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HSE takes 1st at DECA international conference

Throughout the past school year, Hamilton Southeastern High School seniors Eric Bedrosian, Alex Jurkovich, and Ajay Singh competed in the DECA competitive events program. Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) is an association of marketing students that encourages the development of business and leadership skills through academic conferences and competitions. Each year, students can choose from one of many written or roleplay events. Written events include a business plan as well as a presentation to one or more judges, while the roleplay events give students a short amount of time to come up with solutions to a selected

challenge on the day of competition. Both provide students with the necessary skills to compete for jobs in the current and future work environment. The program sees over 211,000 participants annually. At the end of each competition season, students can earn a spot at the international level. This year, HSE sent 19 students to the International Career Development Conference (ICDC), with five receiving top honors for their work on written projects and roleplay scenarios. Included in this group was the team of Bedrosian, Jurkovich, and Singh, who competed in the Hospitality and Tourism Operations Research Event (HTOR).

Carmel high school violinist headed to Julliard

Hear Abigail Ko play with Carmel Symphony Orchestra next weekend

On Saturday, May 14, Carmel High School Senior Violinist Abigail Ko will perform with the Carmel Symphony Orchestra (CSO). As of Thursday, May 5, Ko has accepted an offer to attend The Julliard School this fall. When The Reporter spoke to Ko last Friday afternoon, one day after she decided to attend Julliard, she said the idea did not yet feel real to her. "It's actually kind of surreal," Ko said. "If you'd asked me maybe three years ago if I'd be going to music school or not, I probably would have laughed at you. I feel like it's pretty

representative of how far I've come not only as a musician but as a person just opening up and realizing my own potential. Really, it's just so surreal." Ko began playing violin at six years old and said most violinists she knows started even earlier. "I have a friend whose mother is a violin/beginner piano teacher," Ko said. "I would go to this friend's house a lot and I would see her mom giving violin lessons pretty often. That's when I realized I wanted to start." Ko said she was not pushed into violin by her parents, but it was a thing she chose herself and something that she often did not see the point in, even though it was her own decision. "What's funny is that I used to

hate practicing when I was younger and not enjoy it one bit," Ko told The Reporter. "It was more of a 'I don't know why I'm doing this' thing for a while, but I'd say that definitely started to change in middle school. Over time, as I started playing with other people, I started to see my vi-

olin as something that could help me grow out of my shell a little bit. I tend to be kind if shy sometimes, but I feel like being able to connect with people over music allows me to actually be myself in a way."

Noblesville Preservation Alliance selected for year-long initiative

Five grassroots historic preservation organizations have been selected to participate in Indiana Landmarks' inaugural Affiliate Advancement Program, a year-long training initiative aimed at strengthening volunteer-driven local groups.

Through workshops conducted by leading professionals, participating organizations will learn strategies to help improve fundraising and planning efforts, develop new opportunities for community engagement, and communicate historic preservation's role in creating vibrant, resilient communities.

Organizations selected to participate in 2022 include Cornerstone Society of Madison; Historic Fall Creek, Pendleton Settlement; Noblesville Preservation Alliance; Save Our Stories in Marion; and Vincennes Knox Preservation Foundation.

The groups were selected via a competitive application process from among Indiana Landmarks' 61 affiliate organizations, which work as local partners to help save

and revitalize historic places. Each participating organization has demonstrated leadership in rehabilitating historic properties within its community but seeks ideas for increasing local capacity.

"Noblesville's success in attracting new residents and businesses is due in part to the historic buildings that connect our community's past

and present," said Mike Corbett, Noblesville Preservation Alliance treasurer and Indiana Landmarks board member. "We look forward to growing NPA's capacity and leadership as we prepare to celebrate our 35th year in 2023."

Experts leading the training include professionals from Ball State's Indiana Communities Institute, Pro-

peller Marketing, Creative Insight Community Development, the Indiana Historical Society, and Jamie Simek, author of Beyond the Bake Sale. Upon completion of the program in March 2023, the participating affiliate organizations will share their strategies for increasing community engagement with each other.

Costa has a way of connecting with her math students that not only makes them believe they can learn, but shows them through their academic performance that they can succeed. She encourages students through individualized attention and seeks out areas where she is most needed. As chair of one of the largest academic departments in the district, she supports veteran teachers, mentors new educators, and is a role model among her peers.

Costa is the high school winner.

The four educators were selected to represent different academic levels, with two teachers chosen at the elementary level to reflect the fact that 50 percent of Noblesville Schools teachers are in elementary schools.

This year's middle school winner, Lori McGavic, was further distinguished as the overall district winner.

Selection focused on master teachers who excel at putting Noblesville Schools' mission and vision into action and whose accomplishments align well with the Indiana Department of Education's state Teacher of the Year criteria.

The winners regularly demonstrate the highest levels of quality instruction for their students and leadership among their peers. They will be honored at a Noblesville Schools Education Foundation recognition dinner this month.

As the overall district honoree, McGavic will also participate in the state Teacher of the Year competition.

New county parking garage set to open May 13

Hamilton County will hold a ribbon cutting for the new parking garage at 10 a.m. on Friday, May 13 at 801 Clinton St., Noblesville. The new garage will consolidate parking for county employees who currently use several lots around downtown Noblesville.

“Building this parking garage will prevent county employees from having to cross Indiana State Road 32 to get to the government center, which can be dangerous,” said Steve Dillinger,

president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. “This parking garage will also help us accommodate a burgeoning court system. Hamilton County will soon get another judge which means more jury members, attorneys, and judges.”

The five-story garage cost \$11.5 million and has 475 parking spaces. The public will be able to use the parking garage after 5 p.m. on weekdays and on

Parking for the ribbon cutting will be available in the lot located next to Erika’s Place on Logan Street. There will be signage directing attendees to the ribbon-cutting ceremony on the first floor of the new parking garage.

Saturday, May 14 marks the 30th annual Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive, sponsored by the National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC), the largest one-day food drive in America. This year will be the first time the food drive has been live in two years.

In the Noblesville and Fishers communities, local NALC Union 888 is partnering with Hamilton County Harvest (HCH) Food Bank and the broad network of food pantries and meal programs across the county. The letter carriers make this one of the easiest food drives you can do – just leave your

non-perishable items in a bag (which will be provided in the mail the week before) by your mail box and they will pick it up on May 14. The food will be distributed here in Hamilton County. Food drive organizers want to exceed the previous year’s grand total of 36,056 pounds.

According to Map the Meal Gap, there are 26,710 food insecure individuals here in Hamilton County, and many are children. Good items to donate include canned chicken or tuna, Chef Boyardee cans with meat, mac and cheese cups, canned fruit, Chunky Meat soups, and small peanut butter jars.

HCH Food Bank needs volunteers to help collect, weigh, and pass out the food at the Noblesville and Fishers post offices on May 14 – which could be a wonderful family and/or student activity. For more information and to sign up to help, go to tinyurl.com/StampOutHungerMay14.

On May 25, 2020, Derek Chauvin pressed his knee into the neck of George Floyd, an unarmed black man, for 9 minutes and 29 seconds. This political standpoint changed the perspective of many human aspects on police brutality and racism. As a result, protests began to globally spread around the world, causing people to riot. This left police departments to make a change.

I had to learn that I wouldn't get as many opportunities as other people, and I would have

to work 10 times harder than most.

Many people who go to my school grew up not knowing what it's like to not be privileged, such as going to school with no one who looks like you, going to stores, walking anywhere alone, being accused of more trouble, any encounter with the police, and being made fun of not only for the color of my skin but the way I look and the way I act.

When I experienced my first encounter with racism, I thought it was normal. It disappoints me that I thought all the nasty, cruel words said over the years were normal and okay. Not only did I think it was okay, but the people in my school

made it okay for these issues to occur.

One thing that is normally never talked about in school is racism. Yes, we talk about slavery, equal rights, and how it affected our race long-term, but we don't talk about how racism affects us in modern-day society. The surge of the Black Lives Matter Movement for racial justice gives us an opportunity to push efforts into systematic changes in our education systems. If you go to a school largely populated by white people, it's hard to feel like you belong somewhere. That was my problem for years. It was so hard to feel like I belonged. My whole life I had wanted friends of col-

or because it's a struggle not feeling like you have anyone who relates to the same racist experiences you've endured. I wish all schools were more diverse.

I am very passionate about diversity. Diversity widens viewpoints and takes different ideas and aspects into account. Diversity is what drives creativity and innovation. It's important to hear other people's perspectives on the way they view situations and the way they think. It's equally important to understand and respect other people's cultural backgrounds and religions.

Culture is something that defines many of us, including me. Culture is reflected in our history, in

our heritage, and in how we express ideas and creativity. When I visit my family, I always get to see more of my culture. For me, it's so important to be able to be a part of my culture because without it you lose yourself and your identity. Diversity is what makes us, us.

We are struggling to make ends meet in a system set up for our race to fail. Achieving racial equity is something very important for not only me, but for our society and our culture. The goal is not to just eliminate the gap between white people and people of color but to increase the success for all groups.

You can't love the culture and not support the people.

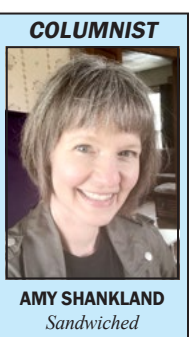
To My Siblings,

Westfield's own Anya Burke kept acting, dancing through pandemic

Imagine standing on a stage, lights beaming down, seats filled with people, castmates by your side – and the next day it all disappears because of a global pandemic.

This was the reality for Westfield resident Anya Burke and virtually everyone else in the performing arts industry.

Burke graduated from Westfield High School in 2020. That spring, her school's production of *Shrek the Musical* was postponed until August because of COVID-19.

Shortly thereafter, she began her freshman year at Anderson University, where in-person productions were canceled throughout the 2020-21 academic year.

"I didn't know what to expect coming into school," Burke said. "Broadway was shut down, so I didn't know if we would do any shows or what all we'd be doing."

Preparing her professional career during the pandemic proved to be challenging. Burke remembers how frustrating it was to not be able to perform for a live audience due to COVID restrictions.

For most of her freshman year, Burke was part of numerous collaborations between the musical theater program and Anderson's cinema and media arts program – resulting in shows that were staged for video rather than an in-person audience.

"Any experience is a good experience," she said, "but that's not what I came to school for."

Regardless of how much she enjoyed the video collaborations, what she loves most is performing live.

Although many people were able to work remotely during the pandemic, the performing arts are best done in person

with a live audience. Burke's program was still able to have vocal lessons and acting classes, but students couldn't get the full experience without performance opportunities.

"Being able to do a show is kind of like a final project – putting everything together – and we weren't able to do that," she said.

However, as the pandemic eased in recent months, Anderson University performances were once again taking place live on stage with in-person audiences and without masks.

When asked how the pandemic has permanently affected the industry, Burke chooses to emphasize the positive.

"A lot more things are online," she said. "There are a lot more video auditions, which opens the doors to many more opportunities."

It's difficult when performances are canceled because

one person tests positive for COVID-19, she added. But if someone is available to step into a role, "swings and understudies are starting to get more recognition, which is good."

This spring semester was the first time Burke performed in front of a "normal" live audience since the start of COVID-19. She recently starred in an off-campus production of *The Little Mermaid*. She also performed in the AU production of *The Drowning Girls*.

Burke finished her sophomore year in May. Once she graduates from Anderson in the spring of 2024, she plans to do musical theater work on cruise ships, which is a good way to gain experience.

"Eventually, I want to work my way to New York," she said, "or audition for a tour, or go to Chicago."

"I just want to keep performing. It's fun to have that interaction with the audience, and I've missed that."

Bedrosian, Jurkovich, and Singh formed their DECA team over a year ago at the height of the pandemic. They previously competed in Destination Imagination (DI), a problem-solving challenge program, where they received national accolades for their project solutions between 2015 and 2020. In 2020, the group left DI to form their DECA team and to compete in the HTOR category. In 2021, the group received second place at the State Career Development Conference (SCDC) and competed in the preliminary rounds at the international level.

This year, however, the team set out with the goal to win the first-place spot at the international conference. Bedrosian knew it would be their last year together and he be-

lieved it was important to leave a mark on the DECA program before leaving HSE.

"We were on our last year as a group," Bedrosian mentioned. "We needed to work hard and efficiently to get ourselves on stage. We had meetings for hours on end to get the project submitted on time, but in the end, it was well worth the wait to represent our school at the international level."

This season's competition asked students to work with an existing business to improve its employees' experience and boost morale. Bedrosian, Jurkovich, and Singh reached out to a franchised location of Rusty Taco in Lafayette to help with this. The team developed a five-point marketing and improvement strategy, along with a prototype of an internal per-

sonality testing interface that would help boost employee morale and increase the employee pool at the location.

"We simply took what was being used for upper management and made it accessible to all. Everyone should have a chance at developing their career, and our new application allows their employees to do so."

As a result of their hard work, the team placed first at SCDC and moved onto ICDC. In the end, the plan and presentation received high marks from the judges and placed them first internationally. Being an ICDC winner is a big deal in the DECA community, and Jurkovich was happy to see their hard work turn into first place.

"Being an international winner makes you cry," Jurkovich

said. "You get a great sense of euphoria as you are able to win something not only for your school and state, but for your country."

HSE DECA has been headed by Kristin Lidstrom since day one. As a result of the work between the team and Lidstrom, HSE earned its first top 3 finish in the program's 17-year history.

In addition to the first-place win by the HTOR team, Junior Suhita Chintalacharuvu received top 10 for the Human Resources Management event and senior Anish Kambhampati placed top 15 in the Human Resources Management event.

As for the DECA class? It now stands tall in the front office of HSE High School as a reminder that with hard work comes a great end result.

Freedom of speech includes freedom of religious expression

On Monday, April 25, the United States Supreme Court heard oral arguments on an important case involving freedom of speech and religion in public schools. The case, *Joseph A. Kennedy v. Bremerton School District*, has garnered a great deal of national attention.

Joseph Kennedy, a Christian public-school football coach, began saying a brief, audible prayer on the 50-yard line of the football field after games. Problems arose for Coach Kennedy when players, students, and fans started joining him on field for prayer, and the Bremerton School District perceived Coach Kennedy's actions as a school-sponsored endorsement of Christianity. After refusing to stop his post-game prayer, Bremerton fired Coach Kennedy.

The facts of this case, though strongly disputed, and the legal theories presented to the Su-

preme Court provide us with a great deal to consider. Chief among those considerations is the question: What must a public-school teacher leave behind when he or she enters the school premises?

In a seminal decision from 1969, *Tinker v. Des Moines Independent Community School District*, the Supreme Court declared, "It can hardly be argued that either students or teachers shed their constitutional rights to freedom of speech or expression at the schoolhouse gate." Although the statement by the Supreme Court appears straightforward and intuitive, free speech rights among public-school teachers, especially as it relates to religious expression, has been almost entirely confined to an ambiguous sphere of "private" speech (i.e., personal views expressed outside his or her official role of teacher). It is argued that such a limitation is justified on

the basis of the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment, which prohibits the government from establishing or unduly favoring one religion over another.

Notwithstanding the interesting proposition that no religion is in itself a form of religion (which in this column we do not have time to examine), I believe our courts and public schools have gone too far in eliminating all expressions of religion from the classroom. For if the argument is that religion is so delicate and personal that it must be relegated to the home, why not the same for theories on sex and gender or for critical race theory? Indeed, Justice Clarence Thomas posed this exact scenario when he asked, "If the coach, instead of taking a knee for prayer, took a knee during the national anthem because of moral opposition to racism ... how would your school district respond?"

My point is not to engage in a game of "whataboutism" on what should or should not be al-

lowed in schools, but to simply point out that religious expression by public-school teachers, administrators, and coaches has been overly restricted.

We live in a free society, with a variety of beliefs. Further, our public schools are staffed by living, breathing humans — many of whom possess deeply held religious convictions — not robots. Thus, while our public schools are not religious factories and unbridled religious expression and/or practice should not be maintained, is it not beneficial for our children to see their teachers and coaches for who they really are?

Does not, at the very least, our Constitution allow for a football coach to knee at the center of a football field and say a short prayer for the men he is charged to lead?

The Bottomless Lake

Recently, we were notified that our rent in Fishers would be raised an added \$800 per month, triggering a second move in less than a year. Once again, I challenged myself to sort through boxes of past writings and correspondences to determine how to lighten the load.

It was during this sifting and sorting that I became besieged by memories of my old buddy Matt Fry in the form of a letter written in 1987, postmarked Van Nuys, Calif.

The letter began: "Hey there you crazy last semester squawker. What's the latest parrot-head activity back on the campus of USI?"

Matt and I bonded because of Jimmy Buffett. A mutual friend, aware of our devotion to the beach bum balladeer famous for "Margaritaville," introduced us. We became fast feathered Parrot Head friends.

We also shared a fondness for John Prine and Jerry Jeff Walker. Matt introduced me to a Prine song, "The Bottomless Lake."

"We are falling down / Down to the bottom of a hole in the ground / Smoke 'em if you got 'em / I'm so scared I can hardly breathe / I may never see my sweetheart again."

It became one of my favorites.

At the time of the letter, Matt was a fresh USI graduate living in LA, a major geography jump for a small-town boy from Eldorado, Ill. The letter reminded me of how lonely he was then, part of this due to having not met any Buffett fans.

"I've got to logically approach this matter and try to find out exactly where a Southern California parrot head would roost," he wrote, adding, "I'm in desperate need of some tropical tantalizing talk and an equally (imaginative mind) to accompany me to Margaritaville."

Matt, himself, was a wonderful singer songwriter. He seemed happiest with his six-string. His perpetual smile while performing told us that.

The letter alluded to his shows at the Dixie bar in Evansville on Wednesday nights when draft beer sold for a quarter, the perfect dive bait for a college crowd. He played "The Bottomless Lake" every gig.

My fondest Matt memory was at the Dixie. While he was on stage, I handed him a piece of paper with lyrics I wrote. The song was called "8th Fairway Delight," detailing how two young lovers rendezvoused at the local golf course one night only to have their togetherness spoiled by a water-hose wielding greenskeeper.

"They were public lovers / Anytime anyplace / No need for any covers / Never too tight of a space / A picnic table or a park bench / Or under the public light / But the best place of all was on the 8th fairway that night."

"Is this autobiographical?" he asked.

"No, but it is based on a true story that I made up."

"I got this," Matt said, and right on the spot, he put music to my words, the first time any of my words had been put to song. It was the sweetest applause I ever heard. I knew then I had a friend for life.

"I really thought that old distorted PA was a piece of (crap) but I would be simply elated to sit down behind that Sears microphone and plug in my old flat top to roll through another weeknight session of drunken orchestration. Never knew how good I had it until it's all gone ... Perhaps we can plan a special time when I come home next time to do it all again ... mark my word, we will do it all again — more than once!"

At the time of the letter, Matt was working on two other songs of mine, "Mr. Coffee" and "I Guess Your Letter Wanted Me More Than You Did." In the letter, Matt mentioned the constant questions gnawing at him. "Did I make the right move? Is the big city life the real life for me?"

The letter was dated 2/1/87.

Two months later, on a Friday afternoon, our mutual friend, Amy, called. Matt had drowned after a plane crash just off Malibu. The pilot of the rented Piper Cherokee had been drunk and survived. A woman lived too. A second man died.

According to the *LA Times*, as the four-seat plane flew south over the Santa Monica Mountains, it quickly lost altitude. The woman testified how the pilot described the drop as being "better than a free fall." "He was laughing about it," she said. Then, the plane flew so low over the ocean that "it was as if you were on a boat and could just stick your feet in the water." She recalled the pilot saying, "Look, water on the wing tip. Look, we're so close we can get water on the wing tip." The plane dipped, hit the ocean twice and started to fill with water. "I didn't feel anyone moving around me. I sat back and just waited to die."

After hanging up the phone, stunned, I drove by a little church with its door open and soon found myself inside, alone, with bent knees. From there, I stopped at the Alpine bar for a long-neck beer and toasted my buddy.

Matt ended his letter this way: "Anyhow Saalman, I guess I'll sign off for now. Take care. Later."

Once again, reading Matt's letter while prepping for another move, I thought, "Later, Matt, much later." Then, as always, I listened to "The Bottomless Lake," which always seems like the right thing to do.

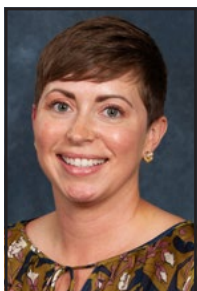

The prophets spoke of where He would be born, His being exiled into Egypt as a child, sold for 30 pieces of silver and being buried in a rich man's tomb.

If these prophecies were artificially manipulated, who would Jesus need to have controlled? His parents before He was born, a maniacal Herod, Judas and the Sanhedrin along with Pilate. Reasonable? After being born, many of us have manipulated one or both parents. See the whining child in the cereal aisle of the grocery? How many of you were manipulated?

Big difference, isn't it? There are important Biblical "bookends" to proph-

ecies. One bookend goes where the prophecy was made. It would hardly be prophecy if the prediction was made after the event. For example, I prophesy that Joe Biden will be elected president in 2020. Prophecy? Hardly!

Acts 3:24 provides another significant "bookend." There Peter declared, "In addition, all the prophets who have spoken, from Samuel and those after him, have also foretold these days." These would have been the days in which the apostles were preaching, the Gospel was spreading rapidly and a new covenant relationship between God and man was proclaimed.

So, what are the divinely given "bookends"? Of necessity it must have been spoken prior to the event and fulfilled by the first century. One cannot predict the future after the "future" event has occurred. When

Millers girls claim first-ever HCC title

ZIONSVILLE - The Noblesville girls track and field team achieved something last Tuesday that it had never done before: Win a Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship.

The Millers claimed the HCC trophy at the finish of the meet, which took place at Zionsville. Noblesville scored 125 points to win the championship, holding off Hamilton Southeastern, which scored 113.5 points to claim second place.

“We’re pretty balanced,” said Millers coach James Pearce. The coach said that winning a conference meet is “really tough, because you’ve got to have depth in there.”

And the Millers’ depth pulled them through. Noblesville won five individual events, including a 1-2 finish in the 800 run. Summer Rempe was first in a time of 2 minutes, 17.21 seconds, followed by Brinkley Cooper in second (2:18.67). Both runners had already

won an HCC event, as they were on the Millers’ first-place 4x800 relay, with Riley Flynn and Paige Hazelrigg. (9:28.85).

Kiana Siefert finished first in the 100 hurdles (15.10 seconds). Noblesville was also strong in the field events, with Malina Miller taking the high jump (5 feet, 3 inches) and Hannah Alexander triumphing in the discus (139-9), while placing second in the shot put.

“The 800 was huge,” said Pearce. “When you can get 18 points in something, that’s pretty cool.”

Rylee Hassan finished third in the high jump, giving the Millers 16 points in that event.

“Those big events really add up quick,” said Pearce.

Southeastern picked up the final event of the night, as the team of Elia Blackmore, Ciara Kepner, Jehnea Mirro and Regan Wans won the 4x400 relay in 4:06.79. Blackmore and Ally Elsbury went 2-3 in the 300 hurdles, with Elsbury also taking

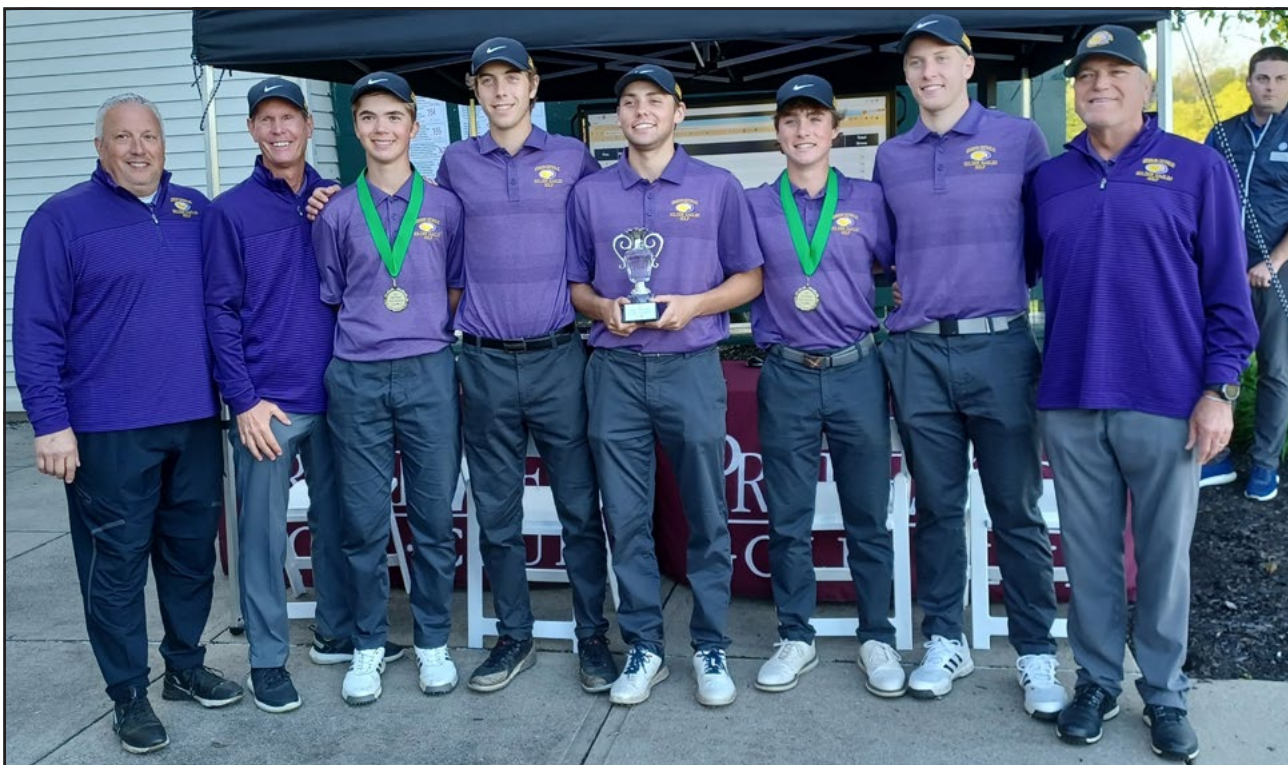

WESTFIELD - It only took one quarter for the Indianapolis AlleyCats to set the tone for the season - especially on the defensive side.
