

Tie vote means ailing member will remain on Carmel City Council

Carmel City Council Member Bruce Kimball was re-elected in 2019.

According to Kimball's son, a year later, Kimball suffered a stroke. The council decided at that time to take a wait-and-see approach as to whether Kimball would recover and return to his seat on the council.

Since then, Kimball has continued to receive his pay and

health care benefits. Council Member Sue Finkam said Monday night, "It's clearly been a while, and, again, we hoped he'd be back, but unfortunately he has not and, given all the activity in this district, I feel it's



time to look closer at this issue and when he can return.'

Finkam co-sponsored a resolution that would initiate a process of declaring Kimball's council seat vacant due to his extended absence. The resolution on Monday night ended in a 4-4 tie, meaning it does not pass and Kimball will remain in his seat, leaving voters to decide in 2023.

Several in attendance of Monday night's meeting say they feel like they don't have

Sagamore is one of the highest honors in the state of Indiana, awarded by the governor as a personal tribute to those who have rendered distinguished service to the state through their wisdom, public commitment, and concern for the well-being of others.

Issued by Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb, the award was presented to Niedermeyer in honor of her retirement by Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen.

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Boys track and field sectional

Carmel wins third straight in close meet

CARMEL - A close meet can be good for a track and field team, although it is a little better if it involves a victory.

The Carmel boys track and field team had that close meet Thursday as the Greyhounds hosted the sectional at Carmel Stadium. The 'Hounds were chasing Hamilton Southeastern for most of the meet, but took the lead after the 3200 run and held on to claim their third consecutive sectional title, scoring 158 points to the Royals' 150.5 points.

The win was also the 28th sectional title in Carmel program history. Just as important, the Greyhounds had five wins and qualified 15 for next Thursday's regional round at Lafayette Jefferson.

"It definitely helps us get ready for the tournament, because we know these meets are only going to get closer," said Carmel coach Ken Browner. "Looking at the state meet, we feel if we can get everybody through, we're one of the five or six teams that can win it, but we can't make mistakes, either. And this helped us tonight, because if we would've slipped up somewhere, HSE would have got us. And so that just helped our guys and just let them know, 'Hey, we got to be ahead of them these final two rac-

The Greyhounds surged ahead thanks to their 1-2 finish in the 3200. Kole Mathison ran away with the race, finishing in 9 minutes, 4.30 seconds. Mathison was 20 seconds ahead of teammate Charlie Schuman, who placed second. That gave Carmel 18 team points, and turned a 14.5-point deficit into a slight lead. The Greyhounds then clinched the meet with a runner-up result in the 4x400 relay, followed by a 3-4 finish from Evan Brehl and Drew Franklin in the

That was followed by an incredible run from Mathison in the 1600, where he sailed home in a new sectional record time of 4:06.50. The Greyhounds then picked up a victory in the 4x100 relay. Philpott later won the 200 dash.

the 4x800 relay team, Adom Quist in the 110 hurdles, Andrew Willman in the 300 hurdles, Aydrian Caldwell in the high jump (second place with 6 feet, 5 inches), Christian Peterson in the long jump, Greg Gottlieb in the 200 and Nolan Ring in the discus. The top three in each event move on to the regional, so Brehl qualified in the shot put as well. After that, the Greyhounds will likely get a handful of callbacks to regional with four at-large spots available, so Franklin could also be heading to Lafayette.

"We qualified everybody we expected through, which was good," said Browner. "And we had some great performances."

Southeastern had a great meet, with three event wins and a total of 14 regional qualifiers, with several callbacks on the horizon. The Royals began the meet with a win in the 4x800 relay, then soared to two field event victories.

Manraj Grewal won the high jump with leap of 6 feet, 7 inches. Not only was that a personal best for Grewal, but he also broke down a barrier.

"I've been stuck at that 6-4, 6-5 range for the whole year," said Grewal, so for him to finally break through "was amazing." Grewal tried for 6-9 and almost cleared it - "just hit it with my ankle," he said. But he thought the jump was good and said, "my confidence is really high right now."

Southeastern got a 1-2 sweep in the long jump. Michael Griffith won the event with a best jump of 23 feet, while Lamine Sall placed second, jumping 22 feet, 7 inches.

Jack Greer took second in the shot put and Carmel's other regional qualifiers were Jackson Constantine placed third in the discus, while Alex Troutman was third in the high jump, giving HSE six regional qualifiers in the field, with callbacks possible as




