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Fishers ABC Prep Academy lifting skills, expectations

ABC Prep Academy Director Robert Kneberg provided the Reporter with some insight into Friday's scissor lift demonstration. "Currently the students are doing a smooth operator maneuverability and operations competition," Kneberg said. "This is the last day of their training on the scissor lifts and so now they get to show us what they learn and will select the best operator out of the group." The academy, which held its grand opening in January, educates local students interested in pursuing various construction trades. One of those students

is Karson from Westfield High School. "While being at ABC Prep Academy, I've learned about a bunch of different trades that I didn't think existed," Karson said. "My colleagues and I have gotten certifications to big pieces of machinery that can help us get a great job in the future. I have loved every minute of being here and I can't wait to see what my future holds. If you're thinking about going into the trades, come to ABC Prep Academy." ABC is a national construction industry trade association providing the availability of apprenticeships for individuals who want a career in the trades. 



The Reporter had the privilege of speaking with McLean on April 18 about his chart-topping legendary hit, as well as his upcoming tour across North America.

American Pie, released in 1971, was McLean’s second album, and the title track sported a running time of eight-and-a-half minutes. According to McLean, the original single of “American Pie,” with a running time of three minutes, instantly became a hit and led to the eight-minute song holding the No. 1 spot on the *Billboard* Hot 100 song in terms of its running time from 1972 until last year. In 2021, Taylor Swift passed “American Pie” with her 10-minute song “All Too Well (Taylor’s Version).”

When McLean originally released the single, he did not expect it to become popular.

“I was virtually unknown, so the likelihood of having what happened to me happen was next to zero in terms of statistical probabilities for a whole lot of reasons,”McLean said. “I thought it would just be one more song that I sent, but it turned into one of the most iconic songs of my career.”

Now McLean has been on over 10 world tours and featured in many media related aspects.

Although it has been over a year since McLean performed live, he has used his time to work on personal projects and rejuvenate from the last 50 years.

“The first year of the pandemic I really enjoyed that because I didn’t have to catch a plane and didn’t have to travel anywhere, so it was really nice to sort of sit back,” McLean said. “[The] second year, by that time, I started getting into doing a whole lot of things that I’d wanted to do for a long time.”

During this time McLean worked on a children’s book, *American Pie: A Fable*, that integrates themes from the song along with experiences from his early life. Along with publishing a book, he is

currently filming a documentary that will explain how “American Pie” came to be a hit song and the meaning behind it.

McLean and his team ultimately decided to go back on tour because of the 50th anniversary of “American Pie” and the worldwide hit it became.

“The song has sold millions and millions of copies around the world, so millions and millions of people know all those 10 songs and many more,” McLean said. “It gave me a repertoire and a basis for touring the world which I did, and I am doing right now.”

McLean will tour throughout North America and Europe until November. He says he is thrilled to be back on the road doing what he loves.

“I feel normal again ... I feel totally like I did before,” McLean said. “I feel better physically, and I have energy ... I have plans and I’m doing things.”

As for the future, McLean is moving ahead one step at a time. He continues to write songs and bring attention to his music by making media appearances.

“The future takes care of itself if you take care of today,” McLean said. “I just put one foot in front of the other and soldier on. I have a lot of things to do, and I just do them one at a time rather than think about the future.”

Schemmer’s last day with Hamilton County will be May 6. A nationwide search for his successor is underway.

Northern Chamber creates new program to foster entrepreneurship

The Northern Hamilton County Chamber of Commerce (NHCCOC) has created an entrepreneurship program called BYOBoss.

“We have seen a growing interest in secondary and post-secondary students operating their own business, and our Chamber can help,” NHCCOC Board President Liz Nelson said.

The Chamber plans to offer an entrepreneur experience-based course to educate the participants on how to identify and develop opportunities; how to take them to market; and how to operationalize them. The course plans to teach the concepts of defining and taking meaningful, intentional action, and then adjust based on results.

The course will be taught over five weeks with meetings once a week.

The sessions are geared towards teams of two working together, as it usually takes more than one person to get a business going. Teams can be two peers, but also parent/young adult and mentor/mentee teams are expected. If you don’t have a partner, the Chamber can help with that, too.

During the course, participants will build a business plan for an idea the



Chamber provides, and in parallel, follow the same process to build a business plan for an idea the participants identify.

Classes to be offered starting May 18, then again starting July 6. Sessions start at 7 p.m. and run for two to two-and-a-half hours. The cost for the course is \$80 per team.

County mails property tax statements

Treasurer Susan Byer making effort to correct printing errors

Hamilton County property owners should have received their 2022 tax statements last weekend.

County Treasurer Susan Byer says there were a couple of errors on the taxes of which property owners should be aware. The amount due on your statement was not affected.

First, the word “Escrowed” was not watermarked on the tax statements of homeowners who escrow their taxes. “If homeowners have any questions as to whether or not their lender is paying the escrow, they should contact their lender directly,” Byer said.

Second, a list of banks that are accepting payments also erroneously listed three banks that are not participating in this year’s program. Property owners can drop off payments at BMO Harris Bank, Community First Bank of Indiana, Farmers Bank, First Farmers Bank, First Merchants Bank, Horizon Bank, Merchants Bank of Indiana, and Star Financial Bank.

Those who would like to pay online can do so at hamiltoncounty.in.gov/taxes. Payments can also be made in person at the Treasurer’s Office with cash or check during normal office hours – 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

“We apologize for the inconvenience this may cause some of our property owners,” Byer added. “We are happy to help clear up any confusion. Please do not hesitate to reach out with any questions by calling us (317) 776-9620 and select Option 7.”

Noblesville Township Board approves Forest Park Aquatic Center improvements

At its meeting last Wednesday, the Noblesville Township Board, consisting of members Joe Arrowood, Peggy Pfister, and John Davis, voted unanimously to approve \$40,000 to fund improvements to the Forest Park Aquatic Center.

Of that total, \$30,000 will be used to purchase outdoor tables games near the pool. These games would provide entertainment for non-swimmer family members who are visiting the park pool. The other \$10,000 will be used for operational expenses.

The board also approved \$3,000 to Legacy Keepers for the continuation of the Stringtime Summer Music concert series on the court-

house square. This has been a popular free community event for several years.

Additionally, \$1,000 was granted to Wafford Theater to sponsor free movies at the Hamilton County Fairgrounds this summer.

Hamilton County gets \$1M for road projects; Cicero getting over \$900K, Sheridan \$145K

Hamilton County communities will receive more than \$2 million in state matching grants for road and bridge improvement projects, according to area lawmakers.

House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said 223 towns, cities and counties will receive more than \$107 million in state funding through the Community Crossings Matching Grant Program.

“In Hamilton County, our population and our local businesses continue to expand, and it’s exciting to see all of the economic development,” Huston said. “The quality of our roads must keep up with this momentum. The Community Crossings program is a great example of how our local communities and the state work together to improve our infrastructure and make a difference for Hoosiers.”

State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) said funds, awarded twice a year, are for road and bridge preservation, road reconstruction, intersection improvements, guardrail replacements and signage, and can cover material costs for chip sealing and crack filling operations.

“Every dollar counts, and many communities don’t have the resources to fully fund larger projects,” Cook said. “Partnering with the state really helps locals maintain our roads and bridges without stretching budgets beyond their means.”

Area grant recipients include Hamilton County at \$1 million, Cicero at \$910,623 and Sheridan at \$145,836.

According to State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville), as part of the grant program, established in 2016 and expanded through laws supported by local lawmakers, smaller municipalities provide a 25 percent match in local funds, while large communities provide a 50 percent match.

“Indiana’s economy remains strong and the quality of our infrastructure plays a big part in that success,” Goodrich said. “Continuing to improve our roads and bridges in communities large and small, means Hoosiers, visitors and businesses will reap the benefits.”

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers) said state law requires 50 percent of the available matching funds be awarded annually to communities within counties with a population of 50,000 or fewer.

“Investing in our infrastructure also adds to our quality of life,” Jeter said. “Through this program, we’re paving the way for projects without passing debt to future generations while ensuring our roads are safe and functioning for years to come.”

State Rep. Donna Schabley (R-Carmel) said to date, Hoosier communities are on the receiving end of more than \$1 billion in Community

Crossings Matching Grants.

“Our roads help drive our state and local economy, which is why it’s encouraging to see these investments in local infrastructure,” Schabley said. “Many of the projects funded through Community Crossings would not have been possible without these matching grants.”

According to State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel), the Indiana Department of Transportation, which oversees and awards the grants, will issue its next call for projects in July.

“These grants help tackle critical infrastructure projects that keep residents, businesses and visitors safe on our roads, and moving more efficiently,” Torr said. “It’s great to see our local communities take advantage of these state grants year after year and deliver tangible results.”

Richardson is semi-retired and owns two buildings on the historic square. In his free time, he serves as a board member of the Noblesville Preservation Alliance and Noblesville Schools Educational Foundation and is a committee member of Noblesville Main Street. He previously attended Noblesville’s sesquicentennial celebration 50 years ago.

Megan Wiles is the executive director of Riverview Health Foundation. She has served in that role since March 2015. Her responsibilities include working with the Riverview Health Foundation Board of Directors and community members to raise charitable dollars for the benefit of patients and their families of Riverview Health, the county hospital for Hamilton County.

Wiles is in her second term as a member of the Noblesville Common Council and is currently serving as council president. She has previously served as council vice president, chaired the Economic Development Committee and Finance Committee and created the Downtown District Committee.

William Conner and Josiah Polk laid out what is now downtown Noblesville in 1823, which was designated as the Hamilton County seat in 1824 and incorporated in 1851.

Tipton author’s book about 1965 Palm Sunday tornadoes coming in May

The 1965 Palm Sunday Tornadoes in Indiana will be released by national publisher The History Press on May 2. The book was written and compiled by Tipton-based author Janis Thornton.

The tornadoes that devastated much of Indiana were part of a collective rampage that ripped through six Midwestern states. The day, Palm Sunday, started as the nicest of the year, with the kind of weather that encouraged Hoosiers to enjoy an afternoon outdoors, fire up the barbecue grill, hit the golf course, or take a leisurely drive through the country.

That evening, however, the skies over northern and central Indiana turned an ominous black and storms

moved in, quickly manifesting as the worst tornado outbreak in Indiana history. Within three hours, twisters, some a half-mile wide, swept through 17 counties, destroying communities and leaving death and destruction in their wake.


When the tornadoes were finished with Indiana, 137 people were dead, hundreds were injured, and thousands more were forever changed.

Thornton’s book is the first encompassing all three lines of tornadoes that tore through northern and central Indiana on April 11, 1965. The book features dozens of photographs and more than 100 stories shared by people who experienced the tornadoes’ wrath firsthand. They are stories of heroism, terror, and heartbreaking loss,

many told for the first time.

"When people ask what drew me to this project," Thornton said, "my answer is simple: I love people, I love history, and I love telling powerful stories. Recording one of Indiana’s most tragic natural events through the experiences of people who lived it makes for powerful storytelling, and I am immensely grateful for the opportunity to document how so many lives were touched that long-ago Palm Sunday night."

The 1965 Palm Sunday Tornadoes in Indiana is Thornton’s sixth non-fiction work. Her previous works include true crimes books, *No Place Like Murder* and *Too Good a Girl*; pictorial histories covering Tipton County, Frankfort and Elwood (all in Indiana); as well as three mystery novels. She is a member of The Authors Guild, the



national and Indianapolis chapter of Sisters in Crime, Women Fiction Writers Association, the Indianapolis Writers Center, and the Tipton County (Indiana) Historical Society.




I’ve been so inspired by everyone’s kindness over the past few weeks. I’ll strive to be one of those good people, each and every moment, for the rest of my life.



There are countries where news and social media are changed by the government in order to affect how the people who live there see the world. It affects those who grow up with these changes more strongly.

However, a few years ago, the organization Reporters Without Borders found a way to



bypass internet censorship in some of these countries in a way that will be easily accessible – by using the game Minecraft.

Reporters Without Borders collaborated with Blockworks, a company that creates Minecraft worlds, to make the Uncensored Library. The Uncensored Library is a place where journalists who come from places where there is a lot of censorship can still get the information – which they have risked their homes, their jobs, and even

their lives to get to the public – to the public.

Their website, uncensoredlibrary.com/en, mentions a few specific reporters and reporter groups. The ones that you can see are Jamal Khashoggi from Saudi Arabia, Yulia Berezovskaia from Russia, Nguyen Van Dai from Vietnam, Javier Valdez from Mexico, and the Mada Masr from Egypt. The section for Mexico also has a list of reporters who have died reporting.

The Minecraft world itself consists of an island with a few trees, a huge garden that surrounds the library, a statue

We have been doing food charity service work for over 16 years in inner-city Indianapolis with Shepherd Community Center before launching Feeding Team a few years ago. From 1981 to 1986, I lived at 42nd and Kitley Avenue on the east side of Indianapolis. Yesterday, the team deployed pantries 41-44 on the far east side of Indianapolis within minutes of our old neighborhood. Welcome back to the East Side.

Working in conjunction with area churches, Hamilton County businesses, a motivated pastor, and volunteers, the first four pantries built by Eric Fisher and his students at Hamilton Heights High School were placed in service and loaded with hundreds of meals. We are grateful for all the people who make this happen. Helping students learn the importance of serving others is a big part of this project with Hamilton Heights High School.

Sober moment alert: We placed a pantry at Meadowlark Apartments Thursday afternoon and only hours later, near-by the pantry location, a man



was critically shot in broad daylight in front of children playing. Hunger is real in Hamilton County, and the situation on the east side of Indianapolis is dire. Hunger and crime so often travel together.

This column brings the story full circle. Companies and neighbors donate funds, materials are purchased, students build pantries, Gaylor Electric or Gary Green transports, paints and delivers the pantries, and the Feeding Team sets and fills the pantries. Then the process repeats. Your donations provide thousands of meals to Hamilton County neighbors. Now a company’s donations will also feed hungry neighbors in Lawrence. Thank you for serving alongside us.

Without the dedicated efforts of so many volunteers, donors, and friends of Feeding Team this would not be happening all over Hamilton County every week.

With over 27,000 food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County, FeedingTeam.org provides outdoor 24/7/365 no-questions-asked free food pantries throughout the county.

Neighbors ask, “Why do this? What’s in it for you?” The answer is always the same: Serving people feeds my soul. It is a calling, not work.



All I’m saying is give bees a chance

Note: Dear Readers – this is a reprint column from one year ago, but I believe the topic is important and warrants thoughtful discourse.
“The world is plentiful with honey, but only the humble bee can collect it.”
– Ralph Waldo Emerson



Honey – mmm! Possibly my favorite food! My grandfather in North Carolina was a beekeeper in his spare time and I loved watching him go into the hive area with his white outfit and helmet! I remember the many jars of honey, some with honeycombs, sitting in my grandmother’s pantry. Delicious memory for so many reasons.

So – we love our honey for its sweetness, but do you know honey also has many other benefits to our health? Honey has been reported to have an inhibitory effect on around 60 species of bacteria and some species of fungi and viruses. Antioxidant capacity of honey is important

in many disease conditions and is due to a wide range of compounds, including phenolics, peptides, organic acids, enzymes, and Maillard reaction products. Honey has also been used in some gastrointestinal, cardiovascular, inflammatory and neoplastic states.¹

Honey is as old as written history, dating back to 2100 B.C. where it was mentioned in Sumerian and Babylonian cuneiform writings, the Hittite code, and the sacred writings of India and Egypt, and has been used for thousands of years for its antibacterial properties. *Note: Honey is NOT appropriate for babies or young toddlers. Please contact your physician or health care provider for more information.*

Now – who are these blessed little critters who enable us to have this delicious and formidable health additive? The almighty BEE! However, our lit-

tle friends have been in jeopardy for some time now. Sadly, bees of all types are in decline worldwide, as are many other insects. The honeybee has suffered greatly from colony collapse disorder, in which hives suddenly lose their adult members. Populations of bumblebees and other solitary bees have steeply declined in many places, largely because of insecticide and herbicide use, and habitat loss due to overdevelopment.

As honeybees gather pollen and nectar for their survival, they pollinate crops such as apples, cranberries, melons and broccoli. Some crops, including blueberries and cherries, are 90 percent dependent on honeybee pollination. One crop, almonds, depends entirely on the honeybee for pollination at bloom time.

Parents and grandparents ... as a child do you have any memories of picking a dandelion bouquet for your mothers? Did you enjoy sitting in your yard, playing campout, rolling around in the grass, and making clover chains for hours? Am I the only

one? Maybe so! Although I enjoy a lovely green lawn as much as anyone, most children would not be safe rolling around in the grass these days – pets as well! Our lawns are full of pesticides and herbicides to take care of those “nasty” dandelions and clovers – which honeybees have also enjoyed over the years.

Remember, too, that there are many types of honey out there for sale. When you shop for honey make sure that it is safely sourced if possible. For me, there is nothing to compare with Sourwood honey from North Carolina! My last jar is almost gone so I am off to the mountains to secure another supply! Yum!

Medicare scams that hit close to home

The FBI estimates that scams on the elderly account for over \$3 billion a year. Here is what happened to my loved one. (No, it wasn’t my mom. She wants you to know it wasn’t her.)



A common scam is to find college kids from their social media posts and see if they are connected to a grandparent. It’s easy to track down the grandparent’s phone number and try to rip them off. She got a call from someone at Indiana University who had my son, her grandson. “If you don’t pay off his drug debt of four grand within the hour, we will kill him.” She wasn’t aware that my son had a drug problem (he didn’t) but thought it sounded plausible. Sometimes they even “put the kid on the phone” saying, “Grandma, please help me.” While the voice isn’t their relative, many seniors have trouble hearing on the phone and the stressed-out wail sounded like it could be their loved one.

My mother-in-law (okay, now you know) was recently widowed. She didn’t have a spouse to bounce this off of, and even if she had, this scam often succeeds. The scammers give a very firm deadline so there isn’t much time to check sources. Most people don’t even try because they are terrified their loved one is in danger. They’ve watched countless hours of true crime TV and this feels very real.

Luckily, Noblesville had a lot of people who tried to help thwart this scam. My mother-in-law had a bank teller try to dissuade her from withdrawing \$4,000 in cash. Tellers are trained to warn the elderly that these large withdrawals are often scams. My mother-in-law was convinced her grandson’s life was in danger and she ignored the bank’s plea. She then went to Kroger to wire the money, per the instructions. The Western Union representative refused to allow her to wire the money. She knew it was a scam. This only terrified my mother-in-law more because her grandson’s life was hanging in the balance and time was running out. She hurried to CVS to send a MoneyGram and was allowed to proceed.

When she got home, my son returned her call. He had been in class when she called to see if he was OK. He was alarmed that she called, as she had never called his cell phone since it’s hard for her to hear on the phone. In retrospect, he blames himself for not taking her call, being out of the ordinary. She also called her son, who also was in a client meeting and unable to pick up her call. He too called as soon as she had completed the transaction.

These types of scams are something I have trained insurance agents on for years, and it still hit my own family. She was only hit for \$4,000, while I have many stories that are much worse. The scammers see that your loved one 1) has money, 2) is gullible, and 3) had no one to protect them. The scammers usually come back for more money and often get several payments before the victim is out of money or figures out the plot.

This happens to well-educated and sophisticated people. Don’t think your loved ones are immune from this type of scam. It plays on their fears of a dangerous drug culture that they are unfamiliar with. “My grandson looks like a kid who doesn’t get into meth, but then so do those kids I saw on 20/20 last night.”

There are many financial scams that befall this segment of the population. Can you hide their checkbook? Probably not. Could you set up two checking accounts so the one they have easy access to has a very limited amount of money in it? This would prevent most of the scams that hit the elderly, but you risk their anger in an attempt to protect them.

There is no easy answer. Have family discussions about common scams. That’s the best protection I can offer you.

Indiana Humanities ran an abridged version – as you read through this original version, see if you can guess what was not included. Ha.



During the very surreal early weeks of the Great Global Pause while social distancing from my long-distance new wife, I found free time to reread Irving Stone’s *The Agony and the Ecstasy*, a thick paperback purchased from a Florence bookstore.

Once again, I became blessedly lost in this biographical novel, and although it was set during the tempestuous Renaissance and read at a very hysterical time in the present, there came from its passages a sense of solace, a salve for the soul, as I bobbed for paragraphs from the past to escape *the now*, to briefly forget that just outside the closed *and deadbolted* front door of my hermetically sealed house, something invisibly wicked our way had indeed come.

Poor suffering Michelangelo, his spirit shattered whenever Pope Julius II, upon seeing the great Renaissance painter’s completed commissioned work, angrily shouted, “You fool! This is the wrong chapel.”

There came then an awkward pause between the red-faced pontiff and the teary-eyed painter.

Their standoff of silence finally ended when a mortified Michelangelo responded, “Your Holiness, I dedicated the past five years of my life to this project, and ONLY NOW am I informed that I painted THE. WRONG. FREAKING. CHAPEL!!! Damn Google Maps! Oh, my poor, pathetic neck, how it hurts from all that ceiling work! My carpal tunnel has carpal tunnel!”

“Spare me your body pains,” hissed Pope Julius II. “How do you think *I* feel, Michelangelo? I will be dead from syphilis a year from now! Now shut up and do the work I commissioned – only paint in the right place this time! Oh, and I need it done next week.”

I’m just a silly humor newspaper columnist. It’s questionable that my work even qualifies as fitting within the arts and humanities realm, as if I’m destined to always be on the outside looking in at the great ones. Still, I take the crafting of each column’s paragraph as seriously as Michelangelo likely took each brush stroke applied to the Sistine Chapel.

Granted, his frescoes completed near the end of the Middle Ages illustrated the “pre-history of salvation” whereas my columns illustrate such unweighty subjects as the scourges associated with my own middle age in the form of “nose hairs gone wild” or the etiquette one learns *the hard way* while required to

poop in a Walmart bag when accidentally locked in a bud-dy’s backyard shed. Let’s just say those two-handed plastic bags can be a godsend (sorry, sea turtles).

The empty can, itself, could then double as an artificial hand. I envisioned a great wall made of stacked Campbell’s soup cans positioned around the perimeter of their property. Their anti-COVID wall.”

Andy Warhol would be proud.

Readers appreciated my small doses of levity during our

most dangerous of times. Even Dad reported tears of joy, this from a man watching his wife of more than 50 years slowly whittle away.

I embraced my part in helping a small, unseen, community of readers briefly forget about their worries, and, in essence, collectively whistle past the graveyard. The work applied took my mind off the terrible times, too.

Getting lost in a poem, a painting, a song, a serious story, a silly story, demonstrates how the arts and the humanities provide comfort, coherence, healing, and hope while the world burns and churns. Historically, the humanities have provided humankind a chance to escape the hard times. I find the act of escape to be a virtue, for escaping something implies that one possesses the will to both hope and strive for better days ahead.

To all poets and writers and painters and musicians and dancers and actors and comedians and photographers – and yes, fellow humor columnists – please keep adding your unique threadwork to the cultural fabric of society. The talent – and for some, the genius – with which you have been gifted can forge togetherness, create community, and foster hope for humanity.

True, the world is a grand %&\$# show now, and yes, we torch bearers of the arts and humanities are likely to be no better off than the doomed players of the dance band on the Titanic, but still we must play on, *especially now* we must play on. Nearer, my God, to Thee.

Hitting the brakes on free speech zones

In Indiana, we are hitting the brakes on free speech zones.

Free speech zones debuted on college campuses across the country, limiting expressive language and activities to designated areas. Rather than promoting critical thinking and difference of thought, some college administrators are more concerned about confining freedom to avoid conflict. By setting limits on free speech, these higher learning institutions stifle students’ ability to learn and develop.

This blatant infringement of the First Amendment, however craftily labeled, will not be tolerated in Indiana. With a new law I co-authored, free speech will be protected by banning free speech zones at our public state colleges and universities, and by preventing colleges from discriminating against and denying benefits to student groups



on the basis of religion, political affiliation or ideology.

Quite opposite than its name, free speech zones confine expression to certain locations, often in small and remote spots. In some cases, schools give groups permission to use the spaces and then put up other roadblocks, like requiring registration weeks in advance and setting strict time limits. Indiana’s new law will help guide campus policies and ensure that free speech is protected for all students. Several national stories of speech suppression on college campuses have brought this conversation to the forefront.

In California, a student attempted to distribute Spanish-language copies of the Constitution and recruit members for a new chapter of Young Americans for Liberty along the main

campus thoroughfare at a large community college. According to the Foundation for Individual Rights in Education (FIRE), the student was approached by an administrator who told him that he could not distribute literature outside the free speech zone, a 616 square-foot area of the college’s 426-acre campus. He was also told that he must fill out a permit application to use the free speech zone – requiring him to get a permission slip to exercise his First Amendment rights. He was informed that he would be asked to leave his own campus if he refused to comply. The case, and many like it, ended up in court, where it was ultimately settled.

Recently, a large group of Yale law school students hijacked a campus panel discussion about free speech. The conversation was intended to demonstrate how two speakers from different ideological perspectives could agree on the need to support the First

Amendment. However, more than 100 law students shouted obscenities and threatened visiting speakers, shutting down civil discourse.

Confining free speech is not free speech. It’s an attack on our God-given rights and it’s unconstitutional.

I hope more people join me in speaking out against free speech zones, and encouraging young adults to engage in conversations that challenge their way of thinking while respecting others’ rights to express themselves – no matter how unpopular or uncomfortable their ideas may be.

Freedom of speech is what makes our society better, ensures our government serves the people, and it’s worth fighting for on our college campuses and beyond.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by a son, Ron Alden, and a sister, Priscilla Shaw.



Family was a very important part of her life.





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Track and field

Carmel hosts second 3200 Showcase

CARMEL - It night was a perfect night for racing last Friday, and hundreds of Indiana's best high school runners took to the track at Carmel Stadium for the second annual Carmel 3200 Showcase.

The conditions were fantastic - clear, not too warm and (finally) not too chilly. As a result, many of the runners produced some great times, and there were several personal bests as well.

Two of those new best times came from the top two Hamilton County girls finishers. Guerin Catholic junior Bridget Gallagher finished third in that race, zooming home in a time of 10 minutes, 51.24 seconds. Delta's Nicki Southerland won the race in 10:30.44, with Brebeuf Jesuit's Kendall Martin the runner-up in 10:42.47.

"I think I ran pretty well," said Gallagher, who also said was trying to stay up with the top two finishers as long as she could.

"I just tried to stick with them for as long as I could and I knew that as long as I just stayed connected, I'd get a good time," said Gallagher. She had already run a sub-11 minute 3200 during the indoor season, but this was the first time she broke that barrier in an outdoor race.

Gallagher had been dealing with an injury, but seems to be recovering well.

"I still have some aches and pains and I'm doing a lot of physical therapy, just working on my strength," said Gallagher. She said she's "trying to get stronger and I'm definitely feeling a lot stronger, but I still feel like I have a lot of work to go."

Breaking barriers was a theme for Westfield sophomore Liz Smith. She placed seventh in the race with a time of 11:01.57, which shattered her previous personal best of 11:24.

"I fought hard," said Smith. "That's always been my problem is that I gave up easily. I think this race was just a big milestone for me, just pushing past and getting past my barriers and everything."

Next for Smith is getting under the 11-minute mark, which is now in her sights.

"I've been patient for a while," said Smith. She is focused on every race and getting "one step closer to my ultimate goal."

Several schools had runners finish in the top 15 in the girls race. Alivia Romaniuk was Carmel's top runner, placing ninth. Maggie Powers led Hamilton Southeastern by taking 13th and Brooke Lahee finished 14th for Noblesville.

The boys race was also fast, with the top two runners both breaking nine minutes. Ryan Watts from Edwardsville, Ill. finished in 8:54.09, just ahead of Columbus North's Reese Kilbarger-Stumpff by over a second.

Carmel's Kole Mathison placed third in a time of 9:01.31. The junior said he knew he might have to lead for most of the race as he ran against the other two runners. He led the first six laps.

"I was feeling good," said Mathison. "I started to feel it with about a K to go and it fell apart towards the end. "I tried to go with Ryan when he made the move with two laps to go, but I just didn't have the legs under me. And then it came to one lap left and I was hoping that I might have an extra gear, but it just didn't come for me today."

Mathison said he was still happy with the result - a 9:01 is a great time. Mathison had won the mile race at last Friday's Franklin Central Showcase, and he agreed that all these races are good preparation for the post-season, which is only a few weeks away.

"I definitely think that they're preparing me really well," said Mathison. "It's fun to race really good competition in the middle of the season because then when it comes to those championship races during the state tournament, you're prepared and ready to run fast and race strategically. These are the races to test strategies and see how things work. And then when it comes to the state tournament, your tactics are refined and you're ready to run good races."

Two more county runners landed in the boys top 10: Carmel's Charlie Schuman placed sixth and Noblesville's Asher Propst finished eighth. Top finishers for each school included Southeastern's Bennett Dubois in 14th, Fishers' Tate Meaux in 23rd and Westfield's Kai Connor in 24th.

The Lease provides for the payment by the Commission of lease rentals (a) from tax increment revenue generated in the Phase I Allocation Area within the Area (the "TIF Revenues") and (b) to the extent the TIF Revenues are not sufficient, from local income tax revenues pledged by the City to the Commission for the payment thereof. Walkoff in first game . . .

Tigers sweep Shamrocks in HCC series

Baseball fans who went to Fishers last Thursday were expecting a hard-fought game when the igers hosted Westfield in the opener of that Hoosier Crossroads Conference series.

And a hard-fought game is just what they got. It came down to the final play in the bottom of the seventh inning, when a walkoff run lifted Fishers to a 2-1 victory over the Shamrocks. The Tigers handed Westfield its first loss of the season.


one and two-thirds innings.


