay, now you know) was recently widowed. She didn't have a spouse to bounce this off of, and even if she had, this scam often succeeds. The scammers give a very firm deadline so there isn't much time to check sources. Most people don't even try because they are terrified their loved one is in danger. They've watched countless hours of true crime TV and this feels very real.

Luckily, Noblesville had a lot of people who tried to help thwart this scam. My mother-in-law had a bank teller try to dissuade her from withdrawing \$4,000 in cash. Tellers are trained to warn the elderly that these large withdrawals are often scams. My mother-in-law was convinced her grandson's life was in danger and she ignored the bank's plea. She then went to Kroger to wire the money, per the instructions. The Western Union representative refused to allow her to wire the money. She knew it was a scam. This only terrified my mother-in-law more because her grandson's life was hanging in the balance and time was running out. She hurried to CVS to send a MoneyGram and was allowed to proceed.

When she got home, my son returned her call. He had been in class when she called to see if he was OK. He was alarmed that she called, as she had never called his cell phone since it's hard for her to hear on the phone. In retrospect, he blames himself for not taking her call, being out of the ordinary. She also called her son, who also was in a client meeting and unable to pick

up her call. He too called as soon as she had completed the transaction.

These types of scams are something I have trained insurance agents on for years, and it still hit my own family. She was only hit for \$4,000, while I have many stories that are much worse. The scammers see that your loved one 1) has money, 2) is gullible, and 3) had no one to protect them. The scammers usually come back for more money and often get several payments before the victim is out of money or figures out the plot.

This happens to well-educated and sophisticated people. Don't think your loved ones are immune from this type of scam. It plays on their fears of a dangerous drug culture that they are unfamiliar with. "My grandson looks like a kid who doesn't get into meth, but then so do those kids I saw on 20/20 last night."

There are many financial scams that befall this segment of the population. Can you hide their checkbook? Probably not. Could you set up two checking accounts so the one they have easy access to has a very limited amount of money in it? This would prevent most of the scams that hit the elderly, but you risk their anger in an attempt to protect them.

There is no easy answer. Have family discussions about common scams. That's the best protection I can offer you.

online election resource, and we have published our voter guide on Vote411 to serve as a resource for all of Hamilton County's voters."

League members have sought information from all candidates running in the primary this year. They are contributing this information to the national Vote411 website so that Hamilton County users can see who is running in their areas and learn more about their platforms.

Users of the site can click to see their precincts, to learn about candidates on their ballots and to check their voter registration or register.

When logging onto [Vote411.org](#), simply enter your address, and all the information on the next page will be tailored to your area.



The page includes election dates, links for first-time voters, links to register and links to check registrations.

"It's important this year for registered voters to make sure they know where to vote and to see if their precincts have changed as a result of recent redistricting," Dick said.

You see descriptions of the office, then photos and bios of the candidates who responded to the league's request for info. Dick said each candidate was sent a survey by email or mail, and their responses were entered

by their own representatives. The league does not edit candidate responses.

Dick added a few reminders for primary voters. Indiana's is a "closed" primary, which means voters select candidates in one party or another. You choose one party to cast all your votes, but you do not have to be a member of that party to choose its ballot.

"In the general election in the fall, you do not have to declare a party and you can vote for anyone on the ballot, regardless of party," she explained. A list of more primary

voting reminders is on the [league's website home page](#). [Vote411.org](#) is free and nonpartisan in keeping with the League of Women Voters' mission as an organization that encourages informed and active participation in government. Leagues around the nation work to increase understanding of major public policy issues and to influence public policy through education and advocacy.

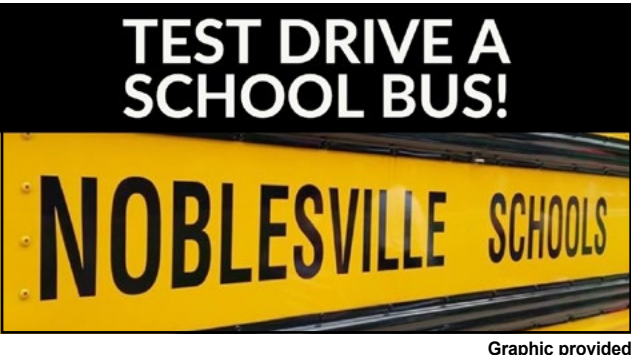

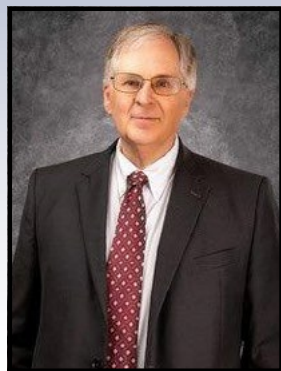
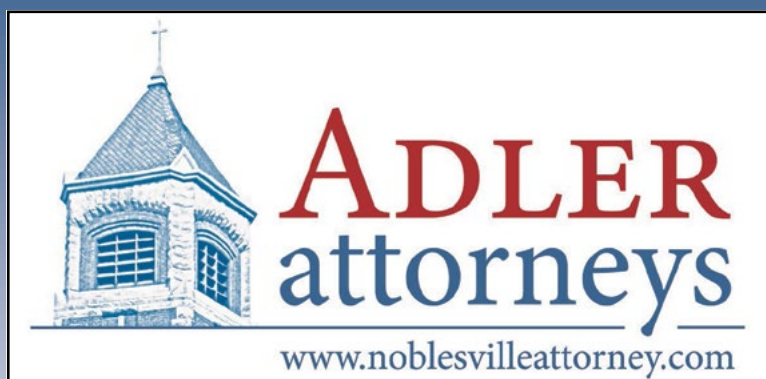

Michael Lecher, Hamilton Heights senior, has signed a letter of intent to play football for Marian University in Indianapolis, Indiana. Marian University is a member of the Crossroads League and is a NAIA athletic institution.

"It was Marian University's nationally ranked Byrum School of Business, its football team being an annual contender in the NAIA National Championships, and a long and deep family connection at this university that sealed the deal," said Michael Lecher, who plans to study business management with a minor in finance. The Byrum School of Business is recognized for education and developing transformational business leaders who are trustworthy, healthy, inquisitive, and skilled with a focus on experiential learning. Lecher believes his education and opportunities at Marian will help him learn the financial and management skills necessary to effectively run his own business and have long-term success in providing a professional service.

"The Knights football team has had four NAIA National Championship appearances over the past 10 years, winning two of the four," he continued. "My parents are both alumni as well as 10 of my aunts and uncles. Two of my cousins are current students and my dad is a professor

there. I also know many of the professors and the campus feels like a second home to me."

Lecher has been passionate about football since the second grade when trying to kick field goals at practice at Our Lady of Grace in Noblesville. In sixth grade, he began professional training which took off under the support and direction of coaches Brandon Kornblue, Mark Hagee, and Tyler Warner. "I devoted many weekends and winter and summer breaks traveling out of state to train," he explained. "I also spent a lot of my time focusing on form drills and making my technique as consistent as possible."

It paid off. Lecher started varsity as freshman and earned four varsity letters. He was nationally ranked by Kornblue Kicking, a Fab 50 Punter – Class of 2022, 2019 Pro Football Hall of Fame Camp Invitee – named to the Class of 2022 All American Team and was the first person to make a field goal at Hamilton Heights Middle School, with the most FG's and PATS at the middle school.

"Michael has been very passionate about kicking for quite some time," said Kurt Ogden, Hamilton Heights High School Athletic Director. "He has put in countless hours of off-season training and individual work with a trainer the past four

years to earn this opportunity. We're excited for Michael, and we wish him well as he takes his talents to Marian University."

"Michael was a varsity kicker for the Huskies all four years of his high school career," said Jon Kirschner, Hamilton Heights High School Head Football Coach. "He was a part of a senior class who lived and breathed football for four years. As he and his class grew and developed they became a formidable group who were able to compete at a high level against everyone on our schedule. The Western game Michael's junior year is a great example. Western was ranked in 4A and undefeated. Through gritty and hard-nosed play, we were able to knock them off in overtime with Michael kicking the game winning PAT."

"Their senior year he and his classmates continued their winning ways with a 6-4 standing which was the first winning record in five seasons," continued Coach Kirschner. "One highlight of Michael's senior year was against Western in which he kicked a crucial onside kick that gave us a chance for a come from behind win. It was one of the best onside kicks I have seen in a very long time. I wish Michael the best at the next level, and I know he will do a great job for the Knights!"

Growing up it was the older kickers and punters at the time that were very in-

fluential on him. "I really looked up to the Marian specialists when I was younger, especially Marty Waddick," Lecher recalled. "They all accepted me and gave me a lot of advice and mentorship coming up in my career. I also learned from the older athletes that I met at kicking camps. I could always reach out to them for help or advice. Learning from the older athletes has been crucial in my development over the years."

For several years Lecher raced ATVs in the IXCR series, which also meant he spent a lot of time wrenching on his quads. He has also taken up "Michael's Mowing" and enjoyed being a part of the Teach One to Lead One mentoring program.

"I think one of the biggest things I have learned at Heights is how to get through the hard times with my head held high," he explained. "I faced a lot of challenges through my high school career, but nothing worse than losing my mom to cancer. From her I learned how to fight through the tough times. You must have the desire and drive to fight for your goals. No one can give that to you, and no one can take that from you. Through it all I kept to my training, kept kicking, and kept getting a little better every day. I also want to say thank you to everyone who believed in me and supported me over the course of my career!"
