“Segregate history. He’s a bum with a big head,” posted another. At least this person’s name didn’t appear to be one announced during roll-call on Old MacDonald’s Farm.

I was called a “pissant,” a name for an insignificant or contemptible person.

I was called a “Northern idiot.” I pity those who still feel the need to refer to people either as “northern” or “southern” simply based on sides taken during a war that ended a century and a half ago.

## State lawmakers' repeal will lower utility bill taxes

Dear Editor:

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

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# Carmel settles with insurance company over fatal crash that heavily damaged roundabout fountain

The City of Carmel has recovered \$50,000 from an insurance company to reimburse taxpayers for most of the cost to repair a damaged fountain inside the roundabout at 106th Street and Ditch Road. The fountain was damaged on Nov. 6, 2021, when the driver of a pickup truck drove through the roundabout at a high rate of speed and struck one of the limestone panels in the fountain.

The city follows a policy to pursue the offending

party and their insurance company for the cost of repairing damage to public property so that local taxpayers do not have to bear those costs. Over the last three years, more than \$160,000 was recovered by filing such claims.

“It is important that we protect the public’s assets,” Mayor Jim Brainard said. “When damages such as this occur, the cost of repairing the public infrastructure should be that of the person responsible for the damage.”

The city contracted with Smock Fansler Corporation to repair the fountain at a cost of \$64,026. Under this person's insurance policy, \$50,000 was the maximum amount allowed to be claimed for property damage.

According to the Carmel Police Department, the driver of the pickup truck, a 35-year-old Carmel resident, was driving an estimated 65 miles-per-hour in a 40 mile-per-hour zone when he struck the east-side curb of the roundabout and

went airborne into the fountain. The result of the impact caused the truck to invert and land upside down. The driver did not survive

the accident.

A toxicology report later revealed a blood alcohol content of 0.199 percent (the legal limit is 0.08 per-

cent), along with evidence of methamphetamine use, both of which were deemed to be contributing causes of the crash.

# Feedback sought on newly updated Indianapolis Metro-area freight map

In its ongoing mission to see that goods move throughout the region in a way that minimizes environmental impacts and supports economic mobility, the Indianapolis Metropolitan Planning Organization (IMPO) is seeking public comment on proposed updates to the Central Indiana Regional Freight Plan, which was initially created in 2010.

In addition to assessing current performance and identifying needs and issues, the plan will develop policy recommendations to enhance the freight corridors and areas in the region. The IMPO is asking for public feedback on the **updated freight map** now through May 9, with expectations that the final map and plan will be completed by late summer.

Providing efficient transport corridors to industries such as manufacturing, retail and whole trade is critical to our region’s economy.

“With the explosive growth of distribution centers and warehouses in the region, our freight network is more important than ever,” IMPO Executive Director Anna Gremling said. “This study is aimed at improving current conditions and planning for future needs.”

According to the **Existing and Future Conditions report** in the freight plan, 33 percent of the region’s

workforce is employed in freight-related businesses.

The IMPO’s eight-county region consists of Boone, Hamilton, Hancock, Hendricks, Marion, Morgan, Johnson and Shelby counties. The region’s freight system includes:

- **Roads** – The IMPO region is served by about 370 miles of interstate, 140 miles of U.S. highways and 190 miles of state highways.
- **Rail** – The IMPO region is served by 220 miles of Class I railroad operations and over 100 miles of regional and short line operations.
- **Pipelines** – Over 490 miles of pipeline carry commodities such as natural gas, refined products, and crude oil, go through the IMPO region
- **Air** – The IMPO region is served by one airport that provides air cargo service – the Indianapolis International Airport.

Work on the freight plan began last summer and has included data collection, a freight stakeholder survey and an analysis of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. In the survey, freight stakeholders ranked infrastructure condition, rail access and road traffic congestion as priorities to address.

**About the Indianapolis Metropolitan Planning Organization**

The Indianapolis Metropolitan Planning Organization is the designated

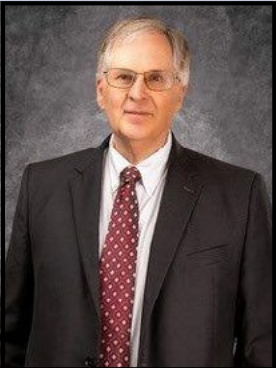
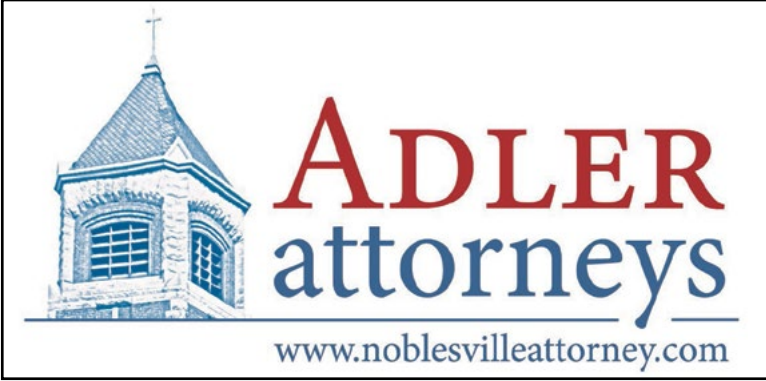

"It is critical to do all we can to protect Hoosier families," Rokita said. "Leftover medications lying around the house pose a serious threat and create an unnecessary risk to our children, friends, and family members. Clear out the medicine cabinet this week to join the fight against drug addiction and overdose."

Team members from the Office of the Attorney General are joining local law enforcement at collection sites around the state

today. Locally, Hamilton County residents can visit Riverview Hospital, 395 Westfield Road, Noblesville, from 9 a.m. to noon today.

The Indiana State Police and other law enforcement agencies are also participating in National Drug Take Back Day. Medications may be dropped off at any Indiana State Police post except the Toll Road Post.

Staff operating the drop-off sites will ensure the safe disposal of medications, including drugs in liquid and pill form. Vaping pens without batteries and vaping cartridges will also be accepted. Needles, new or used, WILL NOT be accepted for disposal. This service is free and anonymous with no questions asked.

Alano said that "being able to put four people in every event was huge," as it will help the Royals figure out who belongs in which event as track and field moves into the tournament season. The season begins Tuesday with the Hoosier Crossroads Conference meet at Zionsville.

"We're still figuring out our lineup for Tuesday, but this helped us. Helped us figure it out and our girls ran well."

"The boys came out there and competed," said Tigers coach Nathan Warnecke. "The seniors did a great job leading the team. We had boys step up and compete like they've never had before. And it was a good time. Good experience for the boys leading into our conference meet next Thursday night."
