HSE seniors place first at international conference

Students use their marketing, business, innovation skills to create one-of-a-kind DECA project solution

District 32 still in play

Throughout the past school year, Hamilton Southeastern High School seniors Eric Bedrosian, Alex Jurkovich, and Ajay Singh competed in the DECA competitive events program.

Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) is an association of marketing students that encourages the development of business and leadership skills through academic conferences and competitions. Each year, students can choose from one of many written or roleplay events. Written events include a business plan as well as a presentation to one or more judges, while the roleplay events give students a short amount of time to come up with solutions to a selected

challenge on the day of competition. Both provide students with the necessary skills to compete for jobs in the current and future work environment. The program sees over 211,000 participants annually.

At the end of each competition season, students can earn a spot at the international level. This year, HSE sent 19 students to the International Career Development Conference (ICDC), with five receiving top honors for their work on written projects and roleplay scenarios. Included in this group was the team of Bedrosian, Jurkovich, and Singh, who competed in the Hospitality and Tourism Operations Research Event (HTOR).

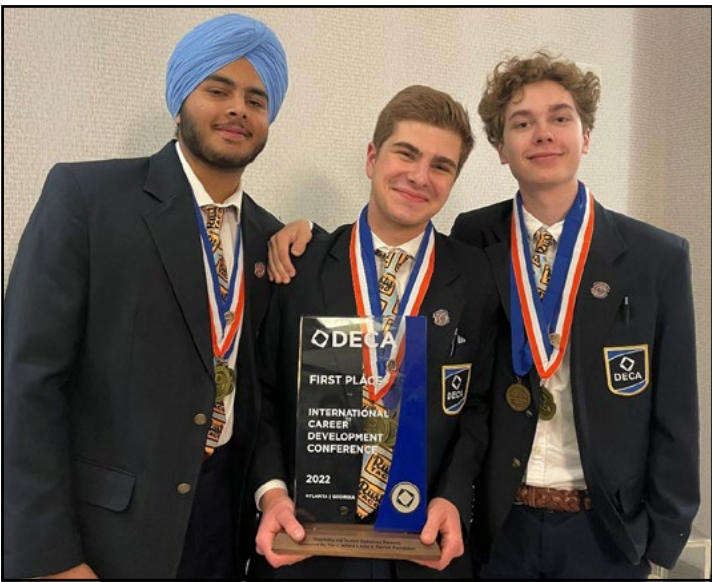

The Reporter has learned there are a total of seven total provisional ballots in all of Hamilton County. In Marion County, there are two provisional ballots from District 32. There is currently no confirmation if those are Republican or Democratic votes. The Marion County Election Board will open those two ballots next Thursday, May 12.

While that could narrow the margin between Glynn and Jaworowski, there are not enough provisional ballots in play to change the final result. Keep reading The Reporter for updates and the eventual outcome of this exceptionally close race.

Bedrosian, Jurkovich, and Singh formed their DECA team over a year ago at the height of the pandemic. They previously competed in Destination Imagination (DI), a problem-solving challenge program, where they received national accolades for their project solutions between 2015 and 2020. In 2020, the group left DI to form their DECA team and to compete in the HTOR category. In 2021, the group received second place at the State Career Development Conference (SCDC) and competed in the preliminary rounds at the international level.

This year, however, the team set out with the goal to win the first-place spot at the international conference. Bedrosian knew it would be their last year together and he believed it was important to leave a mark on the DECA program before leaving HSE.

"We were on our last year as a group," Bedrosian mentioned. "We needed to work hard and efficiently to get ourselves on stage. We had meetings for hours on end to get the project submitted on time, but in the end, it was well worth the wait to represent our school at the international level."

This season's competition asked students to work with an existing business to improve its employees' experience and boost morale. Bedrosian, Jurkovich, and Singh reached out to a franchised location of Rusty Taco in Lafayette to help with this. The team developed a five-point marketing and improvement strategy, along with a prototype of an internal personality testing interface that would help boost employee morale and increase the employee pool at the location.

"We simply took what was being used for upper management and made it accessible to all. Everyone should have a chance at developing their career, and our new application allows their employees to do so."

As a result of their hard work, the team placed first at SCDC and moved onto ICDC. In the end, the plan and presentation received high marks from the judges and placed them first internationally. Being an ICDC winner is a big deal in the DECA community, and Jurkovich was happy to see their hard work turn into first place.

"Being an international winner makes you cry," Jurkovich said. "You get a great

sense of euphoria as you are able to win something not only for your school and state, but for your country."

HSE DECA has been headed by Kristin Lidstrom since day one. As a result of the work between the team and Lidstrom, HSE earned its first top 3 finish in the program's 17-year history.

In addition to the first-place win by the HTOR team, Junior Suhita Chintalacharuvu received top 10 for the Human Resources Management event and senior Anish Kam-bhampati placed top 15 in the Human Resources Management event.

As for the DECA Glass? It now stands tall in the front office of HSE High School as a reminder that with hard work comes a great end result.

The letter carriers make this one of the easiest food drives you can do – just leave your non-perishable items in a bag (which will be provided in the mail the week before) by your mail box and they will pick it up on May 14. 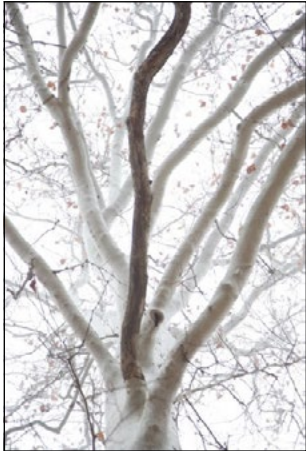

AG Rokita slams Biden administration for 'Orwellian assault' on free speech

Attorney General Todd Rokita on Thursday demanded that the Biden administration disband a new U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) unit that would focus on censoring communications deemed deceptive, false, or misleading.

The so-called Disinformation Governance Board poses a direct threat to First Amendment freedom of speech, Rokita said.

"The leftists controlling our federal government are

shameless when it comes to their cult-like devotion to destroying Americans' liberties," Rokita said. "Fortunately, here in Indiana and across the country, patriots stand prepared to defend our God-given rights. As attorney general, I'll always uphold my solemn oath to lead the cause of liberty."

In a letter to Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas, Rokita and peers from 19 other states declare that the federal government must pull the plug on its Orwellian endeavor.

"The existence of the Disinformation Governance Board will inevitably have a chilling effect

on free speech," the letter states. "Americans will hesitate before they voice their constitutionally protected opinions, knowing that the government's censors may be watching, and some will decide it is safer to keep their opinions to themselves."

The letter further notes that the DHS has chosen as the board's leader an individual who criticized parents as "disinformers" after the parents objected to the use of Critical Race Theory in schools.

"Even for the Biden administration," Rokita said, "this attack on free speech is egregious. At long last, have they no sense of decency?"

How to avoid moving company scams

The REPORTER

For countless Americans, the month of May signifies a major transition in their lives. Whether it is graduating from high school or college, starting a new job or receiving that highly anticipated acceptance letter, May marks the beginning of the busiest time in the nation for moving. So much so, that the month was designated National Moving Month in 1997.

In 2021, 42 percent of all business inquiries on BBB.org for moving companies occurred from May to August, and nearly 1,100 complaints were filed with BBB against moving companies throughout the year. Additionally, consumers reported more than \$730,000 lost to moving scams to [BBB Scam Tracker](http://BBB.org), a 216 percent increase in monetary losses as compared to 2020. Of the **27 million people who moved** from 2020 to 2021, nearly 30 percent were between the ages of 20 and 29.

With the amount of moving activity during summer, the potential of being a victim of a **moving scam** also increases. There are several versions of moving scams reported to BBB every year, including:

- Consumers receive a quote and pay a deposit, but the movers never show up.
- The moving company

provides a quote based on expected weight and, after loading the truck, they inform the consumer that the load is over the expected weight and an additional fee will have to be paid. Most of the time, the additional fee is significantly more expensive per pound, sometimes as much as double the original estimate.

- The most disruptive and difficult to anticipate moving scam is when everything appears to be going well. The movers provide an estimate, arrive on time and load your belongings on a truck. However, this is where the interaction turns disastrous. When the truck fails to arrive at its destination, either your belongings are simply gone or the company requires the consumer to pay an additional fee to have them delivered, holding the possessions hostage.

To avoid becoming a victim of a moving scam this National Moving Month and in the future, BBB recommends consumers follow these guidelines:

- **Watch out for warning signs.** When reviewing a company's website, if there is no address or information about a mover's registration or insurance, it is a sign that it may not possess the proper policies to protect a consumer's belongings. Additionally, if the mover

uses a rented truck or offers an estimate over the phone prior to conducting an on-site inspection, it may not be a legitimate business.

- **Be wary of unusual requests.** If a mover asks for a large down payment or full payment in advance, that may be an indication of a fraudulent business. If an individual's possessions are being held hostage for additional payment that was not agreed upon when the contract was signed, contact BBB or local law enforcement for help.
- **Get everything in writing.** When moving between states, check licensing with the U.S. Department of Transportation. An identification number issued by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) is required of all interstate moving companies, which can be verified at this link. Make sure to carefully read the terms and conditions of the contract, as well as the limits of liability and any disclaimers. The pickup and expected delivery date should be easily identified.
- **Keep an inventory of your belongings.** Having an inventory sheet is one of the best ways to keep track of your possessions. BBB recommends consumers who are moving label the boxes their belongings are packed in and what is in each box.

In general, movers are not liable for lost or damaged contents in customer-packed boxes unless there is provable negligence on the part of the mover. Taking photos of the contents prior to packing is a great way to prove if damages were incurred during the moving process.

- **Ask questions.** Do not be afraid to ask questions about anything you don't understand. If the moving company either can't or won't answer your questions, look for another company. Trust matters when hiring a moving company.

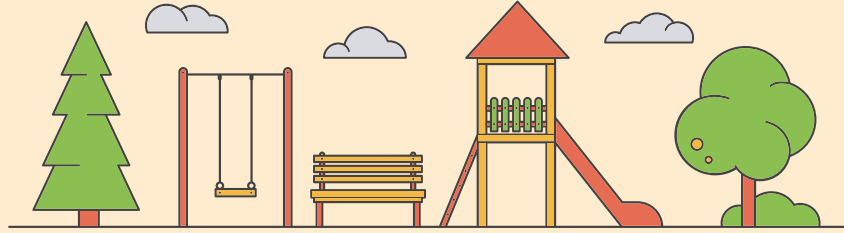
