funded for expansion. Its intersection with the road will be marked with people-activated yellow flashing lights.

- State Road 37 will be resurfaced north of Strawtown and State Road 13. Strawtown Avenue will have a roundabout in place by 2026.
- INDOT is willing to work with businesses on signage for road closures.
- The on-ramp to U.S. 31 from State Road 38 should be open next week.

Duke Energy Government and Community Relations Liaison Dagny Zupin spoke about various upgrades coming to the area, including the installation of automatic sensors which will speed up the detection of defects and pinpoint outages much faster.

"In 2016, we proposed a plan to reduce the risk of power outages on our system through measures such as replacing aging infrastructure," Zupin said. "We upgraded or replaced hundreds of utility poles and overhead and underground power lines. We've improved hundreds of substations which convert voltage for use by customers.

destined to become a popular destination in the core of the city. While portions of the park remain under construction, some of the most exciting features are now open for the public to enjoy, including all-new playground equipment, pickleball courts, an accessible boardwalk, year-round restrooms, picnic shelters, and an expanded parking lot.

- Reimagined play experience: The new "tree-tastic" playground equipment accommodates play for ages 2 to 12. With cues from the natural surroundings, the custom-designed play structures were crafted to look like artistic renderings of trees and shrubs.
- Pickleball courts: Pickleball courts are now open as well. The park sports four outdoor pickleball courts that will be open from sunrise to sunset. Play is first come, first serve and there is no charge to use the courts.
- Boardwalk & restored wetlands: The accessible boardwalk threads throughout the wetland area and allows park guests to get an up-close look at the animals and plants living here. **Over the next two to five years, the wetlands will come to life.** Once established, the wetland will create a robust habitat for a variety of reptiles, fish, birds, and other creatures.

Those interested in participating in the 2022 Noblesville July 4th Parade have until Wednesday, June 29 to submit entry forms, which are available online at noblesvillefireworksfestival.com. Registration is \$25. The City of Noblesville is waiving the entry fee to all nonprofits organizations that want to participate.

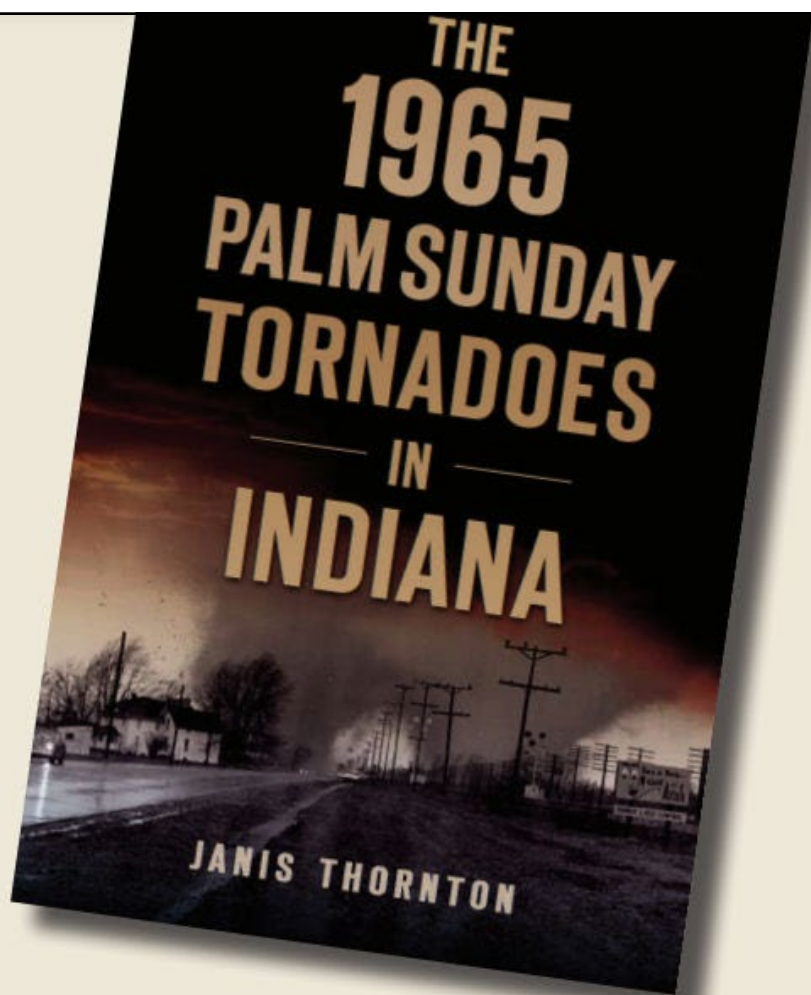

The making of A Meadow’s Tale at Cyntheanne Park

The story A Meadow’s Tale began in the summer of 2021 with my curiosity of the wildflower varieties in the fields at Cyntheanne Park, where I frequently visit as a nearby resident.

As a teacher at the IPS/Butler Lab School 60, I thought it would be perfect for my pre-kindergarten students and their families to engage in a year-long study of the meadows there. Our class then composed a story encompassing the work they had completed, called A Meadow’s Tale.

Written and illustrated by my students, A Meadow’s Tale follows a meadow mouse named Fern in search of spring with the help of Terry the painted turtle, Lemon the rabbit, and Eloise the monarch. From the perspective of young children, the story was greatly inspired by the works of A. A. Milne and Beatrix Potter.

When teaching, it is most encouraging to know that your excitement to learn something new is shared by the students, too. Piece by piece, students studied and built a replica of the meadows at Cyntheanne Park within their classroom. We began with perennial flowers that are seen in the school neighborhood, as well as including the Black-eyed Susan, common milkweed, and purple coneflower.

Following the changing landscape, students then studied the late-fall meadow, which included the browning milkweed leaves and monarchs stopping to feast before traveling south for the winter. An understanding of the meadow’s bed as a warm bungalow for meadow mice was a cherished winter lesson. Much to all our dismay, the revelation that mosquitos hibernate is

remembered, too. With grand anticipation of his return, the painted turtle, Terry, lay buried in the pond muck throughout our long winter studies. Students and their families met at Cyntheanne Park in mid-February to complete necessary field work. The study of the meadow in its dormant state was incredibly impactful for the students. This experience heightened the students’ anticipation for a meadow no longer resting – a spring meadow!

As spring approached, we studied the awakening meadow, and the composition of A Meadow’s Tale began. After a weekend in early spring, I reported back to them that Terry was seen swimming across the pond, which brought immense delight and confirmation that their studies and arrangement of A Meadow’s Tale were precise.

With our studies of the meadows at Cyntheanne Park, we found greater understanding of the ecological benefits of the area. There was, and still is, hope that this study inspires and motivates the installation of meadows across more cities in Indiana.

There is belief that incorporating the outdoors into teaching is not simply a nice addition, but rather

is essential to human development and flourishing. It is our hope that this story delights the audiences at Cyntheanne Park, and if you see Terry the painted turtle, please gently guide him back to the pond for us.

INDIANAPOLIS - The IHSAA's individual state tournament began Friday at Park Tudor, and Hamilton Southeastern's No. 1 doubles team provided some of the excitement in the afternoon's quarter-final round.

The Royals team of seniors Misha Bukkasagaram and Emily Orme won its quarter-final, holding off a tough challenge from Plymouth juniors Taylor Delp and Ellie Jones, 6-2, 7-6 (5). Bukkasagaram and Orme thus advanced to the semi-finals, which will be played this morning at 10 a.m. at Park Tudor.

Southeastern got off to a quick start in the first set, and held off a challenge from Delp and Jones, who began playing better as the set went on. Bukkasagaram continued to hit strong volley winners throughout the set. Orme was also doing her part, and in fact made the winning shot on set point with a low slice winner.

"We practice a lot on volleys," said Orme. "Before these matches, we have what we call the peg drill, which is basically volley battles between us and our best players on the team."

The second set was back and forth all the way through. The Pilgrims won a long first game on their serve, then the Royals held serve at 15 for 1-all. Southeastern then broke serve for a 2-1 lead, but Plymouth broke back.

That led to a sequence of five consecutive service breaks, the fifth of which gave the Royals a 4-3 lead. Orme hit a return winner on game point to get HSE ahead once again. Orme would later hit a service winner on a second serve during the next game, which saw Southeastern hold to go up 5-3.

An Orme volley gave the Royals match point at 30-40, but the Pilgrims got three straight points to hold at 5-4, then broke for 5-all. Plymouth then held for 6-5 and had two set points in the next game, but the Royals saved them both and held for 6-all.

That sent the set into a tiebreak. South-

Bukkasagaram noted that sometimes the crowd noise can be used to a player's advantage.

"I also think sometimes it honestly helps, because it makes you feel more like that game mode," said Bukkasagaram. "I think that's really something that helps me build up my anticipation for the next point and all of that."

The Royals will take on the South Bend St. Joseph team of sophomore Ashi Amalnathan and freshman Anni Amalnathan in this morning's semi-finals. The St. Joseph team received a bye into the semi-finals. Engle and Taylor will play the Floyd Central squad of junior Amelia Meunier and sophomore Elizabeth Banet.

The semi-final winners will play for the state championship at 2 p.m.

Fever fall to Liberty

Fever guard Kelsey Mitchell scored 23 points Friday night to keep her atop the WNBA leaderboard recording nine games with at least 20 points in a 97-83 loss to the New York Liberty. Mitchell started out with 15 points in the first quarter, and finished with eight points on 4 of 7 shooting in the second half. With her 137th consecutive game played on Friday, she is now one game away from tying the franchise record held by Tamika Catchings at 138.

Fever forward NaLyssa Smith finished with 15 points and nine rebounds, her ninth game with at least 10 points. Victoria Vivians also had her ninth game scoring in double figures, ending with 11 points, four assists, and three steals.

In the final game of the regular-season series, Indiana committed a season-low five turnovers and outscored New York, 19-4, on second-chance points.

The first quarter started off competitive, with the Fever forcing six turnovers and leading 22-18 after the opening quarter. Vivians and Tiffany Mitchell briefly left the game with injuries in the first before returning in the second quarter. Indiana held the

Liberty to 2 of 11 from beyond the arc in the first half and owned a 43-38 halftime lead.

Coming out of the break, New York began the third on an 11-3 run to take a three-point lead at the 7:17 mark. New York would continue to grow the lead on the way to a 34-point quarter, the highest-scoring quarter from the Liberty this season.

In the fourth quarter, New York would put the game out of reach with seven three-pointers, including three from Marine Johannes in her season debut. New York finished 11 of 17 from beyond the arc in the second half alone.

For New York, Natasha Howard led the game with 25 points on 12 of 16 shooting to go along with 10 rebounds and five assists. Han Xu scored a career-high 16 points off the bench. Sabrina Ionescu ended with 13 points, six assists, and seven rebounds. Johannes finished with 11 points.

The Fever will face its first western conference opponent on the road this season at the Minnesota Lynx on Sunday at 7 p.m.

Sunday's game will be streamed on the official Indiana Fever Facebook page in Indiana, Kentucky and Ohio.

Rossi stays red hot, tops first Road America practice session

After finishes of fifth and second in the past two NTT INDYCAR SERIES races, Alexander Rossi seems to be back in championship form with Andretti Autosport.

The driver of the No. 27 NAPA AUTO PARTS/AutoNation Honda solidified that notion Friday in the weekend's first practice at Road America, turning the fastest lap of the 75-minute session in preparation for Sunday's Sonsio Grand Prix at Road America presented by AMR, the eighth of 17 races this season.

Rossi arrived at the picturesque 14-turn, 4.048-mile permanent road course on the charge, up to seventh in the driver standings after top-five finishes in the Indianapolis 500 presented by Gainbridge at Indianapolis Motor Speedway and the Chevrolet Detroit Grand Prix presented by Lear at the Raceway at Belle Isle Park in Detroit. Rossi trails series leader Will Power by 74 points. He has finished in the top 11 in five consecutive races.

Friday, Rossi led Friday's field of 27 car-and-driver combinations with a lap of 1 minute, 45.6027 seconds, the first step to-

ward what could be his first series victory since 2019. At this same track, the Californian led 54 of the 55 laps, winning by more than 28 seconds for his seventh career series win.

"Yeah, it was good," Rossi said of the first-day Road America practice. "It's a bit weird to have (the use of) the Firestone (Firehawk) alternate tires on Day 1, so it will be interesting to see how that translates to practice and qualifying (Saturday). The track evolution will continue to get better every session of the weekend.

"Obviously, the car rolled off really strong, which is positive on these weekends where it's so close you've got to start from a good point."

Rossi's lap edged the best time set by teammate Colton Herta, who posted a 1:45.7361 in the No. 26 Gainbridge Honda of Andretti Autosport w/Curb-Agajanian. Rossi couldn't be happier if he could end his 44-race series victory drought this weekend at this track.

"I love this place," he said. "I think it's one of the top five road courses in the world

in my book. It's got everything. It's just a joy to drive around here.

"It's a beautiful part of the world, the people are great, the fan turnout is awesome, the weather usually is pretty good, so all A-pluses in my book."

Marcus Ericsson, the winner of last month's "500," was third Friday in the No. 8 Huski Chocolate Chip Ganassi Racing Honda at 1:45.8050. Will Power was fourth in the No. 12 Verizon Team Penske Chevrolet at 1:45.8592 with last year's Road America winner, Alex Palou, fifth in the No. 10 The American Legion Honda of Chip Ganassi Racing at 1:45.9140.

The 27 cars turned 160 more laps than were turned in last year's first practice, an average of more than five laps per car.

This race features the series return of Simona De Silvestro, the 2010 Indianapolis 500 Rookie of the Year who has finished as high as second in her 69 career starts. She is driving the No. 16 Paretta Autosport Chevrolet in a partnership with Ed Carpenter Racing.

"It was definitely much faster and (the

car) braked much better than anything I've driven the last five years," De Silvestro said. "It was really good. I'm really happy to be back in INDYCAR, especially (at Road America). It's quite special.


"I think Road America is one of the coolest tracks we get to and one of the fastest ones. Definitely feels really fast at the moment."

The presence of De Silvestro and Tatiana Calderon (No. 11 ROKiT/AJ Foyt Racing Chevrolet) gives the NTT INDYCAR SERIES two women drivers in the same race since the 2015 Indianapolis 500 presented by Gainbridge. That race featured de Silvestro and Pippa Mann.

Series resumes action at 10:45 a.m. with the first of the day's two practices. The second, at 5:20 p.m., follows NTT P1 Award qualifying at 1:45 p.m.

All of the action can be viewed on Peacock Premium, NBC's live streaming platform. The INDYCAR Radio Network also will have coverage on the INDYCAR Mobile App and racecontrol.indycar.com.

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
