in Robotics, from Temasek Polytechnic Singapore. At Ball State, he plans on majoring in Business Analytics.

In addition to being the first recipients of this scholarship, these esports student-athletes will drive a Ball State/RLL-branded car in the upcoming INDYCAR video game upon its release in 2023.

“When considering the applicants for the Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing Scholarship, what made both Ar Muhammad Aleef and Rhett Crain stand out was their passion and experience in both sim racing and live racing,” said Dan Marino, director of Ball State’s esports program and head coach of the University’s varsity esports team. “After getting to know both students better, it was clear that they didn’t just see the RLL scholarship as a pathway for competition, but to be a part of something larger within our esports program and through opportunities with RLL.”

The partnership between Ball State and RLL – established in February – has provided other special opportunities for students engaged in Ball State’s esports program. This month, for example, several Ball State Esports students took

advantage of an exclusive opportunity to visit with and observe members of the RLL racing team in action at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway as they prepared for the 106th running of the Indianapolis 500.

“We share in Ball State’s excitement and pride in welcoming the first two recipients of the Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing Scholarship,” said Tom Knox, senior vice president of sales and marketing for RLL. “When we announced the formation of RLL Esport in 2021, we knew the esports industry would be an exciting new way for us to stay engaged to our partners, our fans, and the entire racing community. Since that time, in partnering with Ball State and its esports program, we continue to find new and innovative ways to tap into the young, bright minds of the future, while also giving back to our community, our state, and our sport.”

**Innovation in Esports**

Ball State’s unique partnership with RLL Racing – joining traditional racing with simulated racing – puts the University at the forefront of the collegiate esports industry.

Additionally, these high-profile education-

al-corporate partnerships can be valuable to the economic vitality of Indiana, according to Rollie Helmling, a motorsports advisor at the [Indiana Economic Development Corporation](#) (IEDC).

“As Indiana continues to grow, it expands educational opportunities and partnerships that allow for great advancements in racing and esports,” Helmling said. “A racing team like Rahal Letterman Lanigan teaming up with Ball State University is a prime example of how our state is working diligently to attract and retain innovative talent, and illustrates that Hoosier partnerships are leading the way with evolutionary thinking.”

For Dr. Paaige Turner, dean of Ball State’s [College of Communication, Information, and Media](#) (CCIM), which houses the University’s esports program, having one of the few varsity esports sim racing programs in the country, backed by a unique partnership with a professional racing team, allows the college to attract top talent not only in gaming, but in other areas such as media, film, entertainment production, news and more.

“Sim racing as a genre in esports is gaining a tremendous amount of popularity

each year, and we see it as an incredible opportunity for our University to be on the cutting edge of the collegiate esports industry,” Turner said. “Adding the layer of the Rahal Letterman Lanigan partnership on top of this, students with a passion for racing can have the curtain pulled back to see how an incredible organization like RLL works behind the scenes, while also making connections and gaining experience to propel them into fulfilling careers and meaningful lives.”

Ball State began its varsity esports program in January 2021, becoming a founding member of the Esports Collegiate Conference. The University’s [Esports Production](#) concentration, under CCIM’s [Department of Media](#), delivers hands-on instruction for students to develop their skills in the field of esports media. Students in the program learn the history of esports, video production, streaming, and live event broadcasting.

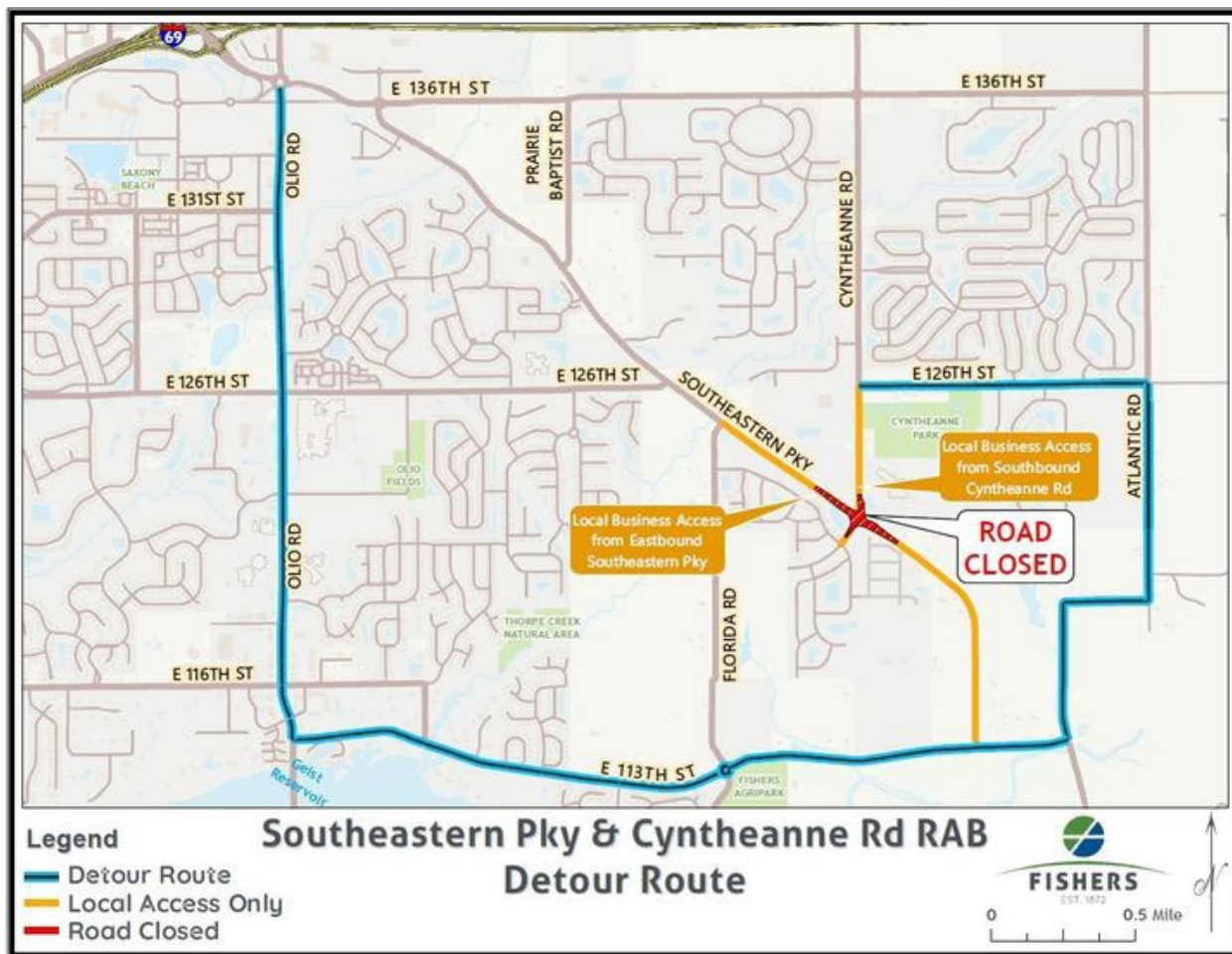

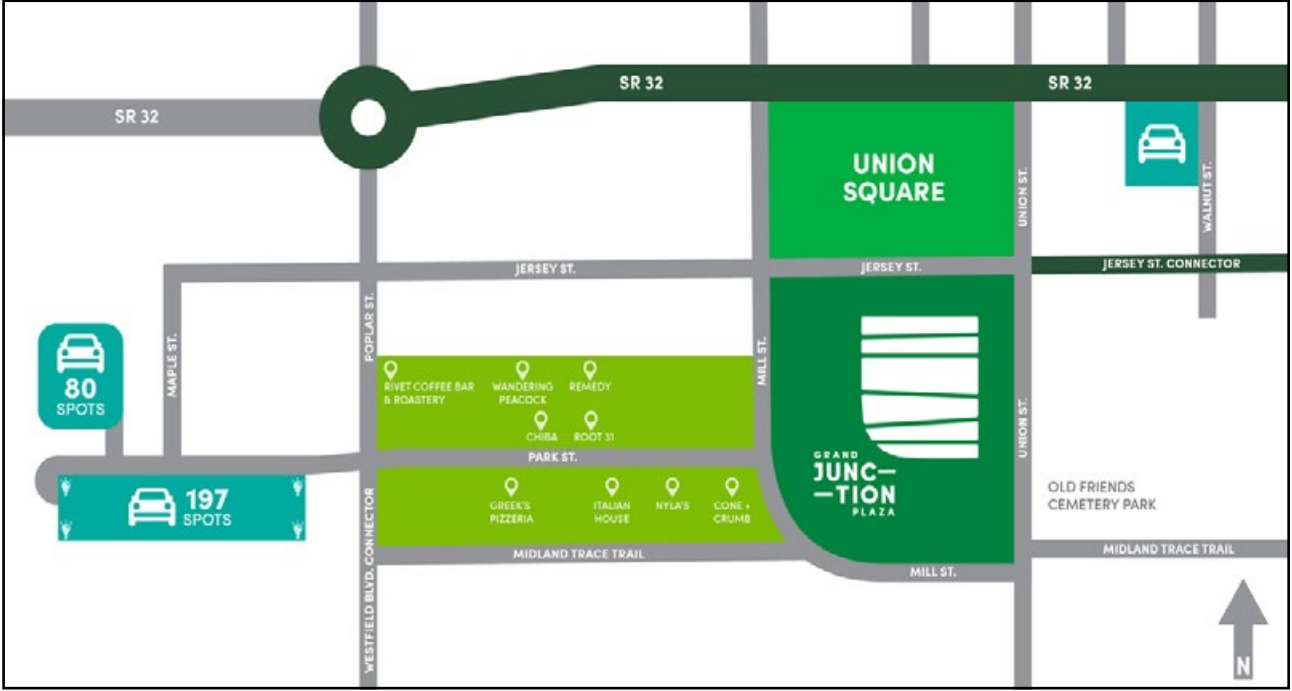

## Hairbanger's Ball returning to headline 2022 Noblesville Fourth of July Fireworks Festival

Noblesville city officials are actively preparing for a spectacular 2022 Noblesville Fireworks Festival, and they have announced details for the free events taking place on Monday, July 4, beginning at 4:30 p.m. with the Stars & Stripes Forever Parade through Downtown Noblesville.

The Noblesville Fourth of July parade, festival, and fireworks display is the longest continuously running celebration in central Indiana and an annual tradition in Noblesville since 1997. "We are so excited for Hairbanger's Ball to be rejoining us for another spectacular Fourth of July celebration," Mayor Chris Jensen said. "This is always a fun day for my family, and I look forward to celebrating with our community starting with the parade going through downtown Noblesville and ending with fun events at Forest Park."

The day kicks off with the annual Stars & Stripes Forever Fourth of July Parade at 4:30 p.m. Registration to participate in the parade is \$25 (nonprofits are not charged) and entries must be submitted by June 29. Forms are available at [NoblesvilleFireworksFestival.com](#).

The free Fireworks Festival will take place from 6 to 10 p.m. at Forest Park. The event will include traditional park amenities

such as playgrounds, shelters and shade, along with festival items like a bungee jump course, an axe throwing trailer, rock wall, inflatables, trackless train and a kids area. An adult area will include a beer garden and games. Hairbanger's Ball will perform on the main stage from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. The day will end with the annual fireworks show, which will begin at 10 p.m.

In addition to all the events planned, Forest Park will also be featuring a limited VIP section where families and friends can purchase tables for the evening. These tables offer up-close seating to the live music performance, an exceptional view of the fireworks, and a great meeting place to safely gather and eat in between activities.

VIP table groups may bring in their own food and drink, participate in a table-decorating contest, and get access to separate VIP restroom options. # Hamilton County Tourism receives grant for 'BEST Project' study, strategic 10-year plan

The U.S. Economic Development Administration awarded Hamilton County Tourism, Inc. (HCT) a major grant to lead a milestone study that will explore potential infrastructure and program investments for HCT and its affiliate, Hamilton County Sports Authority.

The BEST (Business of Entertainment, Sport and Tourism) study will guide future entertainment, group and sports tourism-related capital investments, identify job training needs and identify other endeavors aimed to create greater resilience and grow tourism's economic impact for Hamilton County in the next 10 years.

The study is led by

Hamilton County Tourism Vice President/Chief Strategy Officer Karen Radcliff and a 30-member committee of leaders and stakeholders in the public, private and non-profit tourism business sectors. The committee will issue a request for proposal (RFP) in June and hire a qualified planning group to conduct a series of studies that will lead to a master plan. The EDA grant covers \$208,000 of the study's \$520,000 total cost, and HCT will cover the balance.

The study data, along with the expertise of the BEST Project committee,

will represent a deep analysis of the marketplace and will set a course for a long-range vision and strategic investments over the next decade. According to Hamilton County Tourism President/CEO Brenda Myers, the HCT board and officials will utilize BEST Project data and research to target three areas of need to grow and sustain the county's tourism industry:

- 1) A tourism investment plan that prioritizes infrastructure and programs that best support a resilient and sustainable tourism economy.
- 2) A financial sustain-

ability plan that ensures income streams for sport, entertainment and group tourism product development.

3) A tourism workforce development strategy that connects training and degree programs directly to tourism-related employment and advancement opportunities, with emphasis on greater equity and a more diverse workforce.

"We are grateful the Economic Development Administration shares our vision for the BEST Project and how it will create sustainable growth in the coming years," Myers said.



"Research and data are a cornerstone for Hamilton County Tourism's business and development activities."

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# Duke Energy making upgrades to underground lines in Carmel

Duke Energy is strengthening part of its electric grid in Carmel to improve reliability and reduce power outages. Crews are working to replace more than 18,000 feet of underground power lines across the city. Work includes:

- Replacing 5,900 feet of underground cable northwest of Carey Road and East Smokey Row Road
- Replacing 6,300 feet of underground cable southeast of East 146th Street and Woodgate Drive
- Replacing 3,200 feet of underground cable northwest of West 146th Street and the Monon Trail
- Replacing 3,200 feet of underground cable near East Main Street and Brookshire Parkway

The new underground power lines will be more reliable and reduce the risk of prolonged power outages for homes and businesses in the area in the future. Work on each of the projects is currently underway and is

expected to conclude by the end of September.

Customers may see large electric utility equipment in the area, including utility trucks and digging and boring equipment. In preparation for this work, trained personnel inspected and cleared vegetation near the underground power lines.

"This important work is part of a smart, multi-layered energy grid improvement strategy to help improve electric reliability and strengthen the electric grid against severe weather and other impacts," said Duke Energy government and community relations manager Mark LaBarr. "Making the right investments today means that the energy grid customers and their families depend on will be more reliable and more responsive in the future."

The Millers had five hits in the game, including a 2-for-3 performance from Fowler. Sjolholm, DeRolf and Kira Thomas all had one hit.

Noblesville finished the season 16-13 and defended its sectional championship.

"We accomplished things that no one thought we would do," said Bullard. "We accomplished things that no one gave us credit for and we were able to do that because they came together as a team."

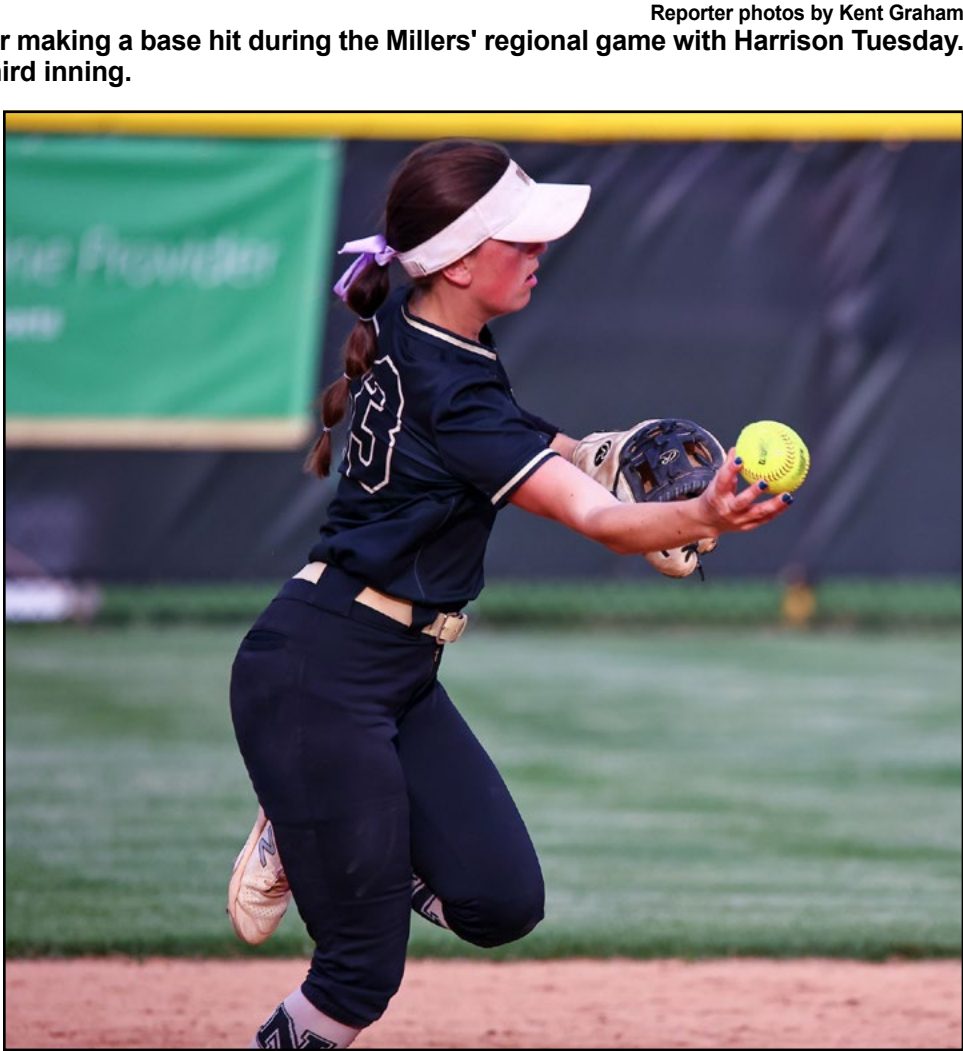

Eagles beat Tigers in Sectional 8 final

**NOBLESVILLE** - The Fishers baseball team saw its season end in the Class 4A Sectional 8 championship game on Monday, as the Tigers were beaten by Zionsville 6-0 in an all-Hoosier Crossroads Conference final at Don Dunker Field in Noblesville.

The Eagles rode the pitching of Andrew Dickson and the hitting of Brody Chrisman to their first sectional title since 2018 and 15th overall. Fishers finished the season 22-8.

"They won when it counts," said Tigers coach Matthew Cherry. "We did that last year. We were 7-7 in conference, finished fourth just like they did this year and got hot at the right time."

The Tigers seemed to be in good position right at the start of the game, as their first two batters, Joey Brenzczewski and Carson Dunn, were both hit by pitches. But Dickson settled down after that and got the next three outs, finishing with a tagout at home plate.

Zionsville quickly scored in the bottom of the first, as Colin Price led off with a triple, then Chrisman batted in for the first run. That would be a pattern for the game.

"I think they had the leadoff guy on every inning except for one and took advantage of that, and we couldn't get anything going after that first," said Fishers coach Matthew Cherry. "We had Dixon on the ropes and he's so good once he settles in."

J.P. Preston and Gavin Clayton delivered back-to-back singles in the second inning with two outs, but Dickson got a strikeout to end the inning. Zionsville would not allow a baserunner over the next two innings.

The Eagles, meanwhile, added another run in the third inning to go up 2-0. Zionsville then got the first two batters on base to start the fourth, then Chrisman stepped up and nailed a three-run home run. Chrisman

struck again in the sixth inning with a lead-off homer, giving him a total of five RBIs for the game.

"He's a great ballplayer," said Cherry, noting that Chrisman is swinging well and playing with confidence. "Not a lot we could do about that," he said.

Fishers totaled four hits in the game. After Preston and Clayton went back-to-back early in the game, Carson Dunn and Dom Oliverio had leadoff singles in the sixth and seventh innings respectively.

Jack Brown pitched four innings, striking out four.

In addition to notching 22 wins - as Cherry later pointed out, the fourth time in the last five years that Fishers has reached the 20-victory mark - the Tigers won the HCC championship with a 12-2 record.

"I'm proud of our guys," said Cherry. "I just told them we're 32-9 since we got hot last year."

# Fever fall at home to Mystics

The Indiana Fever fell to the Washington Mystics, 87-75, at Indiana Farmers Coliseum on Tuesday night. The Mystics took the second game of the four-game regular-season series to improve to 7-3, while Indiana heads into the second game of a back-to-back at 3-8.

Fever guard Kelsey Mitchell led all Indiana scorers with 26 points, her third straight game with at least 20 points and the seventh of the season. This week's Eastern Conference Player of the Week also reached 300 made 3-point field goals in her career on Tuesday night. Fever forward NaLyssa Smith started off with 11 points in the first half, but two quick fouls coming out of halftime limited her to finish with 13 points on the night. Victoria Vivians had her sixth straight game finishing in double figures, capping her night with 11 points.

For the Mystics, Ariel Atkins scored 21 of her season-high 28 points in the second half. Elena Delle Donne added 19 points and seven rebounds, extending her double-digit scoring streak to seven games. Natasha Cloud contributed 16 points and nine assists, and Elizabeth Williams logged a career-high 15 rebounds and a season-high six blocks off the bench.

Indiana started the game on a 13-2 run, but after being down 17-11, the Mystics went on a 10-2 run of their own to help cut their deficit to 23-22 after the first quarter.

To begin the second half, Washington connected on its first four shots to trail 50-49 at the 7:28 mark. The Mystics defense was tough to match in the third quarter holding Indiana to 5-of-20 shooting out of the break.

Atkins scored 11 points in the fourth quarter alone and Washington shot 61 percent from the floor in the final 10 minutes to seal the victory.

The Fever now shift to a stretch of three straight road games beginning at the Barclays Center against the New York Liberty on Wednesday night at 7 p.m. The Fever pulled out a 92-86 road win in overtime in the teams' first meeting back on May 13. The Fever set a new record for total rebounds in the win with 57 rebounds, led by NaLyssa Smith's 17 boards and Queen Egbo's 14.

For New York this season, the Liberty have dropped seven games in a row after winning a nailbiter in its season opener against the Connecticut Sun. Their most recent loss was a 92-61 defeat in Seattle. Han Xu led the Liberty with 13 points, followed by Natasha Howard with 10. Xu has scored at least 10 points in each of the four games she has played this season.
