After two years of virtual events, the Arthritis Foundation will once again play host to the Walk to Cure Arthritis at Conner Prairie on Friday, May 13.

The Walk

Cure Arthritis is the Arthritis Foundation's signature fundraiser, taking place in cities across the country. Funds raised from this event help conquer arthritis, which affects more than 58 million Americans, or roughly one in four adults.

This year, the Walk to Cure Arthritis Indy will feature Angie Harrison of Indianapolis, who has been chosen as the 2022 Walk to Cure Arthritis National Honoree. Other local honorees include Medical Honoree Dr. Abe Beaber from Midwest Sport and Spine, Community Champion Honoree Cheryl Reed, and Brielle Garner, Youth Honoree.

Garner, 13, is a seventh-grade student at Sheridan Middle School. She started showing symptoms of Juvenile Idiopathic Arthritis (JIA) at the age of 4.

She was diagnosed with JIA the following year and has been taking a biologic, which is a shot, to treat her arthritis ever since. She has not let JIA hold her back for doing the things she loves.

Garner is passionate about sports and loves playing basketball. She is very outgoing and loves spending time with her

# Sheridan Farmers Market sure to have something for everyone

Starting on Saturday, May 7, Sheridan will welcome a new Saturday morning outdoor market to the community.

The market will be open for business every other Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and will take place in the parking lot of the Six Points Church located on the east edge of town, just off State Road 38. Many of you will remember this as the former Six Points Wesleyan Church.

The market is organized by residents Sharon Phillips and Amber Kiger. Including themselves, they say they hope to have 30 to 40 vendors participate in this every-other-Saturday event and offer customers a wide variety of edible and non-edible products.

Products will include a variety of baked goods such as breads, rolls, cakes, and pies. There will be vendors selling honey, maple syrup, eggs, a variety of in-season produce, and pet treats. Craft items for sale will include pottery, wood crafts, handmade clothing, body care items, soaps and shampoos, jewelry items, candles, handmade cards, and handcrafted blankets.

Phillips and Kiger say they hope local musicians might like to come out and play during the market hours for entertainment. Food truck vendors will also be available for your convenience.



# Subversive youth hits Carmel stage

'Roald Dahl's Matilda the Musical' playing now at Booth Tarkington Civic Theatre

After literal years of pandemic delays, Civic Theatre in the Center for the Performing Arts, 3 Carter Green, Carmel, is now all set to show Roald Dahl's Matilda the Musical. Director Suzanne Fleenor recently spoke to the Reporter about the play, the path it took to get to the stage and why she chose it.

"What I love about Matilda is that it's rather subversive," Fleenor told the Reporter. "It is unlike most musicals. It's Roald Dahl, whose books are left of center and yet so wonderfully intriguing and I just always loved them."

This show had originally been cast in 2020 and was nearly halfway to stage when the pandemic put every live performance on

"We were three weeks into putting the show together when COVID hit," Fleenor said. "We have had two years to think about the show. We have maintained many of the original cast members, and due to voices changing for some of the boys and going off to college and various other assorted reasons for other cast members, we were easily able to cast this show after two nights of rehearsal in one evening. We were able to do that because we maintained many of the same cast members."

Fleenor said one of the benefits of this long delay was having so much more from Noblesville, time to digest how the show works and how they put it the world returned to allow-

together. There was the added benefit of starting over with many of the same cast members with whom she had already worked.

"The challenges were that it was terribly disappointing for all of us," Fleenor said. "When we left rehearsal on a Sunday evening, we fully expected that we would be back within a couple of weeks. It went on and on and ON. We were full steam ahead at that point. We usually rehearse for approximately eight weeks, so we had a very good idea of what the show would shape up to be. There was disappointment. Also, we had rented the set, so we knew what the set was going to look like. It was terribly disappointing."

# Carmel opens roundabout at Range Line & Medical Drive

Now, major traffic switch for new roundabout at 116th & Range Line

The 142nd roundabout in the City of Carmel at Range Line Road and Medical Drive opend last Thursday. The 143rd roundabout at Range Line Road and 116th Street began construction on Monday, May 2.

There has been a major traffic switch on South Range Line Road between Medical Drive and 116th Street.


The roundabout at 116th Street will be constructed one half at a time with east/west connectivity maintained for the duration of the approximately 110 days of work.

### **What does** this mean?

- The northern half of the roundabout will be constructed with continued vehicular traffic on 116th Street and limited connectivity to Westfield Boulevard. Therefore, southbound Range Line Road will not have access to this intersection.
- Drivers traveling eastbound on 116th Street will be able to turn south onto Westfield Boulevard or continue eastbound on 116th Street.



# Hope & Recovery comes to Noblesville

Drug overdoses kill more than 100,000 tential to be a major game chang-Americans per year - more than vehicle er by helping opioid substance crashes and gun deaths combined. Fentanyl, a legal prescription pain medication, is responsible for a large number of these deaths. Hamilton County is not immune to this drug pandemic problem!

Hope and Recovery Centers Inc., a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization, has been preparing for its grand opening in Noblesville for the last few years. The program's vision is to provide two years of sober living with various phases, using donations, foundation money, and grants. Hope and Recovery Centers Inc. has joined forces with the Miller Care Group, Step-Up Staffing and Chapel Church to provide a comprehensive ministry-based drug rehabilitation service to individuals with alcohol and drug addiction.

Our first foundation was established this week as Brian Foundation. Brian died at the tender age of 43 due to abusive alcoholism disease. The family elected to provide support to the needs of the community so that no one would experience the pain of losing a loved one due to addiction. In lieu of flowers, they requested donations be sent to Hope and Recovery Centers Inc. A full 100 percent of this funds are designated to provide support medications necessary for individuals to combat opioid addiction through Miller Care Group.

Noting that a major issue is fear of opioid withdrawal, four years ago, the FDA approved a single medication to mitigate opioid withdrawal called Lucemyra (Lofexadine). Clinical use has shown this non-opioid medication to be a major treatment for withdrawal, which can last for days. The medication can be costly, as despite FDA approval, far too many insurance companies have not yet adopted it as a mainstay in the treatment of opioid addiction. The use of this medication has the po-

abusers mitigate the potentially horrific effects of withdrawal. Subsequently, preventative measures, including mental health counseling, psychiatric intervention and use of Vivitrol (an opioid and alcohol blocking injection) is employed.

Hope and Recovery Centers Inc. is planning to be the most comprehensive rehabilitation centers for patients and their dependents by providing services unlike anything else available in the industry. The future planned phases are as follows:

Identify candidates suited for the program.


The addicted individual needs to release

their decision-making control to the program of Hope and Recovery Centers Inc. This allows Hope and Recovery to become his/her guardian and will provide assurance of continuity of the recovery. This act will prevent the patient from prematurely opting out of the program. Many other recovery programs fail to achieve this, because the decision to stay loyal to the program is made by a drug-impaired patient. When committed to treatment, Hope and Recovery will pay for the patient's full insurance to prevent financial bias.

### Phase 1 Seven days of detox with medical supervision.

At a certified facility, under care of the doctor, a medical intervention is conducted to start an immediate detox for all abused substances including alcohol, opioids, stimulants including methamphetamine, cocaine and spice, benzodiazepines, marijuana, etc.

Step-Up Staffing's mission is to keep the now recovered patient employed and monitor their progress. Step-Up Staffing will help the patient find employment, learn how to stay employed, provide transportation to and from the place of employment, and track the employee-employer relationship. During this one-year period, the patient will have monitoring devices on them, and when returning to the facility, they are assessed every time for any untoward issues.

### Phase 6

Alumni Phase, or Final Phase, is a period of 15 years after completion of the two years in-patient.

The patient will become an alumnus and will come back as a mentor for others in the program, at least four times annually. Five percent of his/her gross income during this period will be used to pay back the program for its two years of investment. The main reason for this financial arrangement is to keep track of the patient for an extended period.

No one ever completely heals from addiction. They learn how to control and live with addiction on a daily basis so that it does not consume their life.



Organizations wishing to create and develop Commission-sanctioned program proposals may apply for a grant. These includes exhibition development, public programs, interpretation, performances and more. All events must be open to the public, although a ticket fee may be charged to cover costs.

While only non-profits are eligible for grants, those funds may be passed through to support artists, historians, content creators, designers, etc. whose talents are needed to support the program. Businesses historical societies and mu- ditional information.



may also partner with these non-profits to make their program stronger. Applicants are strongly encouraged to submit grant ideas within the themes identified by the Bicentennial Bicentennial Commission Commission: Education, Historic Preservation, Environment/Parks, Diversity/ Inclusion, and Arts.

While there is no match requirement for these grants, applicants are encouraged to find additional resources through other grant programs, corporate sponsors, a political viewpoint, party individual donors, etc. to complete your budgets. You can also partner with other cultural institutions who will be involved in the Bicentennial, including township representatives (a full list is on the website),

seums, libraries, and parks.

Sanctioned events also will be eligible for a free Bicentennial Celebration Kit in 2023 to assist with theming events and programs to the 200th anniversary of the county. The celebration kits will include items such as a banner, posters, a logo tablecloth, bookmarks, digital advertising materials, etc.

The Hamilton County will help promote and coordinate all sanctioned events for the celebration through paid and organic social media and other advertising. The Commission will market and promote events throughout the year.

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


